

Mr. Lawson, 94, died Thursday, January 9, in a Haskell hospital following a brief illness.





# **O'Brien Co-Op Gin** still ginning cotton

'Quite A Bit' More Than Last Year, Officials Say

Some cotton farmers in this area are still waiting to get their cotton ginned at O'Brien Co-op Gin, as the 1996 crop produced "quite a bit more than the previous year," according to Jean Chapman, wife of gin manager Tommy Chapman.

Many dryland farmers benefitted from August rains, and the Boll Weevil Eradication Program, which began later than many would have liked, helped considerably. Many farmers feel that it will continue to help rid the area of the destructive insect. This year farmers are making from one to two bales per acre as compared to 3/4 bale last year.

O'Brien Co-op ginned 13, 483 bales last year, and as of Monday of this week, had ginned 11,308. Mrs. Chapman said they still had about 350 modules to be picked up.

As of Tuesday morning, the gin had about a 100 modules on two different gin yards.

Mrs. Chapman estimated that it would take about three or four more weeks to complete the harvest.


# JIMMY JACKSON Guthrie FFA'er wins Area in Creed Speaking

Jimmy Jackson, son of Judy and Mike Jackson of the 6666 Ranch, received the first place banner at the area contest held at Clarendon College in November.


Jimmy, a student at Guthrie High School, competed at the state level on December 7 representing Area I. Only one speaker from each area advanced to the state competition held in Huntsville.

Officiating was the Rev. Buerkle, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Rochester.


