

## Hounds Take Second At Aspermont

The Knox City Greyhounds tallied 60 points in Saturday's Aspermont Relays for a second place finish behind the Haskell Indians who pulled together 75 points.

Knox City's first place win went to the 400 meter relay team of Scott Lynn, Dwayne Johnson, Tim Roberson, and Ricky Gonzales, who finished with a 43.9 time.

Taking seconds were Scott Lynn, 100 meter dash, 11.4 and the 1600 meter relay team of Lynn, Johnson, Gonzales, and Roberson, who posted a 3:36.5 time.

Placing third was Russel Hacker in the 110 meter hurdles with a 16.0 time and Roberson placed fourth in the 200 meter dash with a 23.2.

In the mile run, Kevin Leach placed fifth with a 5:14 timing.

The field events saw Roberson take fourth in the long jump with a 20'2" and Gonzales fifth in the same contest with a 20'1" leap.

Other Hounds participating were Andy Barnard and Chuck Hutchinson, shot put; Kelley Boone and Daniel Alsidis, pole vault; Barnard, Arturo Rocha and Paul Taylor, discus; Glenn Hedgecoke, 100 meter dash; Johnson and Rance Hacker, 110 meter hurdles; Shelton Rhodes and Steve Lynn, 400 meter run; Russel and Rance Hacker and David Flores, 300 meter intermediate hurdles; Jay Rutherford, Danny Martinez, and Hutchinson, 880 dash; and Alsidis and Martinez, mile run.

Finishing third in the meet overall was Hamlin with 55 points; Rotan, fourth, 54; Rule, fifth, 42; Munday, sixth, 39; Albany, seventh, 35; and Aspermont, eighth, 34.

This Friday and Saturday, the Hounds will travel to Snyder for their relays.

## Sales Tax Rebates Are Increasing

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1980 grew substantially compared to the first quarter of 1979 but the increases don't fare as well under close inspection.

The apparent increases are partly offset by the fact that during the first quarter of 1979 city sales tax allocations were down due to late filings and a backlog of 2,400 returns in the agency's accounting system, Bullock said.

Knox City's net payment for the period was \$5,970.85 as compared to \$7,146.81 for the same period last year. 1980 payments to date, however, are \$14,732.30, a 37% increase over 1979 payments in the amount of \$10,738.99.

Other towns and their amounts for the period are Aspermont, \$4,092.23; Benjamin, \$415.91; Crowell, \$2,615.76; Goree, \$1,868.60; Haskell, \$16,304.31; Munday, \$6,651.00; Rochester, \$863.03; Rule, \$2,532.73; Seymour, \$13,190.48; Stamford, \$21,907.58; and Weinert, \$405.96.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

## Water Is State Approved

A survey report was received recently by Pete Beecher, General Manager of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, which serves the cities of Goree, Haskell, Knox City, and Munday. The survey was conducted for the purpose of determining if the Authority's system facilities meet the requirements for a "State Approved" water supply.

According to word received from the Texas Department of Health, the survey report revealed that all requirements for "State Approval" have been met by the NCTWA; however, it should be pointed out that this recognition does not apply to the cities which purchase water from the Authority, but only to those facilities owned and maintained by NCTWA. The member cities will be considered for "State Approval" on their own merit, Beecher explained.

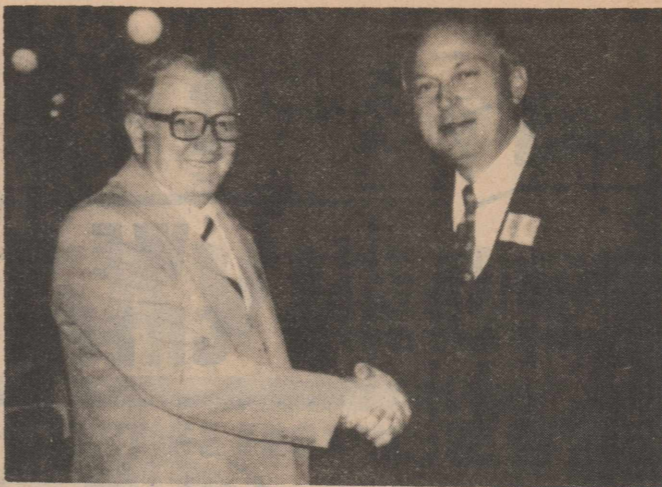
**Baptist Observing Youth Week Locally**

Knox City has many reasons to be proud! The town has two fine doctors, the Knox County Hospital, the Brazos Valley Care Home, a fine school system, many beautiful churches and other assets too numerous to mention. However, when listing all of these, two individuals come to mind that our entire city and area should be proud of and they are Ilene and John Turner.

The Turners assumed duties of the Knox City Area Ambulance Service, Friday, July 27, 1979, and since that time, the name has been changed to the Knox City EMS. Volunteer services of Roland Marion, Steve and Glen Rumley, Cyle Clayton, and Craig Williams, in addition to Ilene and John, have answered calls throughout the area with expertise and dedication.

John, who is also City Chief of Police, and his wife, Ilene, completed their 120-hour EMS course at Lubbock Christian College in July 1976. Prior to this, Ilene had completed an 81-hour course in March 1975 and both are certified in Texas and Illinois. They are the parents of three children, Allen, John David, and Dawn.

Ilene and John have taken a special interest in the ambulance service and have built it into one of the finest in the area today.
