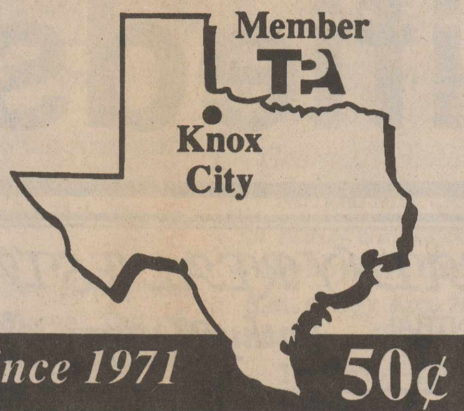

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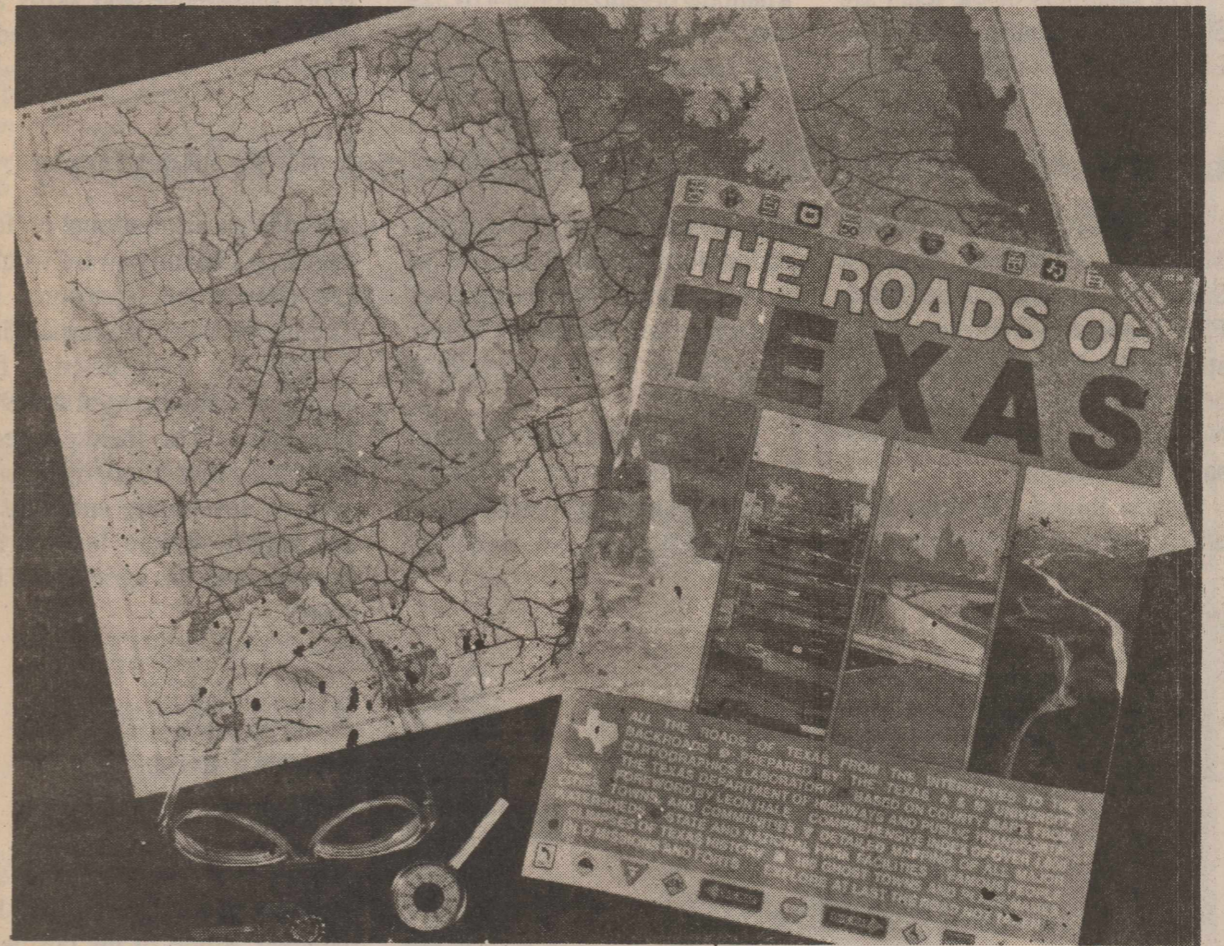

**9-1-1 Celebrating First Anniversary**

November 9th marked the first anniversary of Knox County's 9-1-1 emergency system. A year has passed since the ribbon cutting ceremony that officially declared 9-1-1 on line and ready for operation. It has been a year of protocol trial and error, a year of learning for dispatchers - a time of becoming familiar with radio transmissions and obtaining and recording information that could be vital to Knox County citizens in case of emergency. For Supervisor Jan Rolston, it has been a year of some frustration and a greater feeling of accomplishment. It has been a year of praise, and sometimes, criticism, a year for making decisions, and acquainting county residents with the 9-1-1 system.

During the first year of operation, 9-1-1 dispatchers have taken 560 medical emergency calls, 230 fire department calls, and 540 calls from citizens requiring assistance from law enforcement officers. In addition to the emergency calls, there have been 135 9-1-1 assist calls. Though the assist calls can not be considered emergencies, they are important to the caller. Those are the calls from the latchkey child who is home alone and afraid, and needs the assurance that someone really will answer the phone if he needs help. They are the calls from the worried

mother who hears of a car accident in another county and knows her son is coming home via that route. Even though authorities are not at liberty to release the names of the victims, they can verify that her son is not one. There are callers who need death messages delivered by law enforcement officers, callers who are enroute to another part of Texas and need road condition reports and in one instance, a call from an elderly citizen who was frightened because he had been receiving some hang up calls and wanted the dispatcher "just to call every once in a while" to see if he was still all right.

The system is far from perfect, it still has some "bugs" in it and many people become annoyed when they mistakenly call 9-1-1 and the dispatcher is persistent in calling back and dispatching an officer if the line remains busy or nobody answers the call back. It is important the county residents understand that the dispatcher is only trying to help the caller in case of a medical situation or, in case of an intruder prohibiting the caller from requesting help.

9-1-1 is still in its infancy, but with all residents working together toward perfecting the system, it can and will be a comforting addition to the welfare of Knox County.

Christmas is springing up all over Europe. What a perfect season to return home to! I look forward to seeing everyone soon!

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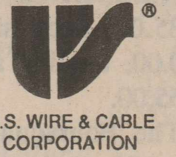
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## Ernest Neal To Be In Junior Recital at MSU

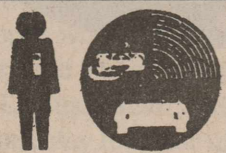
Ernest is a member of Mu Phi Epsilon and is pianist/soloist for the First Christian Church in Benjamin.

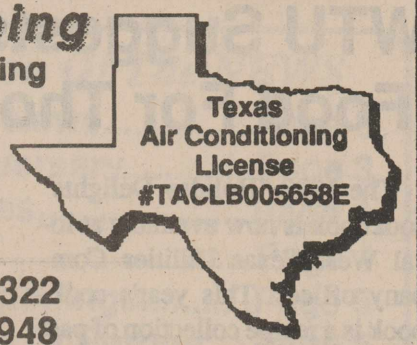

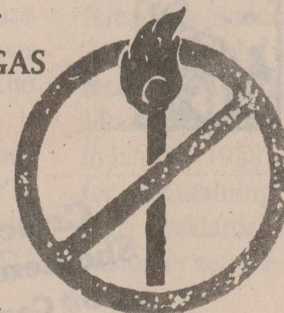

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## WTU Suggests Holiday 'Food For Thought'

The 1993 "Holiday Delights" cookbook is now available at local West Texas Utilities Company offices. This year's cookbook is a recipe collection of past favorites to use for entertaining, baking and gift-giving. Each recipe features a nutritional analysis for each serving to help those in watching calories, cholesterol, fat, sodium, etc.

The holiday season brings with it thoughts of baking and food preparation. WTU has a few tips to offer during this time of year. Food safety is particularly important during the holidays when traditionally larger quantities of food are prepared. Here are a few food safety precautions to follow:

\* Thaw turkey in the refrigerator or in cold water, never at room temperature, to prevent bacterial growth;

\* Do not over-roast meats at temperatures below 325 degrees. Temperatures below 325 degrees are not high enough to destroy

bacteria that may develop in large cuts of meat or turkey during long cooking periods;

\* Cooked food should never be left at room temperature for more than two hours, including preparation time. Refrigerate promptly;

\* Refrigerate cream, custard, or meringue pies and any food with a custard filling, such as cakes, cream puffs or eclairs, just as soon as they have cooled slightly. Follow the same precautions for salads and sandwiches made with salad dressings containing eggs or milk products;

\* Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Hot foods should be kept at 140 degrees until served. Cooked cold foods should be kept at 45 degrees or lower.

By planning ahead and following these food safety tips one can help to ensure their family's health during the holidays and the rest of the year. Remember to stop by WTU for a free cookbook.

## SCS Suggests Ways To Improve Rangelands

Are you, as a manager of native rangelands, dedicated to improving its productivity? The Soil Conservation Service is most definitely dedicated to this purpose and can provide the technical assistance to do so.

One way to improve the productivity of the rangeland is through Planned Grazing Systems. A planned grazing system is managing rangeland so it is grazed and then rested in a planned sequence. Livestock are selective in the plants they graze. They tend to repeatedly graze the desirable plants and leave the less desired plants. This weakens the more desirable plants and allows unwanted plants to thrive and multiply. You can't tell livestock what to eat, but you can limit the length of time and when they eat using a rotation between as few as two pastures.

Grazing and resting plants on rangeland in a planned sequence gives the better plants a chance to regrow, compete, and multiply, thus gradually increasing the amount of high quality plants available per acre. This improved range condition increases livestock production, improves the habitat for wildlife, reduces erosion, and conserves water. By resting pastures in a grazing system, the overgrazed areas are allowed to become productive again.

By combining livestock from several pastures into one herd and grazing one pasture at a time, there is a tendency for them to disperse and improve the grazing distribution over the entire pasture. Planned grazing systems vary somewhat from one ranch to

the next and the kind of system or systems used may depend on present pasture layout, available water supplies, long range goals for rangeland improvement and the time necessary to supervise the operation. The point is, rangeland greatly benefits from the graze-rest sequence provided through properly managed planned grazing systems.

Readers should contact their local Soil Conservation Service office for more information on planned grazing systems. Assistance is provided through all programs administered by the Soil Conservation Service regardless of race, color, sex, age, handicap, religion, or national origin.
