

Locals Aid Rehab '81 **Donations**

ABILENE -- Pledges made at the Rehab '81 telethon benefiting the West Texas Rehabilitation Center January 10 totaled almost \$1 million.

According to Lee Smith, local chairman for WTRC. many donations were called in from Knox City and the surrounding area. Local folk contributing to the Center who were awarded Century Club memberships included Roy W. Smith, \$5,000.00; Lewis Kay, \$200.00; J. McGee \$200.00; and David

and Dusty Bradley, \$200.00. Local chairman Smith commented that the \$5,000.00 donation was given by Roy W. Smith, which is memory of his wife, Mayme, and that the Center had sent him an engraved plate identical to the one which will hang in the children's new wing at the Center in Mrs. Smith's memory.

Sales Tax Rebates Up For '81

AUSTIN, Tex. --State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday made payments totaling \$33.1 million to nearly a thousand cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

The payments represent the first rebates to cities this year who collect city sales tax and about \$10 million more than the cities received in January of last year.

Knox City's net payment this period was \$3,301.26 as compared to \$2,412.09 last year for the same period, reflecting a 36 percent in-

crease. Munday check for this period was \$3,089.69, a 127 percent increase over last year's \$1,359.30.

Aspermont received \$3,217.02, a 109 percent increase over \$1,536.54 last year.

Crowell's check this period was \$1,632.37; Haskell, 5.724.60: Rochester 1 197 47. Rule, \$1,748.09; Seymour, \$2,868,89; and Stamford, \$7,683.44.


Fall continued, "The farm disaster loan program is designed to provide low interest recovery loans for losses sustained during the 1980 production year as declared by SBA's declaration #1900





The quality of cotton classed in Abilene last week was about the same as during the previous week. Grades were one percent white, 27 percent light spotted, 68 percent spotted, and four percent tinged. Grade 53 continued as the predominant grade at 36 percent. Grade 43 comprised 17 percent. About six percent of the cotton classed was below grade. Fiber length was 35 percent staple 31, 32 percent staple 32, 17 percent staple 30, and 11 percent staple 33; with the average staple length being 31.3. Micronaire readings were 87 within the 35 to 49 range. The average mike reading was 40. About 47 percent of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Fiber strength tests averaged 83,000 pounds per square inch breaking strength during the past week, and have averaged

84,000 for the season. Cotton classed at the Munday Marketing Services Office was 38 percent grade 42, 27 percent grade 43, 20 percent 52, and 10 percent grade 53. Fiber length was 41 percent staple 32, 38 percent staple 31, and 12 percent staple 33. Micronaire readings were 88 percent within the 35 to 49 range. About 22 percent of the cotton classed at Munday was reduced in grade because of bark and grass content.


