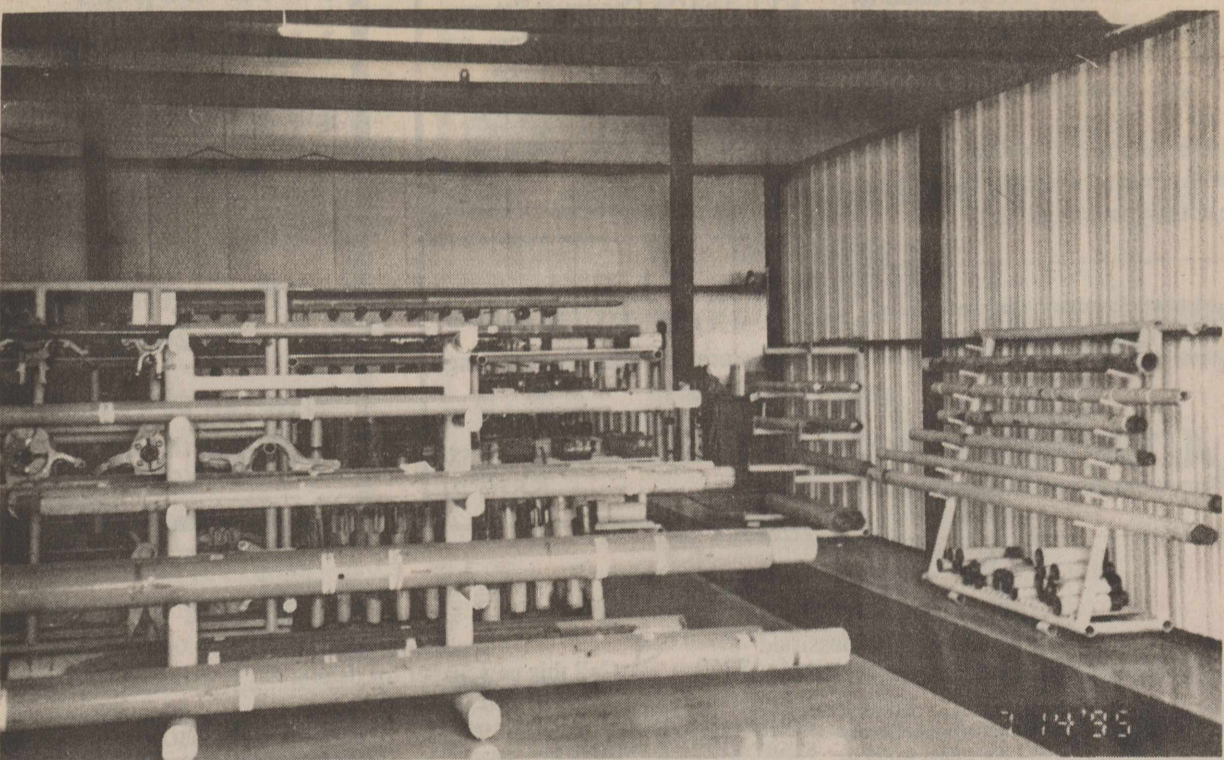

Judge Hajek Delivers Penitentiary Sentences In District Court Cases

On Monday, July 10, 1995, in the Baylor County District Court, Willie Dockins, 35, was found guilty of violating his probation resulting from a prior conviction of Possession of Marijuana and was sentenced to 10 years in the penitentiary by District Judge David Hajek.

On Tuesday, July 11, 1995, in the Knox County District Court, Judge Hajek sentenced his brother Bobby Lynn Dockins, 22, to serve 15 years in the penitentiary for violation of his prior probation for Delivery of Cocaine. Both were represented by Wichita Falls attorney Michael Payne. These sentences came as a result of a recent drug investigation and drug raid through the combined efforts of North Texas Regional Drug Task Force, Baylor County Sheriff's Department, Knox County Sheriff's Department, and the District Attorney's office.

In other court action in the Baylor County District Court Mildred Skannal, 32, of Seymour, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary for violation of her probation resulting from a forg-

ery conviction.

Jerry Lambert Holub, 28, of Kamay, plead guilty to an offense of Possession of Methamphetamine and was fined \$1,500.00 and put on three-year deferred adjudication probation. Holub was represented by James Ammons of Wichita Falls.

Michael Widner, 27, of Lubbock represented by Greg Merkle of Wichita Falls, plead guilty to a Class A misdemeanor charge of Possession of Marijuana. He was assessed a \$2,500.00 fine and put on one-year probation by Hajek.

Clifford Edward Henderson, 25, of Wichita Falls, plead guilty to a Retaliation charge with respect to assaulting a jailer and was given a two-year deferred adjudication probation. In addition, Henderson had already made restitution in the amount of \$980.00.

Jeffery Farris, 18, and Carl Shannon Brown, 25, both of Seymour, plead guilty to a Burglary with Intent to Commit Theft and were both given two-year probation with provision to restitution to the injured party.

Lucio Montez, Jr., 24, of Seymour, also came before the Court after serving a 90-day sentence in the penitentiary's Boot Camp Division after having been convicted of Aggravated Assault on his wife. Judge Hajek had previously sentenced Montez to 10 years in the penitentiary's Boot Camp Division. Upon successfully completing 90 days in boot camp, Montez was returned to the District Court for determination of whether he should serve the remainder of 10-year sentence or place him on probation for balance of the 10-year term. After hearing evidence of the defendant's successful completion of Boot Camp program and upon request of the defendant and his wife that he be granted probation, Judge Hajek did grant the defendant's request.

The following day, Tuesday, July 11, 1995, in the Knox County District Court, after the Court's having revoked Bobby Lynn Dockins' probation and sentenced him to 15 years on the drug charge, the court heard a plea from Samuel See SENTENCES, Page Six

WTU's Don Welch Announces Retirement

ABILENE - Don Welch, vice president of Operations and Engineering for West Texas Utilities Company since 1982, has announced he will retire on August 1.

Welch's distinguished career with WTU spans 36 years from the time he joined the utility as a lineman in Stamford and as he worked his way through the company in various operations and management positions.

Welch served as a local WTU Manager in Aspermont, Wellington and Alpine from 1967 to 1976. He then was promoted to Assistant District Manager at Stamford and later served as District Manager at Stamford.

In 1982, he moved to WTU's General Office in Abilene and was named Executive Assistant. After a few months, he became Vice President of Operations and Engineering, presiding over the utility's operations for a service area that stretches across more than 53,000 miles in 52 West Texas counties.

During his career at WTU, he also served in many leadership capacities in civic and regional organizations. While in Stamford, he was a Director of the Rotary Club and was a Director of the Lions Club in Alpine. In Wellington, he was President of the Kiwanis Club.

Welch serves on the Board of Directors of the Fairway Oaks Country Club in Abilene; the West Texas Rehabilitation Center; the

Ben Richey Boys Ranch and the Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford. He also served on the Worker's Compensation Task Force of the Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Welch is known in West Texas as a strong advocate for the importance of enhancing and developing the West Texas agricultural economy, and his devotion to the region is seen in his approach to WTU business providing superior customer service.

He once said in a presentation to employees that, "It comes as no surprise to any of you that our customers have pretty high expectations for electric service."

"What we have to do is match their expectations for service with our ability to provide service at a reasonable price," he added.

Welch has shown a keen sense of what the customer expects, and he also has recognized that WTU's employees are key to delivering service to meet those expectations.

"Communication is the key. When our customers come in contact with us, they are telling us that something is important to them and we better believe it," Welch told employees recently.

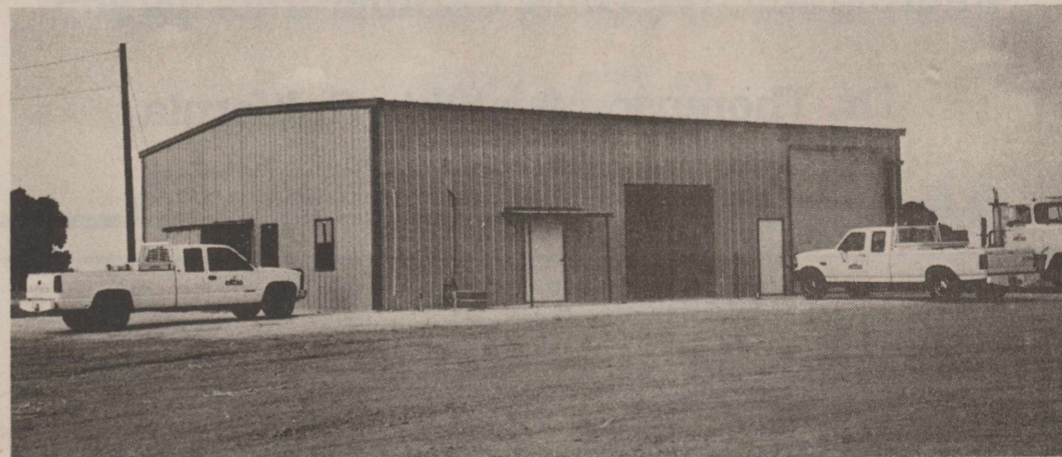

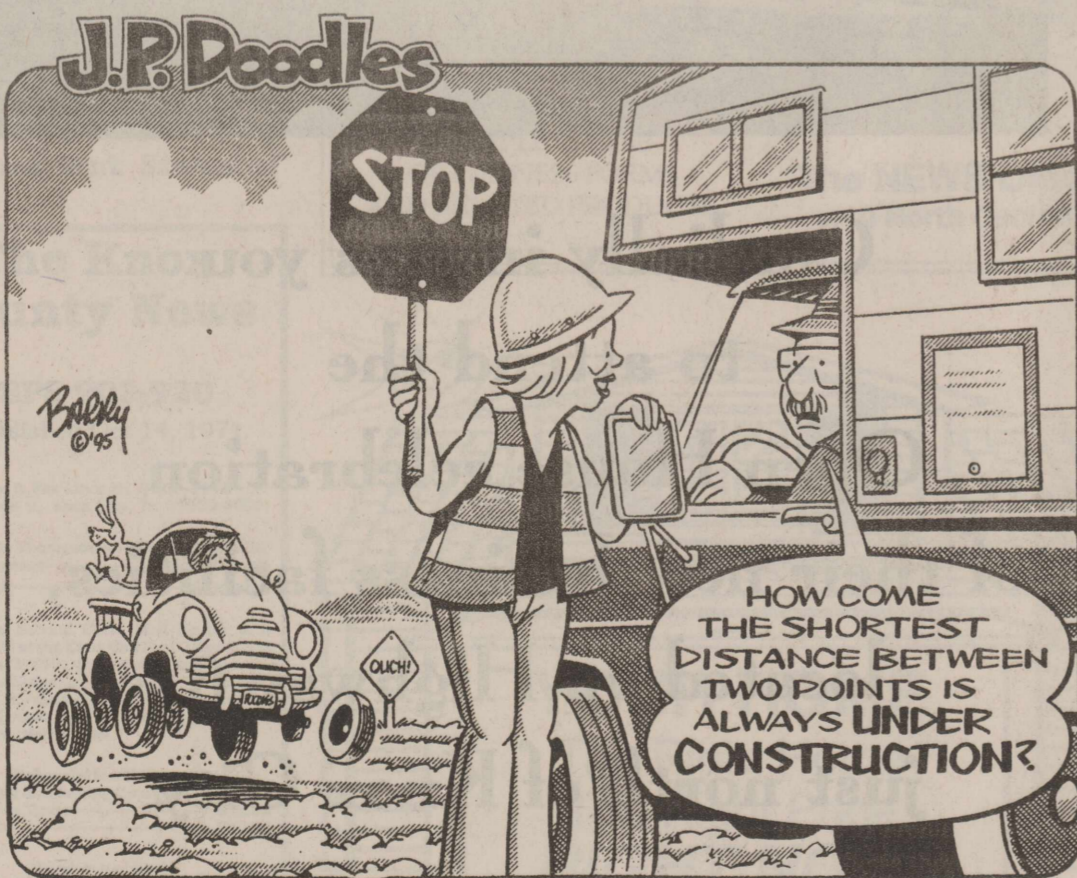

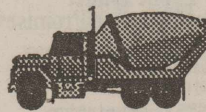

Knox Co. Hospital Cardiac Rehab Has Four Patients

The Knox County Hospital Cardiac Rehabilitation Center has four regular patients, according to Stephan Kuehler, administrator of the hospital. "These patients are taking advantage of this service here in our hometown, instead of driving to Abilene for their treatment," he said. "Most physicians agree that the key to recovery from a heart attack is a supervised, planned rehabilitation program, and we're excited that we can offer this service right here at Knox County."

The Cardiac Rehabilitation Service utilizes the same equipment as the Wellness Center Rehabilitation Service. "We have three treadmills, two exercise bikes, an ergometer, a weight machine, and a small stair stepper," Kuehler said. "It's the same type of equipment that those who belong to health clubs in larger towns have." The Cardiac Rehabilitation Services operate in conjunction with Abilene Regional Medical Center, Kuehler said.

The patients come to the rehabilitation center three days a week, and spend an hour to an hour and a half using the exercise equipment under the supervision of a trained health care professional.

"The most important part of the service is the fact that the patient is carefully monitored and watched so that he or she gets enough exercise but not too much," Kuehler said.

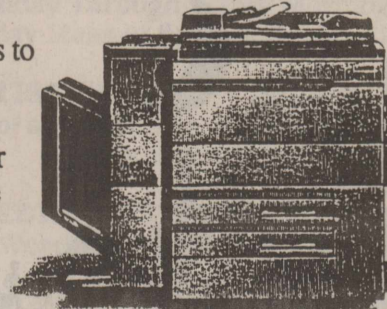

Applications Are Being Taken For Head Start

Knox City Child Development Center will be taking applications for the enrollment of children for the Head Start program that will begin in the fall.

The Head Start program is designed to meet the needs of low-income three and four year old children by providing an environment which will help them develop socially, physically, intellectually and emotionally in a manner appropriate to their age and stage of development towards the overall goal of social competence. The Head Start program serves children with disabilities and children with disabilities receive the full range of developmental services that non-disabled children receive. The program works closely with other community agencies to provide services to meet the special needs of children with disabilities. Parents whose children have disabilities or developmental delays are encouraged to make application for the program. The guidelines for participation in Head Start are established by the U.S. Office of Budget and Management and Knox City Child Development Center has 18 funded slots available.

To make application for the program, parents must bring the following documents: child's birth certificate, immunization record, social security number of family member enrolling the child, and proof of income for the past 12 months or the calendar year 1994. A 1040 or 1040A Income Tax return form for 1994 is the easiest form of annual income documentation. AFDC recipients are categorically eligible for the program, but we must have documentation of AFDC benefits, i.e., letter from Social Workers, Case #s, etc. All information is considered confidential and will be used only for the purpose of establishing eligibility and defining the needs of the family and child.

Applications will be taken from July 24 through July 26, 1995, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Knox City Child Development Center, 500 North Second Street, Knox City. It is very important that persons wanting their child in the Head Start program that begins in the fall to make application on the designated days at the location mentioned above. Those who cannot make application on the designated days, call June Moss at 658-3770 to make arrangements for making an application.

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

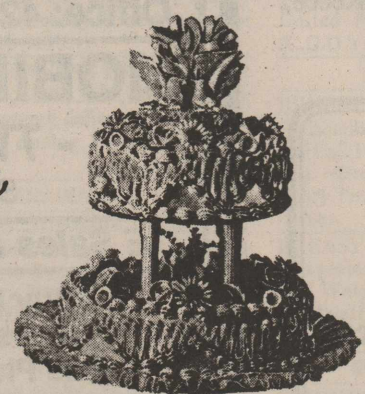
