The Knox City Chamber of Commerce decided that the special week provided a good opportunity to focus on one of its own, so Chamber director Dick Evatt and Chamber secretary-manager Doris Crownover advised The News that Wes Tex Coupon Clearing House had been chosen in Knox City for recognition.

The business is one that started with one employee fourteen years ago and has now expanded to fifteen.

Owner Bob Harrison began the coupon clearing firm in January 1967 with one employee who worked a half day once a week. After five years, the firm employed two fulltime and three parttime clerks, and after ten years, employed eight fulltime clerks. Now after thirteen years, fifteen persons are employed, and according to Harrison, if he could hire ten to fifteen more, the business could expand that much

The growing firm, located just east of Bob's Super Save, now processes 180,000 coupons weekly and serves eight states including Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Kansas, Colorado, and Missouri. Harrison said within the next four or five months the states of Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Florida, and Tennessee would be added.

Office manager is Billie Jean McAuley and other employees in addition to Harrison, his wife Bobbie, and son Rob include Judy Feemster, Rosa Rocha, Linda Parker, Irene Flores, Debbie Lindsay, Linda Fojtik, Jeri Mattes, Julie Pope, Peggy Gutierrez, Dorothy Cook, Gerri Watson, and Lidia Aguilira.

Rob Harrison and his wife, Belinda, returned here two years ago when Rob joined the firm where he now serves as vice-president in charge of accounts receivable and also

in charge of shipping. Harrison explained that although Wes Tex Coupon Clearing House is not one of the largest, it is one of the more prestigious in that it is one of only fourteen firms recognized by a major manufacturer out of a field of

An IBM 32 computer was installed in August 1976 to assist in the tremendous workload. It was replaced in January 1979 with the IBM 34, which has an abundance of capabilities, Harrison explained. A Data Processing System was initiated last October, and a Payroll System that may be used by other firms was begun in January of this year. Harrison is currently running an 80 employee payroll for a customer and is working on a General Ledger System for his own

Knox City is among the use, but may also be utilized by other firms when completed, he said.

> Another new addition to the firm is the Fixture Division. In meeting his own needs, it was necessary for Harrison to design and build special equipment to accomodate the coupon sorting, and he is now in the process of applying for a patent for his Circle Sort

MENTAL-HEALTH MONTH

The beautiful month of May is National Mental-Health Month. In a national survey of families, 73 percent of the family members (parents and teenagers) felt that mental health would be improved if people were more concerned about others and less concerned about their own

problems Dr. Karl Menninger, the famous psychiatrist, once gave a lecture on mental health and was answering questions from the audience. "What would you advise a person to do," asked one man, "if that person felt a nervous breakdown coming on?" Most people expected him to reply, "Consult your psychiatrist. To their astonishment he replied, "Lock up your house, go across the railway tracks, find someone in need and do something to help that per-

Although few, if any, of us may be on the verge of a nervous breakdown and still fewer can even find railway tracks to cross, Menninger's advice still rings true.

Much human energy is being spent worrying about how inflation or the energy crisis or rising food prices are affecting families. When worry engulfs a person, it is easy to forget about the human concerns of those in the family. Children, regardless of the country's economics, still need parents. They need parents who somehow can find the time and energy to be concerned about them

Children need their parents to help them understand life, the changes that are occurring within their bodies and among their friends. Children, at least most of them, need a parent who can listen to their concerns and help them interpret what is happening. As we worry about what this summer will bring or what the next paycheck won't bring, maybe we can remember Menninger's advice.

Lock up the worry and go find your child and do

I asked Mr. Beecher if he was a chemist, and he said that he was not. I said, "Mr. Beecher, you are adding water softeners." He did not agree with that. I have been a chemistry teacher, and I know quite a bit about water analysis

Here are the chemical ter-

1. The chlorine is little cakes of calcium chloride which dissolve in the water germicide

2. The ammonia is ammonium hydroxide - a good germicide

3. The manganese is potassium per manganate, a good germicide that veterinarians and others use to disinfect their instruments.

4. The potassium is potassium hydroxide (the basic ingredient in Grandma's lye soap and active in breaking down



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
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
