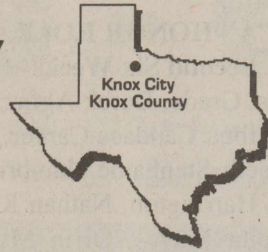

Laurie is the daughter of Yolanda and Edmund Casillas of Knox City.

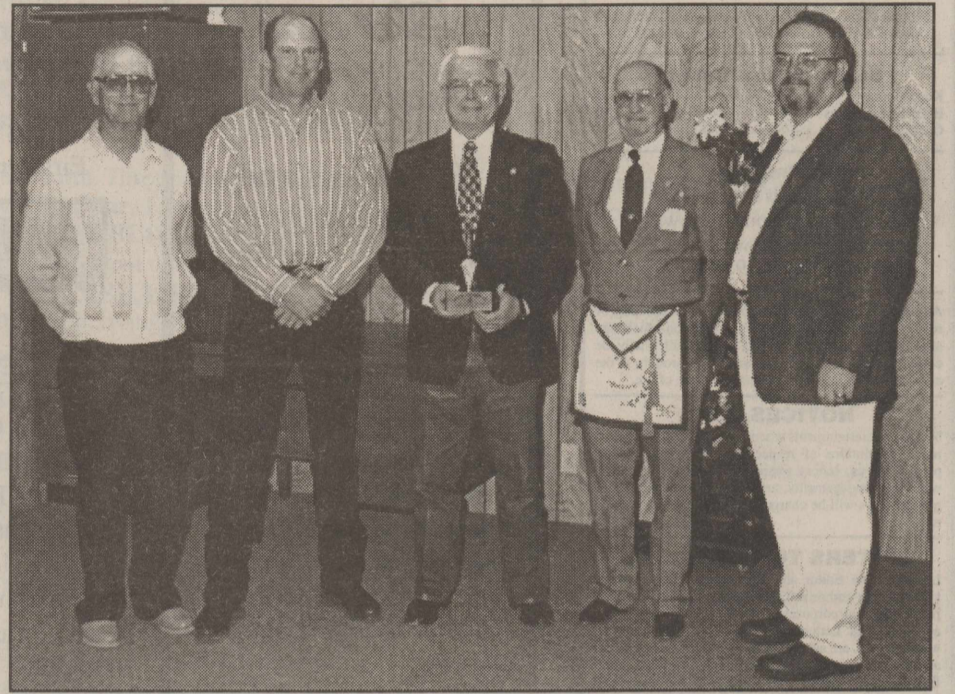
State Rep. David Counts receives prestigious award from Orient Lodge

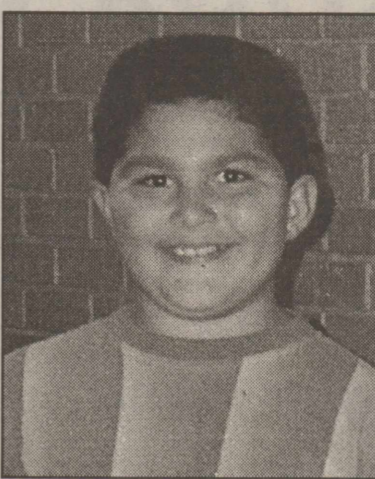

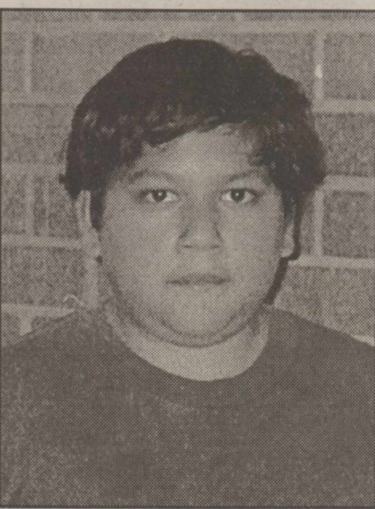

Knox County Pecan Show Set December 3

The thirteenth annual Knox County Pecan Show will be held Tuesday, December 3, at the Community Center in Knox City. Emory Boring III, Extension Entomologist, will judge this year's pecans beginning at 7:30 a.m.

Entries for the 1996 Pecan Show may be delivered to the Knox County Extension office in Benjamin, the Whittle and Paint Shop in Knox City or the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station in Munday. All entries must be received by 12:00 noon, Monday, December 2.

With each entry, the following information is required: name, address, phone number and pecan variety. This information must be written on the entry cards available at each of these locations and is used to mail awards to participants from county, regional and state. An entry consists of 40 pecans raised in Knox City. All entries will be classified by a committee on Monday, December 2.

Fisher Featured In Dallas Column

Scott Burns, business columnist for *The Dallas Morning News*, wrote on CD annuities delivering a real punch in his Sunday, October 20, column.

Burns conferred with Knox City High School graduate Danny Fisher, who is the sole proprietor of the nation's largest database on tax-deferred annuities and creator of the Fisher Annuity Index. His monthly publication now lists nearly 900 contracts from 148 different insurance companies. In addition to traditional tax-deferred annuity contracts, his data include figures for five-year CD-like annuities as well. Portions of his article are as follows:

With Fisher's help it was discovered the average five-year CD-type annuity beats the average government bond fund two times out of three.

Those odds present some interesting possibilities. They can be improved.

How? Simple. Find a five-year CD-type annuity that has a yield equal to, or better than, a five-year Treasury.

Sadly, this isn't a lead pipe cinch. Examining a multi-year listing of CD-type annuities that Mr. Fisher publishes each month, there's a five-year yield as low as 4.9 percent offered. If you bought this stunning product from Lincoln Benefit Life, you would have accepted 75 percent of the yield of a five-year Treasury. That makes Lincoln Benefit Life a pretty good substitute for the Internal Revenue Service, tax deferral notwithstanding.

In fact, the current list has no contracts that yield higher than a five-year Treasury. It does, however, have three that are within a few points and one from a company with very high credit rat-

ings, US Guaranty Life.

What does this mean? If you shop for a Treasury-competitive yield, you'll have about a 75 percent chance of beating the average government fund and the joy of tax deferral for five years. While the most common CD-type annuity contracts are for one and five years, they are available, for different companies in maturities from one to 10 years. This means you also could build a ladder of CD-type annuities.

Cherry-picking CD annuities with maturities of two, four, six, eight and 10 years in the current market would create a tax-deferred average yield of 6.10 percent with an average maturity of six years, only about 20 basis points less than a comparable Treasury ladder.

As each contract matures, it could be rolled with a 1035 exchange to a new 10-year contract. The benefit would be lower risk, a short average maturity, a competitive return and tax deferral for those who elected to accumulate the income.

Does it make sense, instead, to just buy a regular tax-deferred annuity - one that isn't structured like a CD?

Maybe. Maybe not. The problem, according to Mr. Fisher, is the near Byzantine nature of insurance products. Most annuity contracts doesn't guarantee your yield for more than a year, and, even more problematic, there really is no such thing as a standard contract. Variations in fine print, Mr. Fisher says, make the task of comparing very difficult.

Bottom line: The five-year annuity CD contract can be a competitor for the \$130 billion committed to government securities funds.

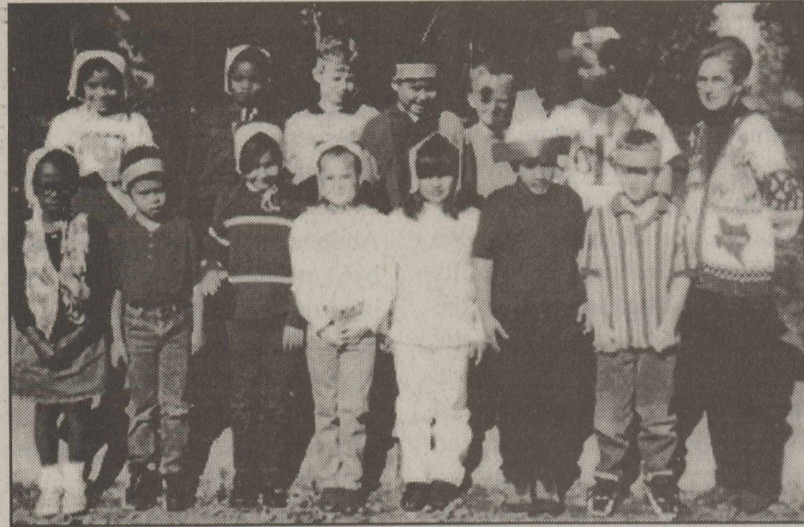

Teachers leap to the future through TENET Institute

TENET Institute empowers teachers who are new to technology

AUSTIN (November 13, 1996) - The Texas Education Network (TENET) held its first Teachers Accessing Telecommunications Technology (TATT) Institute this month. Knox City-O'Brien CISD Spanish teacher Kay Adkisson is one of twenty-two exceptional teachers accepted to the TATT Institute which convened in Austin November 13th to the 17th at the J. J. Pickle Research Center of the University of Texas. Each teacher will receive a laptop computer, software, training, and a travel stipend.

The TATT Institute was designed specifically to take teachers who are new to telecommunications and computing technolo-

gies and dramatically increase their comfort level in working with these tools. The benefits from teachers given free reign to apply these technologies into their daily curriculum will allow them to extend the classroom walls of learning to include the global community.

For the remainder of the school year, these 22 teachers will pursue individually designed projects to integrate telecommunications technologies into their classroom curriculums. Patsy Lanlos, the Coordinator of Secondary Instructional Technology at Spring Branch ISD will act as a mentor for the teachers.

The Texas Legislature created TENET five years ago to foster excellence and innovation in education by providing K-12 educators with a transparent communications infrastructure. TENET does more than furnish Internet access to educators, it also supplies the resources necessary to effectively use computer networks as a teaching tool.

These resources include technical support, professional development activities and training programs.

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
(3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

Police Department Activity Report

For October, 1996 By Dean Homstad, Chief Of Police

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during October 1996, receiving a total of 544 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 31 actual criminal offenses, of which 23 were cleared or otherwise handled. Five charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, with four of the offenses involving juveniles as offenders. The cases involving juveniles were referred to the Juvenile Authorities for further action.

The Knox City Police Department Reserve Officers contributed a total of 17 hours of duty time to the City during the month of October, 1996.

Other Items reported to the Knox City Police Department during October are classified as incidents. These incidents either did not occur in the City of Knox City or for some other reason were not able to be considered as a criminal offense. However, they must be investigated to determine if a record is to be made for future reference or if the case should be referred to another agency.

Six of the reported incidents involved juveniles as defendants and all six have been referred to the Juvenile Court for consideration and follow-up.

On October 1st, this department held its regular department meeting. A film was observed and a discussion followed dealing with a person having the will and ambition to do a job to the best of that person's ability. Although some may criticize or complain about the way a person, in this case an officer, does his job, he must continue to do the job that job as the law dictates. Persons may become upset, however, consider the results if no law enforcement was present.

On October 12, after a traffic stop by Officer Steen, a search of the vehicle turned up several grams of Methamphetamine substance. The search and investigation was assisted by Knox County Deputies Johnny Andrade and Travis Griffith. The results of the investigation led to the arrest of the occupants of the vehicle, which was a local female and a Goree resident, both charged with Possession of a Controlled Substance with Intent to Deliver. On October 15, the clean-up at 406 S-Central was underway. This was the location of a house fire a few months earlier, and the ruins have been an eyesore for some time. I would like to thank the owner for taking care of the clean-up and helping to improve the looks of Knox City.

During the month of October, the City of Knox City was again blessed with door-to-door salesmen. They were selling an appliance that is used in most if not

all households. Although very expensive in comparison to other brands, some residents did go along with the sales pitch and allowed the salesmen to enter their house. Once contact is made, the salesmen can make you feel ashamed that you do not buy what they are selling if you know, deep down inside, that you are being persuaded to do something that you know is not right. Be cautious of anyone offering to do something for you or your house that will not cost you anything. The company that these individuals were working for did call my residence and told me that the representatives were in town and could come by for my free benefit. I simply advised the caller, twice, that I was not interested. They hung up and did not come to my residence. If someone calls, ask what company they represent, if its someone that you do not want to deal with, tell them your not interested and hang up. If you have contact, either by phone or in person, from a salesperson, and don't know anything about the company, call the Better Business Bureau in Abilene and inquire. As reported by a resident, they called and inquired about the company. It was reported by the resident that there had been many complaints about the sales practices that the salesmen use. To bad that the resident checked after having a bad experience with the company.

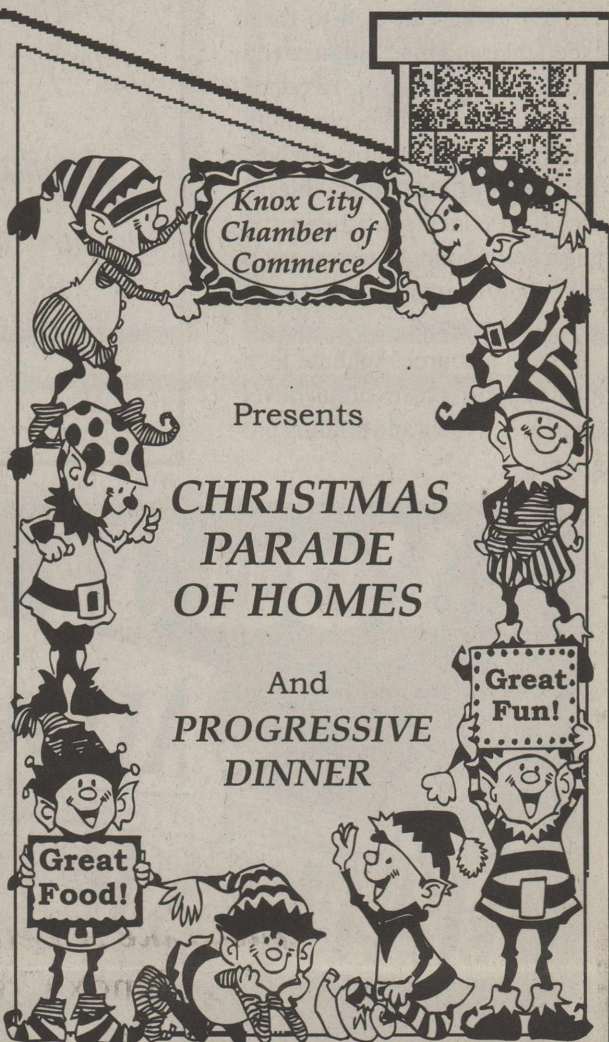

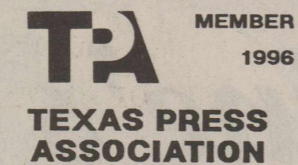

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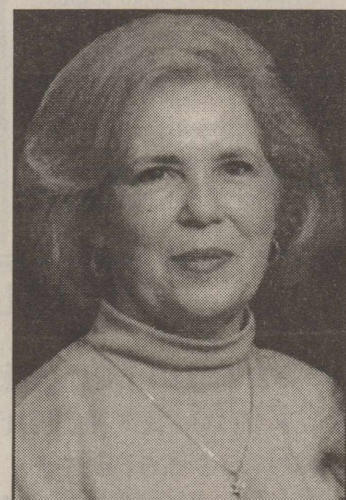
