Applications being taken for head start program

Knox City Child Development Center will be taking applications for the enrollment of children for the Head Start program that will begin in the fall.

The Head Start program serves three and four year old children. It is designed to meet the needs of children by providing an environment which will help them develop socially, physically, intellectually and emotionally in a manner appropriate to their age and stage of development towards the overall goal of social competence. Children with disabilities are welcome in Head Start and are offered the full range of developmental services that chidren without disabilities receive. The program works closely with other community agencies to provide services to meet the special needs of all the children enrolled. The guidelines for participation in Head Start are established by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget.

To make application for the program, parents must bring the following documents: child's birth certificate, immunization record, social security number for family member enrolling the child, and proof of income for the past 12 months or the calendar year 1996.

A 1040 or 1040A Income Tax return form for 1996 is the easiest form of annual income documentation. AFDC recipients are categorically eligible for the program, but we must have documentation of AFDC benefits, I.E., letter from Social Workers, Case #'s, etc. All information is considered confidential and will be used only for the purpose of establishing eligibility and defining the needs of the family and child.

Appliations can be taken anytime throughout the year; however, special recruitment efforts are made during the month of May. Applications will be taken through May 23, 1997 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Knox City Child Development Center, 500 North Second Street, Knox City. It is very important that persons wanting their child in Head Start this fall to make an application as soon as possible as selections will be made during the summer months and there are only 17 funded slots available. For those needing transportation or wishing to have the application done in their home, call June Moss, Center Director at 658-3770.


DEREK STOVALL
