# Local, Area Voting Results Tallied

Overall Knox County election totals found incumbent Greg Clonts of Knox City winner in his bid for re-election to the Knox County Hospital Board tallying 604 votes county wide. Bill Kingston of Munday received 362 votes followed by Dr. W.F. Thompson with 225.

In the city election, councilman Craig Williams was re-elected with 231 votes and Carol Felts received 202 votes

to fill the two council places. Incumbent Corrie King was defeated by only two votes, receiving 200 votes and Bobby Vasquez received 120 votes.

Unopposed city contests found Charles Auburg re-elected for mayor with 324 votes and councilman Larry Staggs re-elected to a one-year term with 316 votes.

The uncontested election of the Knox City-O'Brien Con-

solidated Independent School District found incumbents J.M. Emerson receiving 336 votes, Allen McGaughey with 330 votes, and John Gillispie with 325 votes.

In the O'Brien city election, Butch Stephens was elected mayor with a write in vote of 8. The three councilmen, C.H. Underwood, Wayne James, and Rayland Hayes, were all re-elected with 11 votes.

School board results in O'Brien saw Emerson receiving 14 and McGaughey and Gillispie each with 15.

City election results in Benjamin found incumbent Vernon D. McCanlies receiving 48 votes for the office of mayor and Don Hertel receiving one write-in vote. Fred McGregor received 59 votes and incumbent Dennis Duke received 58 for the two council seats.

School board results in Benjamin had incumbents Yvonne Conner receiving 68 votes and Charles Griffith and LeMoyné Patterson each receiving 70 votes. Homer Rolston and Buddy Tolson both received one write-in vote.

The Knox County Water Control Improvement District One had Charlie Groves receiving 67 votes while Don Hertel received 68 and Joe Barton 69. All of these men are from Benjamin.

## Debate Team Wins First At District

The District 9-A Debate Contest was held Thursday, April 2, at Vernon. Knox City High School entered two teams and both teams were successful.

Knox City's first team, composed of Jay Rutherford and Kelley Boone, defeated Weinert for the district championship. This marks the third straight district debate championship for Rutherford and Boone.

Knox City's second team of Steve Rutherford and Sarah Jones ended up with a fourth place finish and the alternate position to regional.

Regional competition for Rutherford and Boone will be held in Abilene on April 25 and 26.

Everyone is invited to attend and tour the new building Sunday afternoon, a spokesman said.



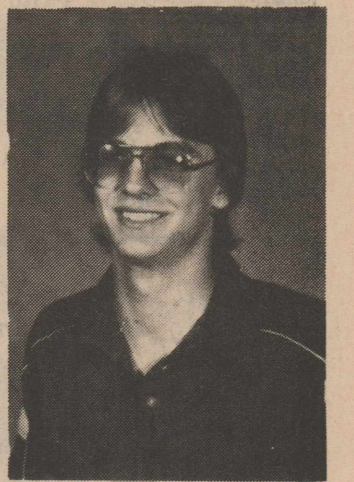


