Locals Aid Rehab '81 Donations

ABILENE - Pledges made at the Rehab '81 telethon benefiting the West Texas Rehabilitation Center January 10 totaled almost \$1 million.

According to Lee Smith, local chairman for WTRC, many donations were called in from Knox City and the surrounding area. Local folk contributing to the Center who were awarded Century Club memberships included Roy W. Smith, \$5,000.00; Lewis Kay, \$200.00; J. McGee \$200.00; and David and Dusty Bradley, \$200.00.

Local chairman Smith commented that the \$5,000.00 donation was given by Roy W. Smith, which is memory of his wife, Mayme, and that the Center had sent him an engraved plate identical to the one which will hang in the children's new wing at the Center in Mrs. Smith's memory.

More than 6,500 pledges to support the treatment center for handicapped children and adults were made during the seven-hour telecast.

Rehab officials announced pledges of \$989,350. This breaks down to \$635,350 pledged for the operating fund of the Rehab Center's three campuses in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder; \$246,000 pledged for the building of a new facility in San Angelo; and \$108,000 bid on auction items.

When the totals are complete, a 1981 budget exceeding \$3.5 million will be presented to the Board of Directors in February.

This was the eleventh annual telethon broadcast on 15 television stations and 11 radio stations in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico.

More than 25 stars, including Rex Allen, Shari Lewis and Jimmy Dean appeared with stars from the Big Band Era, the Lawrence Welk Show, "Days Of Our Lives", and the country-western world.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center is a private, non-profit facility. In 1980, more than 8,000 patients were treated without charge.

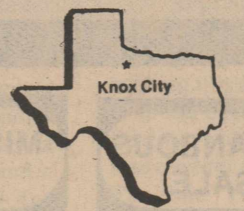

Sales Tax Rebates Up For '81

AUSTIN, Tex. -State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday made payments totaling \$33.1 million to nearly a thousand cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

The payments represent the first rebates to cities this year who collect city sales tax and about \$10 million more than the cities received in January of last year.

Knox City's net payment this period was \$3,301.26 as compared to \$2,412.09 last year for the same period, reflecting a 36 percent increase.

Munday check for this period was \$3,089.69, a 127 percent increase over last year's \$1,359.30.

Aspermont received \$3,217.02, a 109 percent increase over \$1,536.54 last year.

Crowell's check this period was \$1,632.37; Haskell, 5,724.60; Rochester, 1,197.47; Rule, \$1,748.09; Seymour, \$2,868.89; and Stamford, \$7,683.44.

No amounts were given for Benjamin, Goree, O'Brien, or Weinert.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller.

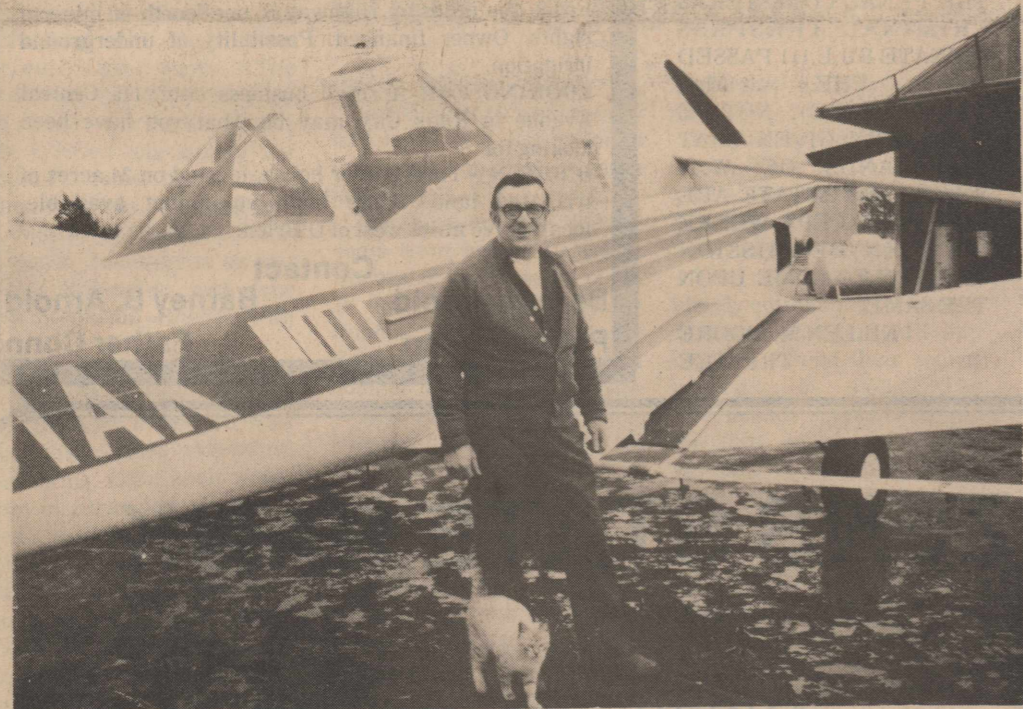

Declaration Deadline Nears

LUBBOCK - "During the months of December and January, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) made arrangements for representatives from the Lubbock Disaster Office to meet with Texas agriculture producers and related businesses at various locations to provide information about the SBA disaster program and make applications available for persons to apply for low-interest recovery loans," John H. Fall, Branch Manager of the SBA Lubbock Disaster Office, said.

Fall continued, "The farm disaster loan program is designed to provide low interest recovery loans for losses sustained during the 1980 production year as declared by SBA's declaration #1900.

Declaration #1900 expires February 12, 1981, and physical loss applications must be received by the SBA Lubbock Disaster Office by the close of business or post-marked by midnight. The deadline for economic injury disaster loan applications is May 12, 1981.

Allied Sprayers, Inc. of Stamford has begun operation in the immediate area following the purchase of Oliver Flying Service January 2.

Allied Sprayers, Inc. was founded 21 years ago in Stamford and the Thatchers, who had an aircraft maintenance business for four years;

bought the firm in November 1978. Mr. Thatcher said he prefers that it be called a cropdusting business because that, specifically, explains the operation. In addition to cropdusting, the firm also sprays a good many acres of brush, he said.

McMurry is a four year liberal arts college jointly owned by the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Conferences of the United Methodist Church, located in Abilene.

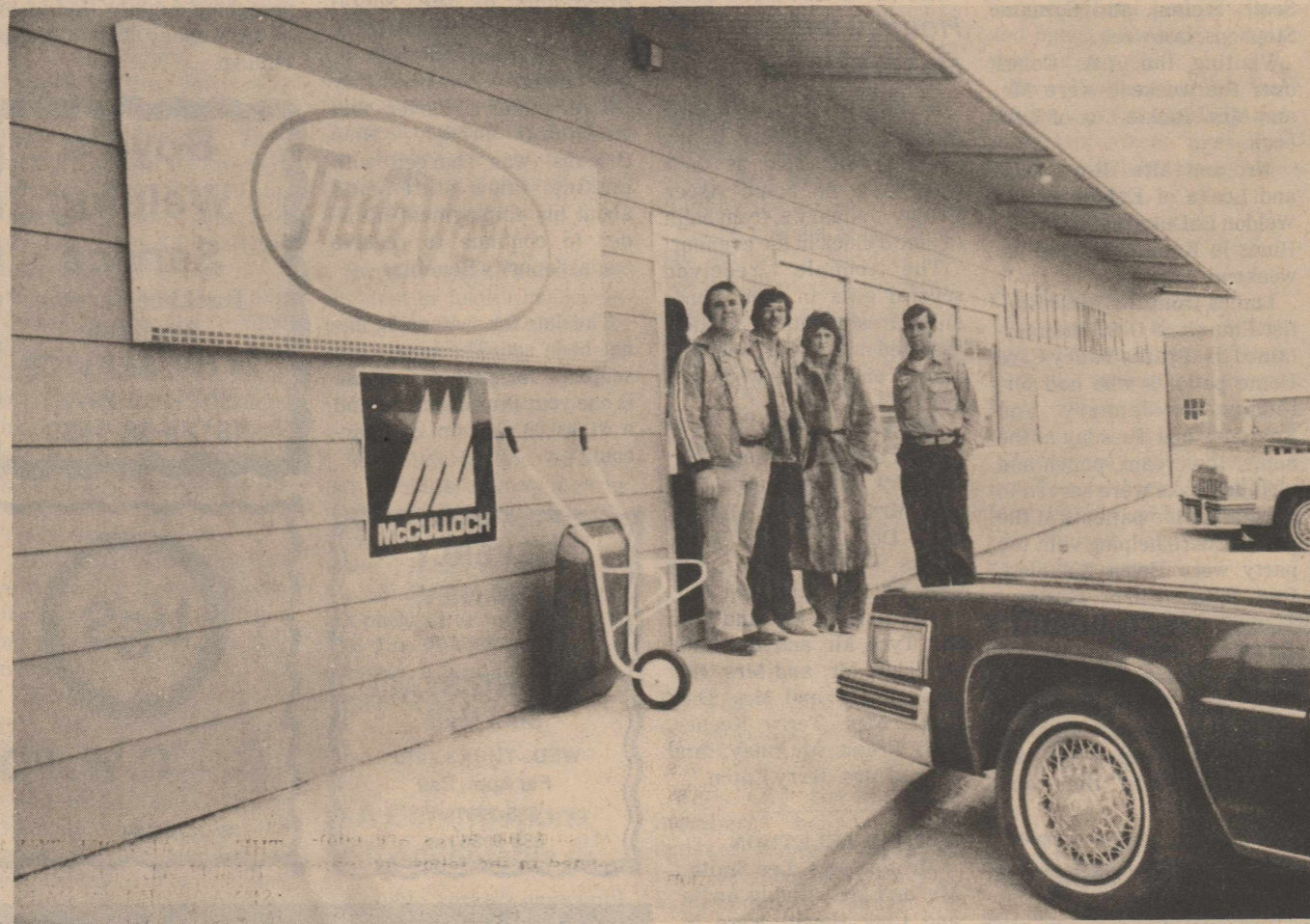
