## City Council Members Have Varied Agenda

During the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night of last week, a proposal submitted by Ernest L. Andrews, consulting engineer, to study the city's drainage problems was considered. In order to secure accurate information and to prepare a detailed report with recommendations, a field survey crew would have to secure elevations all over town, including the fringe areas, according to city manager Faye Railsback. Then a contour map could be prepared from which existing drainage and proposed drainage could be recommended with estimated costs. Mr. Andrews estimated the cost of the study to be \$4,000.00 to \$5,000.00.

City officials are hopeful that residents will express their feelings regarding long-range plans for accomplishing drainage and flood control for the city and especially to secure feelings of these citizens regarding the immediate plans for a study. Mrs. Railsback asks that persons advise city officials of their feelings via letter in or-

der that the city may have the records in its files.

Other business considered was the purchase of a new backhoe loader. Delivery of the new machine is expected in approximately one week, Mrs. Railsback said.

The council re-appointed Joe M. Clonts to serve as a director of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. Other directors are Leon Burkham of Knox City, Tom Watson and R.C. Couch of Haskell, Lee Bruce and Clint Norman of Munday, and Jack Beaty and W.B. Neighbours of Goree.

The public hearing on the city budget and revenue sharing funds was held prior to adopting an ordinance approving the budget for the City of Knox City and levying taxes for the support of the municipal government.

Several interested persons met with the council to discuss possible uses of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad Depot which has been donated to the city for civic use. Plans are currently underway to move the building onto city property, Mrs. Railsback said.

## Sales Tax 60% Above Last Year

AUSTIN -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said May rebates to Texas cities of the one-percent city sales tax will amount to \$38.7 million.

Knox City's net payment for this period is \$4,424.13 as compared to \$798.05 for the same period last year. Payments to date in 1980 are \$21,531.53 as compared to \$13,448.12 in 1979, reflecting a 60% increase.

Other area towns and the amount of their checks for this period include Munday, \$1,740.90; Aspermont, \$2,722.66; Anson, \$4,467.96; Crowell, \$1,129.70; Haskell, \$8,834.88; Hamlin, \$5,325.26; Paducah, \$4,017.49; Rochester, \$2,952.84; Rule, \$1,059.59; Seymour, \$8,183.89; Stamford, \$8,176.24; Throckmorton, \$5,312.37.

Bullock said that while most cities will receive a larger check this month compared to the same period last year he doesn't believe it's because the state's economy is growing at a robust pace.

"We've been tinkering around with our processing system to improve it over the past few months and as a result fund allocations and rebates have shot up from time to time because of improved handling of tax accounts," he said.

Bullock said overall sales tax collections from the first of the fiscal year through April are up only 21.5 percent compared to last year.

## Flouridation Grant Is Approved

Joe Clonts, a director of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, received a letter recently from Pete Beecher, manager of NCTMWA, that he had received approval on the grant for the flouridation program.

The Dental Association had discussed the low flouride contents of the water from Millers Creek with Board members and said that it was necessary to install equipment to add flouride. The cost was estimated at \$15,000 for the "turnkey" job.

"After many pages of paper work in the office on the negotiations in acquiring the grant, it was finally approved. The "turnkey" job which the engineers proposed was greater than the Grant funds would allow, but by doing most of the installation with the personnel of the Authority and by using the guidelines and blueprints of the engineers, we will be able to do the work," Mr. Beecher said.

Clonts stated that he knew that the people of Knox City would be glad to know of the grant's approval.

## O'Brien To Raise Rates On Water

The water system connecting the City of O'Brien to the Millers Creek Water Authority is nearing completion.

Because of the increase in cost to the City for purchasing the Millers Creek water, it will be necessary to increase the water rate from 75 cents per one thousand gallons to \$2.25 per thousand gallons for all water above the minimum charge. The minimum charge will remain at \$4.00 for the first one thousand gallons.

The price change will go in effect the first complete month the Millers Creek water is used by the City, officials said.

Healy was appointed to the office of District Attorney of the 50th Judicial District in February 1970 by former Governor Preston Smith to fill the unexpired term when the office was vacated by Clyde Whiteside on his appointment to the Board of Pardons and Paroles. In 1972, Healy ran for election without opposition and has held the office since that time. During the recent primary election, Healy won in a close contest with Larry Evans of Childress for his reelection to office.

Born February 11, 1944, in Wichita Falls, Healy moved to Paducah in 1947, where he now resides. He graduated from Paducah High School in 1962 and after graduation from PHS, Healy attended Baylor University and the University of Colorado. He graduated from Baylor University in 1966 with a BBA degree and from Baylor University School of Law in 1967 with a JD degree.

After his graduation from law school, Healy worked as assistant district attorney in the office of District Attorney Frank Coffey in Tarrant County from January 1968 until February 1969, when he returned to Paducah to practice law with his father, W.S. Healy.

Healy is married to the former Betty Burris of Weir, Mississippi, and they have

three daughters, Johnnie Green, Karen Lynn, and Marianne. He has served as District Attorney for the 50th Judicial District which includes Cottle, King, Knox, and Baylor Counties for the past nine years.

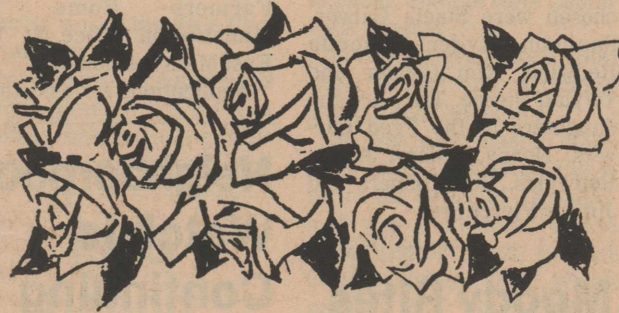

## Emergency Loans Are Available

Emergency loans for farmers and ranchers are available through the Knox County office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), according to Joe T. Boone, FmHA county supervisor.

Boone asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought from August 1, 1979, through May 5, 1980, make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 1101 East Main in Knox City. Applications for assistance

in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by FmHA until February 18, 1981, for physical losses and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment of buildings, including homes, lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to make major adjustments in a farming or ranching operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," the county supervisor said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent (5%) and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending on the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for short-term loans for farm operating purposes is fourteen percent (14%). Long-term loans are being made at an interest rate of fourteen percent (14%), also.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans, based on the emergency designation, can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

## Neighborhood Watch Is Continuing

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD Mid-School faculty and eighth grades will be cooperating with the National Sheriffs' Association, Local Law Enforcement Agencies, and the Knox City Study Club to promote the National Neighborhood Watch Program.

The program began locally with a fall of '79 meeting called by Lena McGee of the Knox City Study Club. The meeting was attended by local law enforcement personnel, Chamber of Commerce officials, and City and School officials. Plans called for appearances by Mrs. McGee and law enforcement officials before various civic and school groups.

This year's activities will conclude with the school groups' distributing Neighborhood Watch Program material to each home and business in Knox City and O'Brien.

Everyone is encouraged to use the material with the hope that the efforts will help to reduce crimes in our area.
