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


Roberts to chair Minnesota chamber

Duluth, Minnesota - - James A. Roberts, 46, vice president of Corporate Relations for Minnesota Power, Duluth, was elected Chair of the 49-member board, replacing Bob Anderson, Boise Cadcade, International Falls.

The Minnesota Chamber of Commerce elected Roberts at its annual meeting held in Brooklyn Center, Minnesota.

The Chamber Board of Directors approves all legislative and operational policies developed by its volunteer committees. Board members represent a cross-section of the business community membership. As the state's largest business organization, the Chamber has nearly 3,000 members representing more than 500,000 Minnesota employees from across the state. About half its members are located in the seven county metro area and half are located in greater Minnesota. Nearly 85 percent of its members have less than 100 employees.

Roberts was born in Knox City, Texas, in 1950 and was raised in Tulia, Texas, where he graduated from high school in 1968. He is the son of Wynelle and the late Alvin Roberts. He attended Northern Virginia Community Colege

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

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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.

(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.

(3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.



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


