## Sales Tax Is Down Slightly

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said Houston was not among a list of nearly 1,000 Texas cities to receive April rebates of the one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said he is holding a \$5.5 million city sales tax rebate for Houston until the city clears up a \$287,699 debt owed to the state as the result of an audit of interstate highway traffic fines collected in the city that were not turned over to the state.

Not counting the check due Houston, April rebates totaled \$18.3 million, compared to \$24 million in rebates handed back to cities in April of 1980.

Total rebates this calendar year to Texas cities reached \$180.8 million, about 14 percent more than cities took in during the first four months last year.

Knox City's net payment for this period was \$2,290.52, slightly down from last year's \$2,375.10. Payments to date in 1981 total \$19,173.89, an increase of 12% above last year's \$17,107.40.

Munday received \$1,717.18 for this period as compared to \$1,686.06 for the same period last year. Payments to date are \$14,508.70, a 15% increase over \$12,521.77 last year.

Haskell received \$3,805.13 for this period as compared to \$4,398.24 for the same period last year. Payments to date reflect a five percent increase for 1981 with \$38,428.38. Last year's total was \$36,270.37.

Stamford's net check for this period was \$5,251.95 as compared to \$3,334.20 last year. Payments to date are \$43,082.94, a 14% increase above last year's \$37,572.77.

Seymour's net payment for this period was \$3,273.72, a slight gain over last year's \$3,003.26. Payments to date for 1981 total \$35,653.85, a four percent above last year's \$34,104.06.

Totals for this period for Rochester were \$727.52, and for Rule, \$741.67.

No monthly totals were shown for these towns but year to date totals are O'Brien \$364.49; Benjamin, \$428.66; Goree, \$904.08; and Weinert, \$337.12.

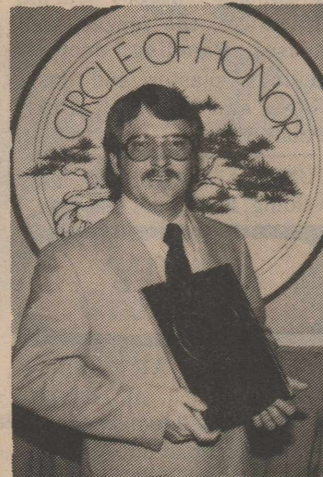

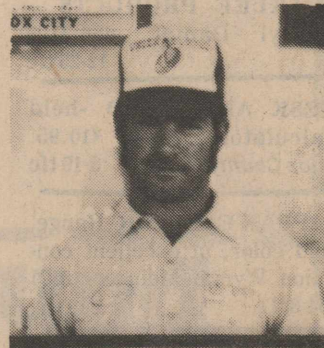

## Nutrition Program Provides Activities

The Knox County Aging Services Program provides a nutritious meal and a variety of activities on a regular basis for residents of the county who are 60 years of age and older.

Currently, four senior centers are in operation within the county. The Knox City center is open five days each week, Monday through Friday. Sites at Benjamin and Truscott are open two days each week, Tuesday and Thursday. The Munday Center is open three days each week, Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

The centers operate with funds from the Older Americans Act, the State of Texas, Knox County and contributions from participants.

Programs throughout the nation, like the Knox County Program, were begun when Congress, in 1972, created the Nutrition Program for the Elderly as Title III-C of the Older Americans Act. Needs of older persons were studied and Nutrition Programs, where these people could meet with people their own age and who had the same needs were the result of the study.

Nutrition Programs are more than just a meal. The purpose of such programs is to nourish the whole person. In addition to providing a meal in a group setting, social interaction is encouraged in an effort to reduce isolation of the elderly.

Supportive services include transportation, information and referral to local agencies which might provide assistance, and activities which help to improve self-image.

Lillian Logan of Knox City coordinates the program throughout the county.

In all 19 counties in the West Central Texas Council of Governments Aging Department, all contributions are considered program income and used to increase the number of people who are served.

Activities this week at the Knox City Center will include exercises Thursday (today) and Tuesday, and a "walk around" Monday. At Truscott, quilting is scheduled Tuesday and Thursday.

Post Office Managers have been accused of showing partiality in the process of promoting employees, instead of on the basis of their experience and efficiency. P.O. clerks and carriers have been accused of being unskilled, uneducated, deficient, etc. On the contrary, most of them are above the average in intelligence and are skillful in their work. Editor's note: First of all, let us agree with you in your statement concerning Gene Clonts and his wife Dovie, and his very nice family. Also, let us agree with you on our postal employees. They are accommodating and cooperative. Now—there are other alternatives in which we believe the U.S. Postal Service could receive income rather than continually seeking rate increases on postage. Back in the 'good ole days', when stamps were one and three cents, many persons enjoyed rural free delivery, but in these days when no one expects something for nothing, why free delivery anywhere? Just think of the income that could be derived from delivery service everywhere if patrons were charged \$1.00 per month payable yearly such as the inspection stickers on our cars. These stickers could be mounted on all mailboxes and when the sticker expired, mail could be withheld until the fee was paid. After all, we in our small town are charged box rent and think nothing of that. Another gripe we have in our area, and a very good one, we think, is that the Abilene district is one of the few in Texas in which Sunday mail was discontinued. The Abilene Sectional Manager, who has since retired, came to Knox City to meet with an interested group of community leaders who expressed extreme dissatisfaction with the discontinued service. He assured the group that within a short time every section of Texas would be denied Sunday service. Today it's not safe for a youngster to ride frontwards down any of Texas suburban or rural streets. Due to the great increase in traffic, bicycles have almost become a hazard to themselves. The very qualities that make them ideal for short distance transportation, such as their lightness and maneuverability add to the hazard.

The rider is too vulnerable. A small pebble can throw a

child off balance and into the path of an automobile. In the hands of a child who doesn't understand the danger of the situation tragedy could occur at any instant.

Children should be made aware that there are certain rules they must obey. A child should form behavior patterns while riding a bike that will be carried over to the time when he will graduate to a responsible motorist.

Today traffic laws apply to bicycles as well as cars and trucks. This is a fatal fact that is often forgotten by young cyclists. It may behoove parents to set safety standards in their own driving habits, because what adults do really makes a strong impression on a child.
