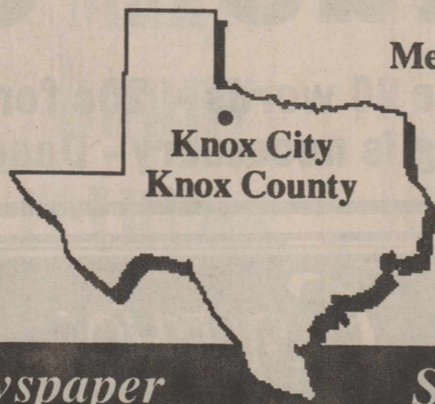

Services Are Held In Seymour Monday For Dr. W.F. Thompson

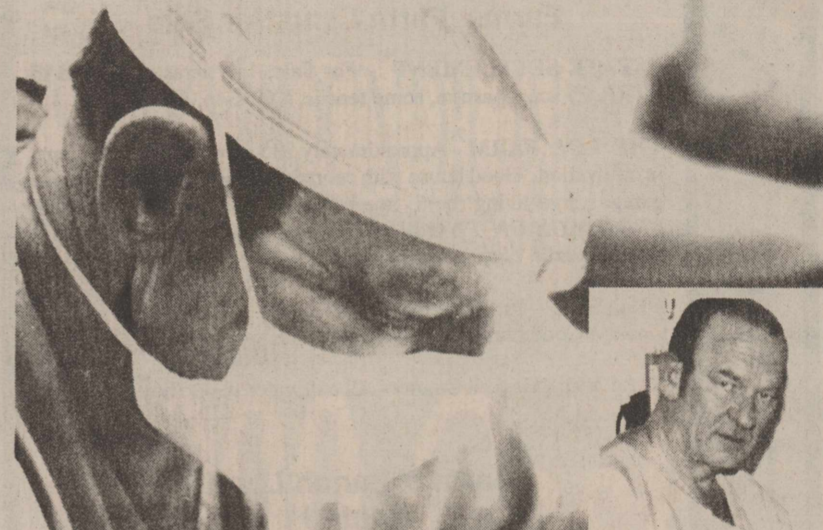
Dr. Walter Fred Thompson, 65, died Saturday morning, August 26, at his residence in Seymour.

Services were held Monday morning, August 28, at ten o'clock in the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Seymour with the Rev. Bart J. Landwermeyer officiating. Burial was Tuesday, August 29, at 4:00 p.m. at Baker Cemetery in Browning, Missouri. Arrangements were by Archer Funeral Home of Seymour.

Father Bart described Dr. Thompson as a "people person, compassionate, caring, a friend to all." He saved lives, brought lives into the world and was a source of strength for his many patients. He did much for those in need and was a supporter of the Boy Scouts of America program. He saw to it that those who were financially unable to pay for camp were among those to attend, saying never to "turn anyone away" who did not have the necessary funds.

Dr. Thompson was born March 29, 1930, in Browning. He was a paratrooper in the United States Army. He graduated from Northeast Missouri State University in 1963. In 1967, he graduated from Kirksville Osteopathic College of Medicine. He interned in Erie, Pennsylvania, and worked in various hospitals and emergency rooms throughout the country. He moved to Knox City and opened a clinic here in 1976. In 1987, he opened a clinic in Seymour.

He and Frankie Smith were married December 30, 1953, in Alton, Missouri. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and was

associated with numerous professional organizations.

Dr. Thompson was named Medical Director of the Year in 1994 by Chartwell Industries.

His son, David B. Thompson, preceded him in death on August 17, 1995.

Survivors include his wife, Frankie; two daughters, Debbie Thompson McCown of Knox City and Lisa Thompson Zipper of Irving; five brothers, Raymond and Alford, both of Raytown, Missouri, Orval of Browning, George of Herscher, Illinois, and Homer

of Springfield, Missouri; and eight grandchildren, Adam McCown and Jordan McCown of Knox City, Emarric Zipper, Temen Zipper, Quintin Zipper, Mychal Zipper, Korin Zipper and Azaria Zipper of Irving.

Pallbearers were Cecil Kuehler, David Albus, Kloyce Guinn, Ron Clark, Dr. Calvin Gambill and Alvin Jungman.

Dr. Thompson's brothers served as honorary pallbearers.

Memorials may be made to the American Cancer Society and the Liver Foundation.

The AQHA World Championship Show is the pinnacle event for the 30,000 member American Junior Quarter Horse Association. The show featured 1,953 entries from around the world competing

for 30 world championships, making this the largest youth world championship horse show. Horses must earn a predetermined number of points in AQHA-approved shows between May 1, 1994 and April 30, 1995.

Worms Move In On Knox County

The BAW (beet armyworms) moths -- which lay the eggs that hatch into the worms -- fly, and with a good southern tailwind, the moths cover lots of territory fast.

This past week, Haskell and Knox counties got EPA's nod for Pirate use. However, according to Farm Editor J.T. Smith in Sunday's *Abilene Reporter News'* article, it is questionable as to whether Pirate Manufacturer

American Cyanamid has nearly enough Pirate to go around. It has long been said that the Lubbock economy is supported by three major crops -- cotton, cotton, and cotton. By mid-August, the beet armyworm had destroyed most of

the cotton in Tom Green, Concho, Runnels, and McCulloch counties. The armyworm had gobbled the cotton almost overnight -- as if someone had mowed the cotton fields with a shredder. Last real beet armyworm year was 1980.

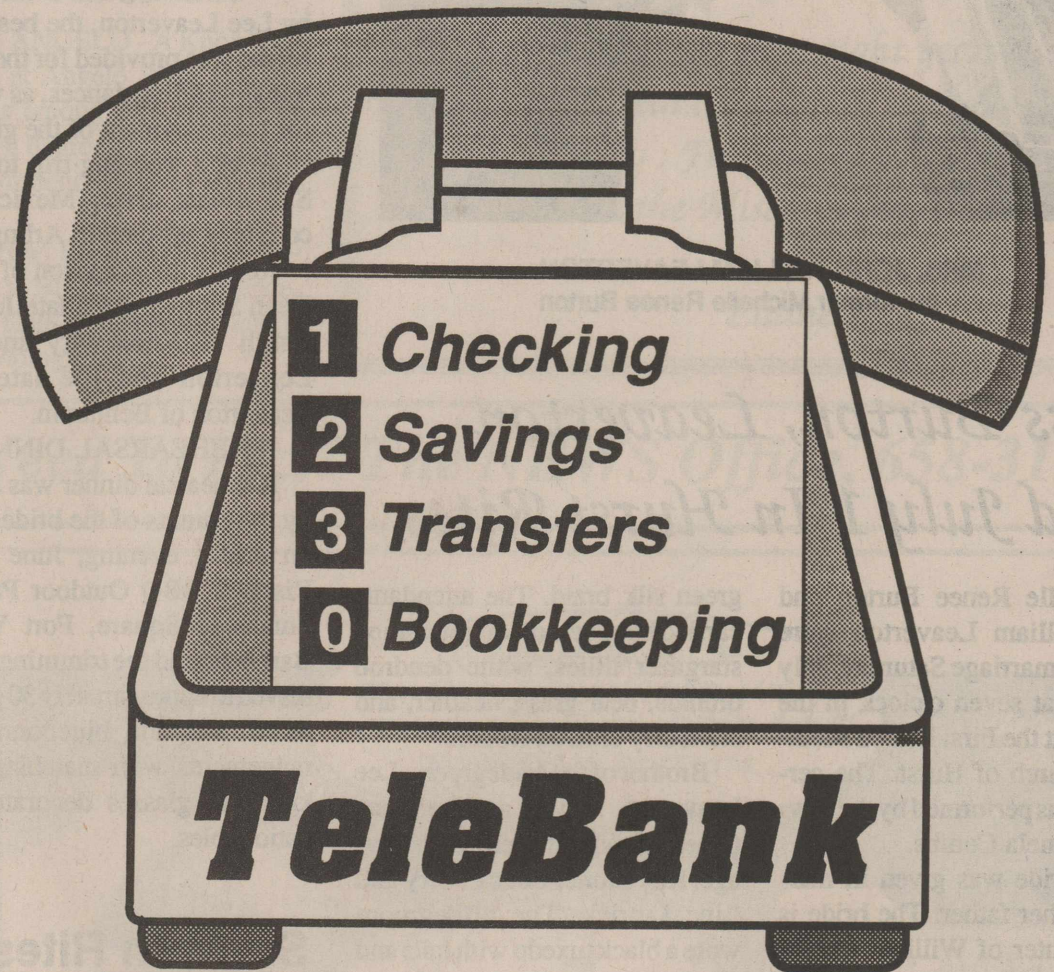

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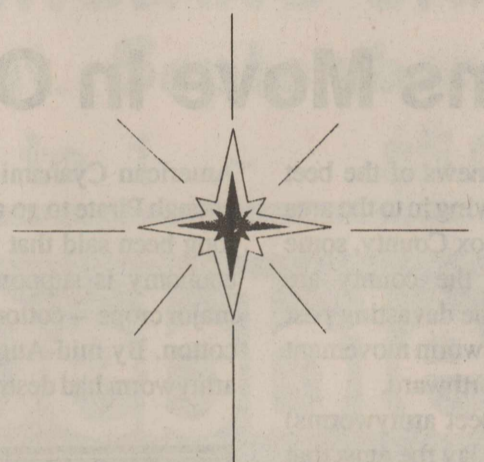

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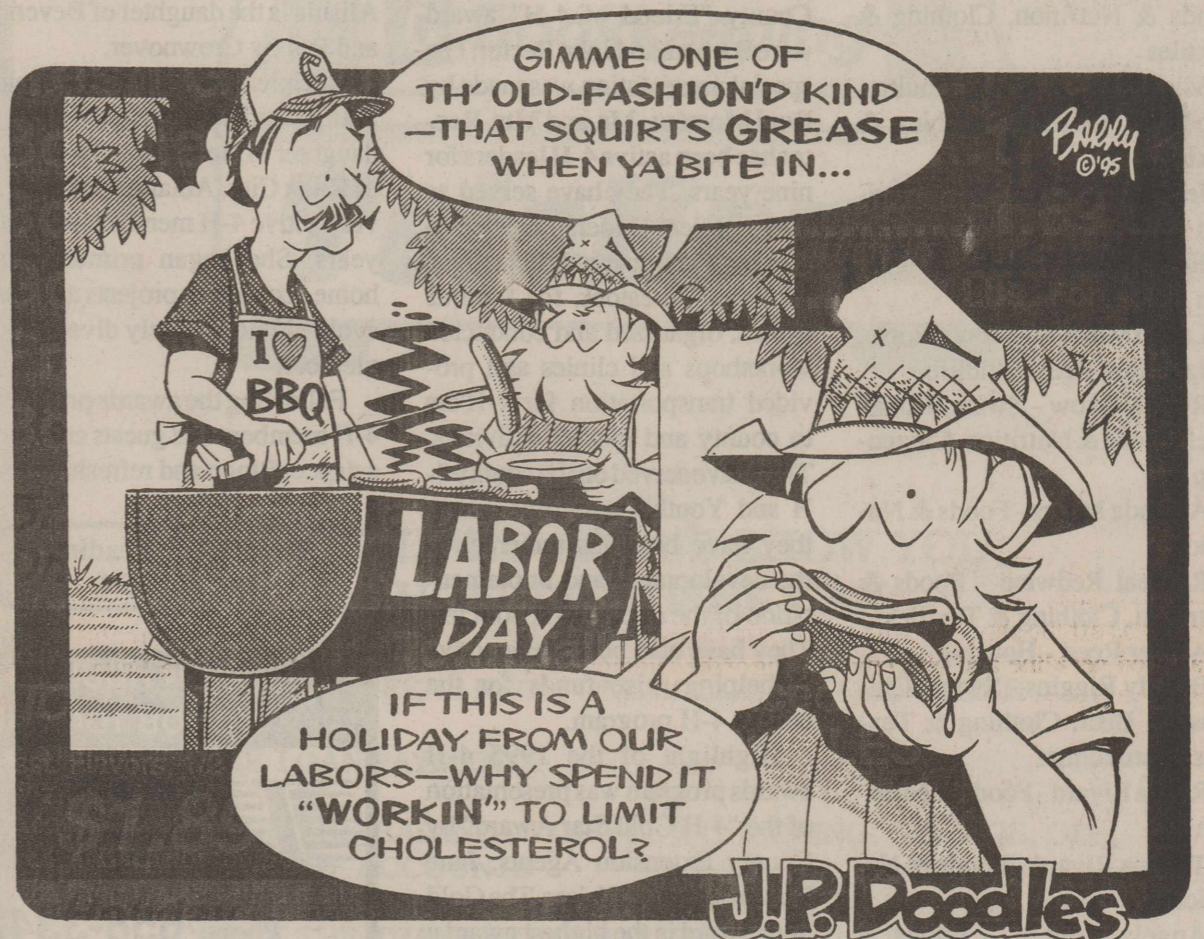

Following the awards program 4-H members and guests enjoyed a dance, Bingo and refreshments.

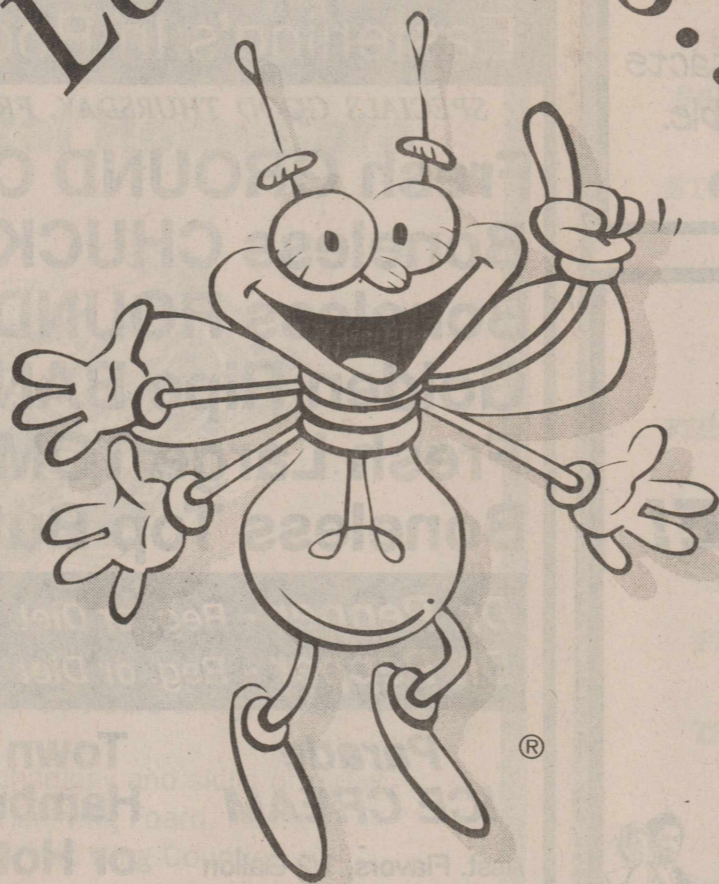

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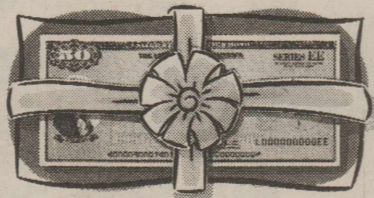

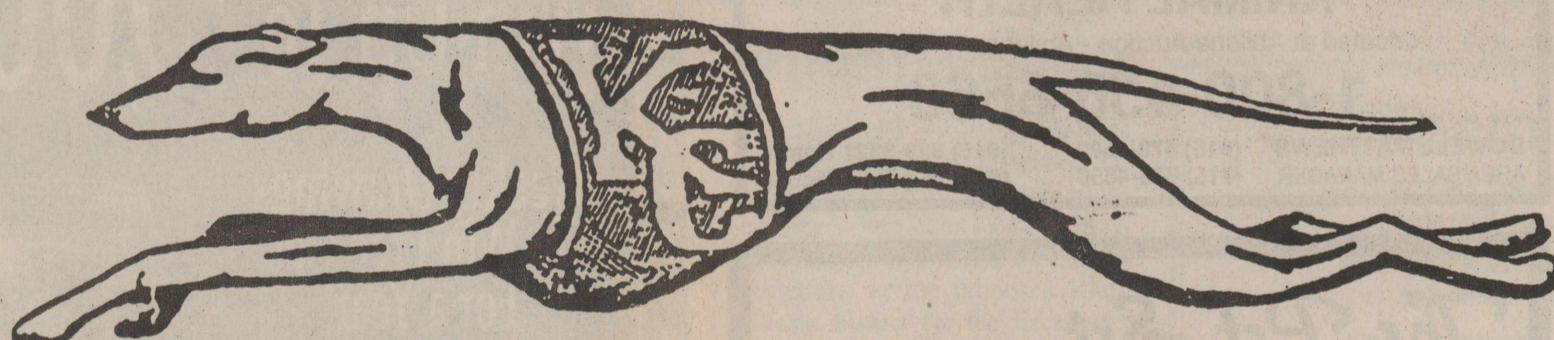
