Sales Tax **Rebates Are** Increasing

AUSTIN. Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1980 grew substantially compared to the first quarter of 1979 but the increases don't fare as well under close inspection.

The apparent increases are partly offset by the fact that during the first quarter of 1979 city sales tax allocations were down due to late filings and a backlog of 2,400 returns in the agency's accounting system, Bullock said.

Knox City's net payment for the period was \$5,970.85 as compared to \$7,146.81 for the same period last year. 1980 payments to date, however, are \$14,732.30, a 37% incres .e over 1979 payments in the amount of \$10,738.99.

Other towns and their amounts for the period are Aspermont, \$4,092.23; Benjamin, \$415.91; Crowell, \$2,615.76; Goree, \$1,868.60; Haskell, \$16,304.31; Munday, \$6,651.00; Rochester, \$863.03; Rule, \$2,532.73; Seymour, \$13,190.48; Stamford, \$21,907.58; and Weinert, \$405.96.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

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

Happy Birthday to Me! A few more and I will be half of a hundred, and that will be

pretty old, for anyone. We attended the Ginner's Convention in Lubbock during the weekend and had a good time. Saw lots of equipment, some of it new and some of it a little like we have in our gins here. This was the 67th Convention that they have had. It was also the largest attendance that they had ever had, by 11:15 a.m. they had Saturday, registered 6,825 people. Talk about being crowded, we were. They had a scale model of the first cotton gin that was built on the South Plains. It was built in 1905, and was the Caprock Gin in Lubbock. It was built as a cooperative effort by Lubbock County farmers. Completed in December 1904, the gin cost \$4,000. Prior to construction of the "Cap" Gin, Lubbock County farmers were producing about four bales of cotton per year. This low volume of Cotton production was due to the fact that there was no cotton ginned on the South Plains. Any cotton grown on the South Plains had to be shipped 100 miles South to Colorado City to be ginned. In its first year of operation, in 1905, Caprock Gin ginned 700 bales of Lubbock County cotton and a new, "Cotton Kingdom" was born. The original building was a wooden structure which received a protective coat of corrugated tin in 1906. The gin machinery was powered by a 1200 horse power steam engine, which was fired with sticks and burrs which were ginned out of the cotton. By 1927, the South Plains was dotted with some 75 cotton gins powered mostly by diesel fuel. The Cap Gin was





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


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
