



John Crossover Rites Are Held Sunday Afternoon

Funeral services for John A. Crossover were held Sunday, July 7, at three o'clock in the First Christian Church. Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Officiating were the Rev. Steve Pepper, church pastor, assisted by Jim Dillon. Music was provided by Donnie Roberts and Dottie Lowrey.

Mr. Crossover, 77, died Thursday, July 4, in an Abilene hospital.

Born May 6, 1919, in Seymour, he was manager of Tri-State Chemical Company in Knox City until he retired. He married Joyce Warren in 1942 in Seymour.

His parents were the late Arthur and Tess Crossover.

This year, he was honored by the Chamber of Commerce as Knox City's Most Appreciated Citizen at the annual banquet held in March. Although he was hospitalized during the banquet, family members accepted the E. Hob Smith Memorial Award in his behalf. He served in every area of the community, including School Board President 17 years, Chamber of Commerce Director, Lions Club Director and as Elder in the First Christian Church leading them in their building program.

Mr. Crossover was a longtime active supporter of the FFA and was Honorary Chapter Farmer and Honorary State Farmer. He was owner of B&C Chemical and Aerial Service and also managed a grain elevator and a gin. He was an active member of the Country Club Board of Directors. His motto was "my faith, family and friends."

Thieves Steal American & Texas Flags Right Off City Flagpoles

This past weekend, someone in our community stooped to an all time low by stealing flags right off of the flagpoles they were flying on. That's right, someone stole a United States flag off the flagpole in the downtown Merchants Park, then stole both a United States flag and a Texas flag off the flagpole at Smith Funeral Home.

Police officials believe the flags were stolen early Saturday morning. There is speculation, and I repeat - this is only speculation at this point, that this could have been done by transient farm laborers who might be looking for a souvenir to take back to their home country when they leave Knox City.

Jimmy Howard at Smith Funeral Home is so steamed over someone stealing his flags that he has offered a cash reward for information leading to the recovery of those flags. An advertisement about the reward can be found inside this edition of the NEWS.

I fully realize that criminals today have a lot more rights than in days of old. But, in spite of efforts that try to protect crimi-

nals, there should be a whole different kind of law passed to deal with someone who would stoop low enough to steal the symbols of both our country and our state while they are flying high to represent each member of our community, state and country.

In the days of the old west, maybe the offenders would have been hoisted up and flown from the same flagpoles..... or maybe they would have been subjected to the 'tar and feather' punishment from earlier days of old. Either way, there would have been a whole different and forceful way to deal with whoever did this. But..... today's do-gooders who influence lawmakers wouldn't stand for those forms of punishment, so maybe good old fashioned guilt imposed by peers and public opinion might be the best form of punishment. If the thief was someone looking to take a souvenir back to another country, maybe there needs to be some way to insure that the return trip is a one way trip - with no chance of ever returning to insult the very

Kent has been hired as principal and head girls coach at Benjamin and this article was written when he began his teaching duties at Benjamin a few years ago.

 Kent Josselet
 Benjamin High School
 Andy Griffith, from the little old town of Mayberry, North Carolina, helps symbolize the necessity of family, friends, and the way life used to be. What's that... "USED TO BE?" Well, for some of us, especially small town coaches, that way of life can still exist today and should be appreciated. In the coaching profession there seems to be a lot of us trying to climb up the ladder to find the perfect town or winning situation. We sometimes forget the impact we can have on a community or the impact a community can have on us.

As a rural coach you have a job with many faces and your days are long and hard, but the relationships built in the process are unforgettable. The times you spend trying to teach youngsters good morals and ethics, as well as X's and O's, are frustrating yet exhilarating. The hours spent painting, cleaning, mowing, mopping, and sweeping are tiresome but rewarding. The nights you plan FCA meetings are usually the nights you've had a very trying day, but the kids and their excitement seem to give you a sense of "resurrection". The numerous days you spent planning and pre-

paring for the junior / senior prom, since you happen to be the class sponsor, are very nerve wracking and generally leave you with a head that has both fewer and grayer hairs. But on prom night, you leave with a sense of accomplishment, an album full of memories, and a handkerchief full of tears. The days spent filling that old Ford tractor with butane, so you can grate the running track, is usually cold, windy, and sometimes a bit muddy... but the kids' efforts make it worth the while. The days and nights you call and write sponsors and workers for those fund raising dinners to buy those much needed sweats seem to go unnoticed... but the smiles of both parents and kids on their first night to wear them gives you a sense of pride. The time you spend digging and putting up outdoor basketball goals is usually during the coldest day of the year, but it's all worth it when you look out your back door and see kids shooting baskets.

Coaching is not just about winning, but about creating opportunities for kids and the community to learn and grow. We need to go back to the time when we, as a society, leaned on and trusted one another much the same way as the people of Mayberry, North Carolina. Athletics is a great opportunity for youngsters to learn about life in more ways than they will ever imagine. As coaches, we too will learn lessons we will not

soon forget, but the communities in which we live can also extol many important lessons. These lessons are generally simplistic, but yet earth shattering. The covered dish lunches at church to visit and share with one another. The men building, mowing and carving that much needed baseball field in what was a cow pasture. The ladies congregating to do aerobics in the evening. Farmers and ranchers gathering their tools and horses to search for lost youngsters they don't even know. Pies, cakes, and enough food to feed Cox's Army brought to help during the loss of a loved one, and finally those early Saturday morning community breakfasts that leave everyone full and content. So you see, the community can create an atmosphere that is warm, sincere, and very enriching to a coach and his family.

Everyone has different goals and aspirations for their career. Before you get to looking too hard at climbing up that ladder just because you had a bad day, week, or month remember this saying... "The grass is greener on the other side." You too have grass on your side - it may just need a little more nourishing.

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

Rocha ~ Baxter Plan August 24 Wedding Date



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
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Bryant - Hicks To Wed

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
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
