# Search Intensifies For Missing Men

Concern in the area was intensifying Tuesday in the search for two Knox City men missing since their departure in a private plane from Waco Thursday night.

Pilot Ross Oliver, 42, owner of Oliver Flying Service, accompanied by Jim Anderson, 37, left Knox City Thursday about 2:30 en route to Waco where Oliver had a 4:00 a.m. appointment.

According to Barney B. Arnold, a friend of the missing men, the two left Waco about 8:30 p.m. with clear weather

conditions. At 9:50 p.m. Oliver requested a weather briefing to Del Rio from the Rocksprings VOR and also asked for an approach control frequency to Del Rio. At that time, Arnold said the ceiling was reported to be 500-700 ft.

The men were in a single engine Beechcraft Bonanza, number N621T. They were expected to return home either Thursday night or Friday.

The Civil Air Patrol and Border Patrol are conducting a search for the brown and

white plane.

Arnold said the search was hampered Sunday by ice and snow and that Monday was the first full-day of work.

Knox City's two flying club planes along with Munday's club plane were scheduled to leave Knox City Tuesday to aid in the search. Eddie Williams, Braniff pilot of Lewisville, arrived in Knox City late Monday night and he and W.R. Baker reportedly left early Tuesday. Barney B. Arnold and Dr. W.F. Thompson were due to leave about

noon Tuesday, as was Richie Smith from Munday, but due to high winds, it was doubtful as to what time they would be able to leave.

Three men, Charlie Bateman, Jerry Guinn, and Payton Tankersley left Knox City Monday night by car to join in the search.

F.D. (Demp) Emerson, Oliver's father-in-law, and his son, J.M. Emerson, left early Tuesday by car.

Reports were that several of Oliver's pilot friends have joined in the search.

Washington, D.C. -- Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that the Farmers Home Administration of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has awarded the Housing Authority of the City of Knox

City funds in the amount of \$225,000.

These funds will be used to construct ten rental units, four one-bedroom and six two-bedroom, for a total of 7,528 square feet. They will serve the rural town of Knox City and surrounding areas, providing safe, decent, and sanitary housing for low moderate income families at reasonable rental rates.

City manager Faye Railsback also reported that Dean Homstad has announced as a candidate for city council and one incumbent, Charles Auburg, has announced for re-election.


Three terms expire including those of Auburg, L.V. Worley, and Celso Gonzales.

# Remodel, Add On, Or Build Where Do We Go From Here?

Most of us had the frightening thought, "What would we do without the hospital?" brought home to us four years ago when the community was without a doctor and the hospital was closed temporarily for several months before Dr. W.F. Thompson moved to Knox City.

After Dr. Thompson began his practice, the hospital was reinstated and reopened, much to the relief of all area residents. Dr. R.G. Howell returned to Knox City to resume his practice the next year, and the two doctors serve patients in a wide area with the hospital's being filled to capacity on many occasions.

A lot of interest from citizens in the area has begun with several of the hospital board members' being approached on updating the hospital facilities, either by remodeling, renovating, adding on to, or building new facilities.

## Local 1980 Census To Get Underway

W.R. Baker, superintendent of the Knox City-O'Brien CISO and Chamber of Commerce director, is asking for public support of the Census Bureau's 1980 Census effort.

The Community has a vital stake in the Census count as the information obtained from the 1980 Census will be used to determine Federal Program Dollars available for use by the community.

Supt. Baker estimated that by the time the 1970 Census information is replaced by the 1980 Census, the 1970 Census will have provided an excess 1.25 million dollars in federal assistance to our community. A good 1980 count is needed to insure our continuing to receive our fair share.

The Census Bureau in cooperation with the Texas Employment Commission will be accepting applications and conducting examinations for temporary workers for the 1980 Census effort.

Arrangements have been made for interested persons to apply and take the required examination in Knox City on Friday, February 22. The site will be the Knox City High School Library at 1:00 p.m.

Information available from the Census office calls the period of employment temporary lasting from 10 to 12 weeks. The lowest paying position will pay \$3.85 per hour and persons who furnish private automobiles will be reimbursed at the rate of 18.5¢ per mile. The work will begin in March. Applicants must be at least 18 years old. Persons who are currently employed elsewhere are not discouraged from applying if they feel they have time available to work after hours and weekends.

Applicants from Knox, Haskell, and other area counties are invited to apply and take the examination, as there are job openings all over the 22 county Census track.

Because of this interest, board members felt that it was time to explore the situation and decide what could and should be done.

Hospital board members along with Drs. Thompson and Howell, administrator, Glen Rumley, and director of nurses Melba Pharr, who also serves as assistant administrator, met Wednesday evening with two representatives of the Keeper Company of Houston, David Bush and John Larson who were in the area, completing a 25-bed hospital in Hamlin. The Houston-based company has spent the past 15 years primarily designing and building hospital and medical facilities in Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas.

The group heard reports from the architects in regard to possible renovation or building. Rumley explained that board members want to hear opinions from other companies also.

Dr. Thompson and Dr. Howell also gave their suggestions needed to improve the present facilities including a larger emergency room, in a more central location situated closer to nurses' station, more sterility in surgery and delivery room, an image intensifier for radiology and GI studies, a larger intensive care room, and a place for isolation. It was also noted that with the addition of Dr. Newton Neufeld to the staff, more rooms would be needed.

Board members present included Stanton Brown, Richie Smith, Greg Clonts, Galen Hord, Paul Horne, Paul Clayton and Vernal Zeissel.

The hospital has acquired within the past few months two machines that greatly add to the efficiency of the staff and the care of the patients.

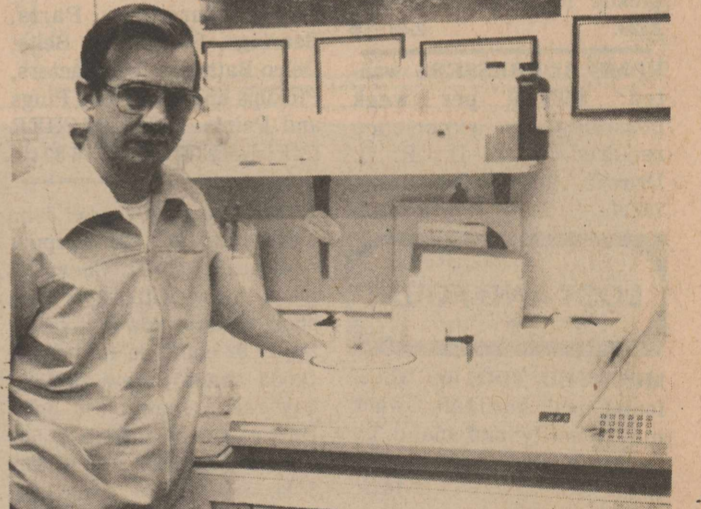
A DC-180 Defibrillator was bought in September 1979 with approximately one-half of the \$4500.00 cost purchased through the Heart Fund. The machine, which operates either by electricity or by battery, is completely portable. It can be taken in the ambulance if necessary or even to a patient's home. The all-in-one unit is used in all surgeries. It monitors the heart tracing, does an EKG paper write-out, and is an electrical defibrillator (in layman terms - shocks the heart).

Another more stationary unit is used in intensive care with two camera monitors in the nurses' station. The patient's pulse rate and heart rate tracing (EKG) can be observed as well as a view of the patient at all times in the station. If any change occurs and the nurse is out of range of the monitor, a signal beeps for the nurse's immediate attention.

Another life-saving device in the modern lab is a completely automated computer chemistry analyzer, one of the most modernistic pieces

of equipment available to smaller hospitals, according to Joe Walaski, lab x-ray supervisor. Walaski explained that the analyzer is capable of doing 37 procedures completely including drug screens, identifying a particular drug taken by the patient. Walaski said one receipt of the next set of boards for the computer, 55 additional tests can be done. The new analyzer, which takes the place of three different machines, completely screens for cardiac conditions and is equal in capability to any machine in labs in Wichita Falls or

Abilene. Walaski praised the hospital administrator for his foresight and overall decision to acquire the machine. It not only simplifies man hours, but increases accuracy and capability. The analyzer allows the lab technician to program different chemistries to run in any sequence. The technician can take a blood sample, program it to whatever test is needed, and the computer will print out the results.

Walaski said the analyzer was ideal for custom profiles of cardiac, liver, or renal tests.

With all the trained personnel, qualified staff, and excellent equipment in the modern lab, more room is desperately needed.

Board members are hopeful that suggestions be heard immediately as to what direction our hospital needs to go. Readers, let your feelings be known. We have the potential right here for one of the finest medical facilities anywhere. Let's all work together in meeting the challenge for larger and more up-to-date facilities.

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## Females Need To Update SS Account

Women can insure getting full credit for their Social Security wages by comparing their Form W-2 with their Social Security card. A change in marital status can frequently result in a woman's wages being reported under a different name from the one used for her Social Security account. In these cases the wages may not be properly credited.

Under a recent change

wages are reported annually to the Social Security Administration on the Form W-2. Although the Social Security tax has been paid the wages cannot be properly credited to the worker's account if the name and Social Security number shown on the Form W-2 are different from the one on the Social Security account.

Any woman whose name changes because of marriage or divorce should have her Social Security account changed to her correct name. This will insure proper crediting of her work and will avoid any problems the day she applies for Social Security benefits.

"This year the Association's major goal is to improve the care for the discharged long term mentally disabled," Stevens continued.

The association is promoting self-help groups for former patients and for families of persons with mental health problems. The association is also working to see that housing opportunities are available in communities for discharged patients.

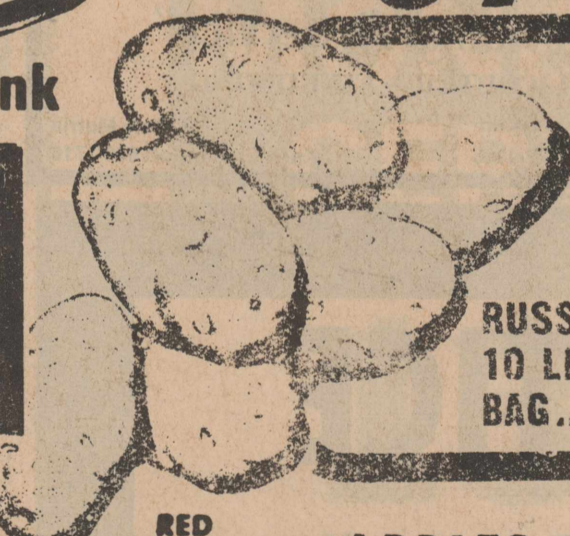
