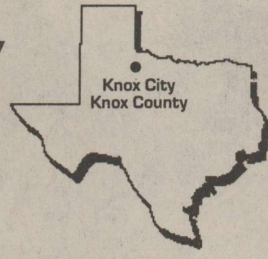

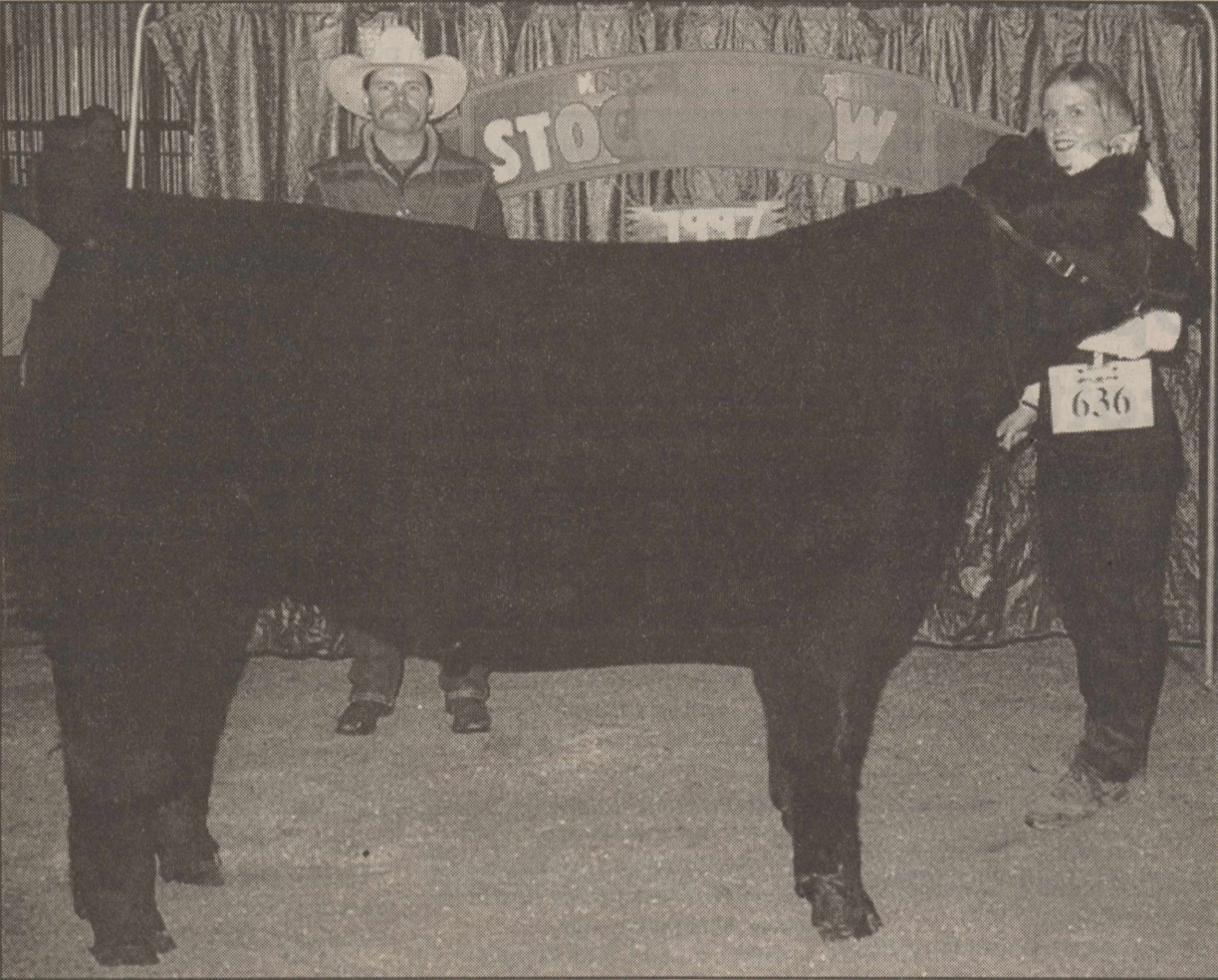

Funeral services for Otto A. Lawson of Knox City were held Saturday afternoon, January 11, at two o'clock in the First United Methodist Church. The Rev. Jim Teeter and the Rev. James Patterson officiated and burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Lawson, 94, died Thursday, January 9, in a Haskell hospital following a brief illness.

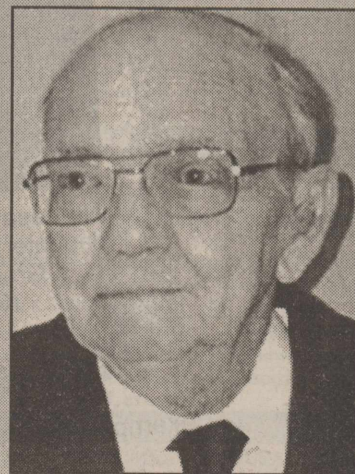
Born May 9, 1902, in Bell County, Texas, he married Leota Jones on June 8, 1924, in Vernon. The Lawsons moved to Knox City in 1926. She preceded him in death on February 4, 1985. They owned and managed City Hardware with their family until retirement.

Mr. Lawson was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of Orient Lodge #905, Knox City. He was a charter member of the Knox City Lions Club and received the Melvin D. Jones Award from the Lions organization. He served on the Knox City Volunteer Fire Department for over 25 years. He was a Shriner and a member of the First United Methodist Church in Knox City.

Survivors include a son, Kenneth and his wife, Elsie Lawson of Knox City; two grandsons, Kenneth A. Lawson Jr. of Austin and James Eiland of Flower Mound; and five grandchildren.

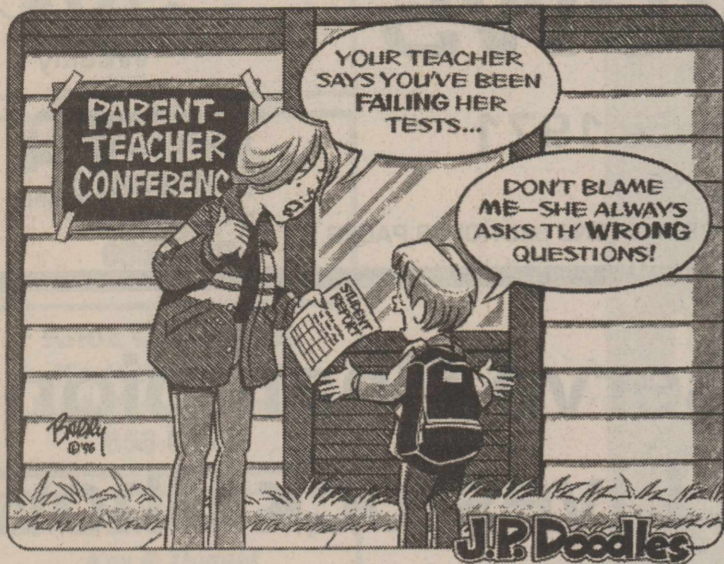

O'Brien Co-Op Gin still ginning cotton

'Quite A Bit' More Than Last Year, Officials Say

Some cotton farmers in this area are still waiting to get their cotton ginned at O'Brien Co-op Gin, as the 1996 crop produced "quite a bit more than the previous year," according to Jean Chapman, wife of gin manager Tommy Chapman.

Many dryland farmers benefitted from August rains, and the Boll Weevil Eradication Program, which began later than many would have liked, helped considerably. Many farmers feel that it will continue to help rid the area of the destructive insect.

This year farmers are making from one to two bales per acre as compared to 3/4 bale last year.

O'Brien Co-op ginned 13,483 bales last year, and as of Monday of this week, had ginned 11,308. Mrs. Chapman said they still had about 350 modules to be picked up.

As of Tuesday morning, the gin had about a 100 modules on two different gin yards.

Mrs. Chapman estimated that it would take about three or four more weeks to complete the harvest.

Not much of any interest this week except school got started back after the holidays, basketball resumed, county stock show went on as planned (bad weather and all) and oh yes, we've had a winter storm. How about that? It has sure put us in a deep freeze for a few days. Maybe we will begin to thaw here before long. 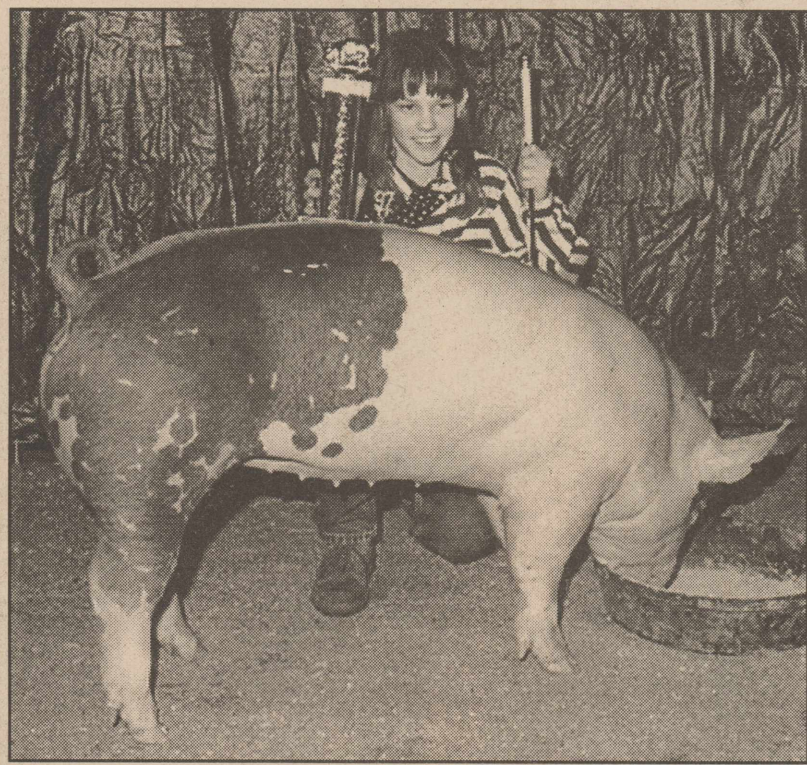

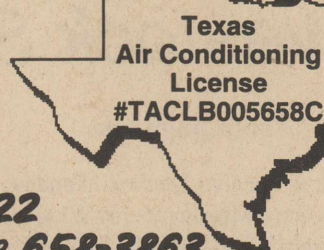

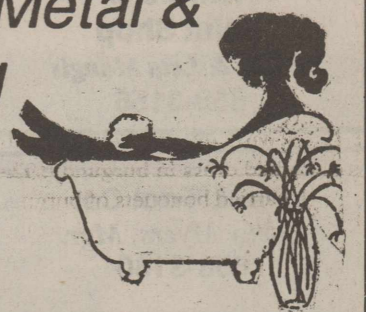

Windbreak trees protect animals, crops and soil

Windbreaks provide protection for people, animals, buildings, crops and natural resources. They reduce soil erosion by wind and contribute to the control of runoff from agricultural lands. Trees and shrubs planted as windbreaks provide wind erosion control, improve crop yields and enhance the quality of many wind sensitive groups. Farmstead windbreaks protect the home site and reduce energy consumption. Windbreaks can reduce stress on livestock, improve weight gain, and reduce mortality of young animals.

Windbreak trees may be purchased now until February 14 through the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District. Several species of evergreens and hardwood are available along with wildlife packets to promote deer, quail, pheasant, turkey or squirrel.

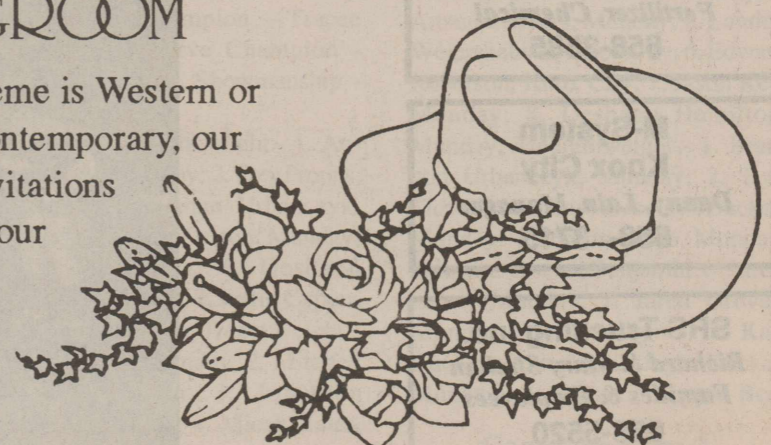

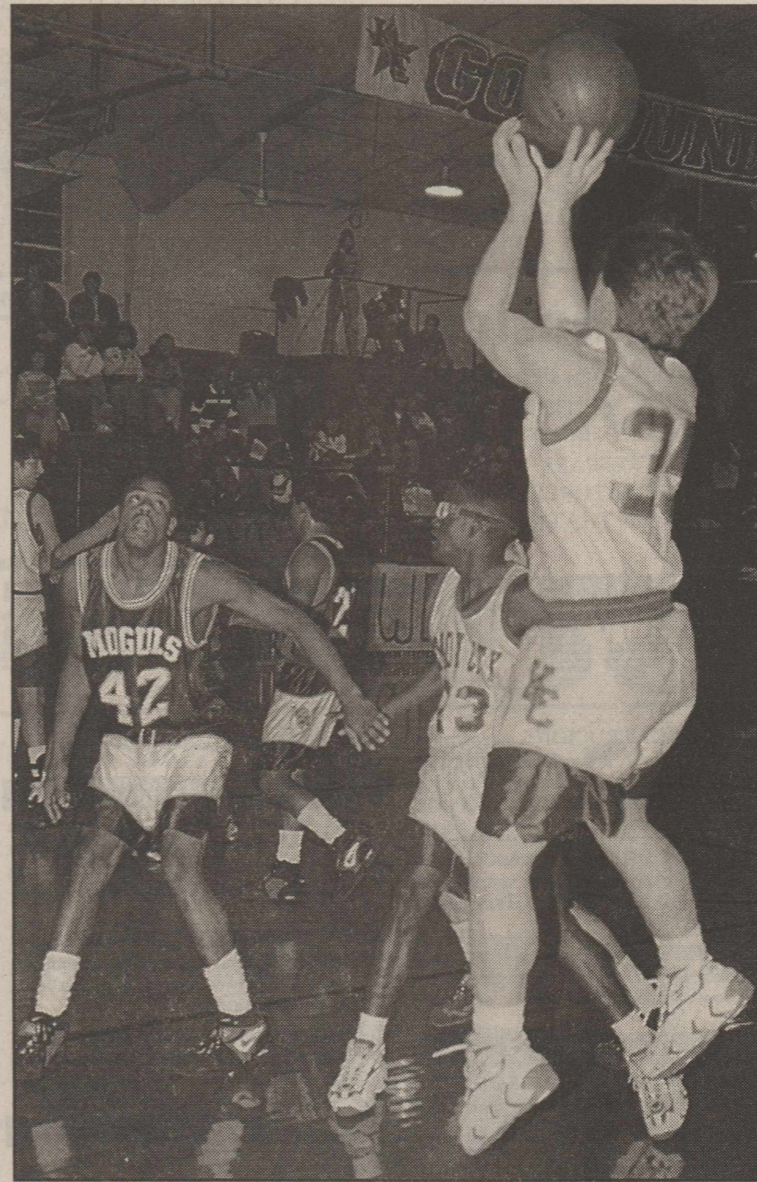
