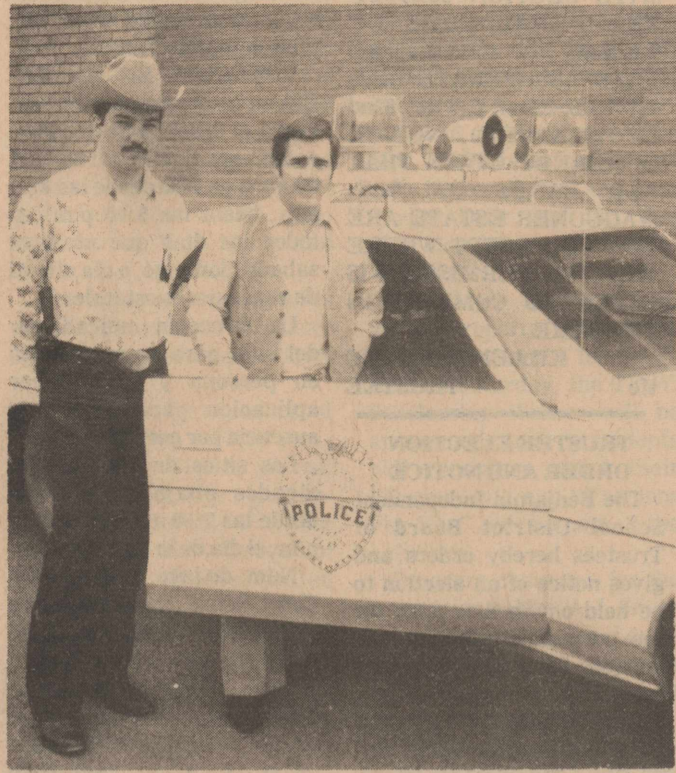

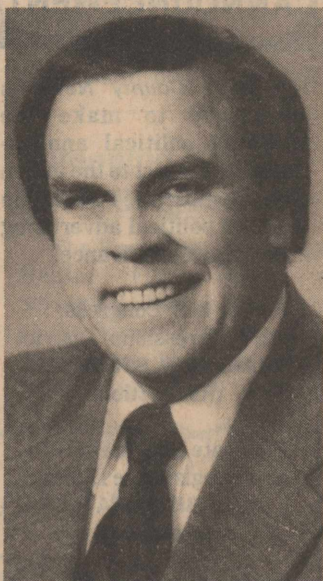
Jett To Address Chamber Guests

Races Develop In All Three Elections

Filing for a place on the city council before the Wednesday, March 5, deadline was James Hewitt.

Six men, including three incumbents, are seeking the three seats to be chosen in the election on April 5. Appearing

on the ballot this year will be incumbent Charles Auburg, Dean Homstad, incumbent Lynn Worley, O.E. (Gene) Sutton, incumbent Celso Gonzales, and James Hewitt.

Two seats on the board of trustees of the Knox City-O'Brien Independent School District are being sought by three men including incumbent Henry J. Jones, Jimmy Tankersley, and J.B. Rutherford.

Filing for the two elective terms expiring of the board of directors at the Knox County Hospital were five candidates as of the March 11 deadline, including the two incumbents Richie Smith and Vernal Zeissel, Bill Kingston, Cora Jean Collins, all of Munday, and Mike Newton of Knox City.

The joint election for all three, entities will be held Saturday, April 5, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the community center in Knox City, with the hospital and school election also in conjunction with the O'Brien city election at the O'Brien Co-op Gin.

Lone Star Files For Rate Increase

SEYMOUR -- Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, Lester Yates, today filed an application for a gas service rate increase which would raise residential customers' bills in the City of Benjamin about \$3.06 per month during the summer and \$5.06 per month in the winter.

The figures are based on typical residential usage of 8,000 cubic feet. Under the present rate, the average bill for that amount would be \$25.17.

Yates said the company needs \$6,358.00 of additional revenues to meet its costs of operation and to earn an adequate return on the company's rate base in the City of Benjamin. For the twelve months ended June 30, 1979, based on actual revenues and expenses, Lone Star had a revenue deficiency of \$1,019.00. Yates said rising costs are the reason why the company's earnings are deficient.

The largest single cost of the utility's operations throughout its pipeline network to 533 cities and towns in Texas is the cost of purchased natural gas. In 1975, Lone Star spent \$11,867.00 on gas purchases for the City of Benjamin. By 1979, that cost had risen to \$23,922.00.

Summer rates for Lone Star customers will be ineffect for consumption between meter reading dates in May and October. They are designed to reduce the customer's cost approximately 25-per thousand cubic feet of gas used during that period.

(Under today's request, commercial customers would also have an increase in service rates.)

"Lone Star has long been dedicated to giving its customers the best possible service at reasonable cost. To maintain this commitment, Lone Star must be permitted to earn a reasonable rate on its investment in Benjamin. Lacking this, we and our customers suffer twice. First, we could ultimately be unable to maintain or expand our facilities in this area in response to customer needs. Second, those who depend upon us for natural gas service could experience year-round curtailments were Lone Star no longer able to compete successfully for important new reserves of natural gas," Yates observed.

Yates added that, despite recent cost increases to customers, natural gas is still, by comparison, the most economical energy used in the home today.

Heart Fund Now Totals \$1,089.25

Mrs. Hazel Cowan, local chairman for the American Heart Association fund drive, has reported a total to date of \$1,089.25.

In regard to how the contributions are used, Mrs. Cowan explained that the battle against heart attack and stroke is concentrated in three areas: 1) funding cardiovascular research; seeking new and better methods of preventing, diagnosing and treating cardiovascular disease; 2) conducting educational programs designed to inform the public of the dangers and ways to reduce the odds, as well as programs to keep physicians and nurses informed of latest advancements; and 3) sponsoring service programs, including free public screenings to detect high blood pressure, a leading cause of heart attack and stroke.

Hounds Take First In Anson Relays

The Knox City Greyhound tracksters coached by Jimmy Rogers got down to business last Friday and Saturday at the Anson Relays to rack up 107 points for the first place finish.

One of the first place finishes for KC was the 440 yard relay team of Scott Lynn, Tim Roberson, Dwayne Johnson, and Ricky Gonzales who finished with a 45.0 time.

In the 120 yard high hurdles, Dwayne Johnson earned a first place to his credit finishing in a 16.0 time.

Russel Hacker took first in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles while brother Rance kept things "in the family" by placing second in the event. Their times were 42.8 and 43.8, respectively.

Ricky Gonzales placed first in the long jump with a leap of 20'4".

Rounding out the first place Hound finishes was the mile relay team of Ricky Gonzales, Dwayne Johnson, Scott Lynn and Tim Roberson who posted a 3:39.8 finish.

In the field events, Kelley Boone placed second in the pole vault division with 10'0".

Another second place finish for KC was in the 100 yard dash with Glenn Hedgecock who ran a 12.1. Hedgecock also took second place in the 220 yard dash with a time of 23.9.

Other KC finishes included Roberson, fifth, 19'5"; and Johnson, sixth, 19'1", long jump; Jay Rutherford, sixth, 2:13.3, 880 yard dash; and Kevin Leach, sixth, 5:04, 1600 meter run.

Also competing for the Hounds were Daniel Alsides, pole vault; Andy Barnard and Chuck Hutchinson, shot put; Barnard, Autro Rocha, Paul Taylor, discus; Danny Martinez and Hutchinson, 380 yard dash; Shelton Rhodes, 440 yard dash; David Flores, 330 yard intermediate hurdles; Hutchinson, 220 yard dash; and Alsides and Martinez, 1600 meter run.

Other team totals from the Anson Relays were Hamlin, second, 69%; Munday, third, 68; Rotan, fourth, 67%; Anson, fifth, 46; Stamford, sixth, 36; Hawley, seventh, 23%; Aspermont, eighth, 22; Merkel, ninth, 20%; and Crowell, tenth, 16.

This Saturday, the Hounds will participate in the Aspermont Relays.

Hospital Strong On Expertise

Articles the past few weeks have dealt with areas in need of improvement at The Knox County Hospital, but rather than continue in the negative, this week's article is going to deal with the very positive - the expertise in which every single employee is trained. Personnel now numbers approximately 55 to 60 persons, varying with the work load, according to administrator Glen Rumley.

The administrator said that he and the board of directors are happy that the hospital has been able to attract and hold on to well-trained personnel. He feels the responsibility assumed by the nursing personnel is much better in the smaller hospital and the experience gained in all phases is much greater in the smaller hospital due to the many services performed by the doctors and nurses.

With the up-to-date equipment available in the local hospital, just about any type illness can be cared for here with the exception of burn patients who are sent to a special center at Parkland Hospital in Dallas.

Dr. W.F. Thompson, who has been responsible for approximately 45 surgeries since the first of the year, assists and is assisted by Dr. Daniel Jackson of Seymour in various types of surgery. Dr. Alfonso Pino of DeLeon, an orthopedic surgeon, performs surgery here with Dr. Thompson assisting. Also Dr. Don Luezing, with the Reagan Urology Clinic in Wichita Falls, and Dr. Thompson assist each other on occasion. Dr. R.G. Howell assists Dr. Thompson, also.

Radiology Associates of Abilene work with Dr. R.G. Howell and Dr. Thompson on X-Ray diagnosis and are available for consultation on diagnosis and also X-Ray reading.

When Dr. N.D. Neufeld arrives, even more extensive and a greater variety of surgeries will be available.

Glen Rumley, has served as administrator of The Knox County Hospital for ten years, serving in the same capacity for two and one-half years at Wheeler before moving to Knox City. Assistant administrator and director of nurses Melba Pharr assumed her positions here last year. She is a

graduate of Hendrick Memorial Hospital and holds the BA degree in health care and education from Ottawa University at Ottawa, Kansas.

Six registered nurses serve The Knox County Hospital. One RN is required on each shift. The RNs work 12 hour shifts for three days and are off four days. They alternate on day and night duty, the administrator explained.

Eight licensed vocational nurses are on the staff with approximately 12 aides. The maintenance man, John

Lewis, has worked for 33 years at the local hospital and holds the record for the employee with the greatest number of years. Other employees include four in housekeeping, one in laundry, four in the kitchen with one consulting dietitian, and one grounds keeper.

One RN serves fulltime in the operating room and takes care of the supplies and equipment in the emergency room as well as those in intensive care.

Four employees make up the office personnel. The receptionist is in charge of admitting and discharging patients, one handles accounts receivable posting all charges and bills, one serves as insurance clerk, and one as bookkeeper, taking care of accounts payable.

Rumley also said the hospital is very fortunate in having a registered medical records technician.

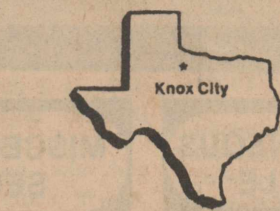
In addition to the registered nurse in the operating room, an LVN is also on hand for all surgery. A certified registered nurse anesthesiologist, either from Seymour or Gorman, is also here for all surgery.

Expertise in the lab comes from Joe Walaski and Joe Randall, both registered medical technologists.

The Knox County Hospital has the best ratio of RNs, LVNs, and aides per patient of any hospital. According to hospital personnel, the best patients are those who have returned here from larger hospitals and experience the personal attention and concern by the local nursing staff. The doctors report that these nurses should take 'no back seat' to anyone, anywhere in the country. They are continually updating their education through seminars and college courses, and patients in The Knox County Hospital receive only the best of care.

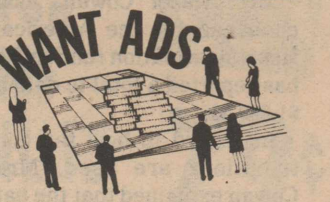

(b) In election precincts numbered Knox County at Community Center Building, in Knox City, Texas, in said School District, with Otis Harbert as presiding Judge and Carolina Rios and Fannie Watson, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Faye Railsback is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Ann Darr is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at City Hall, Knox City, Texas, within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day of absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. 16,000 Samples Are Classed Last Week

B.B. Manly, area director of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office in Abilene, reported that 16,000 cotton samples were classed during the week ending Friday, March 7. This brought the seasonal total to 898,000 samples classed. An additional 180,000 samples were classed at Munday, bringing the combined total to 1,078,000.

Local cotton prices were one and one-half to three cents per pound lower last week. Bid prices ranged from 19 to 23 cents per pound over CCC loan values for base mile, white light-spotted cotton. Low micronaire cotton sold at seven to 19 cents per pound over the loan. The supply was light to moderate. Demand

was light to moderate. Demand strengthened for low mike cotton, but continued light to very light for spotted and tinged cotton. Trading was mostly slow during the week. Grade 32, Staple 32 cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold at 67 to 70 cents per pound.

Abilene cotton was slightly shorter staple and lower mike than during the previous week. Grades were five percent white, 65% light-spotted, and 26% spotted. Grade 32 comprised 36%, grade 42 comprised 26%, grade 33 comprised 15%, and grade 43 comprised 10 percent. Fiber length was 53% staple 31, and 38% staple 32. Micronaire readings were 27% within the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Eighteen percent miked from 3.3 to 3.4, 34% miked from 3.0 to 3.2, and 20% miked 2.9 or lower. Six percent of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.
