Livestock Shows Slated Jan. 8-9-10

The Knox City-O'Brien Junior Livestock Show has been scheduled Thursday (tonight) at 7:00 p.m. in the Show Barn on the Knox City campus. Originally slated for Saturday, January 3, the show was re-scheduled due to students being out for the school holidays, officials said.

Dennis Brooks, vocational ag teacher of Iowa Park, will serve as judge.

Immediately following the local show, the annual Knox County Junior Livestock Show will be held in Knox City this year on January 9-10.

The show alternates each year between Munday and Knox City and this year's show site will be the Show Barn on the Knox City campus.

The county show will begin Friday at 4:00 p.m. with the broiler judging, followed by the breeding sheep and rabbit competition.

Saturday's show begins at 10:00 a.m. with the market swine judging, followed by dairy cattle, breeding beef, and steers.

General chairman of the show will be O.L. Patterson Jr., with Wink Partridge as his assistant. Jim Mazurkiewicz, County Extension Agent, is secretary, and Leona Burkham, treasurer.

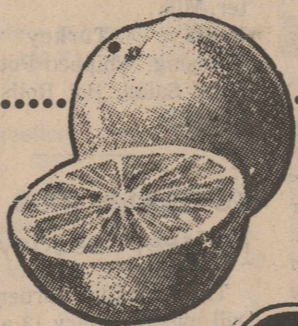
