Services set for Memorial Day

Two Memorial Day services are being planned next Monday, May 28, to honor those who gave their lives in the service of the United States.

American Legion Post 287 will hold its annual service at 10 a.m. at Rowe Cemetery, with the graves of 234 veterans being marked there. Will Thompson will welcome the crowd followed by Bill Stavenhagen offering the invocation. Marine bugler Larry Ray will play the Call to Colors with Roger Hagar and Russell Hargrove raising the colors, and other post members will participate throughout the service.

The keynote address will be delivered by Donley County Judge John Howard.

The American Legion will also place flags on veterans' graves at the Jericho Cemetery, and following the conclusion of the Rowe service, the Legion will join the Donley County Memorial VFW Post 7782 and its Auxiliary for a service at the Donley County War Memorial on the Courthouse Square shortly after 11 a.m.

The service will be moved to the VFW if the weather is bad. The Auxiliary will be serving pulled brisket sandwiches, potato salad, beans and a dessert after the ceremony at the VFW hall.

The VFW Auxiliary has also announced that it will be picking up flags at Citizens Cemetery on Monday, June 4, for those wishing to help.

Accident claims life of Hedley man

A Hedley man lost his life Saturday afternoon, during a one-vehicle accident on County Road.

The Texas Department of Public Safety responded to the accident, which occurred at approximately 5:20 p.m. when a 17-year-old male of Hedley was driving a 2018 Polaris RZR 100 all-terrain vehicle (ATV) west on CR-T,

approximately four and a half miles northeast of Hedley.

According to DPS Sgt. Cindy Barkley, the 17-year-old veered left towards the edge of the roadway which was a raised embankment. When the ATV made contact with the raised embankment, the ATV rolled over and ejected the passenger, identified as 21-year-old Zach-

ary Chapman, of Hedley. The driver remained in the ATV.

Chapman was pronounced dead on scene by Donley County Justice of the Peace Denise Bertrand.

The 17-year-old driver was transported to North West Texas Hospital with serious injuries.

Neither occupant of the ATV

were secured by safety belts. The road conditions were dry and no other vehicles were involved.

DPS officials say the crash remains under investigation.

Services for Chapman were set for Thursday, May 24, 2018, at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon with burial to follow in Rowe Cemetery near Hedley.

Mayor's comments dominate Howardwick meeting

The Howardwick City Council held its first full business meeting with its new membership last Tuesday May 15 with Mayor Greta Byars' comments taking up a large portion of the evening.

Aldermen approved minutes and city bills, before the mayor's comments came up on the agenda.

Byars warned residents to watch out for rattlesnakes in the community and updated those in attendance about restitution being paid to the city by its former fire chief for "absconding" with city equipment.

The mayor also focused her attention on the chain of command in the city in terms of emergencies,

noting that she herself is number one person to be contact. The comments stemmed, she said, from an incident about 9 p.m. last Friday when scanner traffic reportedly claimed the mayor had called for Howardwick to be evacuated while wildfires were being battled south of Goodnight and Ashtola.

Byars said she had never given any such order and promised to prosecute whoever had perpetrated the fraudulent report. Alderman Brice Hawley said he would like to get the scanner recordings from the dispatcher and hear the matter for himself.

Byars then turned her attention to the Howardwick Volunteer

Fire Department and an October 16, 2017, agreement with the department approved by the city council. The document outlines the city's responsibilities to provide insurance, funding, utilities, and other things to the HVFD. It also outlines the department's duties, but prohibits the city from exercising any control over the department or its membership.

"How many of you know that we have no control over the fire department?" Byars asked.

Alderman Doc Holladay said the agreement gives the fire department a "blank check" to do whatever it wants, Alderman Hawley emphasized that the firemen are volunteers, and Alderman Johnny Floyd said the

city should look the agreement and talk to other communities of similar size.

The mayor also said the department's members are not trained and not qualified to fight house fires. Alderman Hawley objected to that comment, saying that he himself was trained, and later in citizen comments, Coy Cooper said the HVFD has six members trained to fight house fires.

Byars also raised concerns about confusion over water conservation in which someone unrelated to the city had asked people to stop watering their yards, "pretending" to represent the city. Holladay said the water problem was due to a tripped

breaker that resulted in Red River Water Authority's tanks not filling.

Heidi Phelps later said in citizen comments that Fire Chief Will Jordan had told her that Red River's Walt Rice had told him that the water tanks were almost empty and asked Jordan not fill up the fire trucks until the tanks recovered.

"He said he wished there were a way to get people to stop watering their yards long enough to fill up tanks," Phelps said. "So Steve and I went around and did that."

Citizens and city officials put forth ideas on how to better communicate important city information, such as having an electronic mes-

Jeopardizing the freedom to assemble

Rightly or wrongly, certain First Amendment issues tend to dominate the national conversation more than others. Bring up President Trump's tweets criticizing the news media, college campus protests of controversial speakers, or the possibility of the government regulating Facebook and you're bound to inspire a rousing and possibly heated discussion.

Nevertheless, it's an issue worth paying attention to. At the end of March, legislators in Louisiana and Minnesota proposed bills that would criminalize the activities of groups protesting the construction of oil pipelines (that would be the infrastructure we're talking about).

Stopping the flow of a pipeline can cause pressure to build and puts thousands at risk of harm from an explosion. While peaceful protests are an important part of Americans' right to free speech, causing damage and putting others at risk of harm is not.

You may be thinking that this sounds reasonable enough. But the proposed Louisiana and Minnesota laws go beyond preventing protesters from causing damage to infrastructure. In Louisiana, it's already a crime to trespass into a critical infrastructure facility.

In Minnesota, the proposed law would allow anyone who "recruits, trains, aids, advises, hires, counsels, or conspires" with someone who trespasses into a critical infrastructure facility to be charged with a misdemeanor, punishable by one year in jail - or a felony, punishable by 10 years in jail, if the trespasser intended to "substantially disrupt" the facility.

As Americans, one of our core freedoms is the right to assemble peacefully in a public space. Like all of our rights, it's not without limits - the government can place restrictions on when and how we exercise it, and it can decide that certain facilities do not qualify as public spaces.

Both of these bills are currently pending (the Louisiana bill is slightly further along, having been approved by the state's House of Representatives in April).

Touching a flying piece of history

You know there are decisions that you don't make that stay with you for a while. I am hoping that I can correct one of those in the coming years.

The B-17 was the Army Air Corp's workhorse during the European campaign in WWII. A wing-span of 104 feet, a maximum speed of 287 mph, a ceiling of more than 35,000 feet, and an armament of 10-11 .50 caliber machine guns, it helped bring the European theater to a quicker close.

Some of you have heard me speak of my grandfather, H.B. Riza, a former B-17 driver. I was so happy to get to know another driver, Mr. Joe Robinson, before he passed. I won't tell my favorite Mr. Robinson story here; but if you ever ask me, and if Mrs. Robinson isn't around, I will tell you.

My uncle Brad Riza, USAF Col. (Ret), simply known to my children as "The Colonel," gave me a book years

ago titled, Combat Crew, written by John Comer. Comer was a Flight Engineer/Top turret gunner on a B-17 assigned to the 381st Bomb Group out of Ridgewell. Mr. Comer flew out of there in 1943, my grandfather flew out of Ridgewell in 1944.

I have seen a restored version before, at the Pima Air & Space Museum (Tucson, Ariz.). This was a trip that included H.B., The Colonel, myself



and my son Bobby. When H.B. saw the plane he got up out of the wheelchair I was pushing him in, and he just stared at it. The walls were covered in maps and he began to walk among them and tell stories about things only he knew.

sons that aren't in textbooks. When he got to the plane, he ran his hands down the fuselage, and you could tell he was thinking of the crew he had led during 35 missions over "the continent" as they referred to Europe.

Saturday in Amarillo, I saw the Texas Raider, one of the last operational B-17s in existence, painted in the markings of the 381st Bomb Group. I stood outside while they fired up each

of the four engines to taxi out and take off. I can only imagine the sounds if you were a civilian in Ridgewell when 75 of these planes were preparing to fly. Towards the later years of the war, it was not uncommon for the 8th Air Force to put 1,000 planes in a mission, as some have said, almost blocking out the sun.

The decision I regret was not riding in the Texas Raider. I missed that opportunity and hope that I can make up for it later. I am very aware that the plane, and the men that flew it, will all be gone in the near future.

They reside at attention in long straight lines on fields of grass without a blade out of place,



long forgotten and hidden from sight amongst the Oaks, Hickories and Wildflowers.



Take time to search them out, for they all have stories they wish to share.

An almost picture perfect day...

The 66-acre tract, with White Rock Lake as a backdrop, is a recognized respite from a fearful, fractured world that surrounds - but fails to suffocate - and is not allowed inside.

Everything about the Arboretum is inviting, and more than a million folks from all 50 states visited during each of the past two years. It is a place of "do's," and almost no "don'ts." Want to walk on the lawn? That's fine; bring a picnic spread if you'd like. Inhale nature. Be on the lookout for summer concerts and special events.

The staff genuinely appreciates guests. Maybe it's because staffers likewise feel appreciated. Just a few days earlier, volunteers heard Arboretum leaders praise them for their toil, indicating that if their annual work had been done by hires, it would have cost in excess

of \$2 million. There are more than 2,500 volunteers, including about 500 who serve regularly throughout the year.

Nearby is a giant Bois D' Arc tree that is more than 200 years old. It offered massive shade during hot summers more than a century before air-conditioning was dreamed of.

Poet Joyce Kilmer credited God with making trees, and surely this is one of the Almighty's best. Had Kilmer ever seen this tree, the poem for which he is known might have had verses without end....

Outfielder Collin Butler and Utility player Payton Hicks were both named to the Second All-District Team.

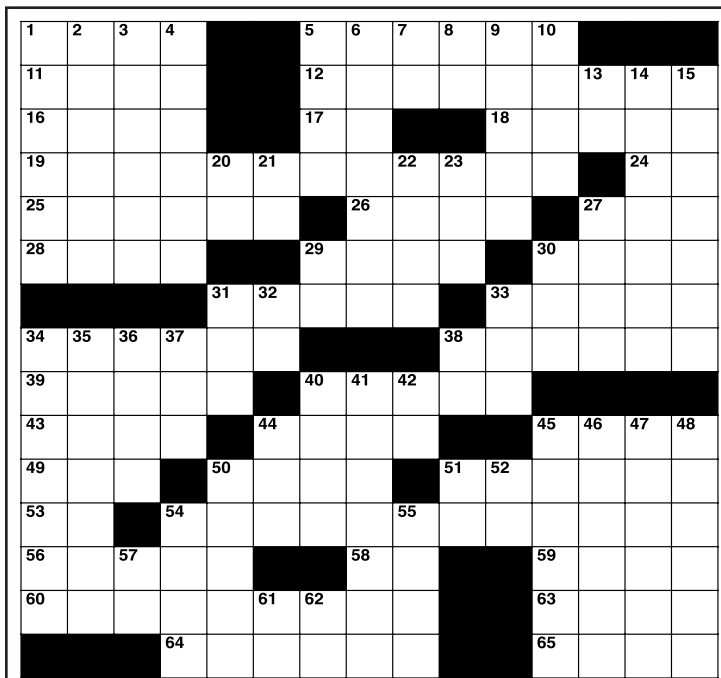

WTAMU offering transfer and graduate scholarships

CANYON – Officials at West Texas A&M University are continuing their quest to make college a reality for more students by helping with the cost of earning a degree. One-time scholarships are available for certain transfer and graduate students who apply for admission to WTAMU by midnight Friday, May 25 and are accepted for either the summer or fall terms.

Community college students who graduate this month from Clarendon College, Amarillo College, and Frank Phillips College with an associate degree or a certificate of completion are eligible for a one-time \$500 transfer scholarship. This scholarship is in addition to any other scholarships the students may earn. Transfer students must apply for admission to WTAMU by the May 25 deadline to be eligible for the scholarship. The funds can be used for either Summer I, Summer II or the fall 2018 semester. The WTAMU application for admission can be found at wtamu.edu/apply.

The University also is offering a one-time \$1,000 graduate tuition scholarship to May 2018 graduating

WTAMU undergraduate and graduate students.

"This is an opportunity for WTAMU to acknowledge our current students while also providing a financial springboard toward one of our 40 graduate programs," Dr. Angela Spaulding, vice president for research and compliance and dean of the Graduate School, said.

To be eligible for the tuition scholarship, the students must enroll in a graduate degree-seeking program at WTAMU by the May 25 deadline. Students must submit the complete program application package to the Graduate School in addition to the online scholarship application at wtamu.edu/scholarships.

The tuition scholarship funds can be used for Summer I, Summer II or the fall semester. The graduate application can be found at wtamu.edu/applygraduate.

District Court hears three cases May 16

Three pleas took place when the district court met in Clarendon last Wednesday, May 16.

District Attorney Luke Inman, along with Assistant District Attorney Harley Caudle, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas, with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Corey Lee Johnsen pleaded true and was adjudicated and convicted for the second degree felony offense of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to 14 years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Johnsen, 38 from Howardwick, was arrested in Donley County on October 31, 2012. He was originally placed on community supervision on March 4, 2013, when he was placed on probation for ten years.

The State filed its motion to

adjudicate on March 6, 2015, alleging 16 violations of community supervision.

Johnsen is also required to pay a \$2,000 fine, \$1,105.50 restitution, and \$473 in court costs.

David Victor Tsygankov pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for two years for the class a misdemeanor offense of unlawful use of a criminal instrument.

Tsygankov, 20 from West Sacramento, Calif., was arrested by Donley County Deputy Miranda Betts on February 7, 2018. Tsygankov pleaded to an information filed by the State on May 15, 2018.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Tsygankov was required to pay an upfront fine of \$4,000, \$458 in court costs, \$180 drug lab restitution, and successfully complete 100 hours of

community service. If Tsygankov violates probation, he could face up to one year in the Donley County Jail.

Jeffrey Scott Jensen pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication community supervision for four years for the third degree felony offense of tampering with evidence.

Jensen, 40 from Fort Worth, was arrested by DPS Trooper Justin Baker on April 22, 2018. Jensen pleaded to an information filed by the State on May 15, 2018.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Jensen is required to pay a \$4,000 fine, \$381 in court costs, \$180 drug lab restitution, and successfully complete 200 hours of community service.

If Jensen violates probation, he could face up to ten years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ.

College board members take office

The Clarendon College Board of Regents swore in its newest member and two returning members when it met in regular session last Thursday, May 17.

Regent Tommy Waldrop joined the board following the May 5 election. He took the oath of office along with incumbent Regents Jerry Woodard and Edwin Campbell.

Waldrop takes the seat of former regent Doug Lowe, who chose not to run for reelection after serving the board for 24 years. Lowe was recognized after the meeting with a plaque for his service.

Lon Adams was chosen to continue to lead the board as its chairman. Waldrop was elected as vice chair, and Darlene Spier was chosen to continue as the board's secretary.

Among the items of business on the board's agenda, regents approved

the recommendation of President Robert Riza to accept the resignations of nursing instructors Bettie Crouch and Marsha Dougherty and to approve 12-month faculty positions for the following employees: Jay Anders, Welding; Missie Billings, Cosmetology; Erinn Campbell, Cosmetology; Ken Carlile, CDL; Brent Childers, Industrial Maintenance; Jana Coats, Cosmetology; Raylynn Cruz, Cosmetology; Dr. Rodney Donahue, Theatre; Bret Franks, Ranch Horse / Rodeo; Alicia Hunter, VN; Jamie Mears, VN; Mandy Poole-Guerrero, Introduction to Nursing; and Tommie Ray, Cosmetology. Nine-month faculty positions were approved last month.

Also under personnel, the board considered Dr. Riza's contract in terms of his vehicle allowance. The president had previously had the

use of a college fleet car, but he had asked for and received a monetary car allowance in place of the fleet car about a year ago as it was more beneficial from a tax standpoint. With the change in tax laws, the president asked to turn back his car allowance and return to using a fleet car.

Woodard said the president's personal taxes weren't the college's responsibility and that the issue had been voted on last year. He moved, seconded by Darlene Spier, to leave the car allowance unchanged. Regent Bill Sansing objected, saying he felt the motion was unfair because the tax law had changed, and Regent Ruth Robinson agreed with him.

The board voted down the motion to leave the car allowance unchanged, 2-7, with Sansing, Robinson, Waldrop, Adams, Campbell, Shields, and Moreman opposed. Dr.

Sansing then made a motion, seconded by Waldrop, to drop the car allowance and go back to the president using a fleet vehicle, and that motion passed unanimously.

In other administrative business, Vice President Academic Affairs Brian Fuller reported that spring mini-session enrollment is ahead of last year, and Vice President of Student Affairs Brad Vanden Boogaard reported a large number of student athletes making the athletic honor roll this year, calling this year's students "a great group of disciplined, high-character kids."

The board voted in favor of holding its June meeting in Pampa and its July meeting in Childress.

The board also met for about seven minutes in closed session to discuss real estate and took no action when they returned to open session.

sage board at City Hall.

Citizens' public comments also included questions about whether the city can install its own water wells, the planning and zoning commission, and appreciating area fire-fighters. Coy Cooper also raised questions about Alderman Holaday's son working for the city, the need for the mayor to read the employee job descriptions outlined in Ordinance 109, and accessibility

issues with City Hall under the Americans With Disabilities Act.

In actual city business listed on the agenda, aldermen approved the audit for fiscal year 2017, accepted bids on tax delinquent properties as presented by the Donley Appraisal District, selected Gordon Maddox as the city's new auditor, and discussed auditing the city books from the beginning of the current fiscal year October 1, 2017, through March.

The council voted in favor of setting City Hall's office hours as Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. with June through August hours being 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

A motion to purchase new Quickbooks software was approved, discussions were held about improvements to the community building with motions being approved for work not to exceed \$500 and to let Sandra Childress do the work.

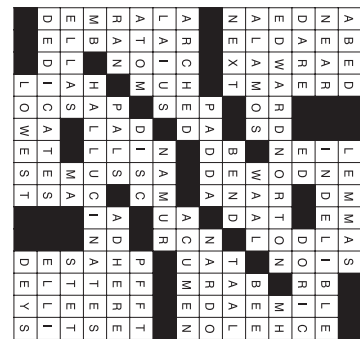

PUBLIC NOTICE

Property Tax Protest & Appeal Procedures

Property owners have the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the appraised (market) value of your property
- the unequal value of your property compared with other properties
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxing units taxing your property
- the property ownership
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- failure of the chief appraiser or appraisal review board (ARB) to send a required notice
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district (CAD) or ARB that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review
For information about informal review and obtaining property tax records, call your appraisal district at the number listed on the Notice of Appraised Value.

Review by the ARB
If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you may file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, *Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest*, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device (such as a CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to properly submit evidence on a small portable electronic device must be reviewed.

To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person or you may by telephone conference call or submission of written affidavit to present your evidence, facts and argument.

If you decide to participate by telephone conference call, you must provide your evidence to the ARB with a written affidavit before the ARB hearing begins. You may use the Comptroller Form 50-283, *Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board*, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for the hearing by affidavit.

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented by both parties. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters.

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you choose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you choose to appeal to the SOAH, you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment
You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

More Information
You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at the address and telephone number shown on the Notice of Appraised Value. You can get Comptroller forms and additional information on how to prepare a protest from the Comptroller's website at comptroller.texas.gov/taxes/property-tax/.

Deadline for Filing Protest with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
Not later than May 15 (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed for good cause if you miss the usual deadline. The ARB decides whether you have a good cause. Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

If you believe the CAD or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

The sales tax holiday also applies to lawn and garden products that help conserve water outdoors.

Items qualifying for the exemption include soaker or drip-irrigation hoses; moisture controls for a sprinkler or irrigation system; mulch; and plants, trees and grasses. These items can be purchased tax-free for residential use only.

There's no limit to the number of water-efficient or water-conserving products you can purchase tax-free.
