Election to be held Saturday for H'wick, CC

Local voters will head to the polls this Saturday, May 5, to elect three members of the Clarendon College Board of Regents and the entire Howardwick City Council.

All registered voters in Donley County can cast ballots for the college district election. On the ballot are incumbents Edwin Campbell and Jerry Woodard and challengers Lance Wood and Tommy Waldrop, and the top three vote earners will be elected.

College voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. All precincts except Precinct 303 will vote at the Donley County Courthouse Annex. Precinct 303 will cast ballots at the Hedley First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall.

Registered voters in the City of Howardwick can cast ballots from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday at the Howardwick City Hall to elect five city aldermen. On the ballot are Alderman Doc Holladay, Marietta Baird, Kay Dye, and Debora Sharpton – all running for two full terms on the city council; and Brice Hawley, Johnny Floyd, Vol Lindsey, James Wix, and Mary Grady – and all running for three unexpired terms.

Early voting in the college election closed Tuesday with 56 early ballots and 11 mail-in ballots so far. There is no early voting in the Howardwick election.

County okays new Hedley JP building

A new building is coming to Hedley's Main Street after Donley County Commissioners approved a bid at a called session Monday.

County Judge John Howard said Pearson Construction submitted the lone bid to build a new office for the Precinct 3&4 justice of the peace for \$68,644.

Work on the 30-foot by 40-foot metal building is expected begin within a week and will be erected on the north side of the present building.

In other county business, the commissioners' court met in regular session April 9. Commissioners renewed the burn ban for another 90-day period and approved a \$5,000 contribution to Clarendon's city pool project.

The court considered reimbursing Finch Helicopter Service, owned by Commissioner Andy Wheatly, for assistance rendered to the sheriff's department during searches. Wheatly recused himself from the voting, and commissioners approved paying \$180 per hour for up to four hours to help defray Wheatly's fuel and maintenance costs.

Alleged child predator facing charges here

Parents are being asked to be extra vigilant after an Amarillo man was arrested here and faces multiple counts of Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn says parents need to pay attention what their kids are doing on smart phones and on social media.

"I want to wake up parents in Donley County," he said. "This is as

bad as murder... or maybe worse."

Blackburn said Vincent Darnell Williams, age 47, was arrested Sunday afternoon following an investigation by the sheriff's office.

A concerned mother brought a phone to authorities which contained text messages and other evidence showing that Williams had been grooming and performing sexual acts with a child who was 13 years

old when the crimes began.

Blackburn filled out a probable cause affidavit and obtained an arrest warrant and then lured Williams back to Clarendon where he was arrested by the sheriff and Deputy John Lockhart.

Williams was charged with two counts of first degree felony Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child and three second degree charges of

Sexual Assault of a Child. At his arraignment Tuesday afternoon, Williams' total bond for all counts was set at \$175,000.

Blackburn said he is working with The Bridge – Children's Advocacy Center to find possible resources to educate parents about the dangers facing today's kids and about activities that kids are engaged in.

In the meantime, the sheriff says parents need to be aware the dangers facing children.

"This is proof there are predators who will come to Clarendon and seek out children," Blackburn said. "I want to urge parents like they haven't been urged before. Check your kids' phones and social media every day and know what they are up to and who they are talking to."

City to hold hearing on sign regulations

The Clarendon City Council will hold a public hearing on sign regulations following discussion at last week's regular meeting.

The hearing on Monday, May 14, will be held at 6 p.m. at the Burton Memorial Library and is being held as a forum to gather feedback from residents and particularly business about current regulations on signs within the city limits and within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

The language of the current sign ordinance is available at City Hall and at ClarendonLive.com.

Also at last week's city meeting, April 26, aldermen approved updates to the city's funds investment policy and approved quarterly investment reports. Grett Betts was announced as the city's new code compliance officer, and City Administrator David Dockery said bids on the USDA-funded water system improvement project will be opened

May 4.

During public comments, Keith Floyd addressed City Council about the recent closing of a portion of S. Bugbee Avenue and S. Allen Street. He said owns part of the property on Bugbee and was never informed that the City Council was considering closing that street. He said he was strongly against closing the portion of Bugbee near the JA highway because Bugbee is a through street from US 287 to the JA Road and is used by school busses and first responders.

Floyd said the land in that area is known as "Fat Rabbit" and that it does not have the activities going on now as in the past. He does not feel that a road should be closed because one person wanted it closed and that the item should have been tabled because there was not a full Council present when the decision was made. He asked for the item be put back on the agenda and reconsidered.

'The press' is same as 'the people'

An angry US president feels hounded by the news media and is infuriated and discouraged with the intense and personal criticism of his domestic and international policies.

I would suspect virtually all of you read that opening paragraph and thought of Donald Trump – and not of George Washington.

But, in fact, it was our first president who felt the pressure of critics who attacked not just his administration but his personal integrity: A leading newspaper criticized him for a 61st birthday party it said was “monarchical” – apparently, a real political body slam in 1792. A critical press was a major reason he declined a third term, scholars say.

This tension between the White House and the journalists who report on it is neither happenstance nor the product of a conspiracy or even – in modern terms – related to “fake news.”

Even as they faced an openly partisan press, the nation’s founders provided the First Amendment as a constitutional wall, so that a “watchdog” press was free to bring a skeptical eye to the people, policies and purse strings of government.

When Trump called journalists “enemies of the people,” he got it wrong. A free press is “the people” – representing us imperfectly at times and doing its job erroneously on occasion, but in the aggregate providing us with multiple perspectives and holding officials accountable.

Let’s anticipate right here the ready and vocal critics who would say this or that news outlet – or the media in general – “don’t represent me.” Really? In fact, these mistaken souls don’t want news that “tells it the way it is.” They want “news” that tells it the way they want it to be.

Such misplaced, hyperbolic rhetoric is worrisome – but has about as much substance as whatever political pillow talk George and Martha may have had about the rancorous news media of their day.

What we ought to be concerned about is the White House assault on the very idea that a free press ought to even be present, let alone function in that watchdog role.

Yes, the traditional values of journalism – accuracy and fairness, news separated from opinion, reporting on multiple points of view – are challenged in an industry with workforce half of what it was a few decades ago, and an audience siphoned off to social media systems not dependent on any of those values.

The annual State of the First Amendment survey by the Newseum Institute has charted rising public concern about media bias and performance since the late 1990s. But Trump has given such concerns a regular voice – via a Twitter-amplified megaphone – not seen before.

When viewed alone, any one of Trump’s blustering broadsides about the news media – his so-called “Fake News Awards,” for example – typically garners a momentary gasp or a muffled guffaw, and then fades. It’s the regularity, persistence and pervasiveness of these attacks that that should concern us.

Press-presidency conflicts come and go. The nation and a free press have weathered them all. But this feels different. Polls show many of us have lost confidence that we have – or ever will have – a fair and accurate press focused on facts. Far too many of us now live in the proverbial “thought bubbles,” reading or viewing only that “news” that confirms or comports with our own view of things.

A watchdog is of no value if it’s really a lapdog.

Thanks to the Web and, in a terrible bit of irony, to the economic and personal disruption it brought to the old order of news-gathering and distribution, we have such multiple sources of information – multiple watchdogs, if you will – at our fingertips and have unprecedented access – if only we will use it.

Consume news from a variety of source and viewpoints. Keep an eye out for legal changes that replace threatening words with actions, such as wholesale reviews of libel laws making it easier to sue those with whom we disagree.

Demand accuracy, completeness and fairness from the news media sources you do use – and don’t accept or reward political pandering or slavish accommodation to what sells rather than what you need to know.

Loudly and constantly require that journalists do their jobs – but also appreciate when they do just that.

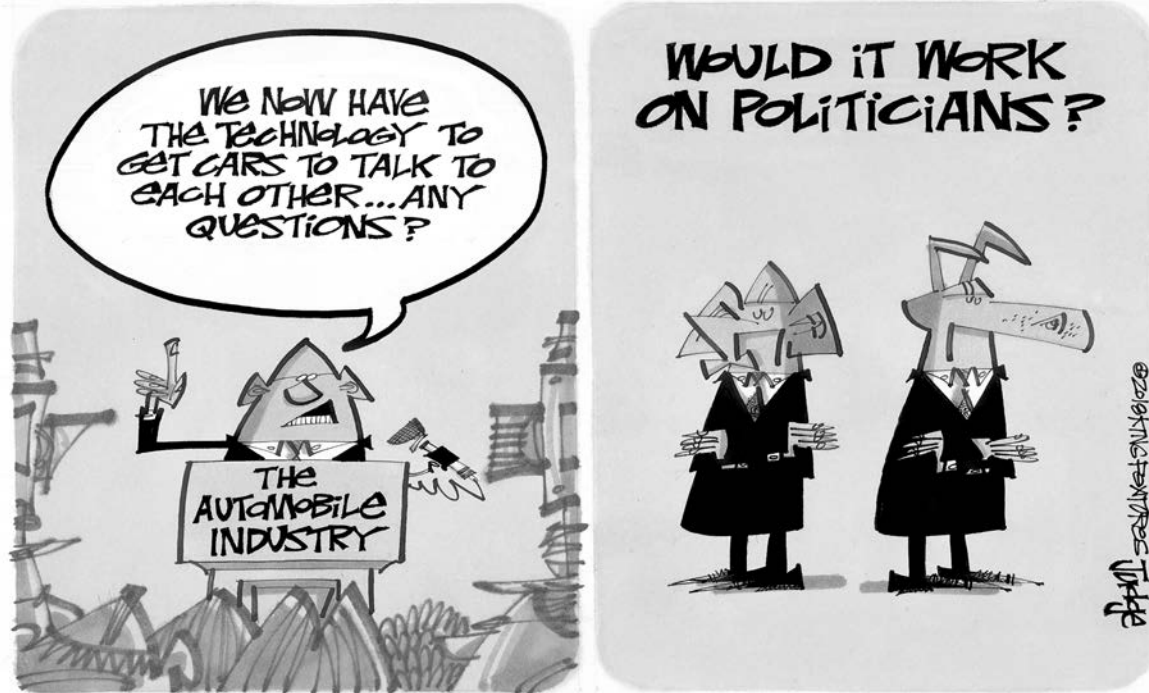
“I’m gonna say it’s returned full,” he smiled....

White Oak’s wood carving fisherman

When I drove up to L.E. Fowler’s house at White Oak, near Longview, half the driveway was taken up with a huge, well-equipped fishing boat. I could tell I was in the right place. Lots of people had told me about this legendary fisherman. Some call him a fish witch because he can catch fish where nobody else can. Some say he’s psychic. Whatever you call him, he knows where and when to catch fish.

He has won some big tournaments and has been a fishing guide. Once on a successful outing, one of his customers asked him how he was catching all those fish. L.E.’s girlfriend, who was along on the fishing expedition, was quick with the answer. She said, “I’ll tell you how he’s catching all those fish. He thinks like a fish.”

Another time L.E. was with some fishing buddies swapping stories at Uncle Ed’s Tackle Shop in Longview.

“They were talking about people being lucky,” says L.E. “This one guy said, ‘I’ll tell you who the luckiest man in this country is and that’s L.E. Fowler.

He’ll catch a ten-pound bass out of a bar ditch.’ I don’t want to sound like I’m bragging but you know, some people are talented to do different things. I’ve always been able to catch fish. There were 12 of us kids and we ate what we caught or killed.”

L.E. makes fishing lures that look like museum quality pieces of art. He carves them with simple tools while sitting in his easy chair watching television. “Everything is done with my pocket knife, my eye and my imagination.” His calls them baits and has sold them in 25 states under the name WHAT A LURE.

“I sell one of these baits for \$50. It takes me about 8 to 10 hours to make one. People seem to treasure them and won’t

hardly fish with them because they’re afraid they’ll lose them. For years I wouldn’t let ‘em have one that they had paid for until I caught a fish or two with it just to make sure it would catch fish.”

His lures are in such demand that he traded a dozen of them with Bass Pro Shop, which outfitted his fishing boat, putting equipment and supplies worth thousands of dollars. Both Bass Pro shop and L.E. were happy with the trade.

He patented a device called a hypnotizer that attracts fish. He teamed up with some marketing people but that didn’t last long.

“They wanted to fly me all over the world and I didn’t want to do that. I sold them just out on the water, people were following me around wanting me to sell them one.”

L.E. has cabinets full of his carvings. Some are life size busts of presidents, movie stars, animals and birds. They are carved from California walnut. He has another house and it’s full of his carvings.

Six members compete in the Duddz to Dazzel contest in which teams were given a discarded garment or textile item to redesign and repurpose into a new consumer product in a given category with a "closet" of additional materials that could be incorporated into their item. After completion, each team presented their finished item to the panel of judges with each member having a speaking part in their presentation.

The junior team of Kennadie Cummins, Tandie Cummins and Whitney Williams made a table runner from a t-shirt in the non-wearable category. The other junior team of Aubry Stidham, Lindley Hill, and Zane Cruse transformed a t-shirt into a sundress in wearable category. Coach Julie Gates had them well prepared for this contest, and they had lots of fun.

The District 1 4-H Livestock Judging Contest was held during the Spring Roundup on April 20 at WTAMU Nance Ranch. Donley County 4-H had 12 members compete.

The results for the Junior Division follow with overall individual placings were: Junior Team, 4th place - Grant Haynes (6), Parker

Haynes (14), Taylee Ehlert (19) and Kaitin Ehlert (45). Intermediate Team One, third overall - Calder Havens (9), Brock Hatley (25), and Tyler Harper (53). Intermediate Team Two, 10th place -Koyt Tucek (32), Kasen Hatley (39), Levi Gates (48). Caton Grahn competed individually in the Senior Division and placed 23rd overall. Placing in the individual classes in the top 25 were: Reasons- Grant 8th, Parker 11th, Taylee 18th, Team 8th; Brock 23rd. Beef- Taylee 6th, Grant 10th, Team 3rd; Brock 7th, Kasen 13th, Levi 18th Tyler 19th, Team 1 2nd, Team 2 4th; Caton 23rd. 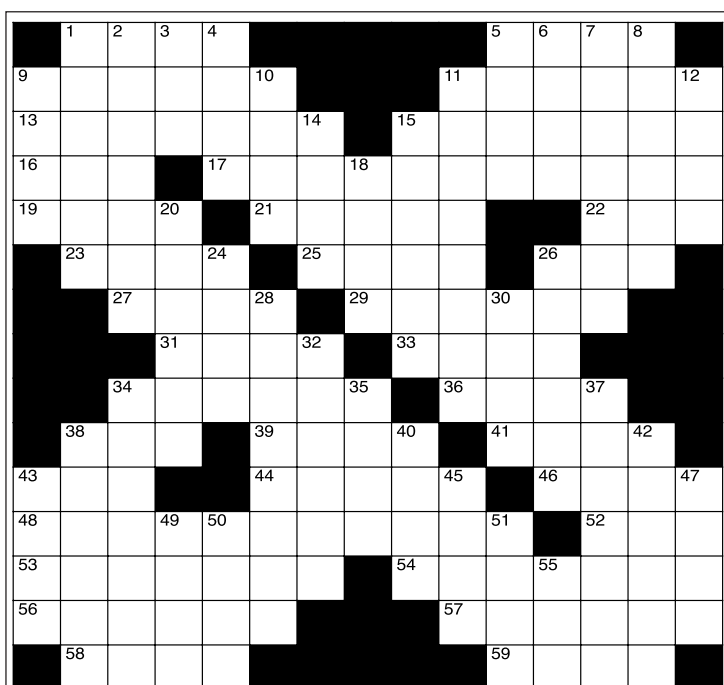

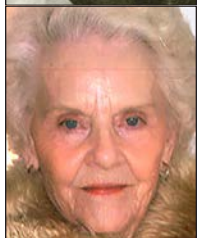

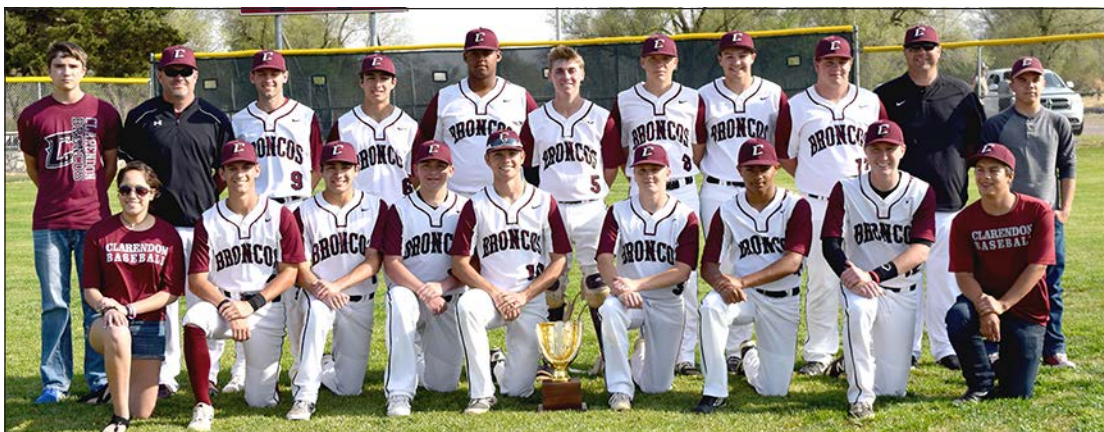
"We just had a bad fifth inning," Elam said. "Really proud of how we showed up focused and how we competed."

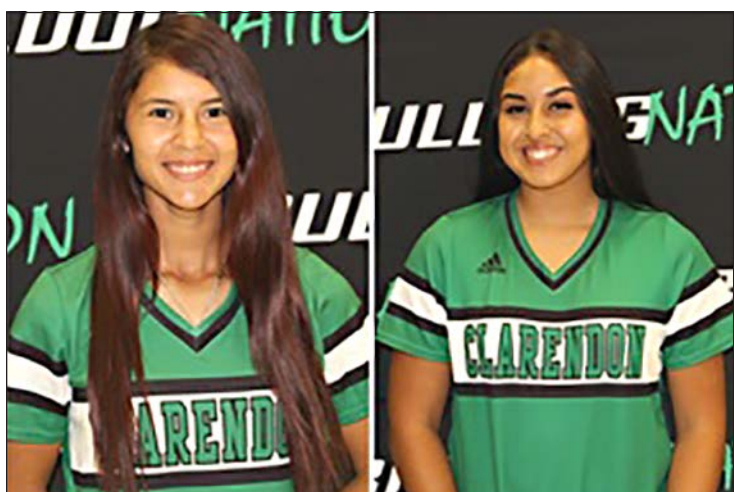
In game two, Gerardo Questel

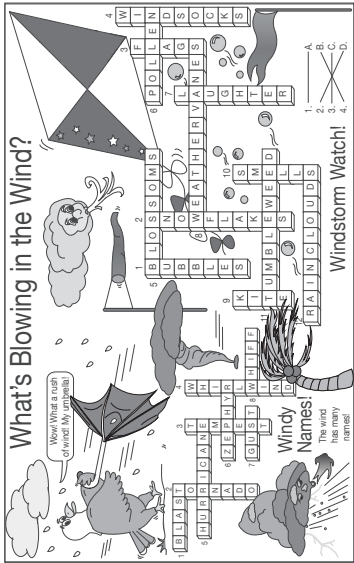
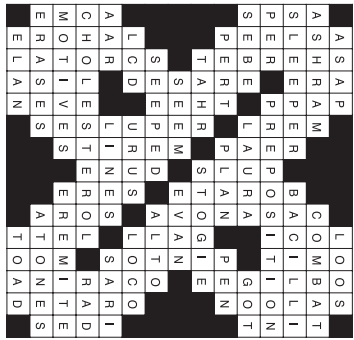

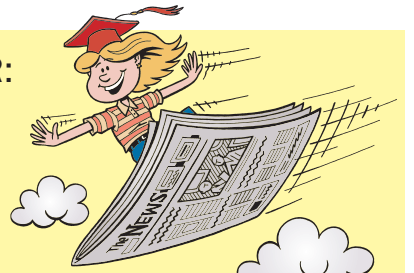
