





communication among the patient, family and attending physician.

In the U.S., every adult of sound mind has a right to accept or refuse medical treatment, even if refusal might prolong an illness or lead to death. This freedom is enjoyed by every adult, provided the consequences of refusal are understood and will not injure another person.

This right of self-determination allows a patient to make all medical decisions, whether they be relatively simple (an epidural during childbirth?) or extremely difficult (withholding hydration and nutrition?). But there are times when a patient may be unable to communicate treatment desires. An accident might result in a coma, or an advanced medical problem may lead to incapacitation. In times like these, an advance directive helps physicians prescribe treatment based on patient desire. By using a directive, a person can indicate what kinds of life-sustaining procedures he wants withdrawn or withheld in the event of terminal illness.

In Texas, methods for preparing advance directives are established through the Natural Death Act and the Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care Act.

The federal law will help disseminate information about patient rights and encourage individuals to exercise options for preparing advance directives.



Cost of Cardiovascular Diseases Continues To Climb in 1995

Heart disease and stroke - - in addition to being deadly killers -are also expensive.

The American Heart Association estimates that the total cost of cardiovascular diseases, including heart attack and stroke (brain attack), will reach \$137.7 billion this year.

Included in the 1995 total are \$87.8 billion for hospital and nursing home services, \$21.2 for physician and nursing services, \$20.2 billion for lost output due to disability, and \$8.4 billion for medications.

"Many of us are aware of the toll in lives and disability resulting from heart attacks, strokes, and other heart and blood vessel diseases," Dorothy Dykes, chairman of the board of the American Heart Association's Knox County Division, said."But it may surprise some that the toll in medical costs and lost wages and output represents a major econommic burden to this country.'

The American Heart Association is doing what it can to lower the toll from cardiovasular diseases in both lives and money.

"The AHA - the nation's largest voluntary health organization fighting heart disease and stroke spends about \$100 million a year on lifesaving biomedical research," Mrs. Dykes said. "That money is being used to unlock the remaining secrets relating to the prevention, detection, and treatment of cardiovascular diseases."

The association offers a range of public and professional education program in addition to community services. Nationally, the AHA spent more that \$230 million during 1993-94 on research and educational programs.

For the same period the AHA's Knox County Division spent \$6,800 to support research and education and community programs in Texas.
