Bullock Warns Of Sales Tax Increase

AUSTIN, Tex.-State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday warned any increase in local sales taxes would lead to an income tax in Texas.

He said the cities, counties, a few hospital districts and some school boards are now on record wanting the Legislature to give them additional sales tax authority.

Texans have accepted the sales tax in its present form but it would cease to be painless if every level of government tried to get a slice of the sales tax pie.

"We now have a four percent state sales tax and more than a thousand cities have adopted an additional one percent tax and two cities have a mass transit sales tax," he said.

"That adds up to five, five and a-half or six percent depending where you live. If every level of government that wants a sales tax gets one, I wouldn't be surprised the sales tax reach 10 percent." Bullock said, "and that would be two percent over New York's--the nation's highest.'

The rate would be so high that state government would lose forever the ability to run to the sales tax for revenue and would be forced into an income tax just like 45 other states have done.

Example: a typical off-highway motorcycle uses 18.8 gallons of gas a year-about a third of the amount wasted by an untuned automobile in the same period.

Cotton Harvest Almost Complete

The 1980-81 cotton harvest was almost completed before being delayed by light rain last Thursday. B.B. Manly that cotton producers made substantial progress with the harvest during the past two weeks, but several thousand bales of seed cotton remain on gin yards waiting to be ginned. About 37,000 cotton samples were classed at the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office in Abilene during the week ending January 8, which brought the seasonal total to 156,000. An additional 9600 samples were classed at Munday, bringing the seasonal total to 29,000 at that office. The combined total of 185,000 compares to about 809,000 samples classed at the two offices by this time last

Local cotton prices were weak to one cent per pound lower during the past week. Staple 31 or longer cotton sold at 33 to 37 cents per pound over loan values, and staple 30 or shorter cotton sold at 28 to 33 cents over the loan. Grade 42, staple 31 cotton miking 35 to 49 sold at 76 to 781/2 cents per pound. Demand was mostly moderate, and trading was also moderate. Cottonseed prices paid producers ranged from \$110

to \$125 per ton. The quality of cotton

classed in Abilene was slightly lower than that of the previous week. Grades were one percent white, 30 per cent light-spotted, 66 percent spotted, and about three percent tinged. Grade 53 continued as the predominant grade classed at 35 per cent. Grade 43 comprised 26 per cent, grade 52 comprised 17 per cent, and grade 42 comprised 10 per cent of the samples classed. About six percent were below grade, as compared to 9 per cent the previous week. Fiber length was 38 per cent staple 31, 31 per cent staple 32, and 17 per cent staple 30; with the average staple length again 31.3 this week. Micronaire readings were 87 per cent within the 35 to 49 range and 12 per cent low mike, with the average being 40. About 42 per cent of the samples classed were reduced in grade for bark or grass. Fiber strength tests averaged 85,000 pounds per square inch-breaking strength for the

week and also for the season. The quality of cotton classed at the Munday Marketing Services Office was comparable to that of the previous week. Grade 42 was the predominant grade classed at 48 percent. Grade 52 comprised 25 per cent and grade 43 comprised 14 percent of the samples classed. Fiber length was 47 per cent staple 32, 25 per cent staple 31, and 20 per cent staple 33. Micronaire readings were 86 per cent within the 35 to 49 range. About 20 per cent was reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.

Final Tax Payment Due Soon for 1980

Taxpayers must pay by January 16, 1981, the final installment of estimated income if they did not have enough 1980 Federal tax withheld or if their amended income Estimates for 1980 changed substantially during the last quarter, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The one exception to the rule is for taxpayers who file their returns to pay all taxes due by February 2, 1981, according to the IRS.

Generally, taxpayers must file estimated tax if their tax is expected to be \$100 or more if they have more than \$500 in income not covered by withholding.

For additional information. taxpayers may order the IRS free Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," using the order form in the tax package. The publication can be ordered by calling the IRS forms/tax information number listed in the local telephone directory.

Former Students May Have Claim

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said he's got a \$378,247 nest egg for several hundred former Texas college and university students.

To claim the money, Bullock said, all the exstudents need to do is pony up their share of \$1.5 million in defaulted student loans.

The money has built up since August of 1979 when Bullock stopped issuing state checks to anyone owing the state for a delinquent student

State law allows Bullock to hold up payment to an individual or firm who owes the state a debt

Most of the delinquent loans come from the state's Hinson-Hazelwood student loan program.

"Hundreds of former students have settled up millions in past due loans since our effort to collect delinquent loans got underway," Bullock said.

At the end of 1980, however, 706 former students still owed the state about \$1.5 million and the state is still holding checks due them that total \$378,247






