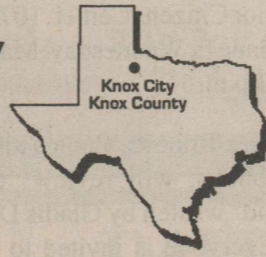

Mayor Reynolds signs Water Proclamation

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS it is recognized that Water is an extremely precious natural resource, second only to the air we breath in sustaining life for the citizens of Knox City.

WHEREAS it is known that Water is a non-replenishing resource, it follows that Water has been constantly recycled since earliest days - - and that it must continue to be treated and recycled in the future;

WHEREAS the treatment of Water (whether to produce potable water for the many needs of the citizens or for its return to our environment after we have used it for our sanitary and other needs) must always be performed by highly skilled professionals - - such as Certified Water and Wastewater Facility Operators, Chemists and others;

and WHEREAS the citizens of

Knox City must be made aware that their continued good health, comfort, and standard of living are dependent upon an abundant supply of safe and high quality water; upon adequate water and wastewater treatment facilities being provided; and upon competent and highly trained water utilities professionals to protect and preserve this valuable resource;

NOW THEREFORE, in recognition of the foregoing I, Tommie Reynolds, as Mayor, do hereby support Texas Water Utilities Association, and our own water and wastewater professionals and do proclaim May 4-10, 1997 as "WATER UTILITIES AWARENESS WEEK" in Knox City.

In official recognition thereof, I hereby affix my signature this the 5th day of May, 1997.

Rural postal addresses to change soon

The U.S. Postal Service has accepted the 9-1-1 location addresses that Knox County has assigned to rural residences. Letters of notification will be going out within the next few weeks to postal customers who receive their mail by route delivery. Postal customers who receive their mail by route delivery (home delivery) will have their mailing addresses changed to a house number and road name or road number type of address. Postal customers who receive their mail at Post Office Boxes WILL NOT have their mailing address changed.

'Red zone' is designated at Knox County Hospital

Visitors to the Knox County Hospital, recently may have noticed a large, red line painted on the wall outside the emergency room door and down the hall. This is not a new decor, but has been painted to designate a "red zone" for visitors with patients who have been injured and brought into the Knox County Hospital Emergency Room.

With Knox City being such a small community and when there is an accident, it almost always involves someone who is a friend or close acquaintance. First instinct is to rush to the hospital to offer help or comfort and rightly so. However, when several patients are involved, as in a major accident it becomes difficult for

medical personnel to get in and out of the emergency room because of so many concerned people waiting in the hall.

The "red zone" is certainly not intended to discourage family and friends from coming to the hospital to be with patients, but it is designated to keep people from lining the hallway outside the emergency room. There has been a family room set up farther down the hall to accommodate family members and friends of patients in the emergency room.

The "red zone" is just one of the several suggestions by the Trauma Team Committee in a continuing effort to insure the very best of medical service to the people of Knox County.

Guilty pleas entered in district court April 29

Kevin Wayne White, 26, of Knox City entered a plea of guilty to the offense of Felony Cattle Theft and Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity in the Knox County District Court last Tuesday, April 29, 1997, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Under a plea bargain agreement with the State, which was approved by District Judge David Hajek, White received a seven year probated sentence but with the stipulation that he must make restitution to the owner of the stolen cattle, Dolan Brinson, in the amount of \$9,358.43.

The offense occurred on March 14, 1995, when 22 head of Brinson's branded cattle were stolen from the Brazos River bottoms on or near his ranch in Stone-wall County, thereafter rebranded and then transported to Knox County, Texas, where they were discovered by law enforcement officials.

White had previously confessed to his part in the theft and then testified for the State in the recent jury trial of Payton Tankersley. White testified that

he,, together with Tankersley and Jerry Carl Eaton, were jointly involved in stealing these cattle and branding over Brinson's brand. He also testified that the three of them were involved, during the same episode, in stealing 16 head of Brinson's unbranded cattle, selling them at the Abilene Auction and then splitting the proceeds.

District Attorney Bill Neal stated that he expected to bring the related case against Jerry Carl Eaton, 38, of Knox City, to a conclusion within the near future.

Linton Lee Clemons, 42, of Fort Worth also entered a plea of guilty to possession of slightly over one pound of marijuana under a plea bargain agreement with the State, as approved by Judge Hajek. Clemons received a two-year state jail probated sentence. However, as a part of the agreement, the defendant agreed to forfeit to the State his Ford pickup, \$1,021.81 cash and a 12-gauge shotgun, all of which were in his possession when he was arrested on April 12, 1997 with the marijuana in his possession in a Knox City motel.

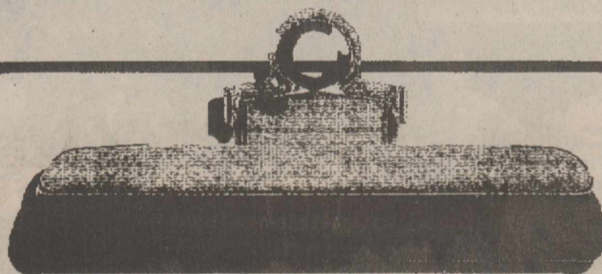

On May 1, 1997, the State of Texas froze the banking accounts of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Council. This, in essence, put an end to the program. This was a result of a Texas Supreme Court Ruling made on April 30, 1997. The Supreme Court ruled that the method used by the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation to collect its money from farmers was unconstitutional. This ruling has killed the program. However, there is still hope that legislation from Austin can save the program. Therefore, we urge you to make your voice known by writing to the lawmakers of Texas. The following is a list of government officials that can impact the decision on the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. Be sure to stress the benefits of the program

and the importance the program plays in rural areas such as our own. The economic impact of the program is great for our area, providing not only jobs but enabling farmers like us to produce cotton at a lower cost.
