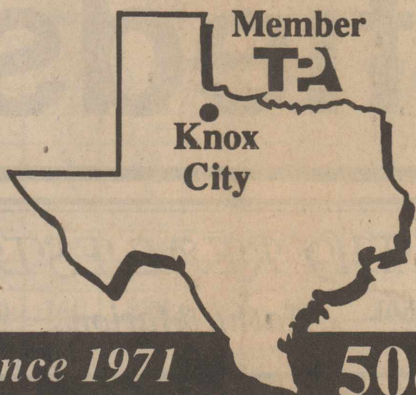

Perdue Wins Judge's Race

Mike Carlson, Judie Whitten, Danny Speck, Imagean Young Also Win Races

In a county election that turned rather nasty in the last few days, David Perdue of Knox City won re-election to the office of Knox County Judge by receiving 760 votes over opponent Charles Durham's 681 votes. Perdue won the victory by a margin of 79 votes.

The following is a quick, late

Tuesday night look at how the other races in Knox County went:

In the contested race for the unexpired term of Sheriff, Munday Police Officer Mike Carlson easily won the race with 859 votes over Interim Sheriff Ricki Russell, who had 238 votes. Munday Police Chief Tom Tejada received a total of 240 votes and

former Knox City Police Chief Gil Gillilan received 133 votes.

In the contested race for County Commissioner of Precinct 2, Incumbent Commissioner Bobby Roberson of Benjamin received 157 votes, Jerry Parker of Benjamin received 150 votes and Homer Rolston of Knox City received 90 votes. This means a

runoff between Bobby Roberson and Jerry Parker on April 12, 1994.

In the contested race for County and District Clerk, current Deputy Clerk Danny Speck of Knox City won with 1,119 votes over former Deputy Clerk Gladene of Benjamin, who had 292 votes.

In the contested race for County Treasurer, current Deputy Treas-

urer Judie Whitten of Benjamin won with 825 votes over Charles Pack of Knox City with 572 votes.

In another contested race, the position of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 & 2 pitted two current office holders against one another since the Commissioners Court approved the merging of the two precincts into one JP District.

Imagean Young of Benjamin won with 440 votes over Guy Bradley of Knox City with 347 votes.

Physician Moving To Knox County

Krishna Prasanna Kumar MD will move to Knox County from Fort Stockton, Texas, to open her office for family practice medicine, according to Stephen Kuehler, Administrator of Knox County Hospital. Dr. Kumar will work in both the Knox City and Munday clinics.

"We're very pleased that through our physician recruiting efforts we were able to find someone of Dr. Kumar's qualifications," Kuehler said. "She has such extensive training and such a wide background in all types of medicine that she will be a real asset to our community."

Dr. Kumar, who received her early medical training in India, graduating from the Bangalore Medical College, moved to the United Kingdom in 1974, where she continued her training. She served both an internship and a residency in general medicine at Shotley Bridge General Hospital in Consett County Durham. She also spent six months training in neurology.

In 1977, Dr. Kumar moved to the United States, where she again continued her education. She completed a two-year residency in rehabilitation medicine at the University of Maryland Hospital in Baltimore. She then completed a three-year residency in internal medicine at Good Samaritan Hospital in Baltimore.

After completing her training, Dr. Kumar spent eight years in private practice in Columbia, Maryland. She has also worked as a medical director for a nursing home and as an Emergency Room physician.

"With Dr. Barretto and Dr. Kumar both in practice here, we can give our patients a choice of two excellent physicians," Kuehler said. "The two physicians will be able to provide coverage for each other, allowing us to use hometown physicians."

Dr. Kumar emphasized the importance of having a local physician. "In an emergency, it is important that someone knows the medical history of the family. A family practice physician can treat the majority of illnesses that a patient has. It's very important for a family to have their records in one place so that the doctor can compare diagnostic tests to previous records, for example, she said."

"We're delighted that Dr. Kumar is moving to Knox County," Kuehler said. She will begin seeing patients on Monday, March 21.

Political Flyer Attacks Knox County Newspapers

"...the newspapers in Knox County have not been doing their job reporting the news."

The mail Saturday morning brought a surprise to us as well as many other "Postal Patrons" of local post office boxes when a political flyer in support of David Perdue for Knox County Judge attacked the two newspapers of Knox County, the *Knox County News* and the *Munday Courier*.

The flyer was sent out anonymously under the labeling of "Paid for by business men and women in Knox County who recognize the truth and want you to know!" Even though this group apparently did not want you to know their names, the flyer was sent out under Bulk Rate Mail, Permit No. 41, Knox City, Texas. When I called our local postmaster on

Monday morning about who had bulk rate permit #41, she stated that she could not give out that information. I fully understand and appreciate her position of having to stay within her official guidelines. Another call to the US Post Office Consumer Affairs Division in Fort Worth clarified the rules. Information regarding a name could be released, and after they called back to the Knox City Post Office, the Ft., Worth office called me back and gave me the name of a local business and businessman here in Knox City who held the permit. Our local postmaster called back and reconfirmed the same business name a short time later. (I am not going to print that name here, those that

want to know it can also obtain it from our local Post Office.)

The flyer was 10 paragraphs long, mostly attacking Charles Durham, Judge Perdue's opponent in the election. All except for paragraph number 8, that one directly attacked the newspapers of Knox County. Here is how it was worded: "8. Contrary to what Judge David Perdue's opponent has printed in his ads, if he hasn't seen a financial statement or minutes of a Commissioners Court meeting, it is because the newspapers of Knox County have not been doing their job reporting the news. The job descriptions of County Judge, Commissioner's, Clerk or Treasurer does not include the writing of, and hand

delivery of news items, which is what the newspapers expect to be done, if these items are to be published."

The timing of this attack was obviously done so as to hit right before the election. There would be no time to respond in the paper before the election, since our next edition is being published the day after the election. Well, this message to the nameless persons behind this flyer: do not ever think that you can attack this newspaper anonymously in the mail and not expect a reply. As a matter of fact, the timing of this attack was perfect for us because we can answer the day after the elections and not have anyone accuse us of trying to hurt or help either candi-

diate with our response.

The statement made in paragraph 8 of the flyer is a gross misstatement of the facts. To call it a lie would not be strong enough. Those writing, printing and mailing those flyers are obviously not in possession of the facts as they really are. The newspapers of the county have been stopped from doing their jobs of publishing the minutes by a barrage of excuses from the county. We have never expected someone else to do our jobs. We have expected cooperation from our elected officials, but that cooperation is specifically covered by Texas law. To prove my point, I'll refer to a letter that I personally sent to Judge Perdue and the Commissioners Court sev-

eral years ago. The letter stated our problem of obtaining copies of the minutes from the county and quoted, word for word, the Texas law REQUIRING the county to make those minutes available. I also stated that, according to law, we could be charged a fee for copies of the minutes. Our position in the letter was that we were willing to pay such a fee, that we would even pay for postage to Knox City, or if that was a problem, we could drive to Benjamin and pick them up personally. I requested that the letter be read into and made a part of the minutes. Later, someone who was in attendance at the next

meeting of the Commissioner's Court did tell me that the letter was discussed.

So, with this letter as just one example of trying to get the minutes, how can this anonymous group state that we have not been doing our jobs? Other requests for the minutes have met with excuses such as... "they aren't transcribed yet"..... "they aren't ready yet"..... "I haven't got them done yet"..... "I can't read David Neil's handwriting".... and the ever popular one: "they haven't been approved yet." (Note: A recent ruling by a Texas Judge and forwarded to us by the Texas Press Association states that the excuse of holding minutes until they are approved at the next month's meeting is illegal, the Judge ruled that the minutes of a governmental body become public record as soon as they are transcribed, NOT when they are approved at the following month's meeting.)

So much for that point. Now on to the next: This anonymous group that hides behind a fancy name appears to have a hidden agenda of trying to tell us how to do our job. Billye Bess has been in the newspaper business for 30 years, Stacy for 19 years, and myself for 11 years now. That's a combined total of 60 years of covering the news of Knox City. How dare an anonymous group - or person - that lacks the courage and dignity to put a name behind an accusation, assume that they can define our jobs for us!! Here in the News, our three names are in each edition as being responsible for what goes into print. But apparently this group prefers to hide behind the fancy name of "Business Men and Women In Knox County" to spout off with false information and try to damage the names and proud reputations of the two newspapers in Knox County.

Our thanks to the many people who have called over the weekend, or come into the office the early part of this week. Simply stated, the response to the anonymous flyers has been a firestorm of upset and angry citizens. Not so surprising is the fact that everyone seems to have the same idea of who was responsible for the flyers. Your comments of support, and outrage over the attack made on us and the candidate in this flyer are appreciated. So many have made it a point to call or come by in person and let us know just exactly what they think about a nasty, anonymous flyer that personally attacks not only a political candidate, but our county newspapers as well. Quite a few folks who have businesses in our city were very upset with the name of the 'group' listed on the bottom of the flyer. Being business owners themselves, they wanted it made known that they were NOT a part of this group and did not feel the same way about either the candidate or the newspapers. In fact, most resented the name of

the 'group' used on the flyer. The overwhelming response from people in business makes me wonder who was left to form such a 'group'.

Stacy was able to talk with Judge Perdue about the flyer just after lunch on Monday. When asked if he would like to comment on the flyer or its contents, Perdue stated that he did not want to comment on the matter. He did however, assure us that if re-elected, the minutes of the Commissioner's Court will be given to the newspapers in the future.

A Monday afternoon phone call with the businessman who mailed the flyer brought little more information. The businessman stated repeatedly that all he did was allow the group to pay for use of his bulk rate permit, as he has done for several other groups in Knox City in the past. He would not release the name of the group, steadfastly defending the people who had paid him and their 'right' to remain secret. I informed him of a phone call that I had earlier in the day with the legal head of the State Ethics Commission in Austin concerning the name of the group listed at the bottom of the flyer. When printing, mailing or broadcasting any political advertisement, if there is any consideration (money changing hands), then an organization listing its name on the flyer must have the name and address of a person listed as the responsible party. The attorney also wanted to know if this 'group' was registered as a political action group.

If a candidate makes up a flyer himself, runs it off on a copy machine, then mails it at his own expense, no name other than his own is necessary. But, as in the case of the Saturday flyer here in Knox City, if any money changes hands, a person responsible disclaimer has to be included. The businessman stated that he was paid to mail the flyers out under his bulk mailing permit, therefore money did change hands and this flyer is in violation of Texas law by not having the name of a person responsible at the bottom.

(NOTE: It is ironic that we

can remember back several years ago to a city council race when three local men who were highly respected in the community had combined on the ballot to run as a team for city council. Shortly before the election, another 'anonymous' flyer appeared in mail boxes of local residents. True to form, the flyer blasted the three. Back then, that 'group' called itself "Citizens For Continued Orderly Progress!"

We here at the NEWS are not immune to making mistakes and accepting criticism for what we do. When you make a mistake in this business, it is right there for everyone to see. We know that we are not able to be everywhere for every news story. We are a small staff with a whole lot of work to do. That's not an excuse, it's just a plain fact. Furthermore, the results of our work are also defined by how much advertising we have to determine the size of each week's paper. One of our features is our Letters To The Editor section. When we receive a complaint about what we do - or don't do - we publish that complaint as long as it falls within the guidelines of being signed and we can verify the signature. We freely admit criticism of our mistakes and openly publish them when the need arises! If a group identifying itself as 'Business Men and Women' who "recognize the truth" want to criticize us, they don't have to use politics as an excuse and hide behind an anonymous flyer. All they have to do is write it, SIGN IT WITH A REAL NAME, mail it to us and we'll print it ourselves!! We are that open to our readers. Honesty requires that.

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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

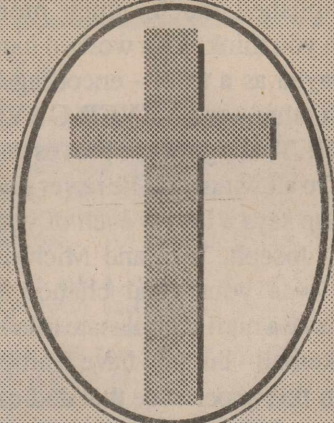

Failure to comply will result in the loss of all program benefits. Please check with SCS to insure that you are following your conservation plan as required.

INTEGRATED FARM MANAGEMENT PROGRAM - IFM

ASCS offers the Integrated Farm Management Program (IFM) to allow producers to participate in the program, plant Resource Conserving Crops (RCC's) on a portion or all of their bases and not reduce their program payments. The minimum acreage that must be devoted to the RCC's is 20% of the total base during the contract period. The minimum contract period is 3 years with a maximum of 5 years. This is not a guaranteed payment, but is subject to all the provisions of the regular program. In other words, if the price goes up and no deficiency is paid to producers planting the crop, you will receive no payment under this program.

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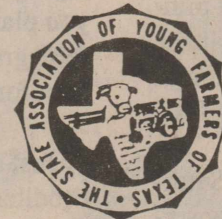

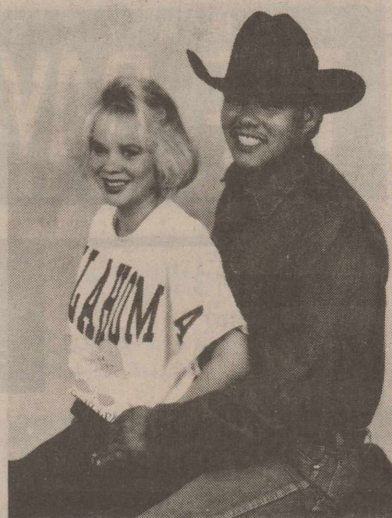

OFFICIAL MEMORANDUM STATE OF TEXAS OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Educational diagnosticians in Texas are responsible for the assessment of students to determine eligibility for special education services; for the coordination of the development and implementation of the Individual Educational Plan for identified, eligible students; and for ensuring a school district's compliance with the mandates for due process in federal and state law.

Educational diagnosticians administer and interpret tests which measure language, perceptual-motor skills, intelligence, adaptive behavior and academic achievement of students. They also determine a mental or learning disability in order to recommend the need for special educational intervention. Diagnosticians consult with professionals in other fields when speech, physical, medical and emotional problems are indicated.

An educational diagnostician in Texas schools must be a certified teacher with a minimum of three years teaching experience, must have a master's degree and must be certified as an educational diagnostician by the Texas Education Agency.

Founded in 1973 in Irving, Texas, the Texas Educational Diagnosticians Association promotes the profession through programs, research and the establishment and maintenance of professional standards in order to better serve the educational needs of exceptional children and youth.
