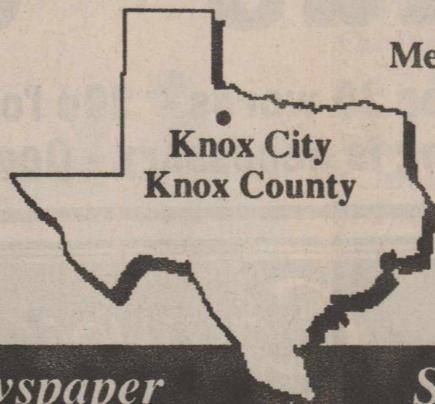

The Houndette Volleyball Team has been going strong, and with several games already behind them, the girls appear to be headed for a strong season. In

their early season, the team has faced both Chillicothe and Albany, as well as playing in the Wichita Falls Tournament two weeks ago.

Upcoming opponents include Rotan, Rochester, Aspermont, Goree, Benjamin, Chillicothe, Paducah and Albany, as well as tournament competition scheduled in Aspermont.

On December 31, 1995, many ag producers will either lose their private applicators license or be eligible for renewal. In order to renew the license one must obtain 15 CEU's approved by TDA. Knox County farmers and homeowners will have the opportunity to receive two (2) CEU's on Monday, September 11, at the 1995 Knox County Fall Crops Tour.

The Fall Crops Tour has been

organized to give producers the opportunity to look back as well as look forward. Looking back will include a look at new varieties of cotton, insect and weed pest problems that occurred in 1995, and the general summer growing season.

Farmers will also have a chance to visit with specialists about upcoming situations. For example: cotton harvest, wheat planting, wheat insect pest, etc.

This will be a very informal

tour. The guest speakers will be prepared to answer questions regarding any of the crops grown in the Knox County area.

Anyone interested in attending should meet at the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station in Munday on Monday, September 11 at 2:00 p.m.

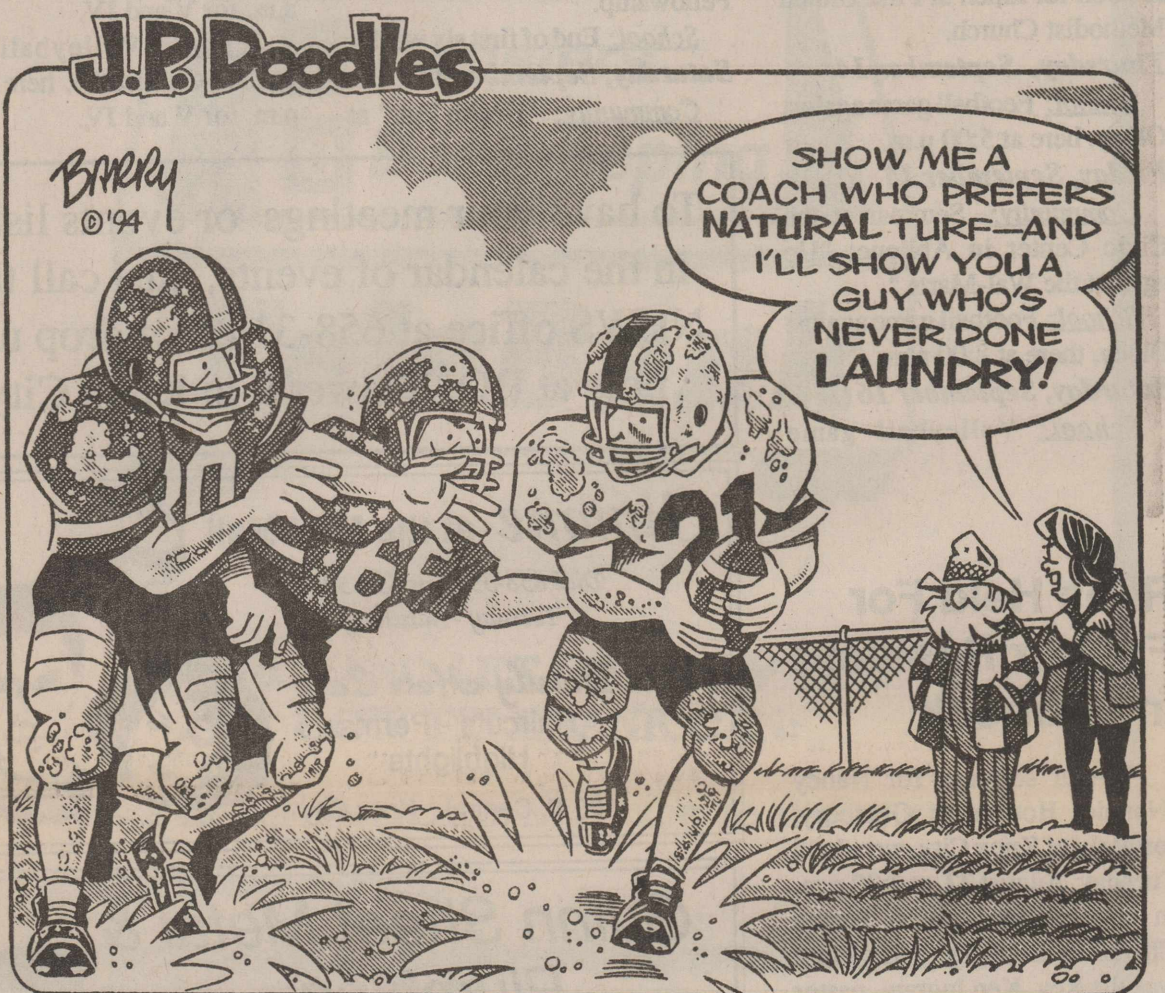

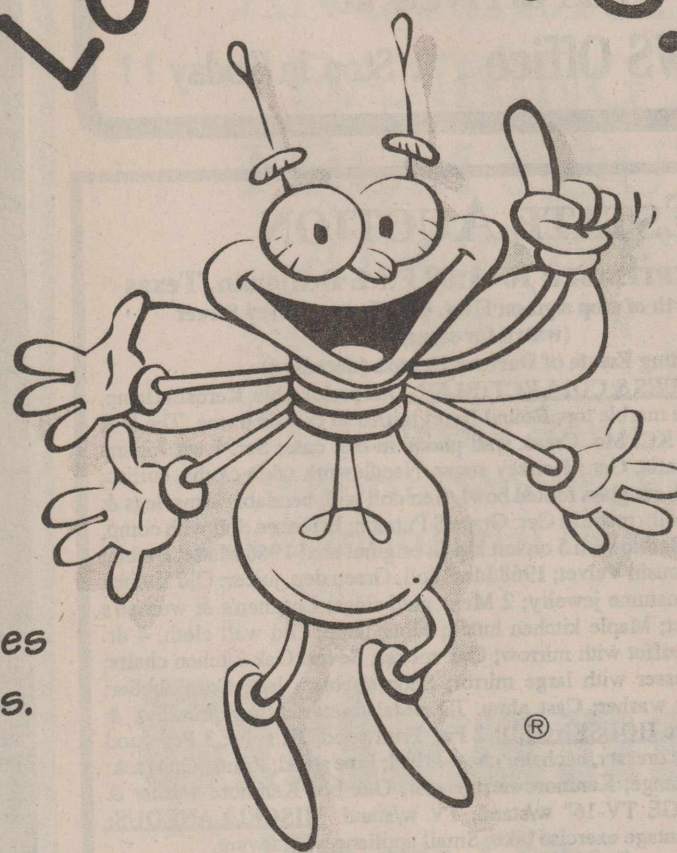

Rites Held For Former Resident In Lubbock

Funeral services for Nancy (Nannie) Horton, of Granbury, formerly of Knox City, were held Tuesday, August 22, at 4:30 p.m. in Resthaven Funeral Home Chapel in Lubbock. Officiating was the Rev. Ken Ingram, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Centraillia, Missouri, and burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park. Mrs. Horton, 94, died Saturday, August 26, in a Granbury nursing home following an illness.

Born January 22, 1901, in Clyde, Texas, she married Joe D. Horton in February 1919 in Knox City. He preceded her in death in November 1977. She was also preceded in death by her son, Gerald D. (Jerry) Horton on December 22, 1993.

Mrs. Horton moved to County Line from Knox City in 1934. In 1944, they moved to Whitharral and to Hurlwood in 1956. In 1968, they moved to Lubbock where she lived until moving to Granbury in 1979. She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Granbury and was a Sunday School teacher and a member of the WMU.

Survivors include two sons, William H. (Bill) of Wills Point and Claude L. of Andrews; six grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Department Of Public Safety Issues Pre-Application Cards For Concealed Handgun License Applications

The Texas Department of Public Safety has begun the process of dealing with those residents of Texas who are interested in carrying a concealed handgun under the new law passed during the last legislative session.

The multi-step process for licenses to carry a concealed handgun begins with the applicant filling out pre-application registration card and mailing the card back to the DPS. A sample of this card appears below and may be

used by those entering the application process. Once filled out, the postcard sized form (or newspaper clipping form) must be mailed to the Texas Department of Public Safety, CRS/Concealed Handgun Licensing Unit, Post Office Box 15888, Austin, Tx., 78761-5888.

The completed card (or newspaper form) will be used as a screening tool. After a background check, those who appear to qualify for a license will be

mailed a complete application packet.

After the DPS receives the completed application, the agency will have 90 days to either issue a license or reject the application. Licenses that are issued will not become valid until after Jan. 1, 1996. Those with questions are encouraged to contact the DPS Public Information Office at (512) 706-7293 or (512) 706-7294 for more information on the concealed handgun law.

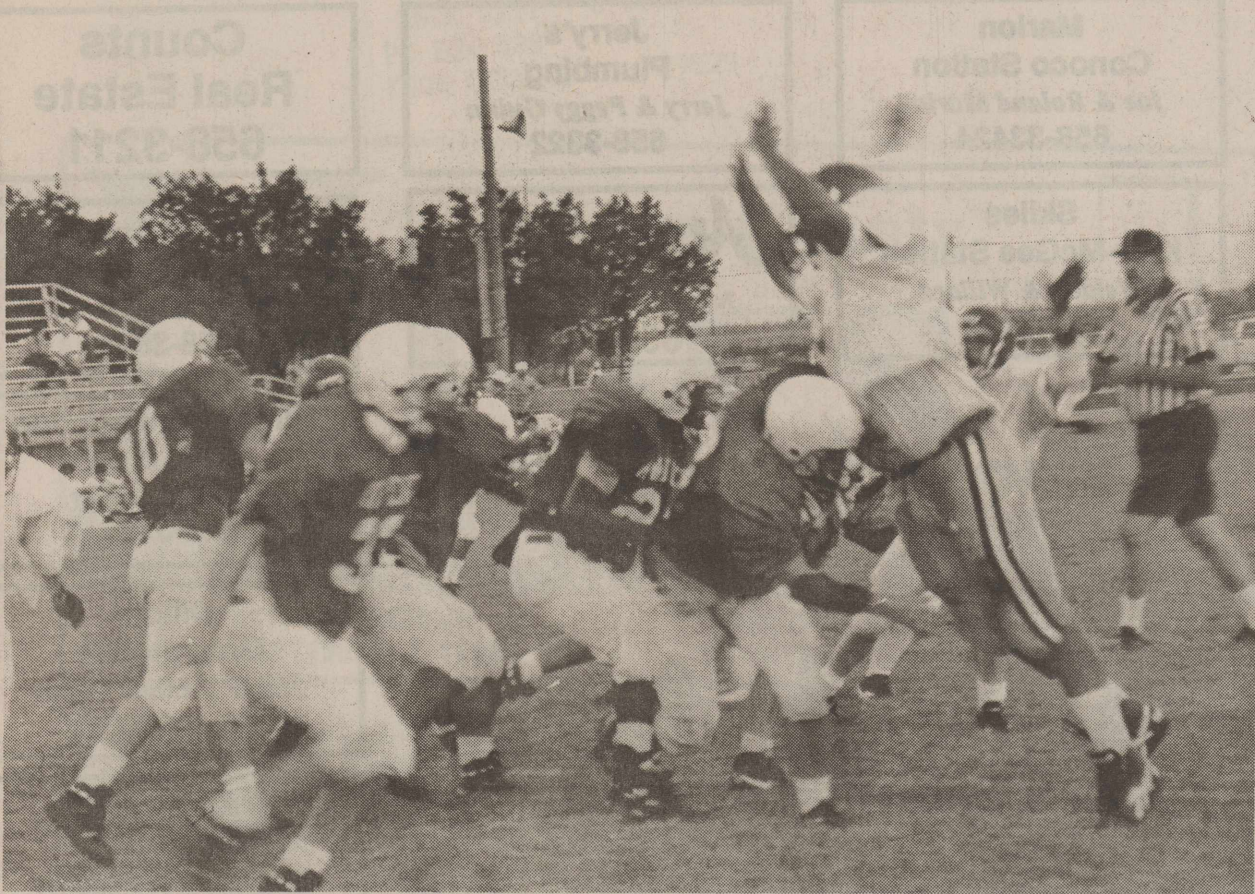
