Gladstone and Talmage.
Liverpool, January 24.—To-day Dr. Talmage, took luncheon and spent the afternoon with Mr. Gladstone at Hawarden Castle. Mr. Gladstone had telegraphed him yesterday: "Pray come to Hawarden to-morrow." Dr. Talmage was received very cordially by the Premier, and the two gentlemen had a long talk on religious and political questions. Mr. Gladstone said: "Talk about questions of the day, there is but one question and that is the Gospel. It can and will correct everything needing correction. All men at the head of great movements are Christian men. During the many years I was in the cabinet I was brought into association with sixty master minds, and all but five of them were Christians. My only hope for the world is in bringing the human mind into contact with divine revelation." Then, placing his hand on Dr. Talmage's shoulder, Mr. Gladstone warmly eulogized the doctor's Christian zeal, and expressed his great gratification at the marvelous publicity given to his sermons, which are now distributed in all lands and read in all languages.

After luncheon the two great men linked arms and took a walk over Mr. Gladstone's vast estate, its proprietor commenting lovingly on his wonderful trees as though they were human beings. He then inquired eagerly if Americans paid proper attention to tree culture. Dr. Talmage asked Mr. Gladstone if the cause of Irish home rule would be victorious. Mr. Gladstone brightened up considerably and responded emphatically: "Yes, when the next election comes." He continued: "It seems to be a disposition of God that I should be engaged in battle. At my time of life I should be resting. I never had any opinion in these matters, I dislike contest, but when Ireland, once the refuge of persecuted Englishmen, showed herself ready to adopt a righteous constitution and do her full duty, I hesitated not a moment to espouse her cause."

Concerning America he said: "No one outside of the United States is bound to love it more than I am." Pointing to numerous beautiful gifts from America, he went on to say: "Everywhere I have practical expression of tender thoughtfulness and kindness of American people." Toward evening when bidding Dr. Talmage farewell, Mr. Gladstone pressed into his hand some books and pamphlets containing autographic inscriptions, and also a copy of his own Latin rendering of his favorite hymn, "Rock of Ages," and said: "Give my highest regards to President Harrison, and express to Mr. Blaine my deepest sympathy with him on account of the loss of his beloved son."



Seymour is to have a national bank in a short time. The money is already subscribed for a \$50,000 national bank, the ground has been purchased for the site and work on a \$10,000 building will begin at an early date.

We've called upon this week to announce the death of little Charles Edgar Findley, the infant child of D. S. and Annie Findley. The little babe passed over the river of death in the home where no pains are felt Tuesday night about 12 o'clock. He was buried yesterday afternoon in the Seymour Cemetery. The Monitor extends sympathy.

BE CAREFUL.

For quite a number of years the people of Seymour have been expecting a railroad to be built to it but so far disappointment has been the only result. Now we have quite an excitement over the two routes that propose in the near future to give us an outlet. Values in real estate have gone up amazingly and are now at such a pitch that it takes money and lots of it to settle here among us, and if we fail to get a road some time in the near future our county is damaged to an incalculable extent.

Now is the time then to put forth every effort in the right direction. The two railroads are opposing each other in this direction and our citizens should be extremely cautious how they deal with their present opportunities for a road and not let the bird in the hand go for the one in the bush.

We cannot hope for but one of the two roads. The Fort Worth & Denver branch is evidently intending to get in ahead of the M. K. & T. and prevent it but they will do it if possible. Whether the agitation of the building of the branch from Wichita Falls will effect the decision of the court in allowing an extension of the M. K. & T. or not we are not able to predict. Yet we are very much afraid that the fight between the two strong companies, as they both are, will result in a complete destruction of our long cherished hope for a road. And to all those who have the management of the interests of our town we would at this time raise the voice of warning that they be extremely cautious how they act, what propositions they accept and how they accept them, for we predict that if the M. K. & T. proposition is killed we will be years without a road unless such terms can be made that will secure beyond a doubt the building of the road from the Falls.

Baylor sent another train of wagons loaded with grain to the west this week and yet we have plenty to spare. The Great Creator in his omnipotence and allwise construction of this western country was thoughtful that the country would some day be settled by mankind, and thoughtful of man as he is, would not leave them without bread. So He created an Egypt, as it were, Baylor county, while they, not being able to raise bread for themselves are tending our herds and flocks for us on the high hills and broad prairies while we raise bread for them.

Mr. E. M. Boyd, traveling for Bitman Bros. of Fort Worth, was in Seymour last week and sold our merchants a large stock of goods. Mr. Boyd also sold D. L. Kenan and Mr. Bob Hanna the largest stock of groceries that has ever been brought to this town. Mr. Kenan is going to run a delivery wagon and will deliver all goods within one mile of the town limits. Mr. Boyd stated that our town was better located for a city than any town in West Texas. We know Mr. Boyd is a splendid salesman and his head is level on many other things.

Seymour is still growing and with the push and energy that she has and her natural advantages she will be a city in no distant day. The river running close by her side will be utilized in the near future for manufacturing purposes, we can build a dam across the river at this place and can have water power sufficient to run any machinery eleven months in the year. Seymour is the place to invest your money if you wish to reap a golden harvest in the days to come.

Now is the time if you wish to have good gardens to plow them. Our citizens will at this time of the year throw all the manure from the stable on their gardens and plow it under, they will find that it will prove a great advantage to them in raising a garden the coming year.

We can now assure the public that Seymour will have a railroad by the middle of May and we will own a great deal to Wichita Falls for this road. She has done all she can and we can assure her we appreciate her efforts.

THE M. K. & T.

Our railroad committee, composed of Judge R. J. Browning, Judge S. I. Newton, our Druggist J. G. Kenan, and Postmaster R. F. Higgins, received a telegram from Mr. Eddy, receiver of the M. K. & T. rail road, to meet him and the company in Henrietta Friday morning at 10 o'clock. Our committee started at once for Henrietta, and on reaching that town found Mr. Eddy, receiver, Mr. Fry, general superintendent and Mr. Waldo, general traffic manager, awaiting their arrival.

They stated to our committee that the consultation was for the purpose of uniting our efforts in extending the M. K. & T. railroad from Henrietta to Seymour and asked to see the probable business that would be done at this place should the road be extended here. On seeing our figures they expressed themselves as being very pleased with the prospect of business that this road would do and then asked what can your county do in the way of securing the right of way. The committee informed them that the right of way through the county as far as Seymour and depot grounds would be donated. The next question was how much money, land or other property will you give for this road. The committee stated that it was their opinion, if this company would insure Seymour and Baylor county a road by the first of September, '90, and insure them that this work would commence in the next ninety days then this county would give the right of way through the county to this place, depot grounds here and \$23,000 in money. The question was then put to Archer City and county as to what they would be able to do. That committee stated that Archer City and county would give right of way through the county, depot grounds in Archer City and \$30,000 in money for this road. Henrietta also proposed to do her share towards the extension of this road. They, after considering everything, spoke very favorably of our country and said that the country by right belonged to the M. K. & T. and she expected to occupy it in the near future. They then requested these different committees to send their reports at once to Sedalia, Mo., and they thought that dirt would be flying within a short while.

Receiver George A. Eddy, Traffic Manager J. Waldo, General Superintendent J. J. Frey and Division Superintendent J. W. Maxwell of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad, and other parties, representatives of the bondholders, were here Jan. 31 and had a conference with our railroad committee, and also with Judge Hart, and Col. Ed East, from Archer county, and Judge Newton, R. J. Browning, J. G. Kenan, and R. F. Higgins, the railroad committee from Baylor county.

The subsidies offered were accepted, and the right-of-way through Clay, Archer and Baylor counties were offered and accepted. A corps of engineers will be in the field in the next five days, and within fifteen days the work will commence along the line. Everybody is jubilant over our success in securing the extension of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas to Archer City and Seymour.

Hen. William Cameron of Waco and other distinguished gentlemen accompanied the party. After the conference with the various committees from each county carriages were furnished and all the gentlemen present, including the railroad officials, took a drive around our city. They were highly pleased and spoke highly of the many improvements being made, and the future prospects for our thriving and growing city. Fort Worth Gazette

Mr. Lee, son of Eld. Lee of the western portion of the county, was in town last week and sent several copies of the Monitor to his friends back east.

Mr. A. B. Merrick, of Round Timbers was in town last Saturday and reported a great deal of sickness in that neighborhood. He said that the children were all sick and the back bones of the old people were aching like frozen fingers.

The Wichita & Western.

It has been in contemplation by officials of the Fort Worth & Denver railroad company to construct a line from some point on said road in a west or southwest direction to Seymour, the county seat of Baylor county. Last week they submitted a proposition to this city and Seymour, agreeing on their part, if it was complied with by these two cities to put an engineering corps into the field at once and begin work within 30 days from the closing of the contract. The terms of this proposition were in substance:

That if Wichita Falls and Seymour would give their right of way and \$60,000, they would begin the construction as above stated and have forty-five miles completed in six months.

A meeting was called for last Saturday night, but owing to a lack of sufficient publicity the meeting was only sparsely attended and only about ten thousand dollars was subscribed. A committee on subscriptions was appointed and the meeting adjourned till Monday night.

A pretty good crowd was in attendance Monday night and after several addresses urging the importance of raising the necessary funds and doing it at once Saturday night's subscription was raised to something over \$17,000. The committee on subscriptions was continued and the meeting adjourned till Tuesday night.

The work of the committee on Tuesday succeeded in raising the fund to \$23,000. On Tuesday night while the attendance was meager those present seemed to be loaded for any emergency, and determined to complete the \$30,000 required of this city. Several new names were added to the list, and what this failed in completing the amount was subscribed by many of the former ones raising their subscriptions.

When it was announced from the secretary's desk that the full amount of \$30,000 was raised the district court room was filled with a deafening applause, which continued for several minutes.—Wichita Herald.

The Cemetery Fence.

A meeting was held at the courthouse Saturday, Feb. 1st 1890 in the interest of the cemetery. Mr. J. M. Wiggins Esq. was elected chairman and L. A. Donnell secretary.

On motion it was resolved that a committee of five be elected to receive and take charge of all moneys that had been collected for cemetery purposes, to collect the outstanding subscriptions, to correspond with manufactures of iron fences, and transact such other business as would be a benefit to the cemetery.

The following persons were elected members of said committee viz: Jo Woodyear A. R. Bengé C. S. Humphreys D. S. Findley and B. M. Britain.

All parties who have subscribed to the cemetery fund are requested to pay their subscriptions to the above named committee.

On motion resolved the Seymour Monitor be requested to publish the proceedings of this meeting.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again at the call of the committee.


