





No-holds-barred ...", and finally. "Guilty or Not

... No-holds-barred ...", and finally, "Guilty or Not Guilty" - "a bizarre case history involves drugs, sex, hypnotism, and 'maybe' murder."

And what about the children? Between 1:30 - 9:00 P.M., they will be able to see at least 11 "R" rated movies (at least five more starting at 9:00) and only one "G" played five times over. This is in addition to the "Entertaining" shows mentioned above. Do you have a guarantee your children will not go to someone else's home to see these "R" movies and shows?

If you had a choice now between H.B.O. & Atlanta

Use either a water bath canner or a pressure canner for home canning -- and know the difference between the

Water bath canners will safely preserve high acid foods, such as tomatoes, fruits and pickles. These foods need only reach boiling point temperature for safe processing.

On the other hand, pressure canners are a "must" for

New Mexico Man Convicted Of Fraud

An Albuquerque man was sentenced in Federal Court in Albuquerque, New Mexico, on Monday, June 23, for defrauding the Social Security Administration, according to James Harper, manager of the Vernon Social Security Office.

Raymond Lucero pled guilty to charges of falsely stating to the Social Security District Office Albuquerque that he was not working in order to receive supplemental security income (SSI) disability benefits, Harper said. Lucero was sentenced to a one year suspended prison term, five years probation, and was ordered to repay the \$2,728 he illegally received. SSI is a program which provides cash assistance to the needy who are 65 or over, blind or disable.

The case against Lucero was developed by a social security investigative unit responsible for uncovering illegal activities relating to social security and supplemental security income benefits, Harper concluded.

Also, microwave ovens produce an uneven heat transfer, so jar centers probably do not reach a temperature high enough to sterilize food.

As a second safety step, heat all home-canned food on the stove top before eating --10 minutes for pints of food, 15 degrees F. -- the temperature minutes for quarts.

That will kill any botulism required to kill any botulism toxin that may have formed toxin-producing organisms because of improper canning which can thrive on low-acid

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Do not use a microwave oven for heating homecanned foods, either. Resear-

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


