In Austin May 9 and 10

Hounds Qualify For State Track Meet

Knox City Greyhound thinclads "got down to business" Friday and Saturday of last week at the Region I-A Track and Field Meet held at Odessa College and won that all important right to compete in the State meet in Austin on May 9 and 10.

With four qualifying for State in three events, Coach Jimmy Rogers' Greyhounds tallied 39 points for a second place outcome. Taking top regional team honors was Crosbyton with 65 points.

The 400 meter relay team of Scott Lynn, Tim Roberson, Dwayne Johnson and Ricky Gonzales crossed the tape with a 43.95 time with teams from Stanton and Rotan following in second and third, respectively. This winning time was somewhat faster than their Friday top qualifying time of 44.68.

Johnson's second place finish in the 120 high hurdles was another battle with Haskell's Joseph Browning who came across the finish first. Throughout the entire track season, Johnson and Browning have been pitted against each other at almost every meet. Dwayne won the district championship at Aspermont, but in Odessa Browning edged him for the regional title by a mere two one-hundredths of a second. Johnson's time was 14.76 while Browning posted a 14.74.

In preliminaries on Friday, Johnson finished first with the top qualifying time of 14.68 and a gusting wind behind him.

Gonzales finished second in the 100 meter dash to earn his ticket to Austin's state meet. According to reports, Gonzales probably got the best start of his life as he jumped out ahead of the field and held on to finish second to Willie Dodd of Stinnett, who ran a 10.68 to Gonzales' 10.76. Billy

Ray Terry of McCamey, one of the favorites in this event, finished third in 10.82.

Roberson finished fifth in the long jump on Friday with a leap of 20-3/4 for his efforts.

Rounding out KC's wins was Lynn, who placed sixth in the 200 meter dash.

Stanton finished third in the meet with 38 points, Haskell, who won the District 7-A track championship had 32 points, Rotan finished with 17 and Albany collected 13.

Charlene Brothers Issues Statement

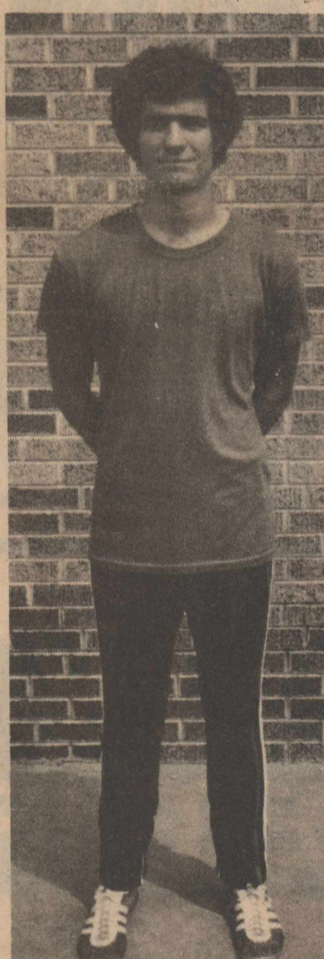

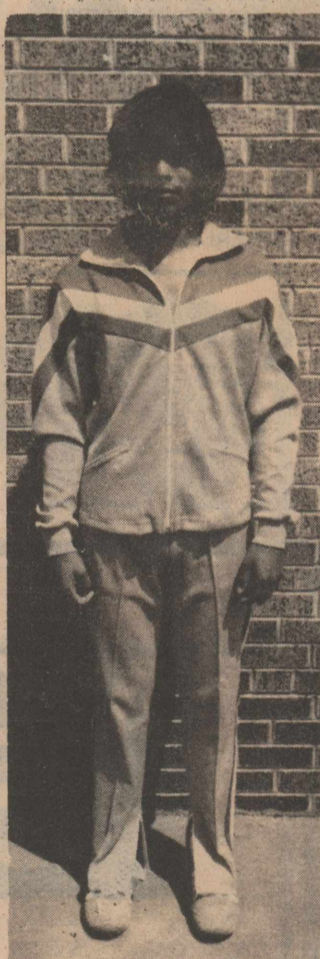

In Saturday's Demo Primary

Good Turnout Expected Here

Officials are expecting a good turnout here Saturday, May 3, for the Democratic Primary even though there are no contested races on the county level. Much interest has been shown however in the race for District Attorney in which incumbent W.H. Healy will face Larry Evans. Also on Texas ballots this year, voters will have the opportunity to make their preference known in the non-binding presidential referendum.

Precinct One voters will vote in Box 7S at the Community Center where election judge will be Abe Watson.

Precinct Two voters will cast their ballots in Box 7N at the City Hall, where Bud Reynolds will serve as election judge.

Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Tax Assessor-Collector John A. Smith's office told the News Tuesday that a total of 2,848 voters have registered for the upcoming election.

In a check with the District and County Clerk's office Tuesday afternoon, Gloria West reported that 10 had

voted absentee including eight Democrats and two Republicans. Deadline for absentee voting was Tuesday at 5:00 p.m. However, mail-in ballots have until Saturday, May 3, at 1:00 p.m. to be received at the office, Mrs. West said.

The race for Railroad Commissioner is also of special interest to Knox City voters. John Poerner is opposed by Buddy Temple, while James E. (Jim) Nugent is opposed by Jim Hightower.

Sample ballots of both the Democratic and Republican Primaries will be noted elsewhere in this week's News. For the first time in many years, a Republican Primary will be held in Knox County. Details of this may be noted in a separate news item.

Polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

KC Lions Hear Police Report

Knox City Lions Club members heard a police officer give facts and figures on police activity at the regular noon luncheon Wednesday of last week.

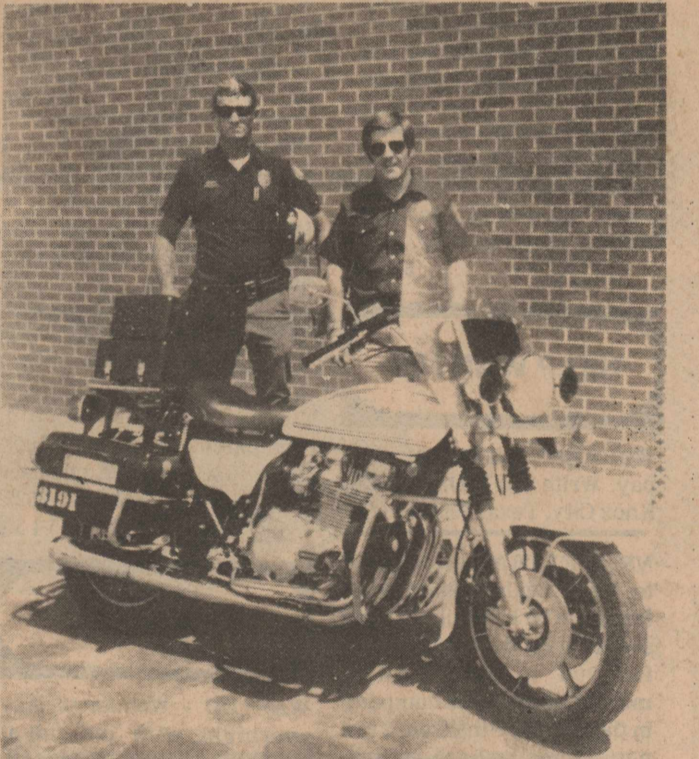
Abilene Officer Robert Waggoner, a motorcycle patrolman with the traffic section of the Abilene Police Department, brought his motorcycle to Knox City to assist Knox City Police Officer Dave Thompson with the program.

Lions Club members were brought up to date on police activity and Thompson gave reports on several areas of police work. Traffic citations and warnings were discussed, along with arrests, types of arrests and the Court Conviction records pertaining to these arrests.

The motorcycle was presented as an alternative to the City in helping cut down on the operating costs of the Police Department. While still allowing the officers to be active and mobile, the motorcycle can cut the Department's gas bill by at least one-half, the officers said. It is currently averaging approximately \$17.00 per day to run the parol car, while the motorcycle could operate on approximately \$3.00 per day, thus allowing a considerable savings to the City of Knox City.

The proposal has been presented to the City Council and final action is pending with further discussion on the matter due at the May 13 meeting.

Arrangements for the display were made through Max's Kawasaki Shop in Abilene, the supplier for these motorcycles in this area, who works with many area police departments on these projects.

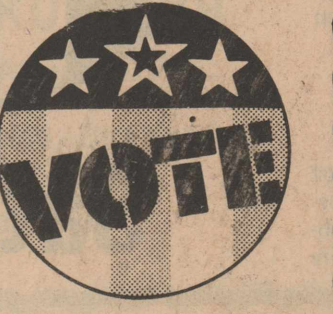

Uniform Planting Aids Pest Control

A uniform planting date, scouting of hot spot fields and early season boll weevil control where needed, are important parts of the boll weevil management program.

For the past three years, boll weevil damage in cotton has been light. A uniform planting date of May 15 will help insure that boll weevil damage will be light in Knox County during the 1980 growing season.

The uniform planting date is the critical first step in the cotton pest management program for counties in the Rolling Plains of Texas.

The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs during the last week of May or the first week in June.

Overwintered boll weevils live from 10 to 22 days after they emerge. When cotton is planted after May 20, it will be the second week in July before one-third grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will survive in squares until the squares are one-third grown. Research has shown that only a small percentage of the overwintered boll weevils survive until the second week in July.

The uniform planting date also limits the boll weevil populations to hot spot fields. These are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat.

Where boll weevils are detected, one insecticidal application just prior to the one-third grown square stage will usually control the overwintered weevils.

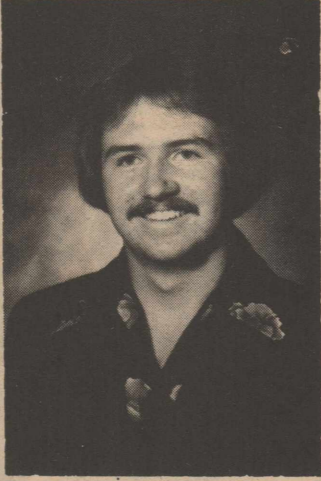

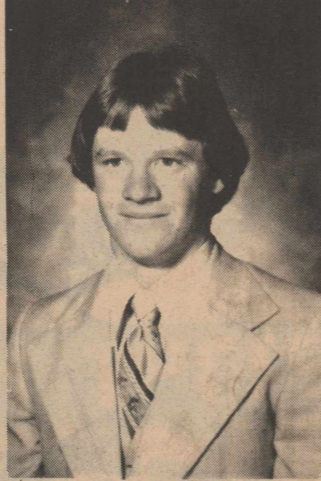


GREG ELSTON

Follow-Up On Census Progressing

Census District Manager, Billy Yarbrough of Abilene reports good progress in this area of the follow-up phase of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. Census takers are following-up on missing census questionnaires by visiting addresses from which householders have not yet mailed theirs back, as well as telephoning most households from which questionnaires were returned inadequately filled out.

The manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in supplying the required census information. But residents should always ask to see their official credential before admitting them to their home. It is a red, white, and blue ID card bearing the U.S. Department of Commerce Seal.

The manager stressed that, because the count of the Nation's population was to be for one day, April 1, everyone who was in the household on that day should be listed on the questionnaire, but not anyone who has moved in since.

"The information given the Census Bureau cannot be used to identify anyone in any way at all," the manager said. "Facts about individuals are lumped together to arrive at statistical totals, averages, and percentages, figures in which no one can be identified. Information about a person cannot be given to any other agency of government, or to a public or private organization of any kind, or to any other individual."

Minimum Tillage Workshop Is Slated

The Wilbarger Soil and Water Conservation District and Vernon Regional Junior College are co-sponsoring a workshop on conservation tillage techniques. The class is scheduled for Tuesday, May 6, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the auditorium of the Administration Building of VRJC.

The registration fee for the course is \$5.00 which includes lunch.

This workshop is designed to acquaint area farmers with conservation tillage

techniques which would enable him to lower fuel consumption and costs. The topics covered should enable farmers to make decisions concerning the possibility of incorporating conservation tillage into their individual operations.

topics to be covered include:

1. An Economic Analysis of Conservation Tillage - Jerry Waller, Conservation Agronomist, USDA Soil Conservation Service

2. Reduced Tillage Research in the Rolling Plains - David Bordovsky, Research Engineer, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station

3. Economic Considerations of Minimum Tillage for the Wilbarger County area - Norman Brints, Area Economist, Texas Agriculture Extension Service

4. Moisture Conservation Practices & Cropping Sequences for Conservation Tillage - Dr. Paul Unger, Soil Scientist, USDA

5. Planting in Residues and Conserving Energy with Conservation Tillage - Ron R. Allen, USDA Agricultural Engineer

6. Controlling Weeds in Conservation Tillage - Dr. Allen Wiese, Professor of Weed Science, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station

Child Education Program Serves Area

Child Find/Child Serve, sponsored by the Texas Education Agency and coordinated by Regions IX and XIV Education Service Centers, seek to locate and serve handicapped persons throughout the area.

In the Haskell-Knox Consortium, the local school districts of Knox City-O'Brien, Benjamin, Goree, Haskell, Munday, Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule, and Weir staff members share the responsibility for identifying handicapped persons who are of school-age and are currently not receiving educational programs and/or those students in school whose educational programs are not appropriate for their needs.

Just as institutions of higher learning state, "mind is a terrible thing to waste." Special educators maintain "a person is a terrible thing to waste." Based on this theme, children are served regardless of their handicapping conditions.

Once located and determined to be handicapped, through assessment, the child's individual educational plan is written. Regular education teachers, special education teachers, parents, and support staff from the school district cooperatively write the plan based on the child's abilities and needs.

After the educational plan has been written, and if additional services are required, a team of specialists (occupational and speech therapists, consultants for the visually handicapped and psychologists from Regions IX and/or XIV), along with the teacher, provide educational services for the child.

Often times special materials, adaptive equipment, or other community resources may be needed. These can be obtained through the resource component of the Child Find/Child Serve program. "Anything from obtaining wheelchairs to locating special service facilities can be identified through this component."

A variety of methods, in-

cluding house-to-house canvasses, booths at community functions, newspaper articles, posters, newsletters, television, and radio spots have been used to inform the public of the search for handicapped children between the ages of three to 21 or children with visual or hearing loss who range in age from birth to 22.

Awareness of the needs of others improves the quality of life for all. Evidence of this in one case was reflected by the smile of a boy when his non-ambulatory brother received a wheelchair. Now his handicapped brother can join him in adventures outside the house.

"Somewhere in your family, neighborhood or community is a handicapped person...that person may need our help," spokesman explained.

A confidential call to the local school district, or the Haskell-Knox Consortium, Bobby Hudson, Director (817) 658-3851, could make the difference—and prevent a terrible waste of human potential.

The goal of education is to make these handicapped persons into productive adults who can provide for themselves.

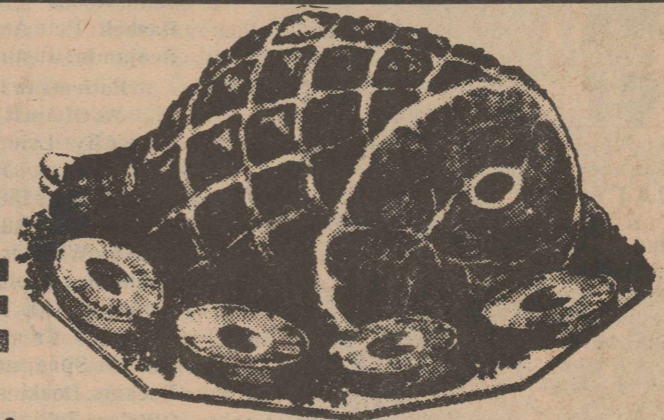


