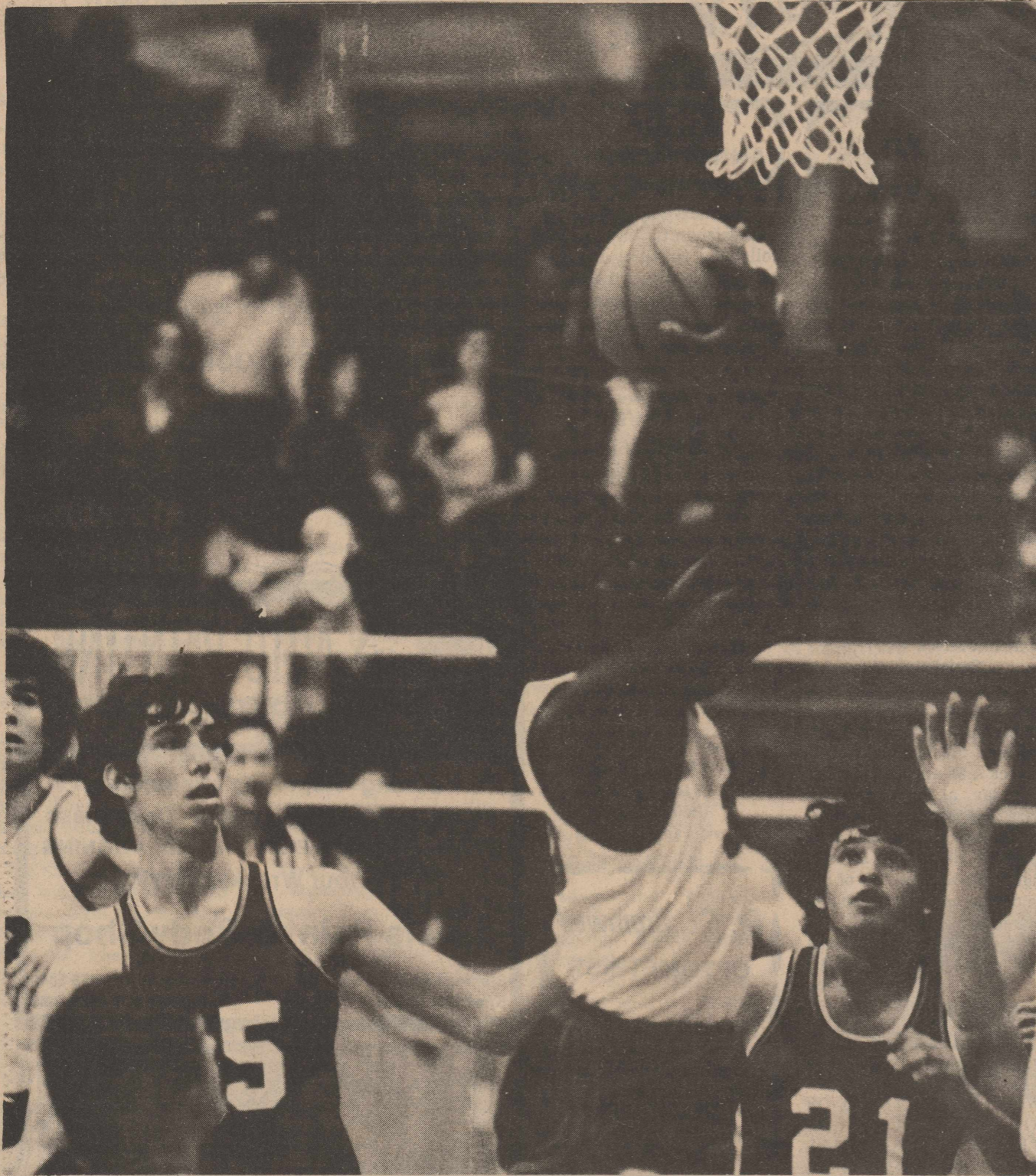

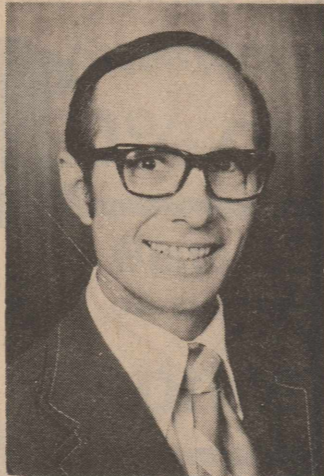
Big Cotton Harvest Now Winding Down

The cotton harvest continued to wind down in the Munday territory, according to Garland Dye, officer in charge of the Munday classing office. Most farmers have completed harvesting and others have only small acreages remaining. Most gins in the territory continued to operate around the clock in order to reduce heavy backlogs of stored seed cotton.

Cotton prices were steady to slightly higher than a week earlier. Demand for most qualities was good and the market was active. Prices ranged from 16 to 17 cents per pound over loan values for cotton miking between 3.5 and 4.9. Demand was light for cotton miking below 3.5. Prices for these qualities ranged from 6 to 13 cents per pound over loan values. Cottonseed prices paid farmers remained at 105 dollars per ton.

The Munday classing office classed 12,597 samples during the week ending January 3, bringing the total for the season to 142,699, which compares to 34,138 classed a year ago. This represents the highest total in the history of the Munday classing office.

The quality of cotton classed during the week was mostly in the light-spotted color group. Grade 32 accounted for 40 percent and grade 42 was 18 percent. Grade 31 made up 18 percent of the total and grade 41 accounted for 10 percent. Staple 33 comprised 54 percent of the total followed by staple 32 with 27 percent. Staple 34 made up 15 percent. Micronaire readings were 67 percent within the 3.5 to 4.9 range, as compared to 69 percent the previous week. Fifteen percent miked from 3.3 to 3.4, and 15 percent miked from 3.0 to 3.2.

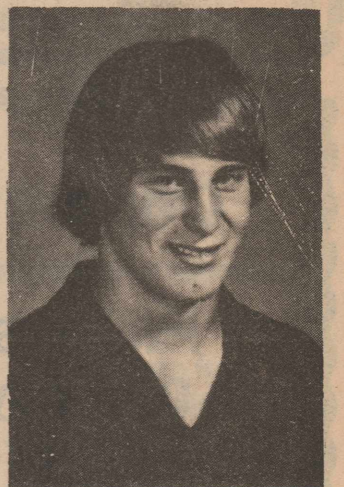

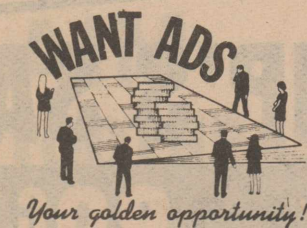

WOOD-BURNING STOVES

Before yielding to the lure of the wood-burning stove, consider a few factors. Consider cost of wood vs. cost of gas or electricity. Wood must be free or inexpensive to make the most of a wood-burning stove.

Avoid fire hazards through proper installation and use.

Be sure the stove is made of sturdy material such as cast iron or steel. Look for stoves listed by Underwriters' Laboratory (UL) or other recognized testing laboratories.

Check the stove for cracks or other defects. Install the stove to comply with local fire and building codes. Select a corrosive-resistant steel stove pipe of suitable gauge. Install dampers according to manufacturer's directions.

Choose seasoned - at least six months - wood, preferably hard wood.

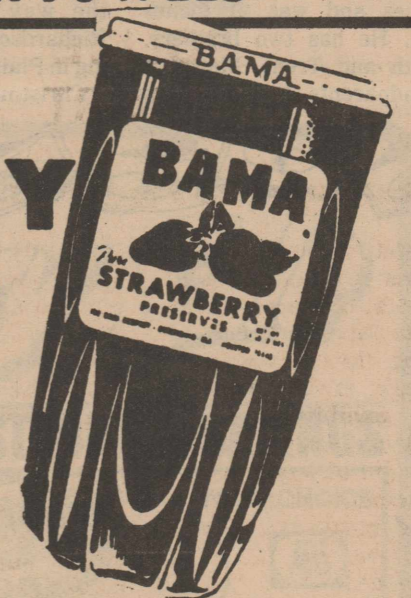

POLICE REPORT

Five assists were given, including three Knox City EMS Ambulance runs, one fire department call on car fire, and one funeral escort.

Eight arrests were made including one driving under the influence of drugs, two driving while intoxicated, four public intoxication, two disorderly conduct, and one felony burglary to automobile.

Three investigations were made into a burglary to an automobile, where a gun was stolen, a burglary to a business, and a rape of a

child. Officers noted that an ongoing investigation into a previous arrest for delivering drugs to a minor revealed that the previous charges filed against a 17 year old should be dismissed.

Chief John Turner and Officer Dave Thompson also state that it has been noted recently that there are a great number of cars following emergency vehicles on runs and that a great deal of congestion is caused at fire locations by citizens trying to see what is happening.

The Officers remind readers that it is a violation of Texas State traffic laws to follow emergency vehicles on emergency runs. It is also a violation to drive over fire hoses that are run across streets at fire locations. They stated that "Continued violation of these types will result in traffic citations being issued and fines imposed against offenders."

The Police, the Fire Department, and EMS unit all need every citizen's cooperation in allowing the emergency vehicles and volunteer firemen quick access to the scene of emergency calls.

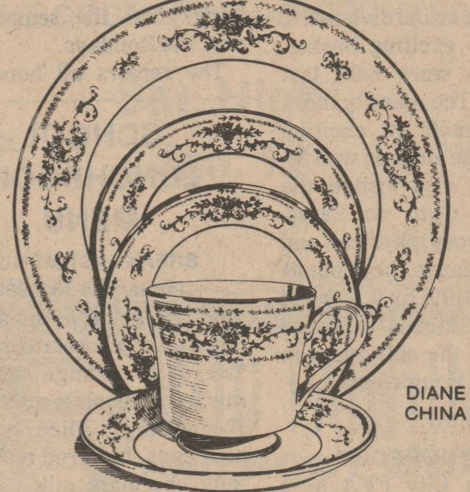

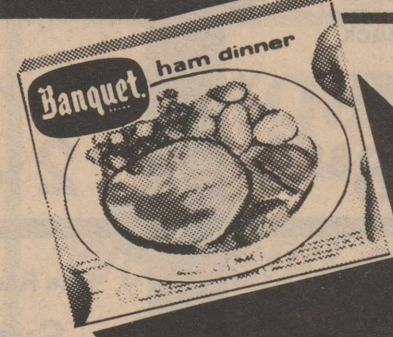
