Auxiliary Plans For New Monitor

The Knox County Hospital Auxiliary, in its monthly meeting Monday night at the Thrift Shop, again discussed the purchase of a new heart monitor. The used one brought here several weeks ago was not satisfactory to doctors and nurses and was returned. President Peggy McGaughey learned from hospital administrator Tom Haden that a new one could be purchased from a Dallas firm for approximately \$9,000, but auxiliary members felt that the purchase of another model, even though much more expensive but more efficient, should be looked into. It was also agreed upon that doctors and nurses who would be using the monitor should inspect, if possible, one before making a purchase. If a more expensive model is purchased, auxiliary members felt that the auxiliary might need financial help from the hospital. Tentative plans called for the president and two other officers to meet with the board before any decision was made.

Secretary Margaret Sieck, read the minutes of the previous meeting and president McGaughey, in the absence of treasurer Pansy Bishop, read the treasurer's report showing a balance of \$5,624.95, including interest earned from the recent transfer to a NOW account at the Citizens State Bank and also \$220.00 in memorials.

President-elect Jerry Smith also issued a plea for more volunteer help in the downtown Thrift Shop. She said those working now were working just about all the time they could spare and more volunteers are needed immediately. The Thrift Shop is the main money-making project for the auxiliary and response to the shop has been most favorable she said.

Ten members attended the meeting.

Win District 9-A At Olney

Tracksters' Victory Earns Triple Crown

A total team effort by Coach Jimmy Rogers' Knox City Greyhounds tallied enough for the local tracksters to win the District 9-A track meet held Wednesday, April 15, at Olney.

The rains which occurred throughout the day didn't seem to hamper the Hounds victory as this win also brought them the triple crown making the third district title won by them this year with football and basketball district victories both earlier in the school year.

Rule's Bobcats, who finished second in the meet, won 11 of the 15 events, but Knox City's depth gave them a 62-point win in team totals.

Ten Greyhounds qualified for the Region 2 meet to be held Tuesday and Wednesday, April 28 and 29 at McMurry College in Abilene. The first two finishers in each event qualify for regional.

Leading the qualifying was Knox City's Rickey Gonzales who won the long jump and finished second in the 100 meter dash and the 400 meter dash.

First place wins for KC were Rance Hacker, 110 meter hurdles; Dwayne Watkins, high jump; and Gonzales, long jump.

Winning second were the 400 meter relay team of Glenn Hedgecoke, Chuck Hutchinson, Hacker and Gonzales; David Flores, 110 meter hurdles; Jay Rutherford, 800 meter dash; Gonzales, 100 meter dash, 400 meter dash; Hacker, 300 meter hurdles; the 1600 meter relay team of Flores, Watkins, Steve Lynn and Hutchinson; Arturo Rocha, discus; and Daniel Alsidis, pole vault.

Taking third places were Leach, 3200 meter run; John Reynolds, 800 meter dash; Watkins, 400 meter dash; Flores, 300 meter hurdles; Hedgecoke, 200 meter dash; Leach, 1600 meter dash; Andy Barnard, shot put; Hutchinson, pole vault; and Watkins, long jump.

Federal Land Bank Holds State Meeting

J.E. Nix of Abilene has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell at the 26th Annual Stockholders Meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 60 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 750 persons in attendance.

Thomas H. Benson, president, in his report to the stockholders, stated that there was an increasing demand for new loans in 1980. This was the second largest year of loans closed in the Bank's history, with 3,774 loans closed for a total of \$322.2 million. This compares to 1979 figures of 3,960 loans closed, for a total of \$337.8 million.

"In this period of historic high interest rate, the advantages of variable rate were apparent with our members paying rates somewhat below the prevailing rate," Benson explained.

Speakers for the meeting included, Sonja Hilgren, National Farm Editor for United Press International; Peter Carney, Fiscal Agent for the Farm Credit Banks

and Gerald P. Carr, former commander of Sky lab and a vice president of Bovay Engineering.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas makes long-term loans on farms, ranches and rural residences and currently has 37,500 loans for approximately \$1.8 billion outstanding.

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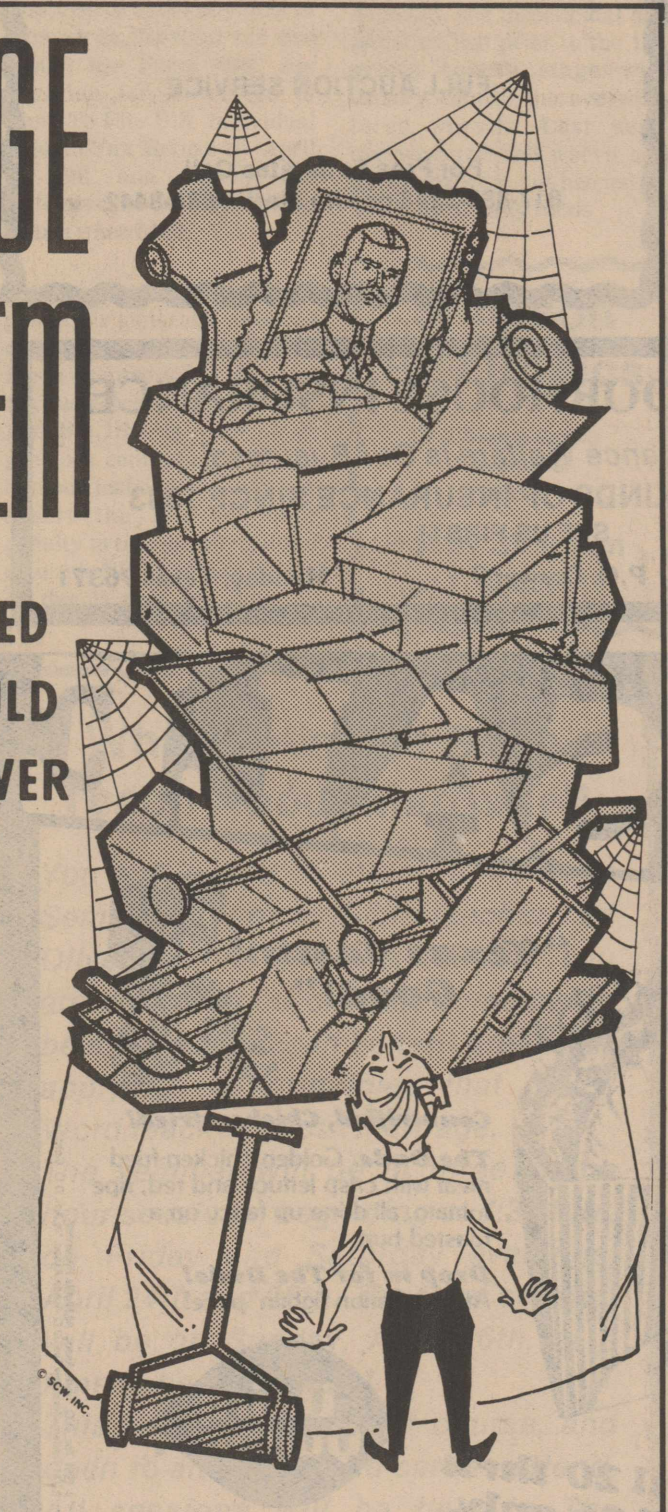
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April's Advice

Texas consumers "talked fabrics" recently and ranked six factors according to order of importance in their clothing choices: easy care, attractiveness and reasonable cost.

Next importance are comfort, fiber content and durability, they said.

To explore consumer needs and preferences for apparel fabrics, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service surveyed 75 adults during January this year. A total of 17 counties participated in a random survey of several adults per county.

Participants also were asked if any qualities not listed in the ranking choices were important. Of those questions, 59 percent said no other qualities were of importance.

A LOOK AT FACTORS

After ranking the six factors or the list, participants were asked to define them.

Here's what most of them said:

EASE OF CARE -- washable and no ironing.

ATTRACTIVE APPEARANCE -- looks nice on me.

REASONABLE COST -- affordable, quality and value.

COMFORT -- good fit and feels good.

FIBER CONTENT -- cotton, makeup of the fabric or fiber, and polyester.

DURABILITY -- long-lasting.

WHAT'S IN A LABEL

To determine what role labels play in a consumer's decision to buy garments or fabrics, the survey asked consumers to rank five common labeling factors.

Participants said factors most helpful are size, care instructions and fiber content. Interestingly not a single par-

ticipant ranked fiber content or care instructions as "least helpful". On the other hand, 60 percent said manufacturer or brand name is least helpful.

FIBER CHOICES

In response to an "open" question: "What fiber or fibers do you prefer?" participants overwhelmingly listed cotton first followed closely by polyester.

Also, cotton and polyester blends were important as were wool and nylon.

Knits got a "first-place vote" from 16 percent of these questions, although knits are a method of constructing fabric rather than an actual fiber.

Participants also were asked why they preferred certain fibers.

Comfort and coolness were important reasons for preferring cotton, while ease of care was the major reason polyester got many votes.

It is additionally interesting, at this point, to note that care was listed as THE most important factor in a buying decision in the first part of the survey.

IMPROVEMENT IDEAS Finally, consumers were asked, "What improvements could be made to make tomorrow's fabrics better?"

"Ease of care" was the most popular response -- specifically "permanent press" and "no iron".

Almost half said that cotton should be improved for no-iron features. Other often-listed improvement ideas included better dyes, knits that don't snag, better quality, more care labeling, better selection and improved fabrics.

WHO PARTICIPATED?

Of the Texas consumers surveyed, most lived in rural areas and small cities or towns. Their ages most often ranged from 36-50 years. Average family size at home was slightly over three, ranging from one to eight. Most annual gross incomes exceeded \$20,000 with only seven percent having incomes of less than \$10.00.

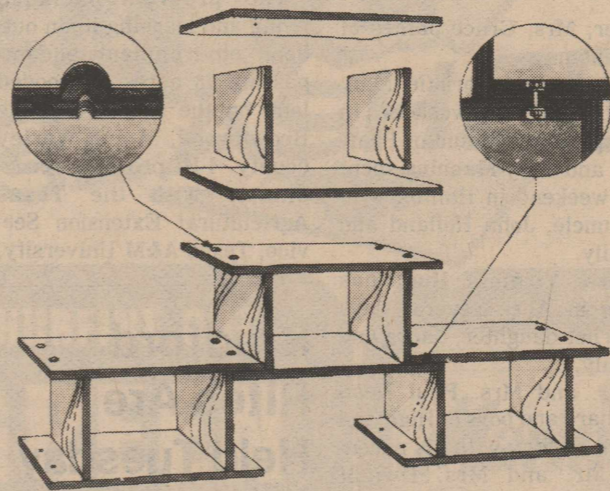

THE HOME WOODCRAFTER

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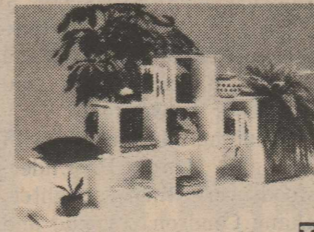


You can use this diagram as a pattern for building a modular storage system.

7. Bolt sections together. Some additional do-it-yourself tips: always measure and mark carefully—using a sharp pencil—before you cut wood. Be sure to double-check your measurements. Whenever possible, lay-up an identical piece of material to duplicate measurements from one board to another.



Here's the finished product: a versatile system for seating or storage.

Use a saw with ten or twelve teeth per inch. If you use a circular saw, a plywood or all-purpose blade is best. Always cut with the wood's good (finished) side up when using a hand, table or radial arm saw; good side down when using a saber or circular saw.

When drilling, always punch a small hole in the spot where you want to drill and place a piece of scrap wood under the piece you're drilling to assure a clean hole.

Use a little white glue even when using nails or screws. And fill all holes or surface irregularities, sand, and then finish the wood.

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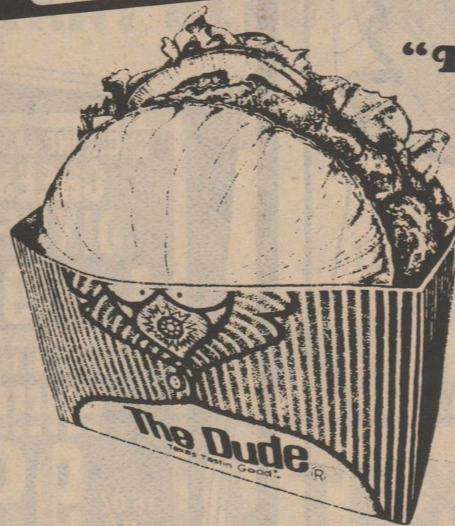

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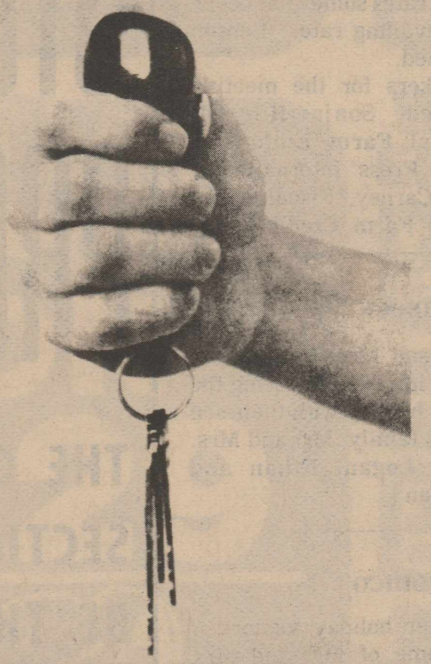
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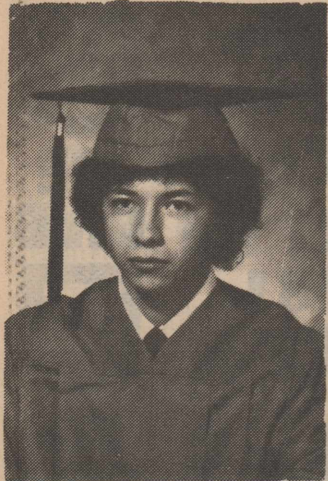

The "Yard of the Month" honors have been presented by the Knox City Garden Club this month to the Hershell Tankersley home located at 409 Central Avenue.

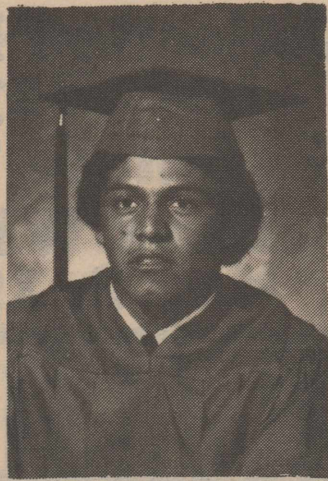
The yard was chosen for the entire neat appearance of the yard and the beautiful blooming flowers in the back of their home as well as the front.

Uniform Planting Date Is Scheduled

A uniform planting date, scouting of hot spot fields and early season boll weevil control where needed are important parts of the boll weevil management program.

For the past four years, boll weevil damage in cotton has been light. A uniform planting date of May 18 will help insure that boll weevil damage will be light in Knox County during the 1981 growing season.

Extension On Windfall Tax

The Internal Revenue Service today said that individuals claiming an overpayment on windfall profit tax on their 1980 income tax returns will have an automatic extension until June 15, 1981, to file their individual income tax return. No penalty for late payment will be asserted if the balance due is paid by June 15, 1981; however, interest, at the rate of 12 percent a year, will be charged on any unpaid tax after April 15, 1981. Taxpayers who wish to avoid payment of interest on the total tax due should file Form 4868, Application for Extension of Time To File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return by April 15, 1981, and pay the tax estimated to be due on the return when filed.

Although the late payment penalty is generally asserted even if an extension of time to file is granted when the total tax due is not paid by April 15, 1981 the IRS, in view of its previous conflicting and ambiguous instructions, will not assert the late payment penalty in this instance, if the return is filed and any balance due is paid by June 15, 1981.

The uniform planting date is the critical first step in the cotton pest management program for counties in the Rolling Plains of Texas.

The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs from May 23 to June 14. Overwintered boll weevils live from 10 to 22 days after they emerge. When cotton is planted after May 18, it will be the last few days of June or early July before 1/3 grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will survive in squares until the squares are 1/3 grown. Research has shown that only a small percentage of the overwintered boll weevils survive until early July. This year less than 0.5% of the overwintered boll weevils are expected to survive.

The uniform planting date also limits the boll weevil populations to hot spot fields. These are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat.

Where boll weevils are detected, one insecticidal application just prior to the 1/3 grown square stage will usually control the overwintered weevils. Last year overwintered boll weevil applications were not needed in any Knox County fields.

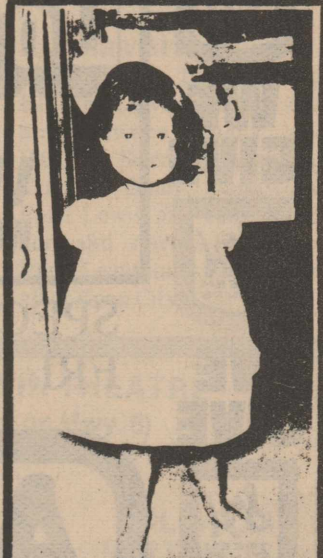

Three Texas Men Arrested On Fraud

Three West Texas men were arrested April 6 as a result of a five-count mail fraud indictment returned by a Federal Grand Jury at Midland.

The indictment charges Kerry Bob Coleman, age 31, of Crane; Howard Leon Ramsey, age 45, of Iraan; and William David Fikes, age 47, of Imperial; with mail fraud in connection with the theft of crude oil from a Sohio Oil lease in Pecos County.

The Grand Jury also charged that Defendant Ramsey falsified production reports to conceal the theft of crude oil from the Sohio lease.

Postal Inspector in Charge W.R. Newsome stated that bond on the defendants had been set at \$25,000 each, and that the indictment capped an eight-month investigation by U.S. Postal Inspectors from the Austin and San Antonio Offices. Also participating in the investigation were Texas Ranger Charlie M. Hodges, Texas Railroad Commission Geologist Edward L. Hall, and private investigators with A.P.I. Service Company and The Branding Association.
