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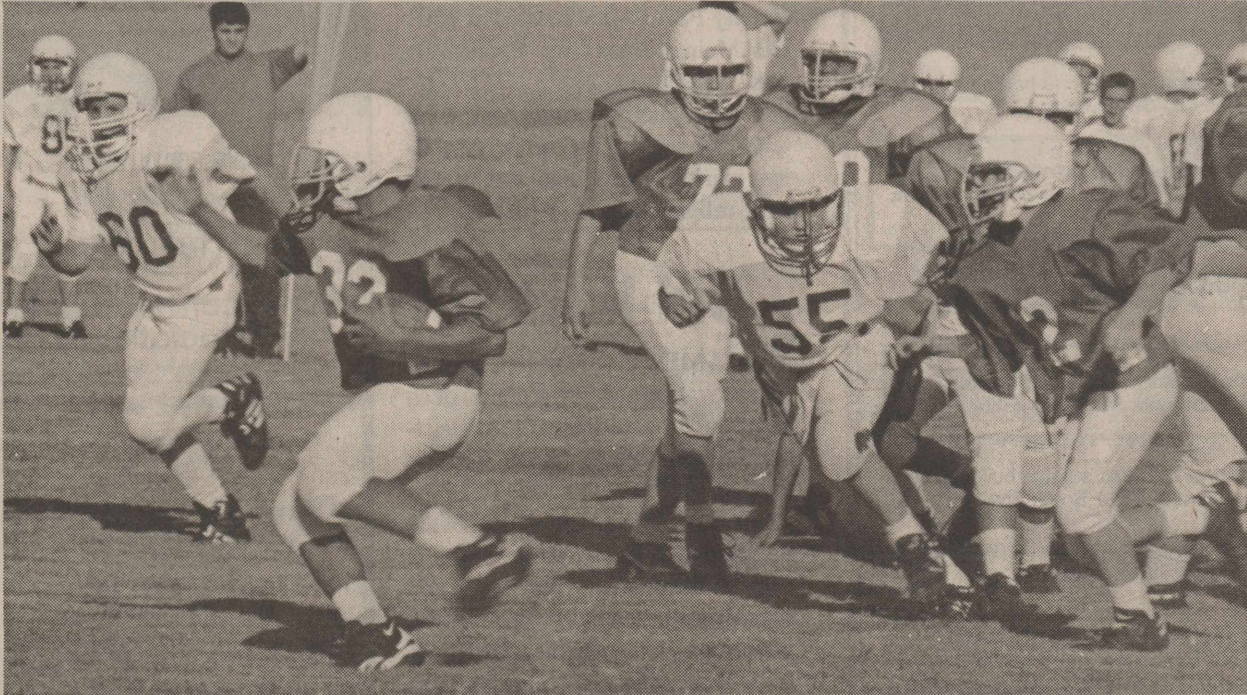

Hounds Overpowered By Windthorst

First District Game With Aspermont, There, Friday At 7:30 P.M.

Knox City's Greyhounds traveled to Windthorst Friday night for their final non-conference game of the season. The Hounds were overpowered by the host Trojans, 48-6.

Knox City's long score came in the fourth quarter on a 45 yard run by Lance Dever. The run for two

failed.

Dever had 32 carries for 173 yards for Knox City.

Windthorst's Justin Boone and Cody Wolf each rushed for more than 100 yards with Boone scoring three times and Nick Brophy twice. Boone ran 67 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter and

had a five-yard run in the second quarter and an 18-yarder in the third quarter. Brophy caught a 28-yard and a 41-yard pass for the Trojans.

District play begins this Friday night for the Greyhounds when they travel to Aspermont to meet the Hornets at 7:30 p.m.

GTE Announces Expanded Local Calling For Knox City

San Angelo, Tx - September 29, 1995 - GTE Telephone Operations for will extend local calling for all customers in the Knox City telephone service area, beginning October 26, 1995. Under the plan, all calls to and from the communities listed as follows will be billed as local calls: Knox City to and from Benjamin, Haskell, Munday-Goree, and Rochester.

"Prior to the start of Extended Local Calling, each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call, and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills," said Larry King, area manager - customer operations for GTE's Plains district. "Now, these calls are equivalent to local calls," explained King.

This action is the result of balloting which took place in the Knox City telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49 (c). Under those guidelines, certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free local calling to nearby communities.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended is operational, it will no longer be necessary to dial 1+ before the number when placing calls between these

communities.

A per-line increase in the total monthly bill for residential customers and business customers will be assessed to customers in Knox City for the added service. The charges will be listed as "EXPANDED LOCAL CALLING" in the tax portion of the telephone bill. More information will be provided to affected customers in their monthly telephone bill as the service becomes operational.

Residential customers with questions about the Extended Local Calling service should call toll free to 1-800-483-4400, and business customers should call 1-800-483-5400.

"We've found people appreciate having more control over their phone, such as knowing who's calling them before they answer the phone." Other new services that will be available beginning October 26 include the following:

* AUTOMATIC BUSY REDIAL - This service keeps trying a busy number and rings you back when your

number and the called number are free.

* AUTOMATIC CALL RETURN - Stores the number of the last call you received and lets you return that call at your convenience even though the caller has hung up.

* CALL BLOCK - Intercepts calls from up to 12 numbers you establish and informs those callers their call is not being accepted.

* SPECIAL CALL ACCEPTANCE - Allows you to list up to 12 telephone numbers from which you want to receive calls. Other calls are routed to a recorded announcement that says you are not accepting calls.

* SPECIAL CALL FORWARDING - Lets you decide which telephone numbers, up to 12, get through to you when you are at another number.

* VIP ALERT - Identifies up to 12 important callers by the sound of the ring.

* CALL TRACING SERVICE - Allows tracing of harassing, threatening or obscene calls. By using the assigned code, the caller's number, as well as the date and time of the call, are sent automatically to GTE's

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

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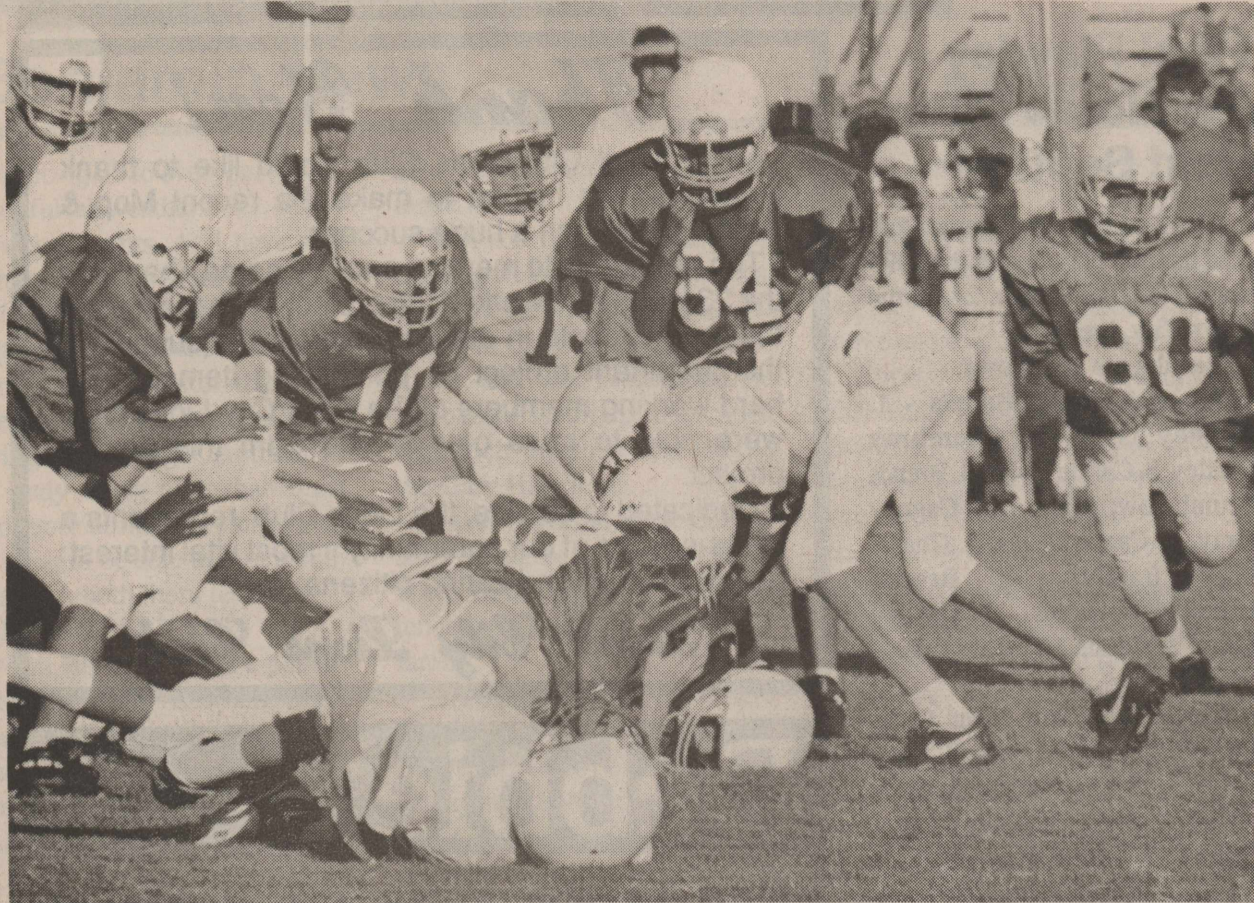
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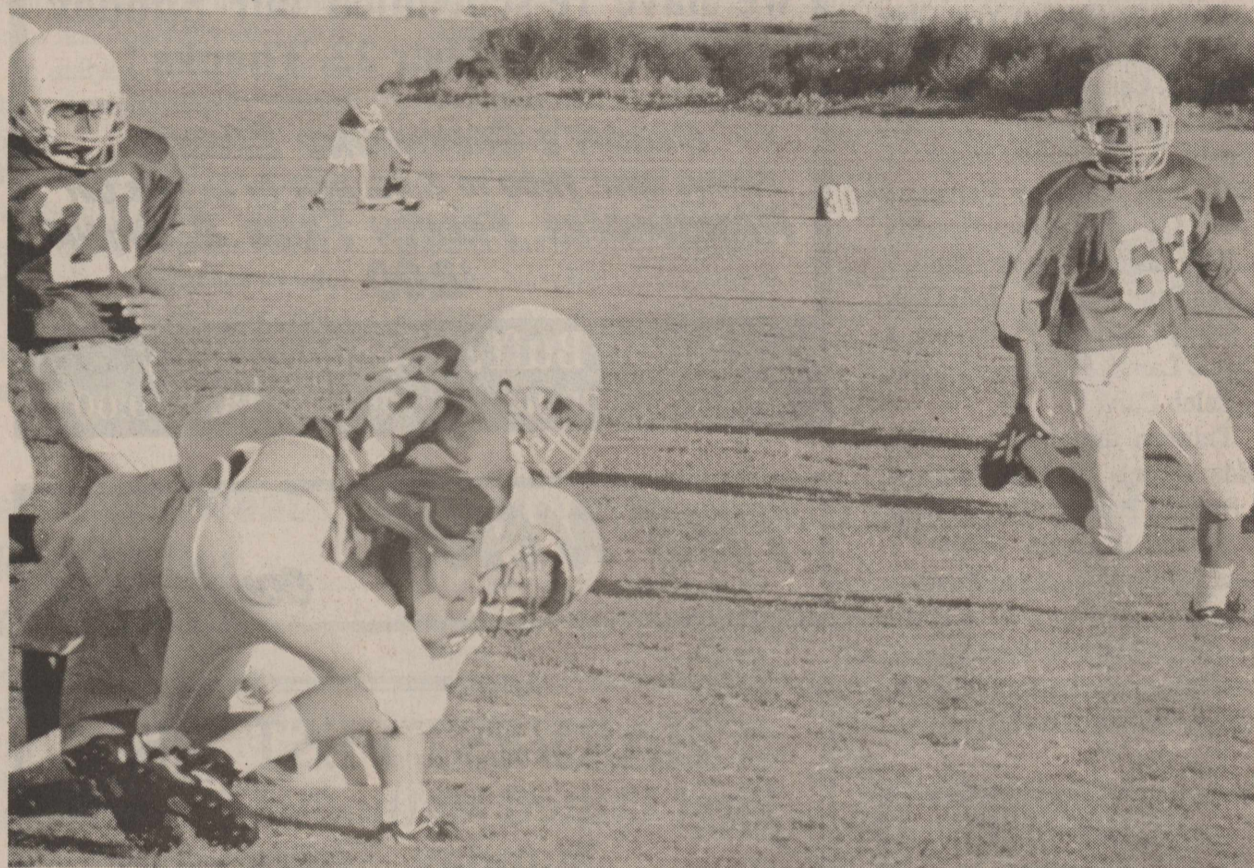
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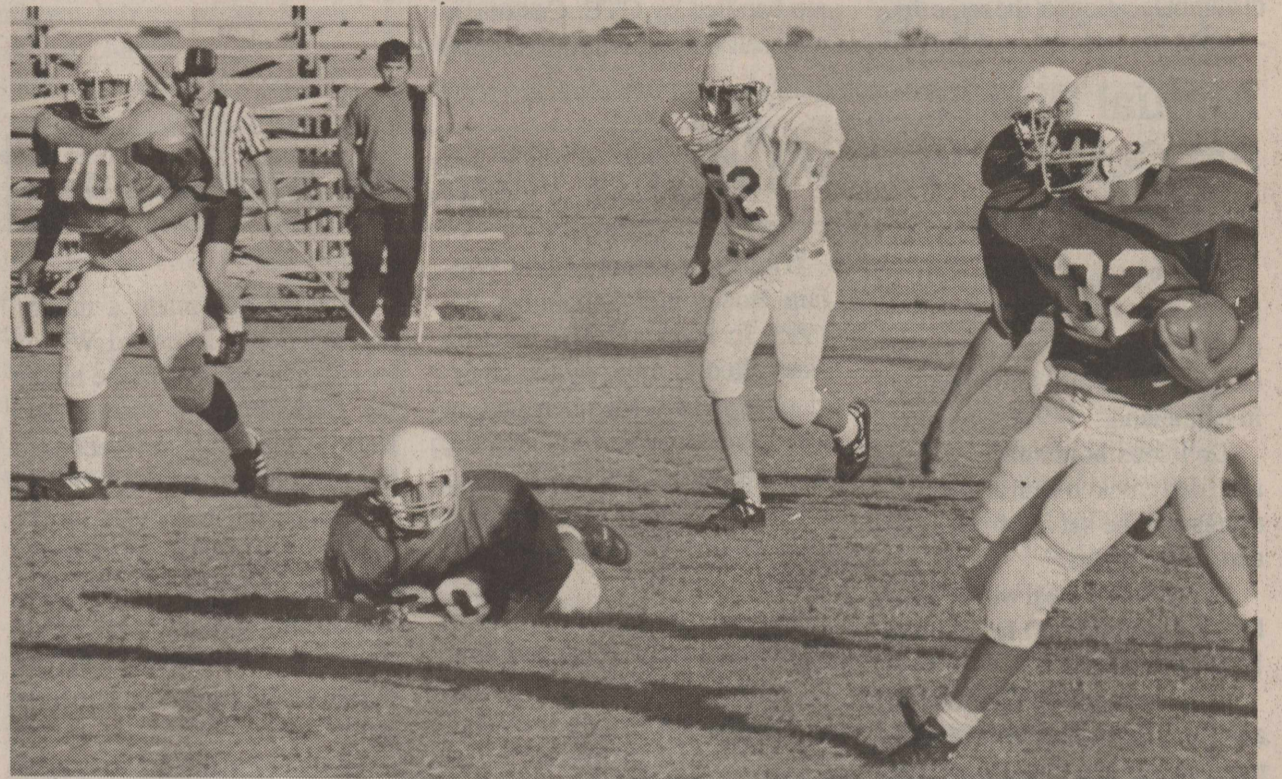

Guthrie Breezes By Harrold By Score of 46-0

Guthrie's Ruben Fuentes and Seth Walker each scored a pair of touchdowns Friday night as the No. 9 Guthrie Jaguars whipped the host Harrold Hornets.

The game was called at half-time because of the 45-point rule. The Jaguars are now 5-0 for the season, while the Hornets fall to 0-5.

Fuentes, who was the leading rusher with 108 yards, opened the scoring midway through the first period on a 14-yard run. His PAT made it 8-0.

Walker got into the act with a 40-yard punt return for a score and Stoney Lee caught a seven-yard touchdown pass from Chris King as the Jaguars led 22-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Fuentes scored his second touchdown on a four-yard run and Walker, who had 68 yards rushing, scored his second from 11 yards out. Heath Stofel scored the final touchdown on a 17-yard run and Fuentes closed out the scoring with his fifth PAT of the night.

The Jaguars didn't have to punt the entire night and had 216 yards of total offense, while the Hornets were limited to just 69 yards.
