## Cardiac Conditioning, Wellness Center To Open Saturday

*Grand Opening Set At Knox County Hospital*

KNOX CITY - The Knox City Cardiac Conditioning and Wellness Center will open its doors October 29 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. for a grand opening at the Knox County Hospital, 701 South Fifth.

Knox City is the seventh center sponsored by the Abilene Heart and Vascular Institute at Abilene Regional Medical Center. Other centers include Breckenridge, Ballinger, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland and Stamford.

Mary Beth Bird, a paramedic, is the center's program director and Dr. Shirley Barretto is the medical director. They will serve refreshments at the opening and offer free cardiovascular screenings.

"The rural cardiac conditioning centers provide a way to return patients back to their local medical care providers and communities," Denise Clayton, director of the WellHealth Center at Abilene Regional Medical Center and coordinator for the rural cen-

ters, said. "It is more convenient for the cardiac patient and his or her family to participate in weekly treatments locally rather than commuting to Abilene or Lubbock. The centers also provide wellness programs for the community, which allows for continued maintenance."

Cardiac conditioning is designed to improve cardiovascular health in persons whose heart function is impaired. It is a medically-supervised program of exercise and nutrition ideally suited for those who have undergone angioplasty, cardiovascular bypass surgery, or had a heart attack or other major heart condition within the past 12 months.

The program is individually tailored to meet the specific needs of cardiac patients.

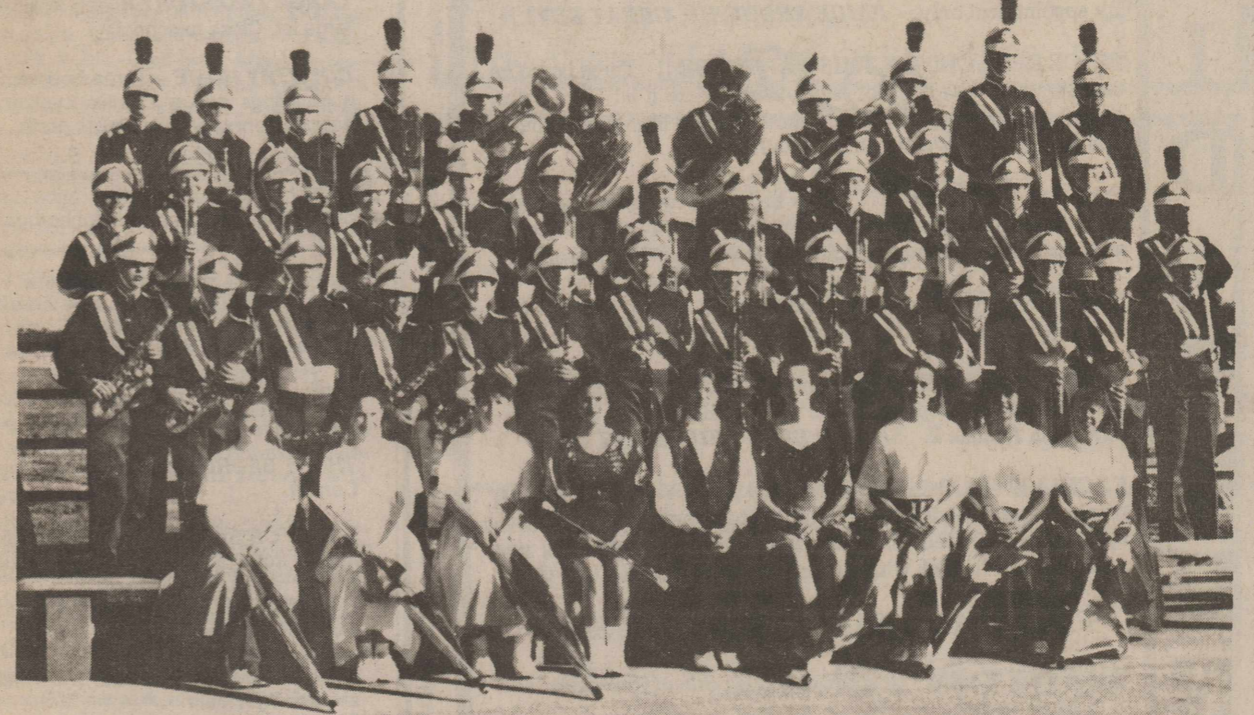
The exercise program will improve heart and lung function and muscle tone through a slow, deliberate training process. Held three times per week for 12 weeks, each cardiovascular training ses-

sion lasts from 30 to 90 minutes.

"To determine functional capabilities and individual needs, EKG stress tests are administered up to three times during the course of the program," Mrs. Clayton said. "The first EKG stress test allows us to determine the appropriate level of exercise for each patient. The final stress test documents progress and aids in re-evaluating improved physical capabilities. Then we develop an exercise plan designed to help maintain the achieved level of cardiac fitness."

Throughout the program the patient's personal physician receives written reports of the progress being made by the patient. The cardiac conditioning staff provides ongoing counseling and educational opportunities to help the patient control or eliminate cardiac risk factors.

## 'Hounds Lose Tough Game

*Greyhounds Fight Every Inch Of The Way, But Roby Wins 21-16*

The Knox City Greyhound Football Team took on the toughest opponent on the 1994 schedule last Friday night when they hosted the Lions from Roby at Greyhound Stadium. The game was the deciding factor as to who was in first place in district 9-A action at this point in the season. With Roby coming out on top by a score of 21-16, the Lions now claim the first place spot with Knox City now in a tie for second place with the Munday Moguls. Knox City will play at Paducah this Friday night while Munday will tangle with the Lions at Roby.

In Friday night's action, the game opened with Knox City winning the toss and electing to receive. Kevin Dorsey took the kick and quickly excited the fans as he moved the ball out to the 50 yard line. The offense showed that they came prepared to do battle as Wes Grimsley, Lance Dever, Kevin Dorsey and Louis Diaz all took turns moving the ball down the field before fumbling the ball

to Roby on a 2nd and 7 play from the 12 yard line.

Roby's offense could not pick up a first down in their opening series against a wall of tough Greyhound defenders. On a 4th and 4

play, Roby punted back to Knox City, with Dorsey receiving the kick and running it back 20 yards to start the Greyhound's second series from their own 32 yard line.

With a short yardage run by Dever, Grimsley slipping in the backfield, then being sacked on a pass play, KC was forced to punt, with Brian Rosencranz booting the ball back to the Roby 9 yard line where it was whistled dead.

Roby's next series fared no better than the first, they were forced to punt back to the 'Hounds in just 4 plays.

The next series of possession for KC turned into paydirt when Grimsley passed to David Dudensing on a 2nd and 11 play from the 35 yard line. Dudensing took the pass and quickly moved the ball into the end zone for the first score of the night. Duane Toliver's extra point kick was good, putting Knox City ahead 7-0 with 1:50 left in the first quarter of play.

## Halloween Trick-Or-Treating Takes Place Monday Night

Knox City residents, and especially motorists are reminded that Halloween activities, including trick-or-treating by area youngsters will take place next Monday night, October 31.

With hundreds of local children out collecting candy or other treats, motorists are reminded to drive careful, drive slow, and watch for all the little ghosts and goblins as they make their rounds throughout their neighborhoods.

Homeowners wanting kids to stop for treats should remember to leave a porch light on and try to remove any objects from their yards and near sidewalks that kids might trip over. Homeowners who dress up and try to scare the children should also keep in mind that some of the children will be very young and scare easily.

Children going trick-or-treating should bypass houses where no lights are showing. All children, regardless of age should refrain from pranks that damage property or could possibly endanger someone's safety.

**Knox County Hospital Will X-Ray Candy**

Stephen Kuehler, Administrator of the Knox County Hospital here in Knox City, has advised the NEWS office that the hospital will use their x-ray equipment to make sure candy collected by trick-or-treaters is safe to eat.

While most candy collected should be safe, Kuehler is making the hospital's equipment available for those parents who want to insure whatever their children collect is safe to eat. Several years ago, a young girl here in Knox City received a piece of bubble gum that had a piece of wire inserted in the gum. Because of incidents like this that happen all over the nation, parents are urged to take advantage of this offer by Kuehler to use the x-ray equipment available at the Knox County Hospital.

By x-raying candy, hospital technicians will be able to see any metal objects possibly inside the candy or other treats.

Parents wanting to have their children's candy x-rayed may do so between the hours of 7 and 10 p.m. on Monday, October 31. Entry into the hospital should be made through the emergency room doors on the west side of the building. The procedure will only take a few minutes and is not harmful to the candy or other treats.

The local office of West Texas Utilities has announced that the local employees will be participating in Halloween activities by passing out candy for treats.

The office of WTU will be open from 6:30 to 8:30 in the evening on Monday, October 31 for kids to come by and receive a treat.

# City Raises Garbage Rates

*Increases Forced By Government Regulations  
"We have no choice" ...City Manager Joe Rice*

The City Council of Knox City has been forced to raise rates for garbage collection. After putting off the move for about six months, the council has no other choice, according to Joe Rice, City Manager. Increasing regulations forced

on small cities by the federal government is responsible for the increases. With small landfills closed by EPA regulations, the costs associated with trucking our local, community garbage all the way to the Abilene landfill make

up the biggest percentage of the increase.

The chart listed to the left below shows a comparison of Knox City's new residential and commercial rates with the fees charged in both Stamford and Munday.

In Addition to the increased rates for garbage pickup, there are new hours and new regulations in effect for the Convenience Center. Hours are from 2 to 6 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday, and from 9-12 noon on Saturday.

No refrigerators or refrigerated air conditioner units will be accepted at the Convenience Center. This is a government regulation because of freon in the units.

**-- Knox City Residents --**

Knox City residents will not have to pay a fee for brush or limbs taken to the Convenience Center. There will also be no charge for larger items taken to the center, items such as washers, dryers, dishwashers or furniture.

Any remodeling or major clean-up projects that require disposal of larger loads will be charged \$10.00 per level pickup bed, \$15.00 per trailer, or \$10.00 per yard of load.

**-- Out Of Town Residents --**

Out of town residents will not be allowed to bring brush or limbs to the Convenience Center. Out of town residents will be allowed to bring other items at a fee of \$10.00 per yard of load.

## Cities Upset About Forced Government Mandates

*National Unfunded Mandates Week  
Is October 24-30*

Knox City, along with many other cities throughout the state and nation, are combining forces to send a message to Washington that unfunded mandates on small communities are a financial burden that will eventually be passed on to unhappy taxpayers. A special week has been set aside to recognize the problem, with October 24-30 designated as National Unfunded Mandate Week by the National League of Cities. The organization is comprised of all state municipal leagues, including the Texas Municipal League, of which Knox City is a member.

City leaders are pointing out that the politicians, bureaucrats, and special interest groups in Washington are the real culprits behind increasing taxes and service related fees.

Coming one after another, federal orders, or mandates, are forcing city governments to do more and more, with no funding included to carry out the added requirements.

Unfunded mandates have forced cities to take unusual actions as a means of response to the federal government. In LaGrange, Georgia, city officials list the costs created by unfunded federal mandates on rising real estate and utility bills with a note included to citizens that the costs were beyond the control of the mayor and council. The note also offered this advice to those taxpayers who thought the costs were too high: "To discuss the matter," the council suggests, "call your U.S. Senators and Representatives."

Recent unfunded mandates forced on Knox City have included additional water testing, additional sewer testing, and a mountain of landfill regulations that eventually resulted in the closing of our local landfill north of Knox City.

Dealing with unfunded mandates has been a top priority of the

Texas Municipal League for many years. Last year, hundreds of Texas cities took part in the National Unfunded Mandates Day on October 27, 1993. That effort had a significant impact on Congress and the White House this year. Although some said it could not be done, there is now bi-partisan support in Congress for federal mandates relief legislation. Any action in this direction will eventually filter down to the small city level and any relief will be a big help in the budget process of small towns like Knox City.

The bottom line is simple: when Washington passes a new unfunded law that requires a city like Knox City do more work - with no funds to accomplish the task - the result is simple, the local citizens (taxpayers) will have to foot the bill. The solution is also simple: if Washington passes laws for us to follow, they need to send funds to accomplish the task, or not pass the law in the first place!

Mayor Sharpe James of N.J., president of the National League of Cities, summed up the situation this way: "We have the federal government writing checks on our city's bank account. The federal government is trying to tell us they know what's best for us at the local level when they do not. We've become, at the local level, tax collectors for the federal government - and we resent that."

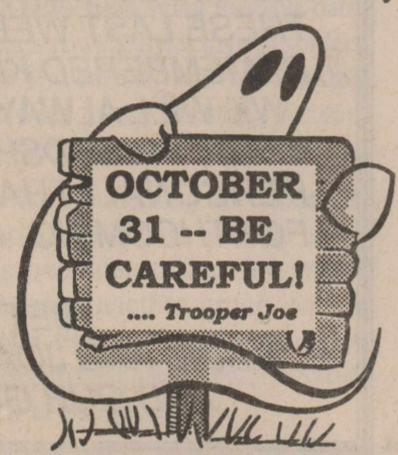
## From The DPS.....Trooper Joe Clement

determination as they took the kick on the 10 yard line, then started to grind down the field 9 first downs and a touchdown play on a 12 yard run. Dever, Dorsey, Dudensing, Scott Stephens, Joseph Logsdon and Al Rios all made strong tackles in trying to stop the advance, but the Lions just ground out the yards until they reached the end zone. The extra point play was a try for 2 points that failed, the scoreboard then showed KC-7, Roby-6, with 10:17 left in the 2nd quarter.

Eric Greenwood took the kick return to the 'Hounds 41 yard line, where Grimsley and crew took over. Runs by Dever, Dorsey, Grimsley and Diaz picked up 3 first downs before Grimsley was sacked by Roby on a 3rd and 7 play that resulted in a loss of 9 yards and a subsequent punt by Rosencranz that was blocked by Roby and recovered on the Lions 47 yard line.

Roby picked up 2 quick first downs before scoring on a 4th and 15, 28 yard touchdown play with 4:26 left in the half. The extra points run failed, resulting in a score of 12-7.

Lance Dever received the Roby kick on the 25 and returned the ball to the 39 yard line.

The 'Hounds picked up one first down before punting back to Roby. The ball changed hands on series four more times before Kevin Dorsey intercepted a Roby pass and ran it back 20 yards. Then the action became exciting as Grimsley passed to Dorsey from the 36 yard marker, with Dorsey taking the catch to the 18 yard line with just 4 seconds left in the half. On a 1st and 10 from the 18, Duane Toliver once again showed his kicking skills as he booted in a field goal to add three more points to the scoreboard, which read KC-10, Roby-12 at the half.

The Knox City Marching Band put on their best halftime show of the season when they performed their marching contest routine under the direction of Drum Major Julie Williams. To the tunes of Blue Suede Shoes, Ain't Misbehaving, and You've Lost That Loving Feeling, the Greyhound Pride Band thoroughly entertained the home crowd and left everyone on a high note for the start of the second half.

Roby received the KC kick to open the half, but soon had to punt back to the 'Hounds when the first series went nowhere.

Knox City struggled with the next series, with a short run by Grimsley, an incomplete pass to Marion and an interception by Roby on the Knox City 7 yard line.

Roby took advantage of the field position gained from the interception when they took the ball into the end zone on a 1st down from the 7 yard line. With 9:41 left in the third quarter, Roby went ahead 19-10.

Eric Greenwood took the kick on the 35 yard line and ran the ball out to the KC 47 yard before being brought down by a host of Lion defenders. With multiple runs by Dever, Diaz, Grimsley, and a pass to Diaz, Knox City

quickly picked up 4 first downs while marching down the field. On a 3rd and 9 play from the 25, Grimsley threw what seemed to be an impossible pass to Kevin Dorsey, who was closely covered by two Lion defensive backs. With hundreds of Greyhound fans madly cheering him on, Dorsey made what could easily be described as the play of the game when he jumped high between the two Lions and came down with the ball and another 6 points for Knox City! With 3:59 left in the third quarter, the Greyhounds tried for a two point conversion that was stopped short of the goal line, so the score stayed at KC-16, Roby-19.

Roby's quarterback felt the game during the next series as he was sacked hard for a 7 yard loss by Michael Ledesma and Scott Stephens. Other strong defensive plays by Ledesma and Logsdon stopped Roby and forced a punt on 4th and 11.

Runs by Dorsey, Grimsley, and Dever, plus an incomplete pass by Grimsley to Dorsey ended the third quarter of play.

To start the final quarter of action, Grimsley was sacked on a 3rd and 5 play for a loss of 10 yards, forcing a punt back to Roby on 4th and 15.

Duane Toliver tackled the punt receiver on the 28 yard line, setting up another bad series for Roby. After 3 running plays, the Lions tried to run on a 4th and 1 play, but the Greyhound Defense stood to the test and stopped the ball carrier, forcing a turnover to KC on downs.

Starting at the 40 yard line, runs by Deever, Diaz and Diaz again, the Hounds were the ones to turn the ball over on downs.

The most exciting series of the game followed, with Roby headed towards the goal line from their own 35 yard line. Strong, hard hitting tackles by Logsdon,

Dudensing, Dever, Rosencranz, Dudensing, and Billy Curd shook up the Lion offense as they tried for another six points. In what looked like a desperation pass, the Lion quarterback passed on a 3rd and 16 play, only to have the ball intercepted by Dudensing. Unfortunately, Dudensing was tackled in the end zone, giving the Lions 2 points for a safety and forcing Knox City to have to kick the ball back to Roby. That two points was added to the Roby total with 2:15 left in the game and the game ended with that same score showing on the board, Knox City 16, Roby 21.

During the next series by Roby, the officials called what was just one of many controversial calls when a Roby fumble recovery by Ryan Marion was ruled a downed ball and given back to Roby. From my vantage point of being directly across from the play, it was easy to see that the ball was fumbled while the player was still moving. Despite strong protests from the Greyhound coaching staff, the officials stood their ground and gave the ball back to Roby.

Another weird call during the game came when the officials called a penalty on Knox City for only having 10 players on the field. Despite loud protests and a quick count of players by Coach Rob Wills, and an attempted lesson in how to count to an official by Coach Wayne Johnson, the officials defiantly remained united behind the call.

Knox City may have been behind in points when the final buzzer sounded, but no one can dare to say that the 'Hounds were losers. The entire team, both offense, defense, and special teams played their best game of the season. Despite the final score, the fans left extremely proud of the entire team and their coaching staff.

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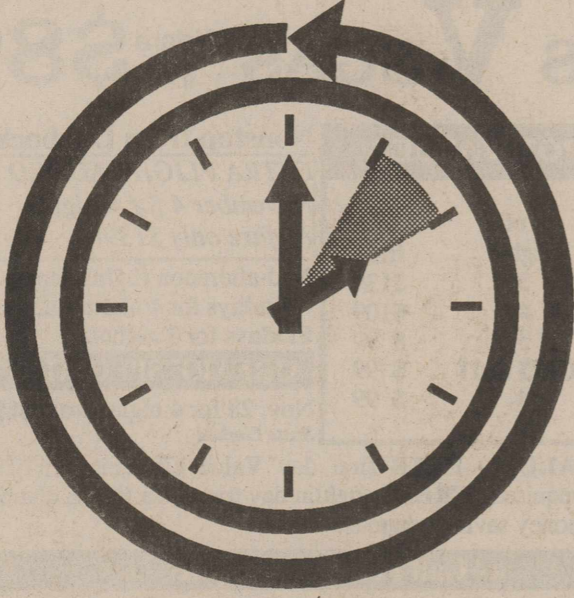

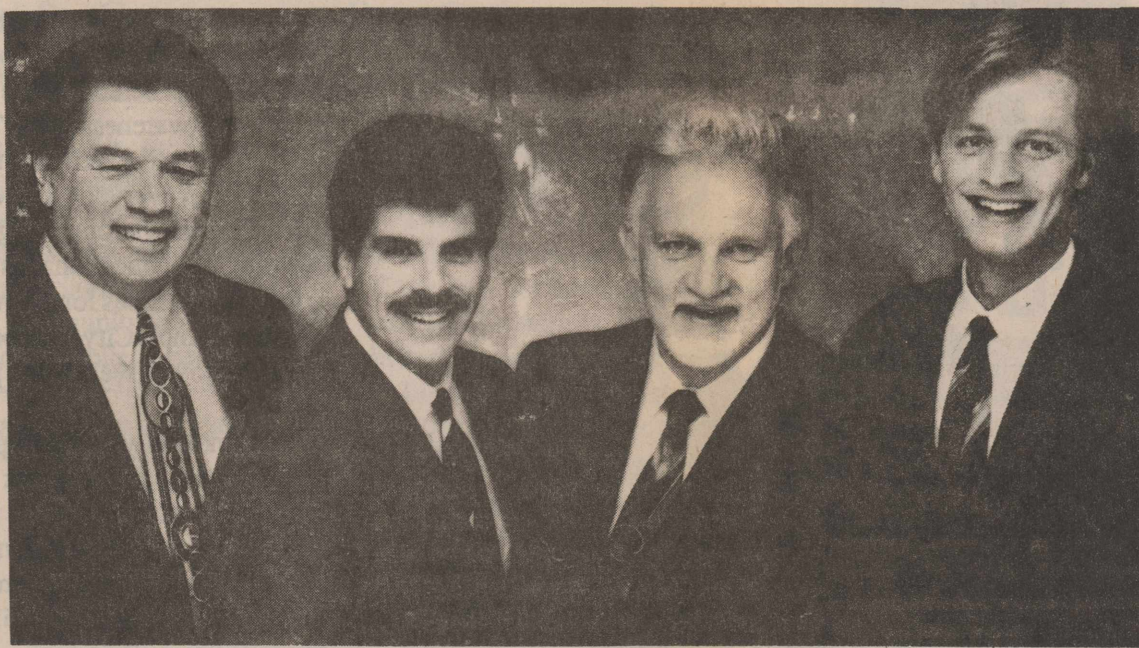
## Imperials Set For Benjamin On Nov. 4

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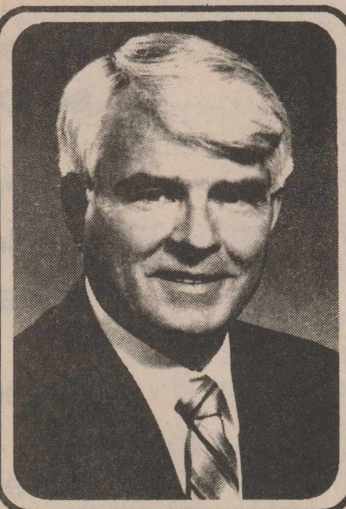

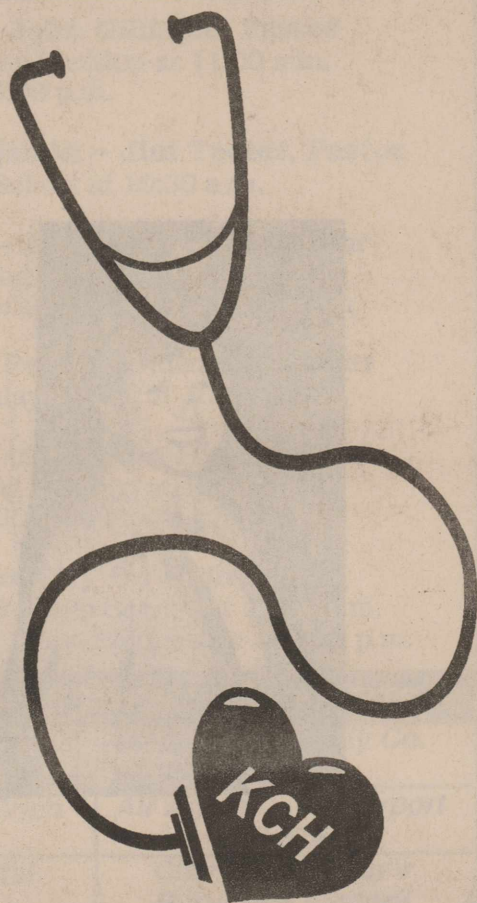

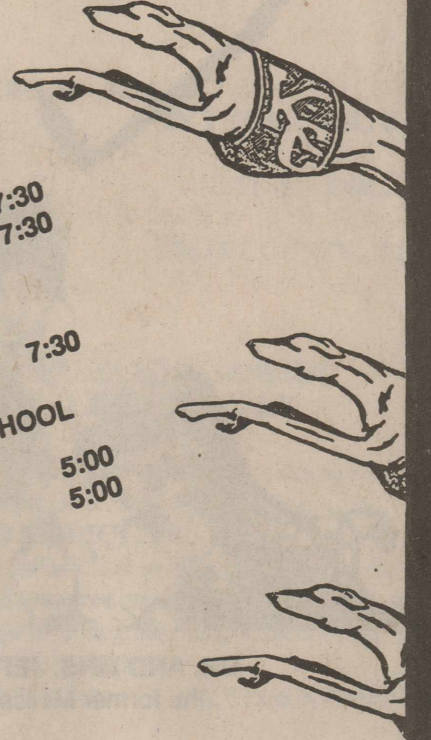
