January 1, 2015

Thornberry prepares to lead Armed Services Committee

Congressman Mac Thornberry will make history next week.

On Tuesday, January 6, he will be sworn in for his eleventh term in the US House of Representatives, and then the passage of a resolution will make the boy from Clarendon the first Texan to lead the House Armed Services Committee.

Thornberry never expected to be in Congress this long when he was first elected with the Republican revolution in 1994, but his longevity has led him to a position of influence that few Americans will ever realize.

"You feel a certain weight to do the most you can with the job," Thornberry told the Enterprise last week. "It is only because of the support of people at home that you can rise in seniority."

The CISD Board of Trustees met behind closed doors for about an hour at their regular meeting this evening before selecting Norrell, who has held the top job in Adrian for four and a half years and was attracted by Clarendon's reputation.

"People are drawn to good schools," he told the Enterprise, "and Clarendon is a good school with a good history and potential."

College making strides

Clarendon College is back in session this week with late registration continuing through Friday.

Students began their spring classes on Tuesday, but college faculty and staff were back in force last Thursday during All College Day for orientation.

President Robert Riza addressed his employees that day and gave them a positive outlook on a college that he said is headed in the right direction.

"We are changing the culture of this college," Riza said. "That's a positive thing, and we're making strides."

January 29, 2015

City taps Dockery as administrator

David Dockery was named the next Clarendon City Administrator during the regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen Tuesday night, January 27.

City officials made the decision after meeting behind closed doors for about 40 minutes. Dockery later accepted the position and is expected to meet with Mayor Larry Hicks soon to finalize contract details.

Hicks said Wednesday morning that a start date for the former

Two-county high-speed chase ends in Clarendon

A high speed chase that ended in downtown Clarendon was one of several cases that had local law enforcement busy last week.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Armstrong County dispatchers got a call of a subject throwing litter out of a car west of Claude on Friday evening, January 30; and when a deputy responded the subject evaded and led officers on a chase into Donley County on US 287.

Donley County deputies successfully spiked three of the vehicle's tires but were not able to stop the vehicle until it got downtown in front of City Hall.

Matthew Andrew Dunscombe, a 24-year-old resident of Tucson, Ariz., was placed under arrest for Evading Arrest and was subsequently arraigned before being returned to the custody of Armstrong County.

Stavenghen Video closing

Clarendon's main street will have one fewer businesses in a short time after Stavenghen Video owner Bill Stavenghen announced this week that he will soon be closing his doors.

After 27 years, Stavenghen says he has no complaints about his relationship with RadioShack. Instead, he says the Internet was ultimately the demise of his store with Netflix cutting into the video rental business and shoppers saving money online.

"The Internet killed us," he said. "I never thought it would happen. At Christmas everyone goes online to beat the crowds. That hurts Amarillo stores, but it really hurts local businesses."

CC spring enrollment down

Clarendon College reports spring enrollment is down slightly following the 12th day of class last Wednesday, February 5, but contact hours, which determine CC's state funding, were up slightly.

CC President Robert Riza said the strong economy in Gray County impacts the college's Pampa Center with more students going into the workforce than pursuing education.

February 19, 2015

Clarendon EDC names King interim director

Jack King was named the Interim Director of Tourism and Economic Development by the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation last week.

The CEDC Board met in called session Monday, February 9, and interviewed King before voting to approve his appointment. King's first day on the job was Monday, February 16, and says he sees several positives for Clarendon.

Chamber honors Selvidge

Former mayor Tex Selvidge was honored by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce with the 2014 Saints' Roost Award for his lifetime of service and commitment to the community during the annual Chamber Awards Banquet last Thursday, February 12.

Man of the Year honors went to Jacob Fangman, and Denise Bertrand was named the Woman of the Year.

Selvidge grew up in Stinnett and joined the Clarendon College family in 1965. He served several positions but is best known for his two-decade stint as Dean of Students, until his retirement in 1998. Through the years he also ran a small business on Kearney Street, served as an adult probation officer, and has been elected to public office.

CC Regents extend Riza's contract

The contract of Clarendon

College President Robert Riza was extended when the CC Board of Regents met in regular session last Thursday, February 19.

Regents met behind closed doors for nearly an hour and a half discussing college personnel, evaluating the president, and discussing real property leases in Childress and Amarillo.

When they resumed in open session, regents approved extending Dr. Riza's contract through June 1, 2018, and approved an increase in salary for the president as well.

Friends help woman during fire

A Clarendon woman is grateful for her neighbors and local firemen this week after a fire threatened her home last Friday, February 27.

"I started to go get my purse (in the back bedroom), but then I thought 'get out of here.'"

The 90-year-old, who uses a walker to get around, made it to the front porch about the same time that a neighbor noticed what was happening.

Clarendon College freshman Sarah Luttrell was across the street in her parents' home with her friends, Deborah Howard and Zhanae Bassett, when she noticed what she first thought was fog outside the kitchen window. She soon realized it was smoke coming from Gray's house, alerted her friends, and took off out the front door.

Luttrell and Howard each took an arm and helped Gray to safety in the nearby car of Jack Barton, who had pulled up in time to see Luttrell dashing across the street. Meanwhile, Bassett was calling 911.

March 12, 2015

County agrees to delay in tax abatement

A wind farm tax abatement was pushed back for a one-year period when Donley County Commissioners met Monday, March 9.

County Judge John Howard said the abatement agreement with Cielo Land & Cattle remains unchanged except for the start date. Cielo's project construction schedule has shifted one year to accommodate the extension of the federal production tax credit and to secure appropriate financing.

Johnson carries Texas Admiral title

You don't have to salute Clarendon's Kevin Johnson the next time you see him, but he carries a new title that few people ever get. and that some didn't even know existed. He's an Admiral in the Texas Navy.

Of course, it's been a long time since actually had a navy. These days being a Texas Admiral is honorary title bestowed by the governor. It's position very much like that of a Kentucky Colonel.

Congressman John Culberson of the Seventh District and State Rep. Dwayne Bohac of the 138th District worked to nominate the local spur maker and artist for the honor for the work he has done to promote Texas history and culture

and also for the work he's done to make badges and other things for Texas Rangers.

Local woman sentenced to 18 months

One woman was sentenced to state jail after a district court hearing on Friday, March 6.

Patricia Danielle Moffett pleaded not true to allegations listed in the State's Motion to Adjudicate Guilt and was sentenced to 18 months in the State Jail Division of Texas Department of Criminal Justice for the state jail felony offense of forgery.

On September 17, 2012, Moffett, 30, from Amarillo, originally pleaded guilty to offense that occurred on August 15, 2012, in Donley County.

March 19, 2015

Services held for former Clarendon city alderman

Former Clarendon Alderman Terry Lee Noble was laid to rest Monday during services that dealt openly and honestly with a subject too often pushed into the shadows.

Noble took his own life in Pampa last Wednesday, March 12, marking the end of a lifelong struggle with depression.

Rev. Charles Lowry, pastor of CrossPointe Church in Pampa, officiated the service and addressed the topics of suicide and depression while eulogizing his friend.

"I don't want to make anyone uncomfortable, but we better start talking about this," Lowry said.

March 26, 2015

Dockery to review city's water system plan

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen put the brakes on an extensive water system improvement plan last Tuesday, March 17, in order to give new City Administrator David Dockery time to review the project.

Dockery commended the board for the work the city has done to identify issues of concern that need addressing and finding a way to pay for those improvements, but he asked the aldermen to give him one month to review the project before proceeding.

April 2, 2015

City names judges for May election

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen appointed election judges for the upcoming May election during the city's regular meeting March 26.

Bunny Owens will serve as the election judge, and Wilma Lindley will the alternate judge.

Election day is May 9. Mayor Larry Hicks is unopposed for reelection, and three men are running for two places on the board. Aldermen Doug Kidd and Sandy Skelton are joined on the ballot by Britton Hall.

CC changing approach to developmental education

Clarendon College is changing the way development education is taught and putting students on a fast track to success, and now the

word is spreading among academic circles.

Last fall, CC undertook a new math pilot program where students needing developmental education were enrolled directly into college level courses paired with a supplemental lab, rather than the typical one- to three-semester route of taking developmental level courses and labs and then the college level course afterwards.

This shortened path has proven to increase the percentage of entering developmental students that successfully complete a college-level course and has cut the time to complete that college-level course by up to three semesters. Additionally, this has resulted in a significant tuition savings to students and a greater overall chance of graduating from college.

HISD names Waldrop as lone finalist

Hedley ISD trustees named Colby Waldrop as their lone finalist in their search for a new school superintendent last Thursday, April 2, during a called board meeting.

Interim Superintendent Bill Wood said the board was unanimous in its selection of Waldrop after considering four applications and interviewing two candidates.

April 16, 2015

Jones 5K draws 117 runners

Clarendon's Gavin Word and Jennifer McIntosh were the top men's and women's finishers of the third annual Chance Mark Jones Roar 'N Run 5K last Saturday, April 21, at Clarendon College.

The race sponsored by the Clarendon Lions Club in conjunction with National Child Abuse Awareness Month, drew nearly 200 registration with 117 actual runners and walkers as well as dozens of spectators, supporters and workers.

County sees rise in foreign residents

Like most of the United States, Donley County saw an increase in the number of foreign-born residents over the last decade.

From 2000 to 2012, the number of Donley County residents who were born in a foreign country grew by 28 people to an estimated 91, according to U.S. Census data.

The percentage of county residents who are foreign born also increased during the period, from 1.6 percent to an estimated 2.5 percent.

The findings could be important locally because a new study by the Daily Yonder indicates rural counties with a higher percentage of immigrants are doing better economically.

Donley courthouse turns 125 this year

The Donley County Courthouse is turning 125 years old this year, and officials are taking steps to make sure the Jewel of the Plains is in tip top shape.

Bees slow work on old house

The old house at Sixth and Bugbee was again on the agenda when the Clarendon City Council held its regular meeting last Thursday, April 23.

The structure narrowly avoided condemnation by the city a little more than five months ago when the owner of the house, Linda Lewis, was given six months to address specific code concerns.

Lewis did not attend last week's meeting, but sent Julie Russell to speak on her behalf. Russell said removal of one old balcony on the house had gone smoothly but attempted removal of a second balcony had revealed an infestation of bees. Work on the house has since been hindered because of the risk of agitating the bees.

JRCA says 200+ will rodeo this weekend

More than 200 kids will put their cowboy skills to the test this weekend when the Junior Rodeo Cowboys Association hosts a spring competition at the Clarendon College Livestock & Equine Center on Saturday and Sunday, May 9 and 10.

JRCA officials say kids ranging in ages from three to 19 are registered for more than 1,100 runs over the two-day period. Events will run from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day, and admission is \$5.

CC adds \$45 million to economy

Clarendon College added an estimated \$44.5 million to the economy of Donley County and seven neighboring counties that make up the CC service area in fiscal year 2013, according to a new study.

Those figures were presented by CC President Robert Riza to the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation Board at its regular meeting Monday evening.

The 78-page reports finds that CC had \$6.5 million in direct spending during the study period, which included \$5.6 million in payroll for 121 full-time and part-time employees. Much of that figure was spent in the service area to purchase groceries, clothing, and other household goods and services.

County receives lighting donation

Donley County Commissioners discussed upcoming improvements and activities on the Courthouse Square when they met in regular session Monday, May 11.

The Courthouse Lighting Committee reported that the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation had approved a request to provide \$5,000 for electrical improvements and additional lighting for the holiday season. Most of that money will go towards adding new outlets to the backs of floodlights on the courthouse lawn that can be used for

Christmas lights, July Fourth booths, and other activities.

Storm spawns tornadoes

A Saturday afternoon storm system produced tornadoic active that tore across part of Donley County.

The storm was first warned by National Weather Service in Amarillo as it entered in to the county near Brice. When emergency personnel spotted rotation, storm sirens were sounded in Clarendon, Howardwick, and Hedley as the system approached.

The NWS reported this week that three separate tornadoes occurred Saturday afternoon with the first being an EF-1 just south of US 287 between Lelia Lake and Hedley about 2:20 p.m. and lasting for 18 minutes as it tracked northeast.

A second EF-1 tornado occurred at 2:40 p.m. and continued for 27 minutes, continuing the northeast track into Collingsworth County. The third tornado was an EF-0 that occurred west of Shamrock and was on the ground for about 11 minutes.

Grant will update CVFD's extrication tools

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire

Department recently received an \$11,000 grant for a set of extrication tools through Texas A&M Forest Service's Rural VFD Assistance Program.

"Our department replaced a set of cutters, jaws, rams and a power unit that was in excess of 30 years old," Fire Chief Jeremy Powell said.

The tools can cut through car metal, apply over 10,000 pounds of force and allow rescuers to reach trapped occupants.

Services held for Selvidge

Hundreds of mourners filled the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Center Sunday afternoon, June 7, to remember the life of Leonard "Tex" Selvidge, - a man who personified Clarendon College for decades.

Selvidge, the college's former dean of students and the former mayor of Clarendon, died Tuesday, June 2, 2015. Sunday's services were led by Rev. Chris Downer and Rev. Lance Wood with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors of Clarendon.

"Tex was totally invested in youth," Rev. Wood said, "and he never lost touch with youth across multiple generations."

Clarendon College President Robert Riza also memorialized Selvidge and discussed the long-lasting impact of his 50-year relationship with the institution.

Rev. Downer eulogized Selvidge as the man who influenced him as a young man, saw potential in him, and gave him a chance. He also touched on Selvidge's own challenges as a youth who faced hard times and said those early experiences made Selvidge the great man and the great leader that he was.

"Tex said 'community' was what raised him and so he spent his life investing in 'community,'" Downer said.

New Type of Flu Vaccine Approved
Fluad is the name of the first seasonal flu vaccine approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) that contains an adjuvant. Fluad has been approved in other countries since 1997. It is used to help prevent bouts of the seasonal flu in people sixty-five years of age and older. This vaccine is produced from three different influenza virus strains and is manufactured from a process that uses chicken eggs. The vaccine contains an adjuvant called MF59. Adjuvants are used in some vaccines to help the body produce a better immune response.
In trials, Fluad demonstrated similar response compared to another FDA approved, non-adjuvanted flu vaccine. Those trials took place in over seven thousand participants aged sixty five and older in a multicenter, international clinical trial. Fluad was also evaluated in twenty-seven thousand individuals sixty five years and older.
