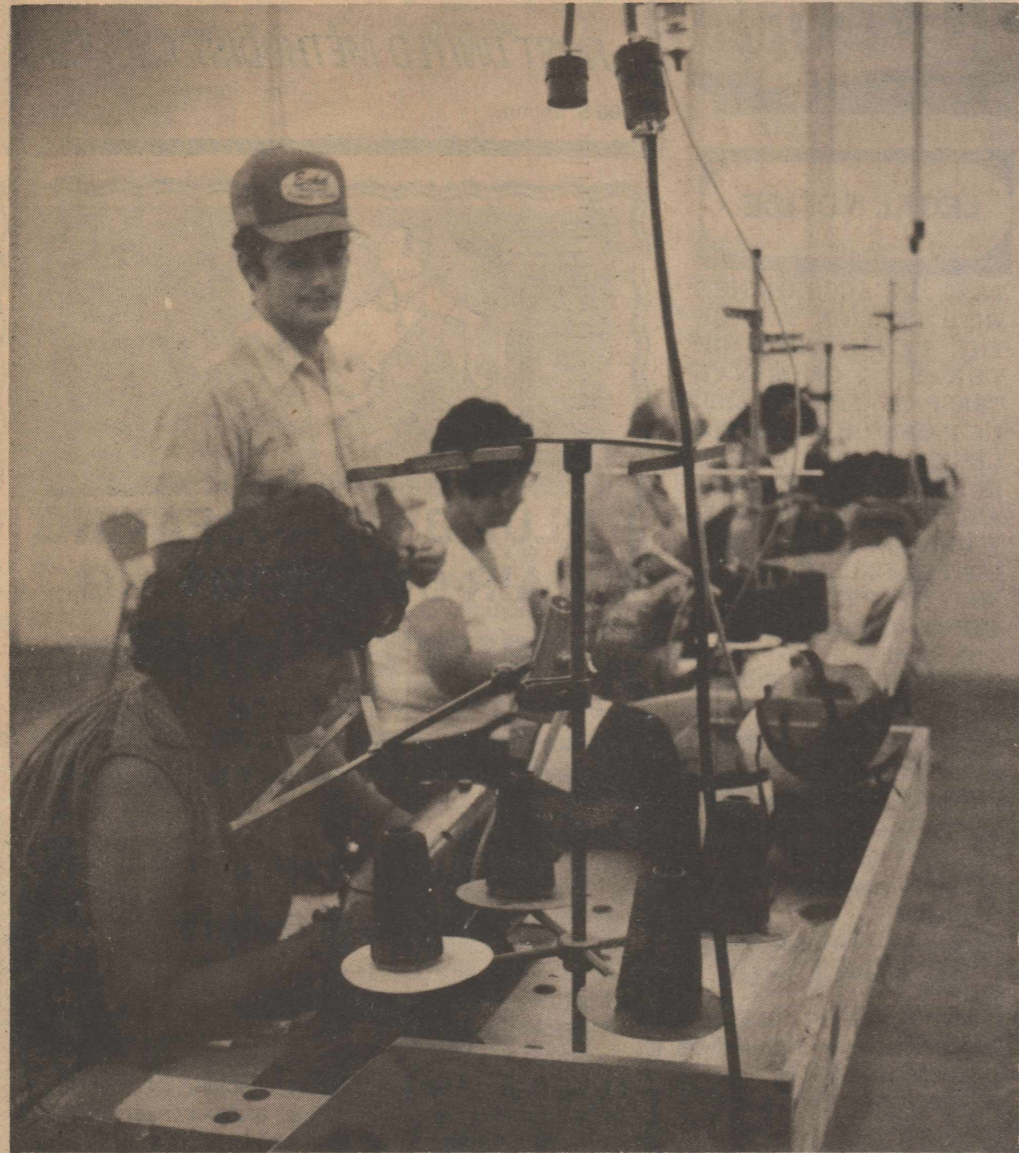

New Industry Opens

A new industry began in Knox City on Monday, August 18, when Crowell Cap Company opened a branch of its corporation here.

Joe Setliff of Crowell, manager, said that local men in Crowell invested in the venture in February 1974 and opened a Quanah branch in 1976.

Four employees are now operating machines in the Knox City plant after training a week in Crowell. Four others are in Crowell this week and will begin here next Monday, according to Tim Christopher, mechanic, who is in charge of the Knox City personnel. Christopher has been with the company for the past five years and com-

mutates from Crowell. The new industry is located in the former Gulf Service Station building on North Central Avenue. The facilities have been completely remodeled and will accommodate 15 machines. Setliff explained that the company anticipates hiring 15 employees fulltime as soon as it can efficiently train personnel to work.

The men said that it requires 13 operations in the manufacture of a cap, and two of these are presently being done in the Knox City plant.

4-H Adult Leaders Hear Summer Reports

The Knox County 4-H Adult Leaders Association met at the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin Tuesday night, August 19.

Reports on the activities of the county 4-H members during the summer were given by Knox County Extension Agents Jim Mazurkiewicz and April Werley. Knox County 4-H'ers participated in 27 different activities and projects during the summer months. The group complimented the county agents on their efforts and success in getting so many of the county's youth involved in 4-H programs.

A report was given by Richard Daniel of Knox City on his trip to Washington, D.C., on the 4-H Heritage Tour this summer.

Plans for the annual Achievement Awards Banquet were discussed.

The group voted to have welcome signs erected on all major highways into the county to be financed and put up by the various 4-H clubs. A donation was made by the Truscott community to pur-

chase and erect their sign and it will be put in place as soon as possible.

Ed Daniel of Knox City was appointed by association president Bob Cude of Goree to represent the Adult Leaders Association at the Knox County Livestock Show meeting Tuesday and present the group's views on obtaining a County 4-H and FFA activity building and possible means of financing this project available at this time.

President Cude reminded the group that the district Adult Leaders meeting will be September 11 in Memphis. Knox County delegates are Linda Griffith of Benjamin and Wink Partridge of Munday. Any member of Adult Leaders Association who wishes to attend the district meeting may do so. Anyone planning to attend should notify the county agent's office by September 5.

Boone Applies For 4-H Congress

According to Knox County Extension Agent Jim Mazurkiewicz, Kelley Boone's application to serve as a delegate to the National 4-H Congress has been sent to College Station for consideration at the state level.

Kelley was one of two District III 4-H'ers whose applications passed the district level and will now be given consideration at the state level.

Only six 4-H members from Texas will serve as state delegates to the National 4-H Congress in Washington, D.C. next spring.

Kelley has been active in 4-H for eight years and has served as an officer in the Knox City club, as well as a district council delegate.

A senior at Knox City High School, Kelley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Boone.

Enrollment Totals Are Announced

First day enrollment totals for the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District have been released by school officials.

The overall total of elementary, mid-school, and high school classes tallied 391 which is slightly up from last year's figure of 385 pupils. The 1978 total for first day of classes was 395.

In the elementary grades, 33 students reported for class in kindergarten with 30 in first grade. Total for the second grade was 27 students, third grade reported 34 children, and the fourth grade had 30 to report. These five classes tallied 154 students.

Mid-school had 117 students report at O'Brien. Fifth grade had a total of 27 students on the first day of school with 27 reporting in the sixth grade. Forty students were present in the seventh grade class for the largest total of any of the school classes, while 23 were accounted for in the eighth grade.

Thirty-four freshmen were present for their first day of high school classes with 33 reporting in the sophomore class. Juniors had a total of 27 with 26 seniors present. Total for the high school was 120 students.

Thirty children registered for the early childhood program, officials said.

crashed. According to Christensen, he was flying out with a load heading east, skirting the edge of a tiny thunderstorm. He said that when he saw dirt 'boiling' up from the ground even though light rain was falling, he realized that turbulence was ahead, so he turned to the north to avoid it, but it was too late. "A tremendous downdraft caught me. I kept thinking the draft would let go and I

could fly out of it, but it forced me to the ground," the veteran pilot explained. The accident occurred about 5:00 p.m. five miles east of Knox City.

buttons complimented the front of the gown and the sleeves. The three tiered skirt was accented with lace and ruffles. She wore a picture hat with a net band.

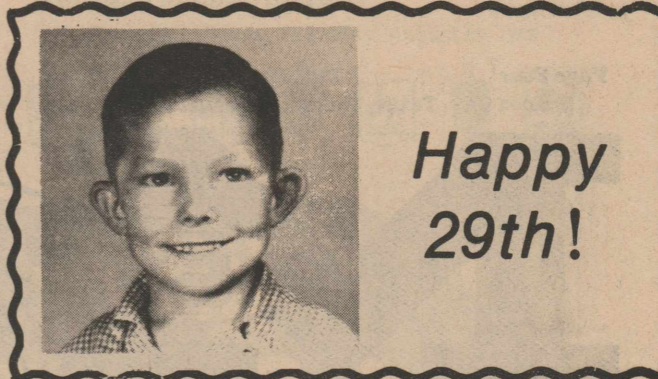
