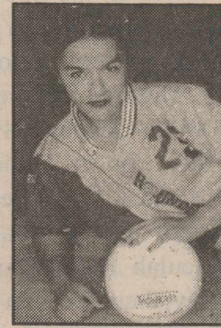

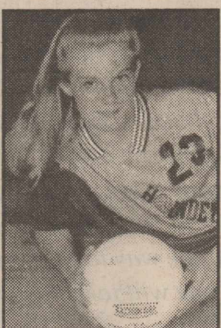

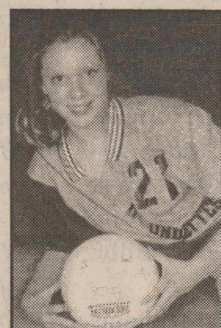

Knox City Chamber of Commerce schedules Christmas Parade for Saturday, December 13

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce has announced this week that plans are well underway for the annual community Christmas Parade, scheduled this year for Saturday, December 13 at 2:00 p.m.

According to Chamber Manager Doris Crownover, the parade this year will be set to the theme of "Christmas - A Celebration." As in past years, a theme has been chosen to allow those building floats and parade entries a direction to go with their decorating ideas.

The parade will once again form in the parking lot of the Knox City High School and Elementary School, then proceed down through the business district of Knox City before ending up back at the school parking lot for disbursement.

Entries in the parade are actively being sought by the Chamber of Commerce. Those wishing to enter in the parade need to contact either Doris at the chamber office (940) 658-3442, or Chamber President Rita Rosencranz at (940) 658-5107 after 5:00 p.m.

Guidelines for parade entries are simple and easy to follow:

(1) There will be no Santas on parade entries as the Chamber will make arrangements for Santa to appear at some point during the parade.

(2) Safety is a major concern and all entries are asked to stay in the parade route at all times.

(3) Lineup and parade routing will be handled by the Knox City Fire Department, with traffic control assistance provided by local and area law enforcement authorities.

(4) Entrants are reminded to keep the parade moving at a "crawl" speed to insure that the judges and all spectators have enough time to view each entry in every division.

(5) A completed entry form must be turned in when the entry lines up for the parade, the form requests information on the organization, group or individual name of the entry, names of riders, make, model, year of vehicle, name of entry, and anything special or funny that the parade announcer can use to describe the entry as it passes the reviewing stand in downtown Knox City.

(6) The parade entry fee this year will be \$5 minimum. You may donate more if you wish, as

entry fees will support the Christmas Project of the Knox County Child Welfare Board.

In past years, the parade was a toy to be donated to the Child Welfare Board, but this year the toys are being furnished by our three school campuses.

There will be an awards ceremony for the presentation of certificates to winning entries about 30 minutes following the end of the parade.

Chamber officials stress that the parade is "open to everyone."

Chamber officials wish to stress that the parade is "open to EVERYONE" who wants to join in celebrating the Christmas holiday here in Knox City. All types of entries are welcome, and those area children wishing to decorate themselves, their bicycles, go-carts, 4-wheelers, and/or wagons are especially encouraged to be a part of the parade. With Christmas special to children, the Chamber of Commerce wants to make the parade special for children.

More information on the parade (including a route map) will be published in future editions of The Knox County news.

Services held Friday for former Knox City Mayor Buddy Angle, Founder of The Knox County News

Buddy Angle, 81, former Knox City mayor, died Tuesday, November 4, at 3:53 p.m. in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital of heart failure.

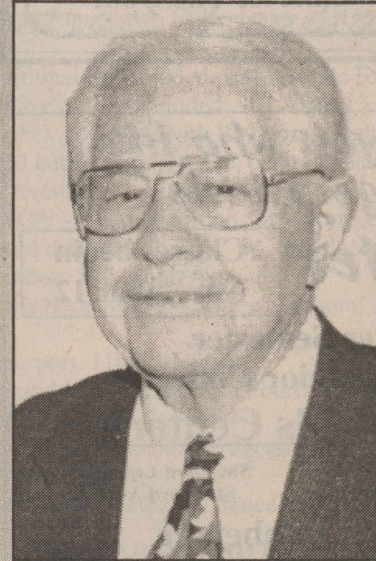
A praise celebration of Buddy's life was held Friday, November 7, at 10:30 a.m. in the First Baptist Church in Knox City. The Rev. Johnny Johnson, church pastor, officiated, assisted by the Revs. John Gillispie and Vergil Ichtertz. Interment followed in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Born Cedric Cleveland Angle on May 29, 1916, in Haskell County, he was the son of the late Jessie Cleveland and Lockie Coates Angle. He graduated from Knox City High School in 1935. He also attended school in Sunset and O'Brien.

He married Billye B. Benedict on September 29, 1940, in Knox City.

Mr. Angle served on the Knox City Council and was the longest tenured mayor in the history of Knox City, serving 16 years. While mayor of Knox City, he was involved in the ground breaking of the Miller Creek Reservoir. Efforts in this regard have helped to insure that this important resource will remain available for years to come. He was also instrumental in the development of Knox City's airport.

Buddy farmed the family land for 45 years before retiring and the land is still in operation today. He had been a member of the Knox County Farmers Union and traveled to

Washington, D.C. with an entourage to the nation's capitol to express concerns of local farmers.

Buddy and his wife Billye began publishing *The Knox County News* in 1971, and also founded the store Appearances in 1995.

He also served in the United States Army, serving in the Philippines and Japan during and after World War II.

He was a member of First Baptist Church where he served as church greeter.

Buddy and his wife, Billye, were honored last year by State Representative David Counts with a Texas House Resolution at the Knox City Chamber of Commerce Banquet for their years of service to the community and area.

Mr. Angle received statewide recognition through the Associated Press and the TV media for the enterprise he built for his grandsons bearing their name, "Clay's and Scooter's Sno-Cone Factory" and his invention of a "frozen pickle on a stick".

His love of all children has

been enjoyed locally for many years through his repeat performances as Santa Claus for family gatherings, community parades and holiday events.

Buddy was a member of the First United Methodist Church for 44 years, serving as official board chairman, chairman of the pastor-parish committee, chairman of the board of trustees, lay member to annual Northwest Texas Conference and member of the building committee.

Survivors include his wife, Billye of the home; two daughters and sons-in-law, Gwen and Mark Decker of Lubbock and Stacy and Dave Thompson of Knox City; two grandsons, Clay Hewitt of Dallas and Scooter Thompson of Knox City; two nieces, whom Buddy's parents reared, Katrine King of Benjamin and JoAnn McNitt of Nolanville; and a sister, Eloise Patton of Nolanville.

He was preceded in death by his parents; and his brother, Sammie Angle on October 26, 1997.

Alice Wilson honored by State Representative Counts with resolution recognizing WWII military service

Alice Wilson of Knox City was honored by State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) with a resolution from The State of Texas recognizing and honoring her service in the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) and the Women's Army Corps (WAC) during World War II.

Presenting the resolution on the day before Veterans Day, Representative Counts pointed out that with the recent dedication of a memorial in Washington, D.C., honoring the service of military women, it was fitting to honor Alice Wilson right here in her hometown.

Rep. Counts presented the resolution that read as follows:

WHEREAS, Serving one's country during wartime is an act of both courage and patriotism, and Florence Alice Wilson has embodied these ideals through her service with the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (WAAC) and the Women's Army Corps (WAC) during World War II; and

WHEREAS, Before being honorably discharged on November 26, 1945, this remarkable woman was stationed at bases throughout the world during her tenure in the armed forces; her many contributions to the war effort include stints as a hospital staffer at Virginia's Camp Pickett

The daughter of the late Sam and Ida Franklin Wilson, Alice Wilson was sworn into the WAAC for the duration plus 6 months on the 17th day of April, 1943 in Dallas, Texas.

Assigned to Camp Manticillo, Arkansas for basic training, Wilson soon learned why the state of Arkansas was famous for the Razorback Hog, as her training group got a "lot of exercise" trying to chase the hogs out of camp.

Later stationed in or traveling through Virginia, Georgia, New Guinea, the Netherlands, East Indies, Brisbane, Australia, Manila in the Philippines and San Antonio, Texas, Wilson served as a hospital staffer and as an Army censor.

Serving with dignity, Wilson



was honored for her service with the Theater & Campaign Medals, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with one Bronze Star, Good Conduct Medal and Victory Medal.

Wilson was discharged from active military service on November 26, 1945.

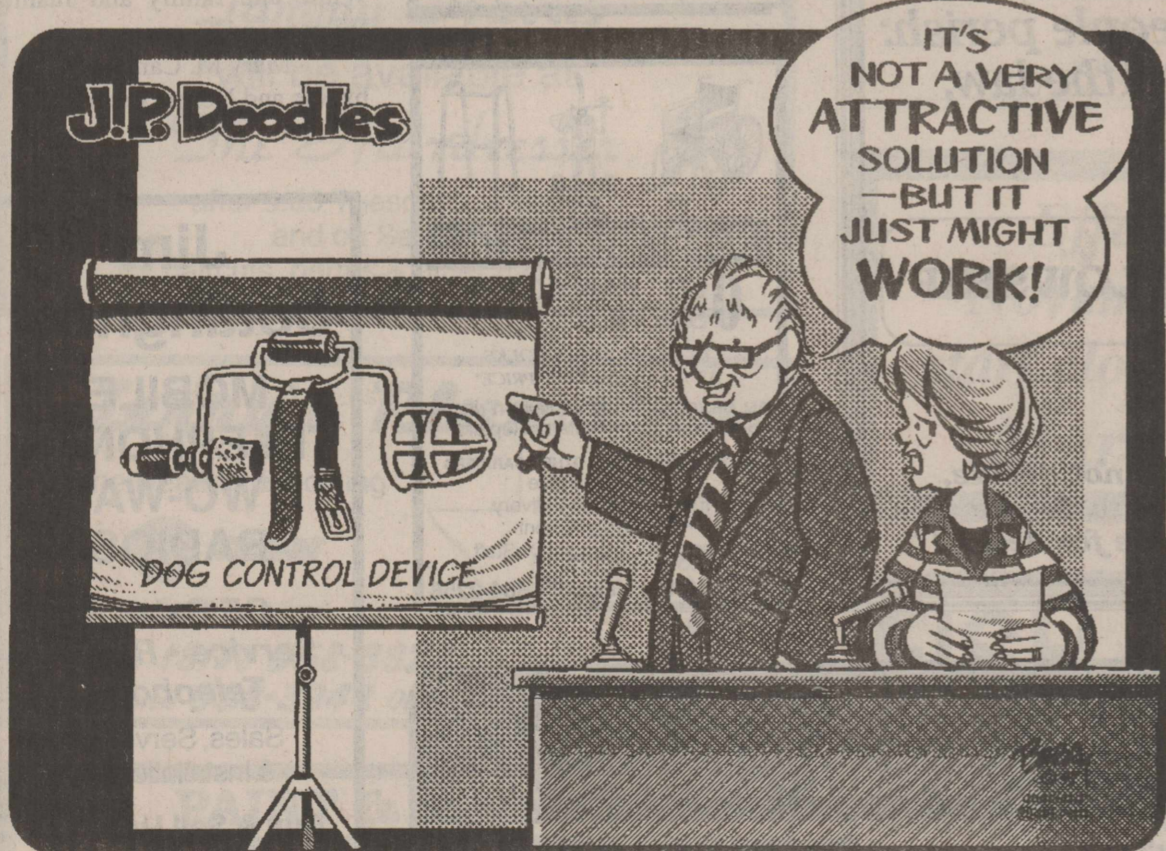

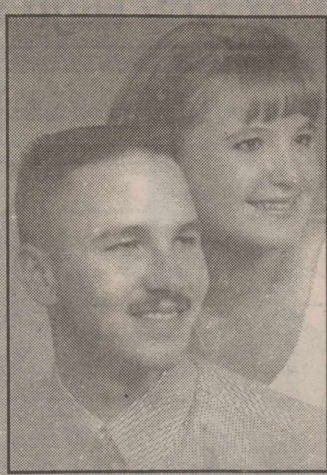

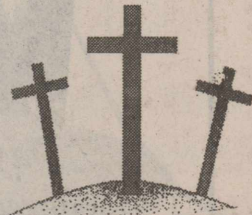

On A Wizer Note....

5th grade learns plant propagation

The fifth grade class at the O'Brien Middle School are currently conducting experiments with plan propagation. Under the supervision of Sandy Chappell and Michelle Hedgecoke, these youth propagated rose plants as well as several different types of house plants.

This project is a small part of a curriculum enrichment program entitled "Plant Pals" developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The "Plant Pals" program was developed in order to assist teachers with plant related science projects in the classroom.

Paul Weiser, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, Knox County, helped in coordinating this plant propagation program. On October 1, the fifth graders planted the cuttings. The youth alternate the responsibility of caring for these new plants.

Several different experiments are being conducted with these plant cuttings. Most of the plants were planted in their own personal greenhouse. These greenhouses were constructed from

clear plastic 20 oz. soft drink bottles. Some of these plants are being rooted in potting soil while others are being kept in water.

Every day the youth check the plants for disease and insect problems. They must also water each plant as needed to avoid any drought stress problems. The youth also add fertilizer once a week to assure proper plant nutrition. This is very important in young root development

The fifth grade, class in the 1996-97 school year conducted a similar program. They used only rose cuttings and did not place them in a personal greenhouse. These changes were added in hopes of a higher success rate.

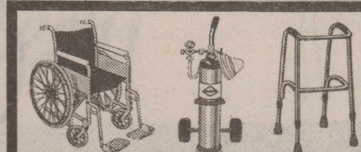

Survivors include his wife, Ileta of the home; three sons, Alan

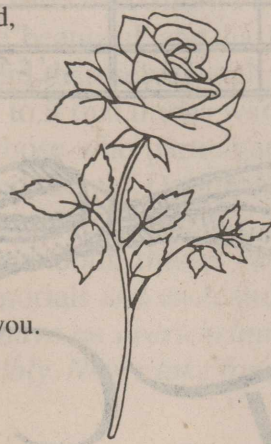
