Services Offered By Project Office

The Seymour Aquifer Water Quality Project began in 1991. It was one of thirty-seven water quality projects started nationwide that year.

The project area covers 274,500 acres in northwest Haskell and southern Knox counties. The goal of the project is to reduce the potential for nitrate and pesticide leaching into the groundwater. The local project office offers several services free of charge to people in the area.

Water testing for nitrates and salts was started in 1992. This service has increased from 150 samples the first year to 293 samples tested in 1995.

Free soil testing is conducted during the spring and fall each year for producers in the area. Tacy Condron again led the scoring with 20 points followed by Lacy Carver with 14, Julie Welch 11, Audra Neal 9 and Cathy Rainwater and Rachel Duke 4 each.

The Mustangs won a comefrom-behind victory over Northside in a low scoring defensively dominated game. The final score was Benjamin 50, Northside 43. Edward Estrada headed up the scoring with 20 points followed by Chad Rainwater with 11. Others scoring for the Mustangs were Tyler Carroll 6, Riley Carver and Zeke Duke 4 each, and Bobby Condron with 3.

Tournament MVP for the girls was Tacy Condron. Julie Welch was named to the all-tournament team.

Edward Estrada was tournament MVP for the boys with Tyler Carroll and Chad Rainwater each making the all-tournament team.

The free sampling periods have increased the number of soil samples submitted to 412 last year.

Forty-six center pivot irrigation system evaluations have been conducted since 1992. There has been a steady increase in the efficiency of the systems checked from the area.

Irrigation scheduling demonstrations using gypsum blocks and tensiometers were conducted at 77 locations last year. Soil moisture readings were taken at 6, 12, 24, and 36 inch depths each week.

Gallon per minute (gpm) check of irrigation wells was performed on 22 systems last year. An ultrasonic flowmeter is attached to the discharge pipe at the well. The gpm is calculated from the speed of the water by soundwaves.

A program to evaluate the possible water contamination risks around the homestead was made available to the project during 1995.
