Toliver Named All State First Team Kicker Lance Dever Named As Honorable Mention Running Back

Duane Toliver Also Looked At By Texas Tech And Other Universities

Duane Toliver seems to be a mighty happy person these days and the smile everyone sees is a result of lots of hard work and personal sacrifice on the part of this tall, athletic high school senior.

In a story reported last week in the Abilene Reporter News, Toliver was selected for the position of kicker on the All State Football First Team.

This prestigious honor for his performance during the 1995 Greyhound football season is the highest of several titles earned by Toliver, he was also selected as a Unanimous All District Defensive End and an All District football player. In another story in the Abilene Reporter News on Tuesday, January 9, Toliver was named

to the All Big Country Class A Team

Honors for the 6'3 215 pound senior were the result of a season that saw him kick 6 of 8 field goal attempts and 19 out of 21 extra point attempts. Scoring 45 points for the season, 38 were by field goals and extra points. His personal achievement was 27% of all the points scored by the Greyhounds this season.

Another reward for his hard work and dedication comes in the form of serious interest at the University and College level. Last Friday, Spike Dykes, Head Coach for the Texas Tech Red Raiders in Lubbock traveled to Knox City to see Toliver, and interest has also been expressed by Rice University in Houston and Angelo State University in San Angelo.

Lance Dever Also Selected For Unanimous All District Running Back, All District Defensive End

Greyhound end Lance Dever is another happy face on campus these days although his humble manner would have one believing that he was just like everyone else on his team.

In reality, the statistics speak for themselves when it comes to Dever's accomplishments on the football field.

Selected as All State Honorable Mention Running Back, Unanimous All District Running Back, All District Defensive End and Offensive End on the All Big Country Class A Team, the 6 foot, 185 pound Senior made quite a name for himself during the 1995

football season.

Picking up 222 rushes for a total of 1612 yards gained, Dever averaged 7.26 yards per carry. He crossed the goal line for 14 touchdowns, and three 2 point conversions. Scoring a total of 90 points, Dever was responsible for 54% of total points scored by the Greyhounds, 68% of the total offense by his team, and 75% of Greyhound rushing yards.

Those of us here at the NEWS have watched these two young men through many years of school and personal achievements. Proud to know both, we offer our congratulations for a job well done.

'Wee Deliver' Installation Held At Knox City Elementary School

Fourth grade students at Knox City Elementary recently participated in an installation of postal employees for an in school mailing program called "Wee Deliver". The program was introduced to the school by Postmaster Cathye Williams, who also conducted the installation ceremony.

"Wee Deliver" is based on a model developed by an elementary school in Florida. The objectives of the program are to provide children with real-life experiences in which to apply basic skills in appropriate letter writing

and address forms, promote school-wide communication, give knowledge of how mail is processed, teach job skills and career opportunities, to develop a sense of responsibility, and to improve language skills.

Students and teachers in all grade levels are writing cards and letters to each other. After a letter is written and stamped, it is mailed in a large "Wee Deliver" mail box in the main building of Knox City Elementary.

Postal workers from the fourth grade then pick up the mail and

use procedures used by the U.S. Postal Service to process and deliver the letters.

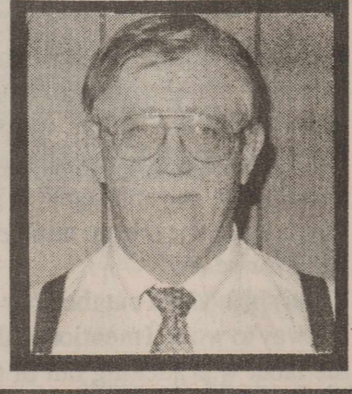
BILL'S HINESight.....By High School Principal Bill Hines

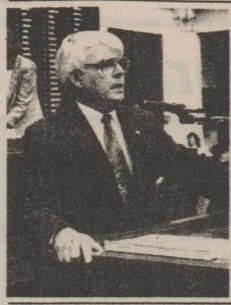

TEXAS CRIME VICTIMS' FUND WORKING FOR TEXANS

With all of the publicity and coverage of trials in the media, many people have begun to ask what about the victims?

In Texas, the Texas Crime Victims' Fund is working for Texans who have been the victim of crimes and the program's impact is being felt throughout much of District 70.

The program serves to provide financial assistance to victims of crimes who have undergone hardships due to the crime that was committed against them, such as personal injury, physical or emotional harm, or a death attributed to a crime. Funding for the program comes from parolee administrative fees, restitution fines, and state court costs.

Over the past year, Texas has provided over \$24 million dollars in assistance to Texas crime victims. Many of these folks have hardships they could have never imagined after having these crimes perpetrated against them. This fund uses the court costs and fines against the criminals to provide some assistance to these innocent victims. Praise is certainly in order for the Attorney General's office for reducing the processing time of claims. People in many cases are not prepared to handle the loss of income or the medical bills that stem from their victimization, and need some sort of quick relief.

In addition to the state wide success of the program, the program has provided assistance to citizens in District 70 with cases reported and approved in the majority of counties in District 70. Payment amounts for counties during the past year have included \$2,374 in Borden, \$28,790 in Howard, \$1,603 in Jones, \$6,562 in Knox, \$3,384 in Lynn, \$6,248 in Nolan, and \$11,877 in Scurry.

The program serves as an important reminder that despite all the focus that is placed on the criminals, we must not forget about the victims and their needs.



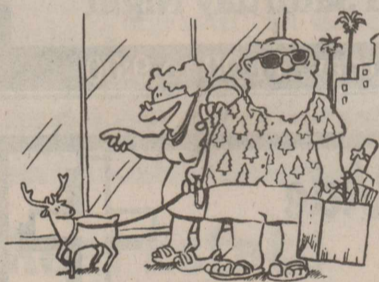

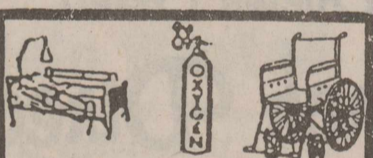
