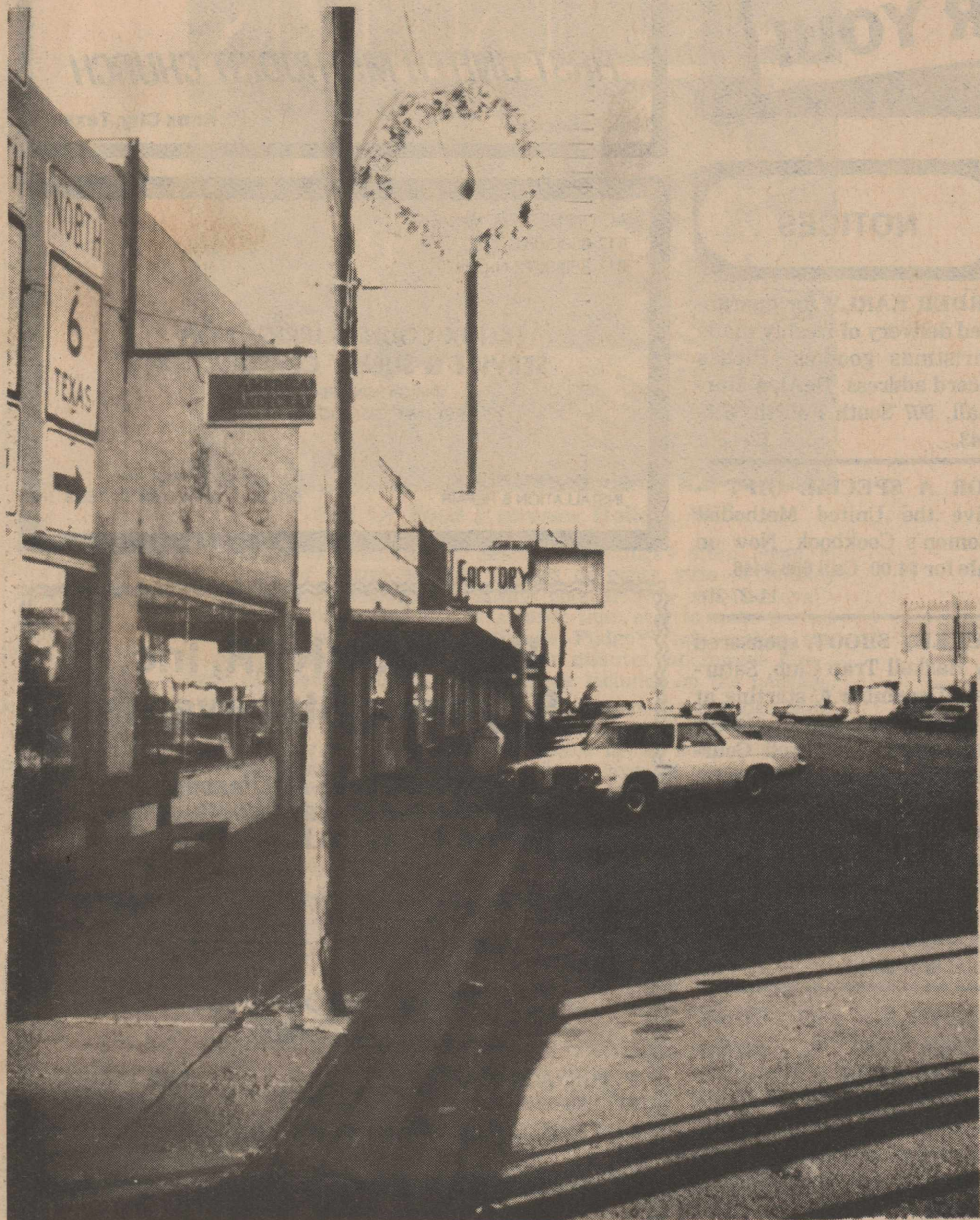

GED Test Slated For Saturday

The General Educational Development Test will be given in the official testing center, the Haskell Junior High School Library, on Saturday, December 6, beginning at 9:00 a.m. There is a fee for the battery of five tests. An applicant is advised to bring his Social Security Number and driver's license for proper identification.

The multiple choice test battery has five parts including writing skills, social studies, science, reading skills and mathematics. Three of the tests have an hour's time limit, while two (social studies and science) have a limitation of one and one half hours. Therefore, most examinees take six hours to complete the test battery.

Persons eligible for testing must:

- be a resident of Texas or a member of the Armed Forces stationed in Texas;
- be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year.

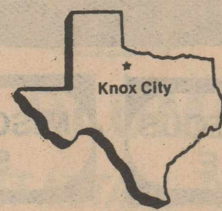
Applicants who have attained their 17th birthday and will enter the Armed Forces may test immediately after withdrawing from school.

To receive a certificate of high school equivalency, the examinee must:

- complete the examination with a minimum standard score of 40 on each of the five tests or average standard score of 45 on all five tests.
- have attained at least their 17th birthday prior to date of testing and be out of school for one calendar year.

The GED Program provides a means for determining the educational level of adults who have not completed a formal high school education. A certificate of high school equivalency will be issued to adults who successfully complete the GED examination. This verifies that the holder has demonstrated a level of competence on the examination which is equivalent to that of a high school senior.

Local Man Burned In Oil Tank Blaze

Bruce Railsback suffered second degree burns on his hands, one arm, neck and ears Saturday morning about 8:30 when he was making his rounds for General American Oil Co., by whom he is employed.

According to reports, the accident occurred on a lease south of Rochester when a hose slipped out and over the side of a tank he was circulating, he ran to cut the pump off and was covered with oil. A spark from the motor caught the motor and Railsback on fire. He attempted to put out the flames by rolling on the ground, but when unable to extinguish the fire, he jumped up. Bruce's mother, Mrs. Don Railsback, said that another son, Brent from Garland, who was here for Thanksgiving holidays, had accompanied Bruce on his rounds and fortunately was able to put out the flames with his hands and loose dirt.

HOW TO MAKE A POPCORN WREATH

Public Warned Of No-Tobacco Cigarettes

There are hazards involved in inhaling any kind of smoke into the lungs, says the North Texas Lung Association. Including smoke from tobacco-free cigarettes.

A new brand of cigarettes is now being promoted nationwide. Available in both regular and menthol ver-

sions, the product looks like a conventional cigarette. But it contains cocoa beans, puffed wheat, citrus fruit derivatives, and chemical flavoring agents.

What the new cigarettes is not free of, says the North Texas Lung Association is carbon monoxide, other gases and compounds created by burning beans, chemical additives, and flavoring. Although cocoa beans, puffed wheat, and citrus derivatives may be good to eat, says the lung association, burning them to inhale into the lungs is another matter.

A spokesman from the company marketing the product says it is aimed at attracting "a growing number of health-conscious smokers." The company is planning a multi-million-dollar radio and television advertising campaign. Because the cigarette contains no tobacco, the product would be the first cigarette promotion allowed on the airwaves since Congress voted to ban tobacco cigarette commercials a decade ago. In many states, the cigarette will be exempt from special tobacco taxes.

According to the manufacturers, the aroma of the non-tobacco smoke was one of the most difficult problems to be overcome by the company's chemists and flavor consultants. Although a similar cigarette, composed largely of the shredded husks of cocoa beans, was test-marked in 1977, the product was not suitable for large-scale distribution until scientists added chemicals and citrus derivatives to the cocoa base to diminish its smell.

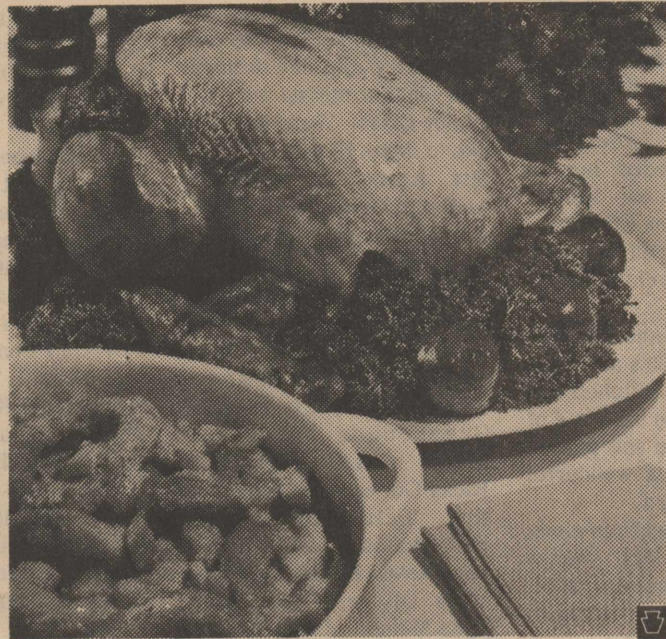

The cost of a center pivot sprinkler irrigation system is naturally very important when considering the purchase of one. But the initial cost is only a small part of your total investment. Service, operating cost, and maintenance cost should also be examined and weighed before making any decision about purchasing one of these systems.

Center pivot sprinkler systems should be custom designed to fit the type of irrigation water delivery system you have to supply it. Every design will be different because there are no two farm units with exactly the same irrigation water delivery system. A sprinkler system designed to work using 600 gallons per minute will not be worth your investment if you only have 400 gallons per minute in your irrigation wells to begin with. All irrigation wells that will be supplying water to the sprinkler system should be measured and their flow calculated to show their true performance during peak use periods in the irrigation season. Naturally, if you measure the wells' flow during the non-irrigating season, the wells can be pumping as much as twice the amount they will actually supply during the irrigation season. The consumptive water use of the crops you will

be growing under the center pivot sprinkler should also be considered in the design of the system. Different soil types will make a difference in the design of a sprinkler system. A sandy soil will take in more water faster and have less runoff than a tighter clay soil. The system should be designed to take all of these conditions into consideration.

An irrigation regulating reservoir can be used to assist an existing irrigation system so that it can supply water to a center pivot sprinkler system very efficiently. These reservoirs can be either a pit type excavated out of the ground or a tank like structure, either concrete or steel, located above ground. These reservoirs can be used to store water pumped from small wells so that a center pivot or side roll sprinkler will have enough water to run efficiently. If you have more than two irrigation wells that you want to use as the water supply for a sprinkler, you should think very seriously about using a regulating reservoir system. The initial investment is very

small and the savings in energy and the increase in crop yields can be increased greatly. These irrigation regulating reservoirs have recently been added to the list of practices that the ASCS office will provide cost-sharing assistance on through its annual program.

If you are interested in improving your irrigation system or purchasing a center pivot or side roll sprinkler system, stop by the Knox City Soil Conservation Service office and talk to us first. We are sincerely interested in seeing that you get the maximum benefits from your irrigation system. If you already have a sprinkler system and you are not satisfied with its performance, drop by or give us a call. We will evaluate the system on the ground for you and make recommendations on how the system can be improved to operate more efficiently.

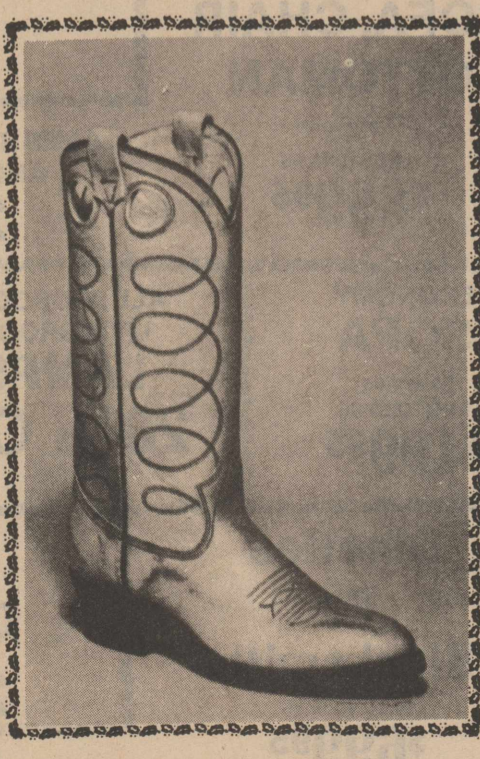

Parent Care Centers Allow Mom To Drop In, Not Out

"When the pressures of childrearing build up, drop in to a parent support group before you resort to dropping out," encourages Bernice Weissbourd, founder of Family Focus Parent Care Centers.

Family Focus, Inc., recently has launched four prototype parent "drop-in" centers in the Midwest, "from which we hope to foster a nationwide network of community based centers to serve parent needs," explains Weissbourd.

Weissbourd, president of Family Focus, Inc., and a member of the Kentucky Fried Chicken Time Out Institute, is working with fellow Institute members to construct a profile of the mothering role in the 80's and to share positive information about parenting. The Institute was founded in 1977 by Kentucky Fried Chicken to contribute to the information available about the changing roles of American women; the problems, needs and concerns of its most important customers—women ages 25-49.

The free drop-in centers offer parents a supportive environment with resources ranging from professional guidance staff to vocational training. While children are cared for by responsive child-care givers, mothers and fathers participate in discussion sessions on a wide range of topics from nutrition and tantrums (dealing with the 2-year-old) to personal issues of marital crises and child abuse. "Not all parent needs are problematic," explains Weissbourd, "some are just the normal stress of growing yourself as your children grow up."

The Family Focus Centers are not a drop-off place,



stresses Weissbourd. The mothers and fathers who use the centers, "drop in to socialize, get assistance and become involved in upgrading their lot as effective parents."

Parents can be their own source of help and guidance, the Time Out Institute member says. "Though we have a full-time professional staff at each of the centers, equally important are the self-help groups parents organize as their own support systems for discussions, or for practical help such as baby-sitting exchanges.

The scope of parental involvement and commitment to the support group idea is evidenced in The Parents' Pages, a directory written by Family Focus members for the parents of young children. The topics, tips and lists of resource aids are a compendium of parental concerns today. Quality child care, pre- and post-natal and pediatric health care, smart shopping advice for juvenile clothing and furnishings all are included in the book.

"Parents are being pushed and pulled from every direction today," Weissbourd says. "Support centers can help them be the good parents they want to be—a task increasingly difficult in our complex society."




