## Bullock Warns Of Sales Tax Increase

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday warned any increase in local sales taxes would lead to an income tax in Texas.

He said the cities, counties, a few hospital districts and some school boards are now on record wanting the Legislature to give them additional sales tax authority.

Texans have accepted the sales tax in its present form but it would cease to be painless if every level of government tried to get a slice of the sales tax pie.

"We now have a four percent state sales tax and more than a thousand cities have adopted an additional one percent tax and two cities have a mass transit sales tax," he said.

"That adds up to five, five and a-half or six percent depending where you live. If every level of government that wants a sales tax gets one, I wouldn't be surprised to see the sales tax reach 10 percent," Bullock said, "and that would be two percent over New York's—the nation's highest."

The rate would be so high that state government would

lose forever the ability to run to the sales tax for revenue and would be forced into an income tax just like 45 other states have done.

Bullock said when the Legislature sends next week it should dump legislative proposals for new sales taxes into the trash can where they belong.

He said government was already paying for most of the roads and highways in the state and a lion's share of public education and public health.

"I'm sick and tired of politicians crying for local control and then standing in the shadow of the Capitol asking for a handout. The state has a pay-as-you-go law that keeps its budget in balance and local governments can do the same."

He said cities and counties should look in their own backyards for the answers before they come running to Austin.

"There's nothing stopping these governments from charging user fees or even adopting their own income tax if their citizens sincerely want more services," he said.

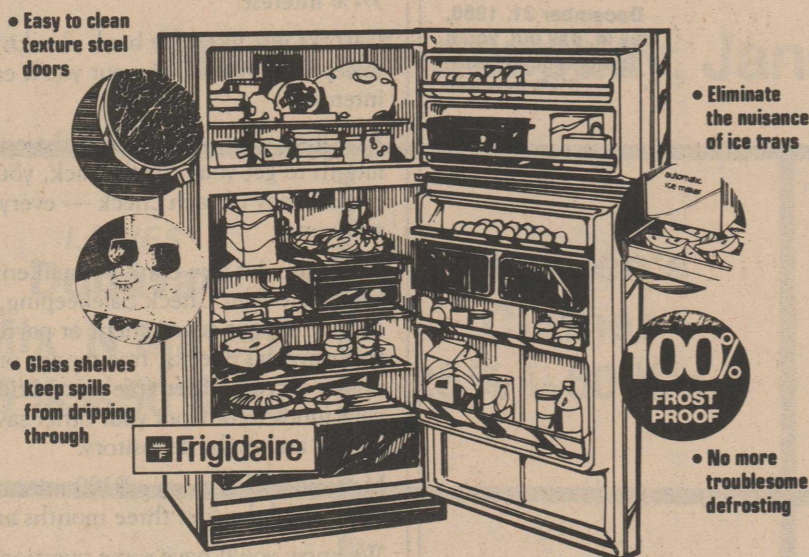

The President's List includes 140 students who have maintained grade point averages between 3.85 and a perfect 4.0 for 12 semester credit hours at WTSU.

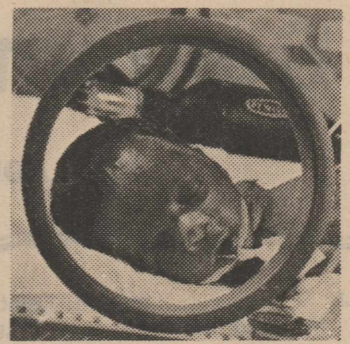

He had a knack for getting the ball in the goal something on the order that John Coussons displays on this year's Johnson City Eagle basketball squad.

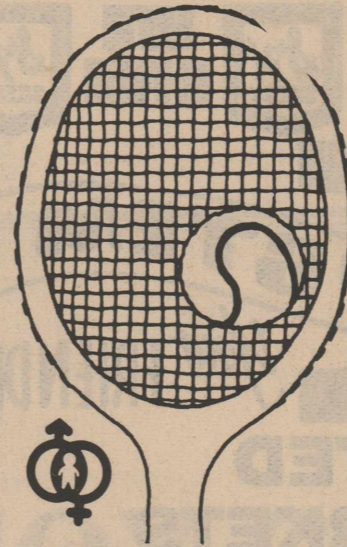
Being a natural shooter ran in Coach Anderson's family. Maybe it is an inherited trait. His little brother was by far

### W-2's Should Be Received By Feb. 2

Employees who have not received their Wage and Tax Statements (Form W-2) from their employers must still file their tax returns by April 15, the Internal Revenue Service advises.

To avoid delays in receiving the W-2, employees should furnish their employers with a current address, the IRS says. If employees do not receive the statement by February 2, they should first contact their employer. After February 15, 1981, the employee should ask for help by calling the IRS toll-free number listed in the telephone directory.

The IRS reminds taxpayers that they must have a W-2 form from every employer they worked for during the year.
