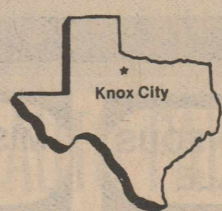

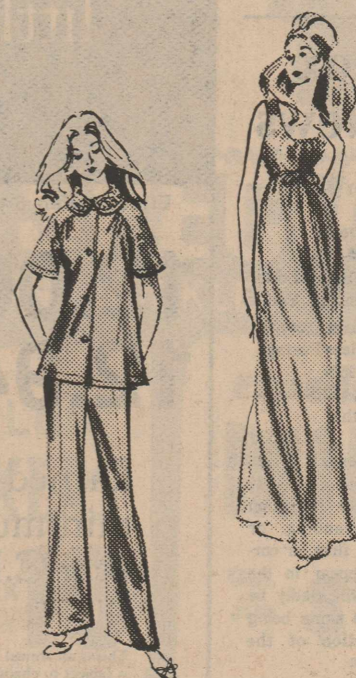

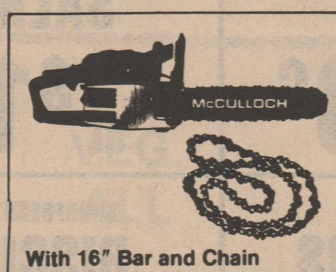

It is the district's intent to grant all possible exemptions; however, a properly executed application is necessary.

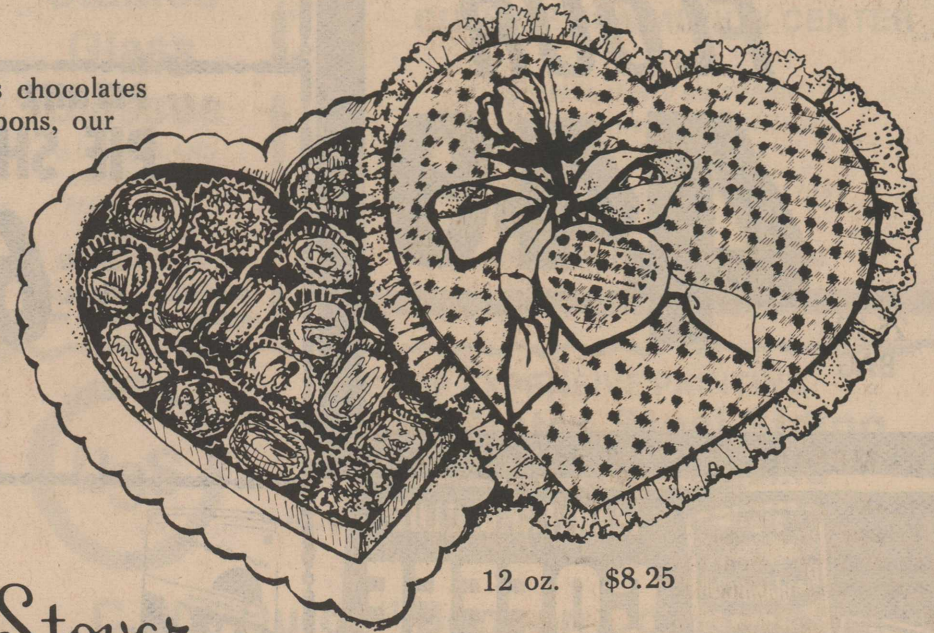
