

Department Of Public Safety Issues Pre-Application Cards For Concealed Handgun License Applications

The Texas Department of Public Safety has begun the process of dealing with those residents of Texas who are interested in carrying a concealed handgun under the new law passed during the last legislative session.

The multi-step process for licenses to carry a concealed handgun begins with the applicant filling out pre-application registration card and mailing the card back to the DPS. A sample of this card appears below and may be

used by those entering the application process. Once filled out, the postcard sized form (or newspaper clipping form) must be mailed to the Texas Department of Public Safety, CRS/Concealed Handgun Licensing Unit, Post Office Box 15888, Austin, Tx., 78761-5888.

The completed card (or newspaper form) will be used as a screening tool. After a background check, those who appear to qualify for a license will be

mailed a complete application

After the DPS receives the completed application, the agency will have 90 days to either issue a license or reject the application. Licenses that are issued will not become valid until after Jan. 1. 1996. Those with questions are encouraged to contact the DPS Public Information Office at (512) 706-7293 or (512) 706-7294 for more information on the concealed handgun law.






