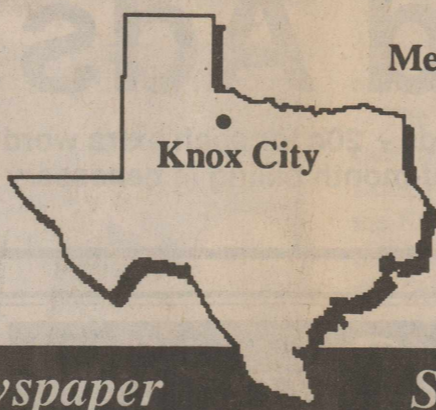

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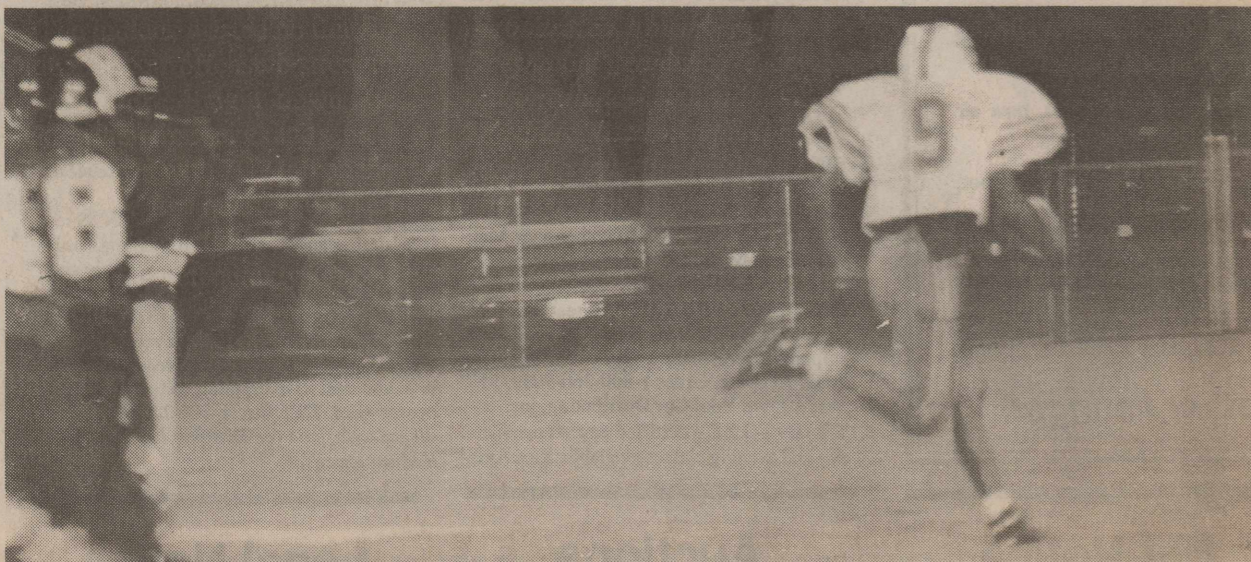

Indians Tomahawk 'Hounds

KC Record Evens Out At 1-1-1, Spur Bulldogs Are Next

The Knox City Greyhounds ran into trouble last Friday night when they traveled to Haskell to take on the Indians. Looking somewhat shell shocked when they left the field, most of the 'Hounds were quiet as they reflected the 40-14 score showing on the scoreboard when the final buzzer sounded.

Despite their first loss of the season, the game did provide Knox City fans with a lot of excitement, including a dazzling 98 yard kickoff return by Kevin Dorsey in the third quarter.

Knox City started their action by receiving the opening kickoff and running right into an overwhelming Haskell defense. Out-numbered and out-weighted by the Indians, KC's first series ended quickly with a turnover punt back to Haskell.

The Indians wasted no time in showing their offensive strength as they moved right down the field on their first series and scored a touchdown with 7:47 left on the clock in the first quarter. With an extra point kick right between the uprights, Haskell quickly jumped out front 7-0.

David Dudensing took the Haskell kick and brought it back to the 20 yard line before running into quite a few Indians. Quarterback Wes Grimsley started the 'Hound offense by handing off to Lance Dever, who mowed the ball out the 41 yard line for a quick first down. A pass by Grimsley to Ryan Marion picked up another first down on the Haskell 34 yard line. Runs by Dever and Dorsey followed, but the series ended with Dorsey fumbling the ball and Haskell recovering.

The next two series for both Haskell and Knox City went nowhere as both defensive units dug

in for a hard fight. The remainder of the first quarter action turned into a dogfight before Haskell scored again with just 3 seconds left on the quarter clock. Again, the extra point kick was good as Haskell's scoreboard showed 14-0 in favor of the home team.

What the scoreboard didn't show...

While the Greyhounds did lose the game, it is important to note here (for those that did not watch the game) that Knox City never gave up during the game. Our team played their hearts out. Simply put, they were just dominated by a much stronger and larger team.

Despite the final score on the board, each member of the Greyhound team has every reason to hold their head high. They played a tremendous ball game that was filled with hard hitting action.

These Greyhounds are fun to watch. They certainly get your blood racing with their exciting brand of football. Even while I am typing this story, I find myself eagerly awaiting the game against Spur this Friday night. The game will be played at Spur and the 'Hounds would appreciate you being there to cheer them on.

See you in Spur on Friday night! Remember, the game is a non-district game and starts at 8:00 p.m.

Haskell. With nothing going on offense, the 'Hounds were forced to punt the ball back on fourth down. Haskell wasted no time in gearing up its offense and marched right down the field for another touchdown with 7:54 remaining in the first half. The extra point kick was wide, so the score was left at 20-0 in favor of Haskell.

On offense again, Grimsley, Dever, Dorsey, and Louis Diaz all went up against the Indian defense, but KC was forced to punt back to Haskell again on fourth down. The rest of first half action remained the same, with neither team adding anything else to the scoreboard.

The halftime show by the Indian Marching Band was stunning as Haskell showed once again that large numbers of students on the field do make a difference. The band played some complex tunes, including the theme song from the movie 'Jurassic Park'. Knox City's halftime performance featured the Greyhound band doing 'Blue Suede Shoes.'

Second half action started off with Haskell on offense. It looked like they might score again quickly as they moved the ball down to the 22 yard line before fumbling the ball away to Greyhound Eric Richardson, who recovered the ball to the obvious delight of the Knox City fans.

Runs by Dever and Dorsey, along with incomplete passes from quarterback Grimsley to receivers Louis Diaz and Adrian Serrano all went nowhere and KC was forced to punt once again on fourth down.

Haskell's next score came with a 56 yard pass/run play with 4:48 left in the third quarter. The extra point was good as Haskell moved

Happy Reunion In Lubbock

Lezlee Hearn Presents Award To Paramedic Credited With Saving Her Life

Approaching each other slowly at first, 19 year old Lezlee Hearn and Paramedic Jeb Brown were reunited last Saturday evening at an awards ceremony in Lubbock for their first "official" meeting since the pair were involved in a near fatal automobile accident last year.

On hand to present the Mark Beck Humanitarian Award to Brown, Lezlee Hearn was finally getting the opportunity to meet the person credited with saving her life on August 6, 1993.

After their vehicles collided in a near head-on accident, Paramedic Brown made use of his extensive medical training and provided Lezlee with lifesaving emergency care until she could be transported to the nearest intensive care facility in Lubbock.

Brown, who now lives in Columbia, Missouri, returned to Lubbock to accept the award, named for an Emergency Medical Services Paramedic who was killed in a 1991 accident. The award was presented by Lezlee during a South Plains EMS dinner in Lubbock on Saturday night.

"I'm just delighted that she is doing so well," Brown said. "Af-

ter an accident like that, she shouldn't have lived. Now here she is, a young 19 year old lady with her whole life still in front of her."

That new lease on life for Lezlee began immediately following the accident, when Brown started to

administer lifesaving medical techniques on her. "I had worked for four years as a medic," he said. "It was instinctive to me to come to her aid and treat her injuries."

Brown and his wife both sustained minor injuries in the accident. *See Award, Page 6*

Knox City's Heart Walk Planned For October 1

Citizens of Knox City and the surrounding area will walk all over cardiovascular diseases during the American Heart Walk, slated for Saturday, October 1, at Greyhound Stadium. The Heart Walk begins at 9:00 a.m.

The American Heart Association's American Heart Walk is a national event held in communities across the country during the first weekend in October.

The non-competitive, just-for-fun event is expected to draw participants of all ages. The walkers will raise money cardiovascular research by asking friends and co-workers for contributions for walking the course.

"We're excited about this event," said Dorothy Jean Dykes, American Heart Walk Chairman. "Cardiovascular diseases, including stroke, are America's No. 1 killer. They affect people in their 30s, 40s and 50s - - often their most productive years. Children

aren't excluded from cardiovascular diseases, either. There are only two ways to fight them: finding the cure through research and preventing them in the first place. We'll have lots of information at the American Heart Walk on how to prevent cardiovascular diseases and stroke, including getting regular exercise that helps strengthen your heart muscle."

TAAS Exit Test To Be Given During October

Enrolled students and out-of-school examinees who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of either the TAAS or TEAMS test, may retake the necessary sections on October 18 through 20.

Out-of-school examinees who wish to test must register. Students who graduated in the spring of 1994 are considered out-of-school examinees and may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office or education service center. The test registration form must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5:00 p.m., September 27, 1994.

The writing test will be given on October 18, the reading on October 19 and the math on October 20. The test will begin at 8:00 a.m. each day in the high school libraries in the Goree, Munday and Benjamin High Schools.

Jonathan Rizan Tells Of Trip To Scout Ranch

(Editor's note: This summer Life Scout Jonathan Rizan traveled with his dad, Jules Rizan, and others to Philmont Scout Ranch in northeastern New Mexico near Cimmaron. Philmont is a two hundred thirty five thousand acre wilderness ranch donated to the Boy Scouts of America in the 1930s by Tulsa philanthropist oilman Waite Phillips. Jonathan told us his story.)

"I left Knox City on Friday, July 15, with eight scouts from Wichita Falls, my dad, and two other adult leaders. We traveled four hundred miles to Philmont Scout Ranch west of Cimmaron, New Mexico. We spent one day at base camp conducting orientation and shakedown. During this time our gear was inspected and our packs weighed. Our packs and personal gear had to weigh forty pounds or less. The first day on the trail we met our ranger and hiked about three miles to camp. On the second day, we climbed from an elevation of 7300 feet to 8500 feet on a six mile hike. We all thought we were going to die from the climb. When we crossed the top of Wilson Mesa, the view was beautiful. We could see snow-capped mountains in Colorado to the north and Baldy Peak to the west. We camped and enjoyed programs each night. They were very entertaining and helped us

learn history of The Colfax County Wars. The daily programs consisted of hiking, forestry, and mining technology from the time of the local gold rush. Programs included blacksmithing, gold panning, and a trip to the bottom of Cypher's Mine. We hiked from camp to camp, up and down mountains each day going up sometimes as high as 11,000 feet. We saw black bear, deer, and many varieties of smaller animals and birds. We hiked on mountain ridges covered with Douglas Fir, Ponderosa Pine, and beautiful flowers. In the river valleys, we walked among towering Aspen trees along rocky creeks inhabited by Cuthroat Trout. On the next to the last day, my dad and I hiked eighteen miles in the rain, uphill, with very little food to a camp on the Tooth Ridge. The last morning on the trail, we hiked to the summit and witnessed the most spectacular sunrise I have ever seen. In ten days we backpacked 124 miles. It was a time that will be with me always."

Sarpalius Mobile Office Plans KC, Area Visits Tues.

U.S. Rep. Bill Sarpalius' mobile office will be in Knox City on September 27 from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m. at the Post Office.

The mobile office will also be in Benjamin earlier in the day from 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. and then in Guthrie following the Knox City visit from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Both of these visits will be at the respective courthouses in these towns.

The mobile office allows the Congressman to bring his office's services directly to his constituents.

"I have always believed that to be an effective public servant you have to go to the people and hear their wants and needs," Sarpalius said.

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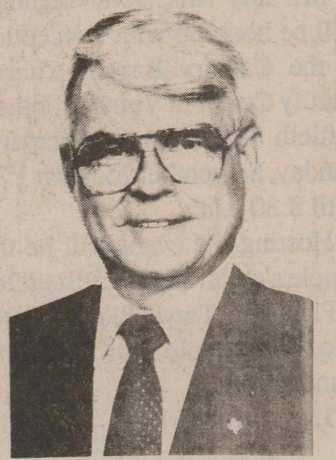

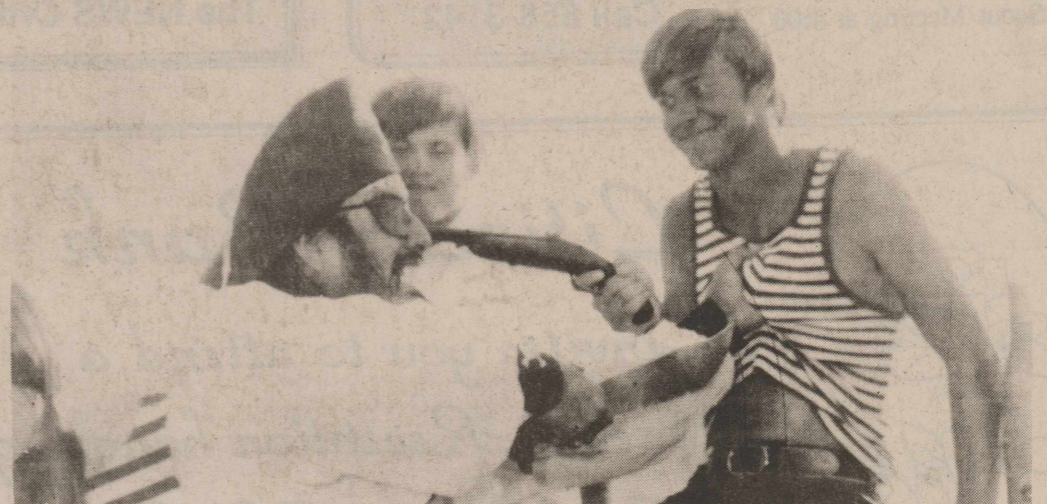

dent. Brown walked over to Lezlee's car, thinking there was no way anyone in that car could survive. But against all odds, Lezlee was alive. Although in a coma, she was breathing. Along with fire-fighters and emergency medical technicians, Brown got Lezlee out of her car, which was virtually destroyed by the force of the collision. Brown then inserted two intravenous tubes, aligned her spine and started a procedure to keep blood flowing to her vital organs. When her breathing began to slow, Brown assisted Lezlee's breathing.

With ranch hands at the nearby Pitchfork Ranch making emergency calls, Brown summoned an Aerocare medical helicopter from Lubbock. The helicopter had to stop at Crosbyton because of weather. That meant Lezlee had to be transported by ground ambulance for a 40 minute ride before being transferred to the helicopter.

Following transportation by both ambulance and helicopter, Lezlee arrived at University Medical Center in Lubbock. After nearly two weeks in a coma and a long stay in the intensive care unit of UMC that was followed by months of hospitalization and extended medical treatment, Lezlee has been able to fully resume her life and is now a Freshman student at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Lezlee's parents, Marla and Don Hawkins were present during the awards ceremony in Lubbock.

Four-H is the youth development and leadership program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System.

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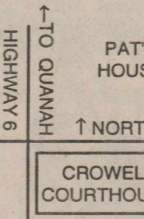
