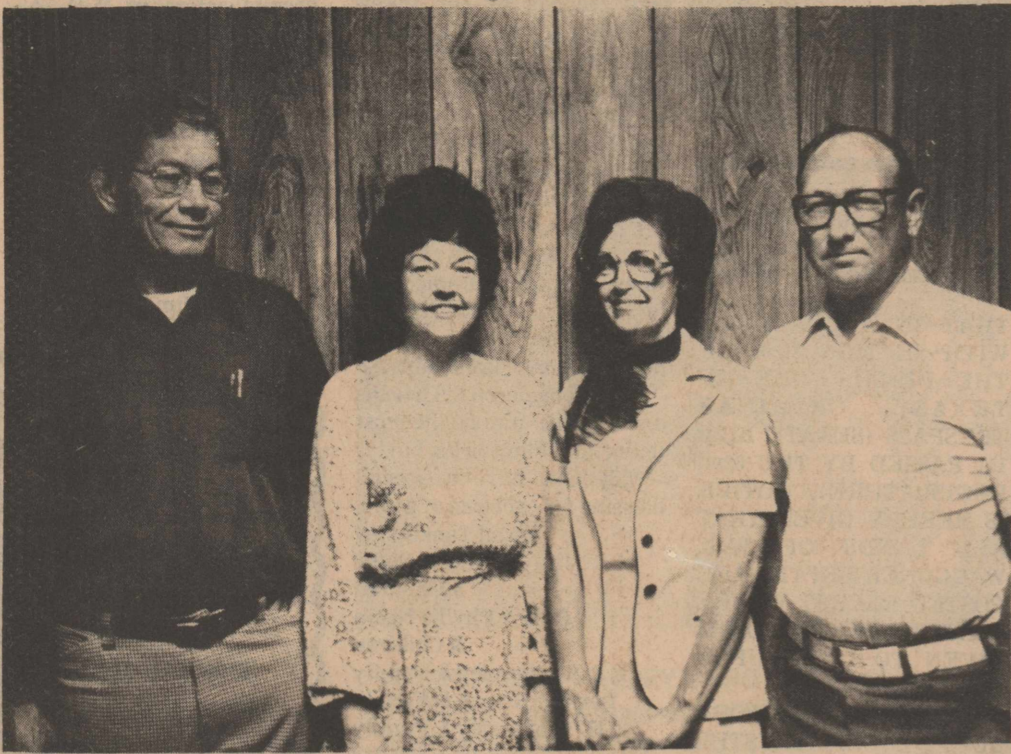

### Johnson Is State Runner-Up

Even though local Greyhound tracksters failed to bring home the state "gold" during Saturday's track and field meet in Austin, Coach Jimmy Rogers commented that the boys did their "best" and did bring home two new school records for their afternoon performances.

Knox City senior Dwayne Johnson brought home a silver medal for his performance in the 110 meter hurdles only one-tenth of a second behind first place winner Matthew Dixon of Eustace. Dwayne posted a 14.4 new school record time slightly behind Dixon's 14.3. The third through fifth place finishers in this contest were also timed one-tenth of a second apart from 14.5 to 14.7. Haskell's Joseph Browning finished the race in sixth place in a 15.0.

The 400 meter relay team of Johnson, Scott Lynn, Tim Roberson, and Rickey Gonzales placed fourth and set a new school record with their "best ever" time of a 42.5. According to Coach Jimmy Rogers, this was the "best we can run" as first place winners from Ganado raced to a whopping 41.8 time. The Hounds' 42.5 run was the winning time of last year's Class A State 400 meter relay winners, Rogers said.

Gonzales also ran in the 100 meter dash and Coach Rogers commented that he "ran well" at Saturday's meet.

In overall team totals, Knox City tied for seventh place with Florence, Crosbyton, and Stinnett with 16 points each. State champions in Class A were team members from Ganado with 42 points.

### EMS Benefit Collects \$266.53

A total of \$266.53 was collected at the Saturday night Benefit Jamboree for the Knox City EMS.

### Students To Assist In Program

A group of students from O'Brien Mid-School will be making a door-to-door drive in both O'Brien and Knox City next Monday, May 19, to assist in the Neighborhood Watch Program which was begun by the Knox City Study Club several years ago. Principal Charles Reed advised *The News* that one of the social study classes, "You and The Law", with Faye Reed and Ronnie Verhalen as instructors, would be delivering inventory forms to each household, and if the residents are not at home, the forms will be left inside the screen door.

The National Neighborhood Watch Program was instituted in 1972 by the National Sheriff's Association to help stem the increasing cases of burglaries and vandalism - especially those occurring in rural and suburban residential areas.

The "Hands Up" crime reduction project of the General Federation of Women's Clubs along with the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, urges residents to keep a personal property identification record and then keep the record in a safe place. Decals will also be furnished to residents to put on a front window or door to let the intentional burglar know that property has been marked.

### During Small Business Week

## Wes Tex Honored

Knox City is among the towns in the nation observing National Small Business Week, which began May 11 and continues through May 17.

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce decided that the special week provided a good opportunity to focus on one of its own, so Chamber director Dick Evatt and Chamber secretary-manager Doris Crownover advised *The News* that Wes Tex Coupon Clearing House had been chosen in Knox City for recognition.

The business is one that started with one employee fourteen years ago and has now expanded to fifteen.

Owner Bob Harrison began the coupon clearing firm in January 1967 with one employee who worked a half day once a week. After five years, the firm employed two fulltime and three parttime clerks, and after ten years, employed eight fulltime clerks. Now after thirteen years, fifteen persons are employed, and according to Harrison, if he could hire ten to fifteen more, the business could expand that much more.

The growing firm, located just east of Bob's Super Save, now processes 180,000 coupons weekly and serves eight states including Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Kansas, Colorado, and Missouri. Harrison said within the next four or five months the states of Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Florida, and Tennessee would be added.

Office manager is Billie Jean McAuley and other employees in addition to Harrison, his wife Bobbie, and son Rob include Judy Feemster, Rosa Rocha, Linda Parker, Irene Flores, Debbie Lindsay, Linda Fojtik, Jeri Mattes, Julie Pope, Peggy Gutierrez, Dorothy Cook, Gerri Watson, and Lidia Aguilera.

Rob Harrison and his wife, Belinda, returned here two years ago when Rob joined the firm where he now serves as vice-president in charge of accounts receivable and also in charge of shipping. Harrison explained that although Wes Tex Coupon Clearing House is not one of the largest, it is one of the more prestigious in that it is one of only fourteen firms recognized by a major manufacturer out of a field of seventy.

An IBM 32 computer was installed in August 1976 to assist in the tremendous workload. It was replaced in January 1979 with the IBM 34, which has an abundance of capabilities, Harrison explained. A Data Processing System was initiated last October, and a Payroll System that may be used by other firms was begun in January of this year. Harrison is currently running an 80 employee payroll for a customer and is working on a General Ledger System for his own

use, but may also be utilized by other firms when completed, he said.

Another new addition to the firm is the Fixture Division. In meeting his own needs, it was necessary for Harrison to design and build special equipment to accommodate the coupon sorting, and he is now in the process of applying for a patent for his Circle Sort

fixtures. Harrison was pleased that the Chamber had selected his firm for the honor, and informed *The News* that anyone who might be interested in seeing how the coupon clearing house is operated is invited to take a tour of the facilities Thursday afternoon from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m.

# Planting Date Could Affect Weevil Number

Weather conditions during the spring and early summer will to a large degree determine the size of the boll weevil population in the infested areas below the Caprock. However, farmers in infested areas, which includes most in Knox County, should be aware of the factors involved in both late and early planting as far as weevils are concerned.  
Early plantings -- in some cases -- give time to set a crop before large weevil populations develop. Early plantings will also attract early emerging weevils and actually serve as trap crops. April cotton provides early food and breeding sites and allows for extra generations.  
If farmers in weevil infested areas would avoid planting until May 10 through the 15, some early emerging weevils would die from lack of food. If planting takes place over a long period --

early to late -- emerging weevils are assured of a constant food supply, probably resulting in heavier over-all infestations.  
This past winter has been an ideal climate for overwintering for weevils and early emerging weevils should be numerous to start with. By avoiding early plantings we can cut off these pests food supply and control their numbers. This will give us a head start instead of us giving them a head start.
