Nine Locals Named To 'Maingate' Honor

MAINGATE (Mentor Approach: Individualizing Needs In Gifted And Talented Education), educators and students met for their second Region wide meeting last month at Chaparral campsite west of Wichita Falls.

While advisers of students participating in Region IX's new program for gifted and talented students attended a session conducted by Program Coordinator Beth Francell, the 83 students from 11 Region IX schools heard brief talks from 15 business and professional people.

Knox City High School participants were Adam White, Krisit Boone, Jay Rutherford, Kay Howell, Ray Farmer, Patty Durham, Melissa Whitley, Karae Beason, and Kelley Boone. The presentors, who gave descriptions of their jobs, were selected because each represented areas of vocational interest expressed by the students at a previous meeting.

Robert Helton-law, Bill Marcell-criticism and journalism, Paulette Koncel-social work, Ralph Perkins-architecture, Bob Swartz-public relations, sales and advertising, Bill Warren-television, public relations and meteorology, Dr. Robert Delizio-medicine and cancer research and Danny Cavasos-engineering discussed their professional areas in the morning session.

Afternoon presentors were Dave Allred-law, politics, journalism, sales, teaching and ministry, Lynn Manely-accounting, sociology and oil business, Mike Parks-computer science, Dr. Michael Gerlach and Midwestern State University Students Gary Meer, David Berton, Cay Boren and Stacy Haynie-theatre arts and music, Ruth Donnell-fashion design and advertising, Wayne McKamie-psychology and Lyndell Haigood-banking.

Objectives of student activities in the MAINGATE program aim at helping students identify career field aptitudes, become aware of economic factors influencing career opportunities and perceive career relevance to high school subjects.

Students who participate in MAINGATE will be informed regarding preparation for a career, sources of occupational literature, job acquisition and retention methods and career field entrance requirements.

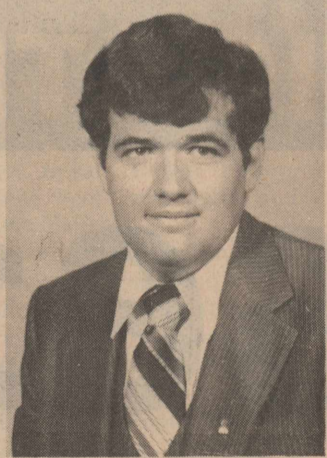
They will have opportunities to pursue a special interest area, become well acquainted with someone in the field of interest and

examine their own self-concepts and values.

At the same time it is hoped that they will gain insights into personal needs, interests and abilities, into lifestyles, personal characteristics and responsibilities of individuals in the career field, into career planning and goal setting and into career development, career path changes, branching and career lattices.

Students will develop abilities to formulate intermediate steps toward their career goal attainment and to exercise planning and decision making skills in formulation an independent study project in a field of interest.

The staff development program is presented by the Texas Education Agency for teachers and educators involved in programs for the gifted and talented.

Singleton Is Degree Candidate

FORT WORTH, TEXAS -- Benjamin Holmes Singleton was among 275 candidates receiving degrees December 19 from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary here.

Harold C. Bennett, executive secretary-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention was commencement speaker. Seminary president Russell H. Dillard Jr. conferred the degrees.

Singleton received the Master of Religious Education degree. He earned the B.S. degree in 1978 from Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.

He is currently minister of youth and education for First Baptist Church in Knox City.

Southwestern is the largest of six such institutions owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Convention.

According to Dr. Severo Gomez, TEA associate commissioner, education for special populations, some 166 Texas school districts are now offering special gifted and talented education programs to students who have shown high intellectual ability, special subject area aptitude, creativity or leadership ability.

MAINGATE is a Region IX Education Service Center program, funded for the pilot year 1980-81 as a joint venture with 11 school districts. Schools participating are Archer City, Bowie, Henrietta, Holliday, Jacksboro, Knox City, Nocona, Olney, Saint Jo, Throckmorton and Winthorst.

Students are now in the process of selecting a career field and being paired with a mentor (a volunteer who will take a personal interest in the student and provide guidance in a particular career field).

The next Region wide MAINGATE meeting is scheduled for January 27.

The baby has a brother, Jason, 2, who is at home with chicken pox and is being cared for by his grandmother, Mrs. Eddie Yost of Perryton, while his mother is in the hospital and his father and grandfather, Eddie Yost, are in Dallas with the baby.

Mrs. Edens said that the baby is in the Premie Ward At Methodist Hospital and reports are that he is doing well. Dr. Thompson receives daily reports from the Dallas doctor and if everything continues to go as expected, the baby should be able to return home before too long.

The Edens moved to Knox City several months ago from Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, and Mr. Edens is a civil engineer, employed by the U.S. Corps of Engineers at Truscott.

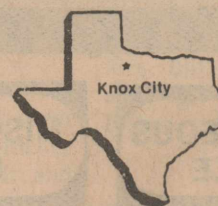

NTOGA Pays Reward

The North Texas Oil and Gas Association has announced that it recently paid \$1500 in cash rewards to citizens for information relating to oilfield thefts.

According to George E. Kadane, NTOGA president, the information involved multiple sources and the \$1500 total was shared by more than one person. "It would be inappropriate to release the names of the recipients or even to describe the circumstances of the case," Kadane said. "The case is still under investigation, additional persons may be charged and it is critical that we protect the identity of our sources," he added.

Kadane did comment that none of the recipients were directly in the oil business. "We are dealing with good, honest citizens who were simply alert enough to note circumstances where the probability was high that stolen equipment was involved," Kadane said. Information was given by the informants to law enforcement officers who are still

developing the case. The NTOGA program offers maximum rewards of \$2500 for information leading to the return of property, arrest and indictment of persons involved in the theft of members' oilfield property. The program began in May, 1980.

Ed S. Spragins, who heads the NTOGA anti-theft efforts, said that the North Texas program seems to have inspired increased anti-theft work in other oil producing areas. "We expect a statewide program to be instituted and will be meeting with representatives of Governor Clements in January to discuss the matter," he said.

Oilfield theft has been estimated to cost the industry \$100-200 million nationally each year. The total in North Texas may be about \$10 million annually, sources estimate. Any citizen with information related to oilfield theft is asked to contact local law enforcement officers or the North Texas Oil and Gas Association at (817) 723-4131.

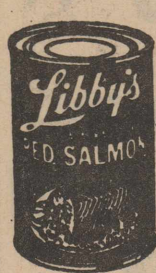

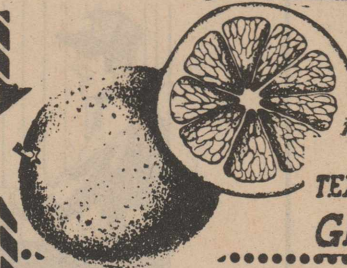
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Basketball Tourney Results Are Told
