City Council Members Have Varied Agenda

During the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night of last week, a proposal submitted by Ernest L. Andrews, consulting engineer, to study the city's drainage problems was considered. In order to secure accurate information and to prepare a detailed report with recommendations, a field survey crew would have to secure elevations all over town, including the fringe areas, according to city manager Faye Railsback. Then a contour map could be prepared from which existing drainage and proposed drainage could be recommended estimated costs. Mr. Andrews estimated the cost of the study to be \$4,000.00 to

City officials are hopeful that residents will express their feelings regarding longrange plans for accomplishing drainage and flood control for the city and especially to secure feelings of thes citizens regarding the immediate plans for a study. Mrs. Railsback asks that persons advise city officials of their feelings vila letter in order that the city may have the records in its files.

Other business considered was the purchase of a new backhoe loader. Delivery of the new machine is expected in approximately one week, Mrs. Railsback said.

The council re-appointed Joe M. Clonts to serve as a director of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. Other directors are Leon Burkham of Knox City, Tom Watson and R.C. Couch of Haskell, Lee Bruce and Clint Norman of Munday, and Jack Beaty and W.B. Neighbours of Goree.

The public hearing on the city budget and revenue sharing funds was held prior to adopting an ordinance approving the budget for the City of Knox City and levying taxes for the support of the

municipal government. Several interested persons met with the council to discuss possible uses of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Depot which has been donated to the city for civic use. Plans are currently underway to move the building onto city property, Mrs. Railsback said.

Bullock said that while most cities will receive a larger check this month compared to the same period last year he doesn't believe it's because the state's economy is growing at a robust pace.

'We've been tinkering around with our processing system to improve it over the past few months and as a result fund allocations and rebates have shot up from time to time because of improved handling of tax accounts," he said.

Bullock said overall sales tax collections from the first of the fiscal year through April are up only 21.5 percent compared to last year.



Flouridation Grant Is **Approved**

Joe Clonts, a director of Worth Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, received a letter recently from Pete Beecher, manager of NCTMWA, that he had received approval on the grant for the flouridation program.

The Dental Association had discussed the low flouride contents of the water from Millers Creek with Board members and said that it was necessary to install equipment to add flouride. The cost was estimated at \$15,000 for the "turnkey" job.

"After many pages of paper work in the office on the negotiations in acquiring the grant, it was finally approved. The "turnkey" job which the engineers proposed was greater than the Grant funds would allow, but by doing most of the installation with the personnel of the Authority and by using the guidelines and blueprints of the engineers, we will be able to do the work," Mr. Beecher

Clonts stated that he knew that the people of Knox City would be glad to know of the grant's approval.

The interest rate for shortterm loans for farm operating purposes is fourteen percent (14%). Longterm loans are being made at an interest rate of fourteen percent (14%), also.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unalbe to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans, based on the emergency designation, can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.
