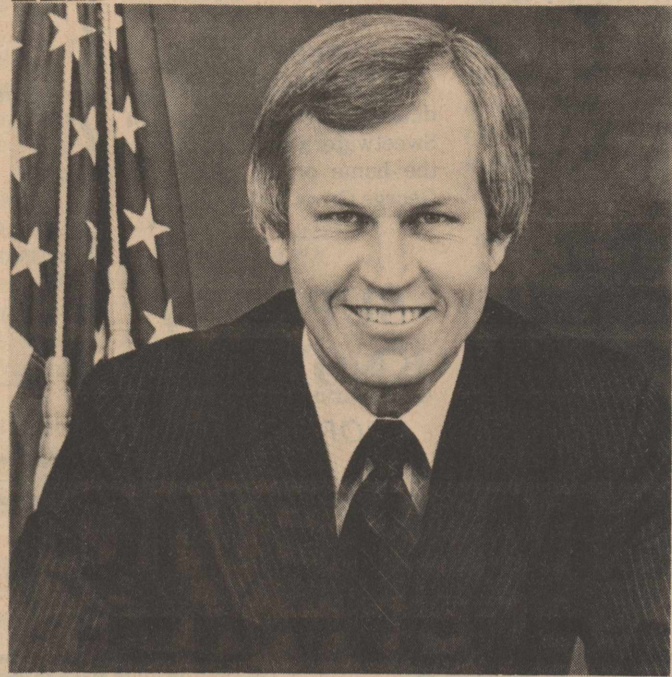

# Stenholm Announces For Second Term



U.S. CONGR. CHARLES STENHOLM  
...announces for re-election

STAMFORD - Citing mounting tension in the middle east as a prime example of the need for increased United States preparedness as the top priority in the 1980s, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced his plans here Tuesday to run for his second term of office.

Stenholm told a large group of supporters of his firm commitment to a stronger defense position that could "leave no doubt in any nation's mind of America's resolve to defend our hard won freedoms".

"That is one of my primary goals during the next session of Congress ... one of the reasons I am asking for a renewal of my contract to serve the people of the 17th District," he said.

"Cindy and I wanted to make this announcement here at home where it all began," Stenholm told the group. "We could not have won in 1978 without your help. We shall continue to work hard to merit your confidence and pledge to every citizen in the district our commitment to listen to their views, to respond to their needs; and to represent them in Washington to the best of our abilities."

Stenholm, 41, was elected to Congress following the retirement of longtime Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson. He serves on the House Agriculture Committee and was recently named to the House Small Business Committee. A native of Jones County, he graduated from Tarleton State University in

1959 and in 1961 received his BS degree from Texas Tech University. The following year he earned his MS in Agriculture Education at Texas Tech.

Stenholm told the group of the "new and varied challenges" faced every day in the Congress. Outlining his overall views, he said he had "every confidence in our system of government and I am optimistic about the second session of the 96th Congress." He stressed the elimination of deficit spending as another primary goal and emphasized his intentions "to continue to do all that is possible to cut any unnecessary federal spending."

"The true test of a good Congressman however is knowing where to cut - knowing what is unnecessary fat and what is real muscle. In the case of national defense, we are dealing with the backbone of our country," he emphasized.

"We are grateful for the encouragement and help given by all of our good friends in the past and during the upcoming campaign," Stenholm concluded. "We know our roots here in Texas soil will continue to provide the strength and determination to use all of our energies in service to the people of the 17th District."

"I don't know how I got it (the Bible) up there," she recalled. Next was McGuffey's reader, and she hasn't stopped reading since. Every morning still begins with a daily newspaper to see what's going on in the world.

Reaching 100 may seem special to friends and family but not to her. "I don't pay no attention to birthdays," she affirmed.

A party in honor of Mrs. Trammell's birthday was held between three and five in the afternoon on January 10 at 708 West Fourth Street in Quannah. Many of her friends came by and helped her celebrate.

## Oklahoma Man Is Convicted Of Fraud

An Oklahoma man has been sentenced in Federal Court in Tulsa for defrauding the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program, according to James Harper, branch manager of the Vernon Social Security Office.

Dorsey Glenn Taulbee was given a one-year suspended sentence, placed on five-year probation, and was ordered to make restitution, Harper said. Sentencing was imposed by Federal Judge H. Dale Cook.

Taulbee was convicted of providing false information about his work and wages so he could continue receiving SSI benefits.

SSI is the Federal Program which provides cash assistance to the needy who are aged, blind or disabled.

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## Time To Prepare For Annual Filing

The time of year is approaching for all employers to prepare for filing the annual Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement. The IRS Publication 393, "1979 Federal Employment Tax Forms" - gives complete instruction regarding the filing of forms W-2 and W-2P with the Social Security Administration instead of with Internal Revenue. A copy of this supplement is available at the local IRS office. Employers in this area will mail Copy A of their W-2's to the Social Security Administration, Albuquerque Date Operations Center, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87180. Forms should be mailed no later than February 29, 1980. Those employers filing W-2's on magnetic tape or diskettes will forward those reports directly to Baltimore.

and pass the W-2 information on the IRS for their income tax processing. Copy A of the 1979 Form W-2 has three forms to an unperforated page. These should not be cut or folded. The entire page should be sent even if one or two of the forms are blank or void, as an optical scanner will be used to process the information. All Forms W-2 rejected by the optical scanner must be manually keyed into the computer system. This will greatly delay recording these wage items and delay claims processing for Social Security benefits and income tax information. Most questions concerning filing W-2 and W-2P forms can be answered by your nearest social security office.

**Your Social Security**

**REPORTING**  
"Every year Social Security must review the eligibility factors for each person who receives a gold-colored supplemental security income check," says James Harper, branch manager of the Social Security office in Vernon.

Harper said, "Most of the reviews do not require any changes in the person's check, while some indicate an increase is due. Moreover, though, if a change is detected, a decrease in the check is required. This decrease is usually retroactive and the recipient has been overpaid."

"In addition to being overpaid, Social Security will also assess a penalty if the event causing the overpayment has not been reported or was reported late. In order to avoid any penalty and to minimize any resulting overpayment, a person receiving supplemental security income should report any change in his circumstances that could affect his check as soon as possible to the nearest Social Security office."

Mr. Harper said that events which should be reported include a change of address, living arrangements, marital status, income, resources, and visits outside the U.S. for more than 30 days. Disability recipients should report if they return to work or if their condition improves. To be more specific, a change in living arrangements means that the number of people with whom a recipient lives has changed. A change in income needs to be reported if a recipient or spouse's earnings either increase or decrease, or the amount of a pension check changes, or if they start receiving support or contributions from someone.

"If someone isn't sure if a change in his circumstances needs to be reported, he should phone his nearest Social Security office. The people there will be glad to tell him if the change will affect his check," Harper stated.

The Vernon Social Security office is located at 1701 Cumberland, and the telephone number is 817-552-9346.

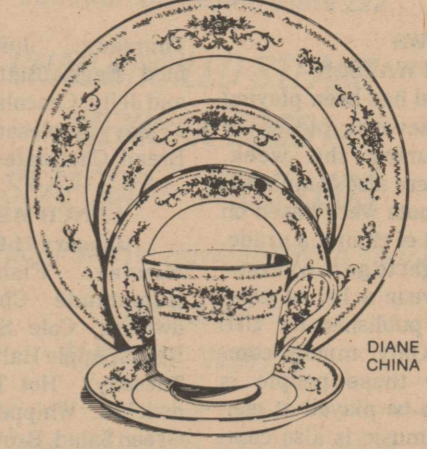

## "The Book Report"

### DEDUCT MOVING EXPENSES FROM FEDERAL INCOME TAX

Before moving to a new home, know the tax allowances and limitations related to moving.

If the move meets the necessary requirements, reasonable direct moving expenses are fully deductible and indirect moving expenses are allowable within specific limitations.

What are the requirements?

1) You must be moving to a new principle residence to work as an employee or a self-employed individual at a new principle place of work.

2) The distance between your old home and new place of work must be at least 35 miles greater than the distance between your old home and old place of work.

3) You must work full time for at least 39 weeks during the 12-month period immediately after your arrival in the general location of your new principle place of work (not necessarily with only one employer or for 39 consecutive weeks).

If self-employed, you must perform services on a full-time basis for at least 78 weeks during the 24-month period immediately after your arrival at your new residence.

What is deductible?

1) The cost of moving household goods and personal effects to a new residence is fully deductible. This includes the actual cost of transportation or hauling from your old residence to your new one, the cost of packing and crating, in-transit storage up to 30 consecutive days, and insurance.

2) The cost of shipping your automobile is deductible.

3) The cost of transporting household pets (dogs, cats, tropical fish, etc.) is deductible.

4) The cost of moving personal belongings from a place

other than your old residence (summer home, relative's home, etc.) can be deducted to the extent that it does not exceed what it would have cost to move them from your old residence.

The cost of connecting or disconnecting utilities because of moving household appliances is deductible. The cost of connecting a new telephone is not deductible.

5) The final family trip to the new residence is considered a direct moving expense and is fully deductible. This includes meals, lodging, gas, oil and repairs incurred on the trip.

6) Indirect moving expenses including pre-move house-hunting trips, tem-

porary quarters, selling and buying your old and new residence and settling an unexpired lease or acquiring a new lease can be deducted within certain limits.

The maximum limit for indirect moving expenses is \$3,000 of which more than \$1,500 may be for house-hunting trips and temporary quarters.

The deductible cost of selling or acquiring a residence includes all of the fees and expenses paid or incurred in connection with the sale, exchange of purchase of your old and new residence.

Finally, be sure you keep all receipts of all expenses.

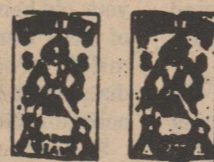

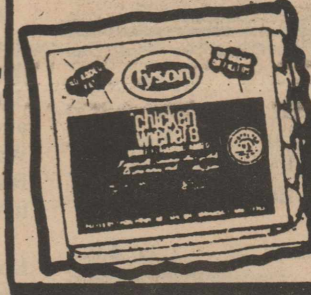

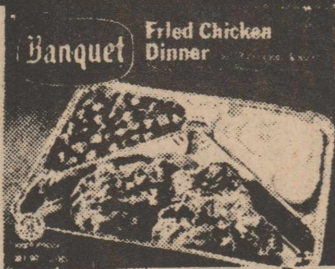
