Mario Avila explains system

County receives grant for dry hydrants

According to Mario Avila, District Conservationist in Yoakum County, a "dry hydrant system" is a non-pressurized pipe system that can be installed in a permanent body of water such as a pond, lake, or perennial stream. Pumpers from rural volunteer fire departments are able to draft water directly from these dry hydrants.

Avila continued, saying that "in our area of Texas, we use a modified dry

hydrant system. The modified dry hydrant system is a pressurized pipe system installed on irrigation wells, which are abundant in most parts of our county."

He iterated that there were several benefits that the dry hydrant system provides. "We all know that rural volunteer fire departments must be able to deliver large volumes of water to fire scenes by tankers. The travel distance to fill up points is critical to the fire fight-

ing capability of a volunteer fire department."

Dry hydrants provide a readily available source of unprocessed water for fire protection and allows rural volunteer fire departments to be much more efficient by providing water sources close to fire risks.

Avila added, "you can see how a well planned and installed system of dry hydrants can provide rural communities with peace of mind, reduced property loss, improved safety conditions, and possibly reduced insurance rates."

Avila announced that the Yoakum

County RC&D (Resource Conservation and Development) Council in coordination with the Yoakum County Commissioner's Court had applied for a grant to install some dry hydrants in Yoakum County. Judge Dallas Brewer recently received word from the Texas Forest Service that Yoakum County had received a grant to install six dry hydrants.

A coordination meeting will be scheduled within the next few weeks, to finalize plans on where these will be located and who will maintain them. Avila stated that he would be drafting a letter shortly calling the meeting.

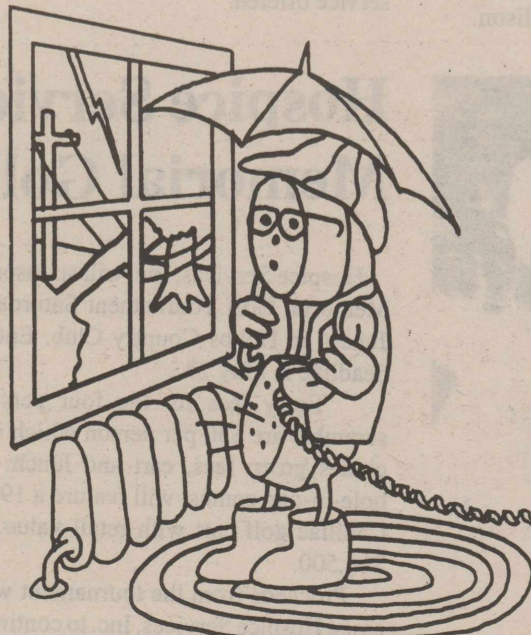

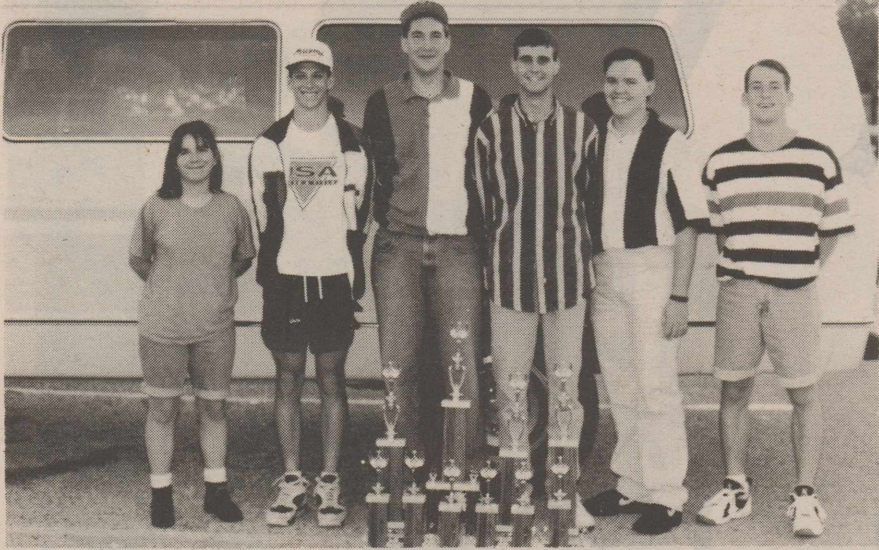

Tracy Bearden placed sixth in Number Sense, eighth in Calculator, seventh in Mathematics, and seventh in Science.

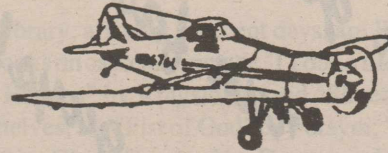
Brian Wilson placed ninth in Number Sense, 11th in Calculator, 11th in Mathematics and sixth in Science.

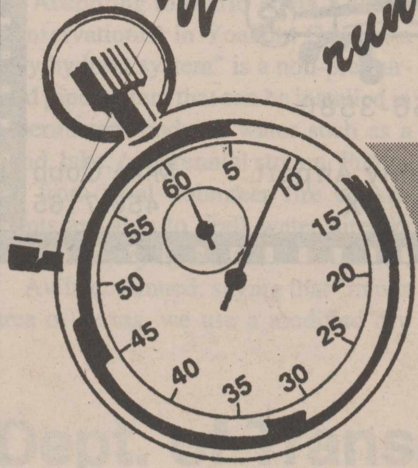
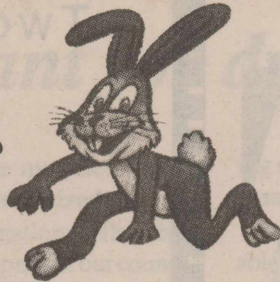

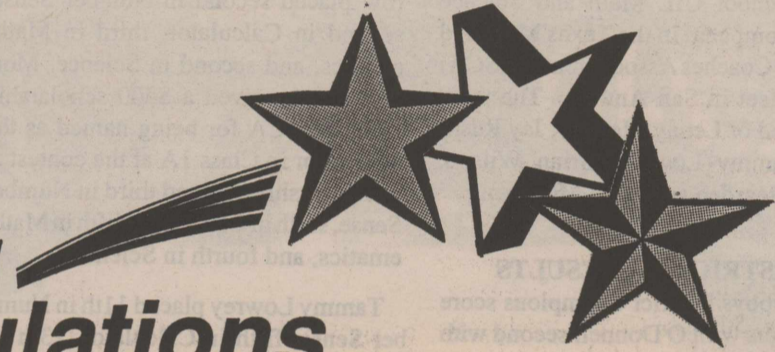


AMY CRUTCHER - State Qualifier in the 300m. hurdles.

Barbara Bullock of Hospice speaks to Tsa Mo Ga Club

Barbara Bullock, director of community services for Hospice Services Inc. of Hobbs, NM, was guest speaker recently for a program for Tsa Mo Ga Study Club.

Hospice helps patients of all ages achieve physical and emotional comfort so that they can concentrate on living as fully as possible, she explained. The organization concentrates efforts on terminally ill people and their families, helping them cope with the prospect of death.

"Hospice takes the view that death is as much a part of life as birth," she said. "With proper care, the last period of someone's life can be a time of peace and growth."

Hospice Services Inc. serves the residents of Lea County, NM and Gaines and Yoakum Counties of Texas. Organized in 1991, it is one of the fastest growing offices in the hospice network and one of few in the U.S. that is licensed to operate in two states. All nurses in the local organization are licensed to work in both Texas and New Mexico.

The original office is located at 901 E. Bender in Hobbs. Another office was opened last month in Denver City.

Approximately 20 percent of the funding for Hospice Inc. is provided by donations, memorials, fund raising grants and gifts, Ms. Bullock explained. Donations are tax deductible. Gift envelopes are available at Yoakum County Library in Plains.

Volunteers on the local level are needed, Ms. Bullock said. Interested persons may contact Hospice Services Inc. at 505-393-4717.

Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087 or the TNRCC Lubbock Regional Office.

You may submit written comments concerning the permit application to the Office of Air Quality, New Source Review Program in Austin. All written comments received within 30 days after the second publication of this notice shall be considered by the Executive Director in determining whether to issue or not issue the permit. All written comments will be made available for public inspection at the TNRCC Central Office in Austin. This notice is to be published on May 11 and May 18.

Any person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the proposed facility may request the Commission to hold an informal public meeting and/or contested case hearing on the permit application pursuant to Section 382.056(d) of the Texas Health and Safety Code. The Commission is not required to hold a contested case hearing if the basis of a request is determined to be unreasonable. All requests for a contested case hearing must be received in writing within the 30-day comment period regardless of whether an informal public meeting has been held or scheduled on this matter. If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/We request a public hearing"; (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. Requests for a public hearing on this application should be submitted in writing to Bill Ehret, Assistant Chief Hearings Examiner, Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, Telephone (512) 305-9087.

Before a permit can be issued for this facility, the applicant must demonstrate that all emission sources are in compliance with all TNRCC air quality Rules and Regulations and all applicable Federal Regulations. This includes the application of "best available control technology" to each new or modified emission source and compliance with all ambient air quality standards.

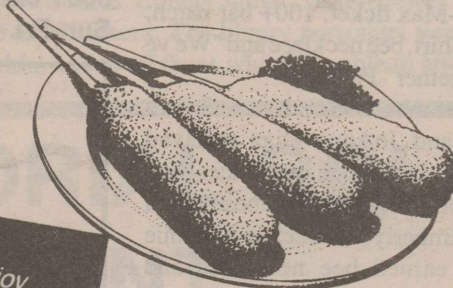
