The Clarendon Enterprise will be closed next Monday for Memorial Day. All news, ads, and classifieds for next week's issue are due in the office by this Friday, May 26, at 5 p.m.

Local services set for Memorial Day

Two local services are planned next Monday, May 29, to honor America's fallen service men and women.

Hedley's Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion will host its annual Memorial Day service at the Rowe Cemetery on Monday, May 29, at 10 a.m.

Post members will participate throughout the service, and Clarendon College President Robert Riza will deliver the keynote address. Post members will also be placing flags on the graves of veterans at the Jericho Cemetery.

In case of inclement weather, the Legion service will be moved to the Lions Hall in Hedley.

Also Monday, the Donley County VFW Post will hold a Memorial Day service at 11 a.m. at the War Memorial on the Donley County Courthouse Square.

Post Commander Nathan Floyd and George Hall will speak during the ceremony, and music will be provided by Danny Mullins and Beverly Burrow.

Following the service, the hot dogs and chili dogs will be served at the VFW Hall on US 287 East. In case of inclement weather, the service will be moved to the VFW Hall.

Citywide clean-up set for June 5-10

A Citywide Clean-Up has been set for June 5-10 and local residents will be able to bring items to the Citizens Convenience Center at half-price for those dates.

The Clarendon City Council approved the clean-up during their May 11 meeting, and to take advantage of the half-price dumping, citizens will have to show their city water bill.

Items accepted at the center include garbage, debris, tires, and yard waste. Items not accepted include shingles, construction waste, electronics, paint, and batteries.

City Hall is also requesting volunteers to assist residents who are without means to haul off debris. City crews will pick up items at curbside for senior citizens and disabled residents. Call City Hall for more information at 874-3438.

A History of Caring Ward retiring after 43 years

Hedley's Carole Ward has spent a lifetime caring for others as a nurse, teacher, and nurse practitioner. Now after 43 years, she's ready for a rest and will retire Friday, May 25.

As a student at Hedley High, Ward remembers that a nursing recruiter visited the school and sparked her interest in health care.

"I just felt like it was the best fit for me," Ward said.

Time proved that to be true. Ward graduated and went to work as a Registered Nurse in 1974, earned her bachelor's degree in 1983, and then went back to school a third time to earn an Advanced Practice degree in 1995.

"I just kind of went back to school every ten years or so," she says.

Her career started at the former Hall County Hospital where she worked her way up to the Director of Nurses position before she left the hospital to lead Clarendon College's nursing program for five years. She worked in Memphis and Childress before becoming a nurse practitioner and opening the Clinic for Family Wellness in Memphis 1 1/2 years ago.

"It's been good," Ward says of her time running her own clinic. "I've been blessed to have a good nurse and a good office manager."

Ward's nurse, Debra Guinn, has more than 20 years' experience, and office manager Connie Mur-

dock says she has been working in health care for 37 years. Both ladies have been with Ward since the clinic began.

Clarendon resident Nancy Kidd is one of Ward's many patients who have fond feelings for Ward and her staff. She and her husband, Doug, have been seeing Ward since 2009.

"I like her honesty," Kidd said. "I could always talk to her about whatever was going on and I would trust her answers."

Kidd says she got teary eyed during her final visit to the clinic last week.

"I just hate to see her go," Kidd said. "She wasn't just my doctor, she was my friend."

Looking back on her career, Ward says the time has flown but that she would do it all over again.

It's been a long time, but it's gone by fast," she said. "I've been blessed to do it, and it's been nice to be a benefit to people that you know."

Ward says travel is likely in the future for her and her husband, Leon, who is also retired. She's not fully retiring, however, and plans to continue giving people care with her bioidentical hormone therapy.

"I'll take it easy and see what develops, but I still love what I do," she said.

A reception for Ward will be held Thursday, May 25, from 3:30 to 5:30 at her clinic at 1645 N. 18th in Memphis.

CC Regents approve 12-month faculty renewals

The Clarendon College Board of Regents approved renewing 13 faculty members who work on 12-month schedules during their regular meeting May 18.

Those faculty members renewed were Jay Anderson, welding; Missing Billings, cosmetology; Erin Campbell, cosmetology; Brent Childers, industrial maintenance; Jana Coats, cosmetology; Betty Couch, nursing; Raylynn Cruz, cosmetology; Dr. Rodney Donahue, theatre; Kaylynn Fasholtz, nursing; Bret Franks, ranch horse/rodeo; Alicia Hunter, nursing; Mandy Poole, intro to nursing; and Tommie Ray, cosmetology.

Regents also ratified the hiring of Donnie Chambliss as the Director of Maintenance and acknowledged the resignations of Gabby Gloria, student life coordinator; Connor McKowen, assistant livestock judging coach; Garner Small, assistant men's basketball coach; and nursing instructor Joanne Genn.

In other college business, the board welcomed Edwin Campbell as its newest member as he received the oath of office. Campbell was appointed last month to fill the term of the late Delbert Roberson.

Regents approved a plan for improvements to the Deyhle House as presented by

chairman Jerry Woodard.

In his president's report, Dr. Robert Riza updated the board on the college's current strategic plan, which he said includes 62 individual items. Eight of those, he said, are ongoing efforts but the remainder has all been completed, and the administration is now planning for the next strategic plan.

It was reported that Dr. Riza has been nominated by the Texas Association of Community Colleges and the Higher Education Coordinating Board to a committee looking at formula funding for community and technical colleges.

Galveston's countdown to greatness

Folks given to dreaming some 500 years ago could never have imagined the many dozens of major historical occurrences linked to Galveston Island from then until now. Keep in mind that many historians believe the island was discovered in 1519, so it's time to begin planning celebrations for the coastal playground on the 500th anniversary at hand.

A major milestone in September, 2018, will be a welcome prelude to the celebration. That's when Carnival Cruise Lines assigns its newest and largest vessel, Carnival Vista, to Galveston. This announcement underscores the corporation's ongoing confidence in the Port of Galveston, which in just 17 years has become Carnival's second-busiest cruise port, and now is number four for all lines in the USA....

In the fading years of the last century, only incurable optimists went public with positive thoughts about the viability of cruising from Galveston. In 2000, Carnival launched Galveston's first year-round cruise program with a smaller ship that served slightly more than 100,000 guests that year. Now, the island is home to three CCL vessels carrying well over half a million guests annually.

We boarded the Vista recently in Miami, where it began US cruises several months ago. It was a spring break week, so bunks were used to accommodate the 1,700 children included among the some 4,700 guests. (Add the 1,450 staff, and the total count exceeded 6,200.)

The cruise dazzled in every way. With expanded dining specialties, new activities and additional attractions, the

Vista owns many "firsts." Its 187-seat IMAX Theatre is the only one afloat, and the new SkyRide is favored by guests of all ages. (SkyRide is something akin to bike-riding since pedaling is required.) It is atop the Vista, high above the top deck and even higher above the deep blue sea. With two go-mobles on suspended tracks, riders may compete for racing victories, fastest laps or perhaps set "gazing records" of spectacular views....

Much about the Vista is subtle. The centerpiece is a colorful, pattern-changing pedestal extending skyward from the ship's center. Truly "gaze-worthy."

There's nothing new about deck numbers imprinted on carpet near elevators. A "first," though, is the "dot" placed at the end of deck numbers "6" and "9." (Who knows? Maybe this is helpful if, perchance, guests walk on their hands, or are otherwise contorted.)

Captain Stefano Battinelli has more than 30 years with Carnival, and obviously is aware that many guests are first-time cruisers. Early on, he heard guests discussing unfamiliar nautical terms, like "forward and aft," etc. Captain Battinelli made a PA announcement: "Forward is the 'pointy' end of the ship." Such explanations should be helpful in Texas, where inordinate names are cruising for the first time. (I still have a hard time accepting a widely-held opinion that

more than 75 percent of Americans have never cruised.)....

Miami remains the mecca for the industry. That's where Carnival began scheduled cruising 45 years ago. Galveston, with its rich history, provides reasons for visitors to spend extra time there before ending cruise vacations.

Many attractions warrant repeat visits. Besides, there's much to be said about arrival at cruise ports a day or more prior to departure....

Each cruise provides accounts of new experiences. Jim and Trish Demers of Annapolis, MD, provided one of the best, or maybe credit should go to their son. The couple was scheduled to fly to Miami on Friday prior to Saturday departure.

Weather in the northeast cancelled hundreds of flights, including theirs. They were forlorn until their son INSISTED on driving them to Miami. Making only gas, carpet and food stops, they arrived 20 minutes before the ship left, covering 1,083 miles in about 15 hours.

Let's applaud a remarkable son....

While in applause mode, let's hear it for Galveston leaders who hold out for the city's becoming a cruise port.

We are true visionaries.

They are lovers are the beneficiaries of their dogged determination that made it happen....

City should okay request by Allsup's

The Clarendon City Council should approve a variance request for Allsup's Convenience Stores after it holds a public hearing next Tuesday at 7 p.m.

The company, which has been in business here for more than 40 years, is in contract to buy a large tract of land on US 287 and says it plans to invest \$2.6 million to develop a larger nicer store.

So what's the problem with that? Allsup's sells beer and wine, and the new store location is right across the street from the Clarendon public schools, specifically the backside of Bronco Stadium. Unfortunately, city ordinance prohibits establishments from selling alcohol within 300 feet of a church or a school. A business can ask for a variance on this issue, and Allsup's has done just that.

The request from Allsup's has led to naysaying and ferromongering from Clarendon's usual Prophet of Doom, who once predicted that we would have drunken bums sleeping in Prospect Park and a host of other maladies if we legalized the sale of alcohol in this town. Now, we're told that Allsup's plans will attract transients, bums, and whores.

The biggest concern the Prophet and others say here is safety. The proposed site for the new store is about a block and half west of its current location at US 287 and Koogle Street. This site is supposedly too dangerous because speeding traffic coming over the hill will cause accidents with vehicles pulling in and out of the new store.

It would be a crying shame if we had to slow traffic in this town. TxDOT and law enforcement certainly have it in their power to do that... if it really is a concern. But where was all this worry when Best Western, Sonic, Dollar General, and Pizza Hut were built across the highway from this site?

In all honesty though, safety would not even be on anybody's radar if it wasn't for the alcohol issue. If someone wanted to build a hotel or a McDonald's on that property, everything would be just hunky-dory. But propose something — anything — that wants to sell beer, and some people will just lose their freaking minds.

The next supposed problem is that this new store will somehow send "mixed messages" to the children at Clarendon ISD, which tries to promote a strong anti-drug/anti-alcohol theme. The school board even approved a resolution opposed to the city granting Allsup's variance request.

The school board might want to keep in mind that a \$2.6 million improvement will generate a significant amount of tax revenue for the school. And here's a news flash for the school and the naysayers... the school kids go to Allsup's every day already. So what difference will it really make? None.

People concerned about the new Allsup's location have also been quick to suggest other more desirable, in their opinions, locations for the store. The Prophet himself has even suggested one location that is outside the city limits and would bring no sales or property tax revenue to the city, but it is just about as far away from the children as you can get. Ultimately, the location of a new Allsup's store ought to be up to Allsup's and whoever is selling the property. It's a business decision. Likewise, what happens to Allsup's current property is for that company to determine.

It's important to point out that a majority of people in Clarendon want to see businesses grow and thrive here. Your editor firmly believes that most people want to welcome Allsup's and appreciate the firm's willingness to invest literally millions of dollars in this community.

The City Council must look at the big picture in this case. Allsup's new store will mean more property taxes, more sales taxes, and more jobs. It will also further the image that positive things are happening in this community... just like in the case of the new Family Dollar, the Buckin' Bean, the Whistle-Stop, and other developments. Many other communities our size don't have these things going on. It's a sign of progress. That's what this really means for Clarendon, and that's why the variance should be approved — because business expansion is good for our city.

Beyond this instance, the council also needs to consider that highway frontage in this town is limited. The distance requirements on establishments selling alcohol are potentially limiting on development and therefore should be abolished altogether. Alcohol sales should be allowed anywhere along the 287 corridor and in the central business district. There shouldn't have to be a fight every time someone wants to put in a business that sells beer or wine.

Clarendon must be open and welcoming to development. The fate of Allsup's request will determine the message that we send to other potential businesses.

The Language of Texas Wildflowers

During March and April of this year I was able to travel the entire state for speeches, interviews and meetings. Everywhere I went the wildflowers were spectacular. It all started in early March when I was in Brenham, one of the best places in Texas to see wildflowers in the spring. Bluebonnets were just beginning to burst with color. Later in East Texas the dogwoods and redbuds brightened the woods with color.

I've never seen such a display of Indian paintbrush and primrose like I saw between Sweetwater and Fort Worth. There were blankets of them along the Interstate where you usually don't find many wildflowers.

On the way to and from San Antonio in late April the bluebonnets, Indian paintbrush, winecups and galliardias decorated the fields and pastures. I saw more types of yellow flowers than I can name. Vines, shrubs and trees were also displaying their spring colors.

When we went to California to visit our son and his family in mid-April, our daughter in law gave us a book titled "The Language of Flowers" by Vanessa Diffenbaugh that is all about what dif-

ferent flowers mean (maniculcus; you are radiant with charm). Now I know what the advertising slogan "Say It With Flowers" means.

I began thinking about what meanings some of our Texas wildflowers might have. I went to the internet and various floral dictionaries to discover that primrose conveys childhood, bluebell conveys constancy. Here are others: cactus-ardent love, daffodil-new beginnings, lady's-innocence, dandelion-rudely duty, lady's slipper-capricious, moss-maternal love, nettle-cruelty, Indian paintbrush-friendship, bluebonnet-imagination, buttercup-ingratitude, foxglove-insincerity, scarlet geranium-stupidity, gladioli-you pierce my heart, grapevine-abundance, Hawthorne-heart, honeysuckle-devotion, broom-humility, consopsis-always careful, goldenrod-encouragement, marigold-grief, sunflower-false riches,

yellow rose-infidelity, sage-good health and long life, verben-a-pray for me, forsythia-anticipation, wisteria-welcome, oleander-beware, bird of paradise-magnificence, heliotrope-devoid affection, lavender-mistmood, mimosa-sensitivity, pansy-thinking of you, phlox-our souls are united, when Anne's lace-fantasy, trumpet vine-fame, zinnia-I mourn your absence, rosebud-betrayal, dogwood-love.

Knowing all this, I'll be careful the next time I choose a bouquet. I probably won't have any scarlet geraniums, yellow roses, buttercups, foxglove, lavender, rosebud or nettles. I prefer dogwood, bird of paradise, grapevine, Hawthorne, phlox, heliotrope, and honeysuckle, with maybe some verben and forsythia mixed in.

Anyway, it was a great time to enjoy the beauty of spring. Texas writer Jack Maguire once said bluebonnets are to Texas what tulips are to Holland, what the shamrock is to Ireland. That beautiful lupine has been our state flower since 1901. Not all are blue. Some are pink, purple, red and maroon.

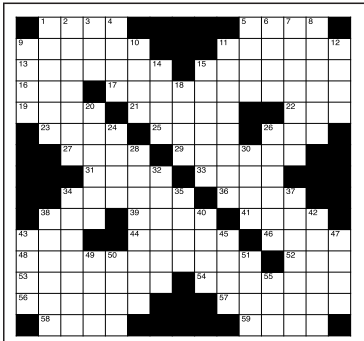

New Medicare cards, fake email scams

Hi, gang! The tornadoes were kind of close last week. Just in case you are not aware, there is a lot of the time and effort, not to mention the danger, our law enforcement officers and volunteers face each time we have a storm approaching. Sheriff Blackburn is out directing the group that includes his Deputies, the DPS officers and volunteers from the Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardwick fire departments and the ambulance service. Other people who play a major role in this is the Sheriff's Office dispatchers who not only keeps up with all the radio traffic but also answer the 911 calls along with many calls just wanting information. I haven't met the evening dispatcher; however, she did a great job, and I speak from dispatching experience. I don't want to forget the Texas Department of Transportation supervisor who also has a radio and is out checking roads for debris on our roads and can send equipment when needed.

"New Medicare cards are on the way" by Andrew Johnson, FTC
Changes are coming to your Medicare card. By April 2019, your card will be replaced with one that no longer shows your Social Security number. Instead, your card will have a new Medicare Beneficiary Identifier (MBI) that will be used for billing and for checking your eligibility and claim status. And it will all happen automatically you won't have to pay anyone or give anyone information, no matter what someone might tell you.

Having your Social Security number removed from your Medicare card helps fight medical identity theft and protect your medical and financial information. But even with these changes, scammers will

still look for ways to take what doesn't belong to them. Here are some ways to avoid Medicare scams:

Is someone calling, claiming to be from Medicare, and asking for your Social Security number or bank information? Hang up. That's a scam.

First, Medicare won't call you. Second, Medicare will never ask for your Social Security number or bank information. Is someone asking you to pay for your new card? That's a scam. Your new Medicare card is free. Is someone threatening to cancel your benefits if you don't give up information or money? Also a scam. New Medicare cards will be mailed out to you automatically. There won't be any changes to your benefits. For more on the new changes to your Medicare card, visit Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. And report scams to the FTC.

New dietary supplement website launched by Cristina Miranda Consumer Education Specialist, FTC

Ever wonder if your dietary supplements are truly safe, effective and risk-free? If you are a member of the military, this question can be particularly important. Service members often are targeted by companies selling supplements: to help members of the military lose weight, enhance workouts, or be in top shape for battle. If you're considering using a dietary supplement, you may be aware of some of the potential

health risks. But you also might want to know which supplements can be risky for your military career. To help military service members, the Consortium for Health and Military Performance (CHAMP) at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences, launched Operation Supplement Safety OPSS.org a resource with articles, videos, and downloadable educational materials.

While mostly intended for the military community, anyone can use it. Leaders, health care providers, and civilians at the Department of Defense. OPSS.org has a list of dietary supplement ingredients prohibited by the Department of Defense - which could help service members maintain their mission readiness. There also is a list of high-risk supplements so that service members can avoid using products that may contain stimulants, steroids, hormone like ingredients, controlled substances, or unapproved drugs. Can't find the right information on a particular supplement? Use the handy "Ask the Expert" feature to ask questions, and someone will respond with science-based answers.

"Fake emails could cost you thousands" by Christina Tusan Attorney, FTC

Think you got an email from a business you know? Scammers sometimes use emails that look legit to trick you into sending money to them. The email might say it's from

a real estate professional you're working with, telling you there's a last-minute change and you should now wire your closing costs to a different account. Or it could seem to be an email with an invoice from your utility company, telling you to wire payment. Whatever the story, if you wire that money, it goes to the scammer and you may never see your money again.

These scammers might get your information by hacking into a business. Once they know about you, they send an email that seems to come from the business, telling you where to send money. So, how can you spot these scams? Never wire money to anyone who emails or calls and asks you to. Instead, check it out. Contact the company through a number or email address you know is real. Don't use phone numbers or links in the email. Don't open email attachments, even from someone you know, unless you're expecting it. Opening attachments can put malware on your computer.

If you've already sent in money to a scammer, act quickly. If you wired money through your bank, ask them right away for a wire recall. If you used a money transfer company, like Western Union or MoneyGram, call their complaint lines immediately. Report your experience to the FTC and to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at ic3.gov. Give as much information as you can, including all requested banking information. The sooner you get this report in to ic3, the more likely they can help you. If your bank asks for a police report, give them a copy of your report to ic3.gov.

Also, learn more about protecting yourself from phishing. Stay safe out there!

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Drugs in the News

New Multiple Sclerosis Drug Shows Promise
In a recent study of patients with relapsing multiple sclerosis, ozanimod was linked to a decrease in yearly relapse rates. Ozanimod is a sphingosine 1-phosphate 1 (S1PR1) and 5 (S1PR5) receptor modulator. It binds specifically to S1PR1 receptors to block the flow of activated white blood cells, which decreases inflammation. Ozanimod also binds with S1PR5 receptors to help prevent nerve damage. Researchers of the study observed over 1,000 people with relapsing multiple sclerosis for 12 months. When compared to the standard drug treatment, ozanimod showed a larger decrease in relapses. Side effects of this drug may include headaches. Multiple sclerosis is a condition where the immune system attacks the covering of the nerves. It is likely caused by either a genetic disorder, viruses, or the environment. Relapses occur when there is a sudden increase in symptoms. Symptoms of relapsing multiple sclerosis may include dizziness, numbness, vision problems, and stiff muscles.

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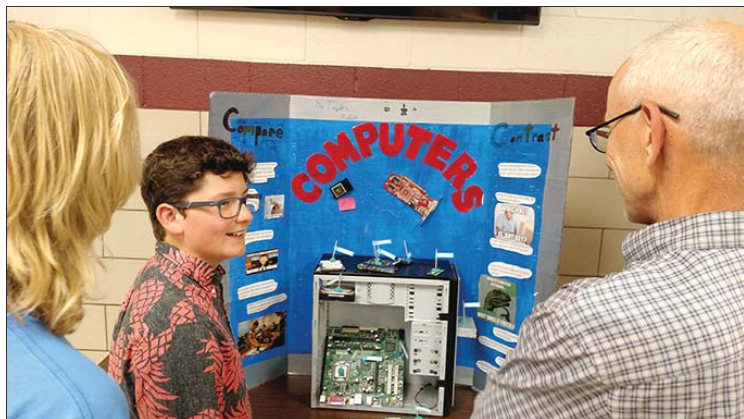

which allowed Cobb and Shadle to put two on the board for the win. Cobb, Andy Davis, and Hunsaker all had multiple hits for the Broncos.

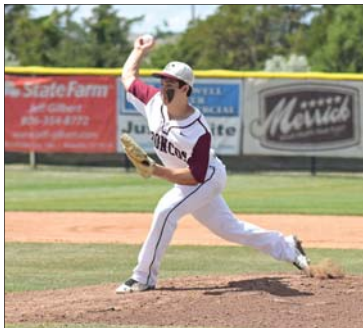

The Broncos' lone run came in the second inning. WT put their final run on the board in the fifth, but Clarendon was not able to answer.

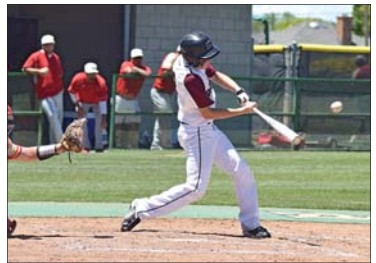

The Broncos finished their 2017 season 23-3-1.



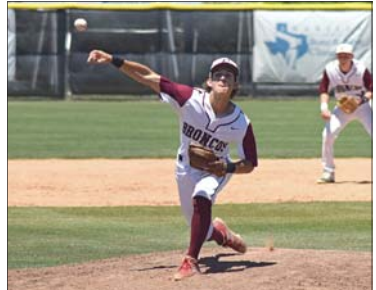


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CHS recognized for student success

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DPS enhances enforcement for holiday weekend

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will join law enforcement efforts across the state during the Memorial Day weekend to help keep Texas roadways safe. From Friday, May 26, through Monday, May 29, DPS Troopers will be on the lookout for intoxicated drivers, and drivers violating speed limit, seat belt and other traffic laws.

“As we honor those who gave their lives to protect and serve our country, we are asking all drivers to help us prevent senseless tragedies on the roadways this holiday weekend,” said DPS Director Steven McCraw. “Drive sober, wear your seat belt, slow down, obey traffic laws and use extra caution when you get behind the wheel this weekend. During the Memorial Day holiday weekend last year, DPS Troopers

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State plans for safer foster care

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott today Tuesday that the Office of the Governor's Criminal Justice Division will provide \$547,000 in funding to emergency shelters and residential facilities for support services to help reduce the number of high-needs children in foster care currently without placements.

In addition to the funding, the Department of Family Protective Services (DFPS) is also announcing new contracts to qualified residential child care providers under the Emergency Procurement Waiver for Children Without Placement. DFPS will immediately begin negotiations and establish standing contracts with the limitation that such contracts would accept children or youth who are otherwise refused placement.

"The number of children still sleeping in state agency offices is unacceptable," said Governor Abbott. "We must do better, which is why I am taking immediate action to help resolve this problem. Ensuring safe placements for children in the state's care is a top priority, and I will continue to work with the legislature, DFPS and all stakeholders to provide safe and secure placements for those in need."

The Governor and DFPS are committed to solving this important issue by providing emergency funding to secure appropriate placements for high-needs foster children. While this joint effort is designed to serve as a bridge to immediately secure placements for some of Texas' highest-risk foster youth, DFPS and the

Governor's Office will continue to monitor and assess the success of the program throughout the length of each agreement. These beds will be provided for the Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Lubbock, and Amarillo regions.

"I am extremely grateful to Governor Abbott for his continued generosity and commitment to protecting Texas children, specifically those in the State's care who need our help the most," said Henry L. "Hank" Whitman, Commissioner of the Department of Family and Protective Services. "A CPS office is no place for a foster child, and through the innovative use of these funds, and our ongoing efforts to build capacity, we hope to make it a thing of the past."

Patrick still pushing on bathrooms, property taxes

After threatening to force a special session of the Texas Legislature unless lawmakers approve a "bathroom bill" and property tax legislation, Lt. Gov Dan Patrick on Monday appeared to be unconvincing by the House's actions on the two issues.

"I share Governor Abbott's concern about the lack of a rollback provision in Senate Bill 669 on property taxes," Patrick said in a statement about a property tax measure the House passed Saturday. Patrick, like Gov. Greg Abbott, had indicated he wanted the House to approve Senate Bill 2, to require local governments that want to raise property taxes by 5 percent or more to get voter approval, but that proposal stalled in the House.

On the bathroom front, Patrick said he had concerns about the "ambiguous language" the House approved as an amendment Sunday to address bathroom use by transgender Texans in public schools because it "doesn't appear to do much." The measure the House approved would require schools to provide single-stall restrooms, locker rooms

and changing facilities to students who don't want to use facilities designated by "biological sex."

"There is still time for the House and Senate to address these concerns - which are both priorities for Texas voters - in a meaningful way," Patrick said.

Throughout the session, Patrick and Straus have been at odds over what should be the Legislature's priorities. The lieutenant governor's statement comes after a weekend of House votes on the issues that have emerged as sticking points in his efforts to push for Abbott to call a special session. The regular legislative session ends May 29.

Last week, Patrick had said he was prepared to go to a special session if the House did not act on the property tax issue and some version of a "bathroom bill." Abbott said both pieces of legislation were also priorities for him, though he has not publicly threatened a special session over the two items.

But following the House's vote on the bathroom amendment, House Speaker Joe Straus said in a statement that the governor made clear "he would demand action on this in a

special session."

Patrick had pushed for the House to move on Senate Bill 6, the measure his chamber passed out in March, to regulate bathroom use for transgender Texans or to amend a bill with language from a related House measure. Both measures stalled in the House, which on Sunday approved a more narrow proposal. Over the past few months, Straus was reticent to allow a vote on the Senate's bathroom proposal, saying the issue felt "manufactured and unnecessary."

And ahead of the House's vote on the property tax measure - which was set on the House calendar ahead of Patrick's special session ultimatum - Straus argued that the House had addressed the issue of offering taxpayers relief by focusing on a measure intended to reform the state's complex school finance system.

"Now it's really time for the Senate to take care of the many House priorities that they know they've been sitting on," Straus said in a statement Monday evening. "We'll just have to see what happens."

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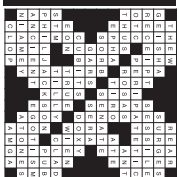
